### Parliament.

On Wednesday, the report of the Military Committee on Sr. Carve's Bill respecting political rights of military men was discussed.

Mr. Edward Cooper, as cessionaire of Don Jorge W. Hansen, presented a proposition relative to the building of a port at Coronilla and the exportation of live stock. This was referred to the corresponding Committee.

For want of a quorum, no further business was transacted.

On Wednesday, Dr. A. M. Rodriguez presented a Bill concerning Railway Control, which was referred to the Committee of Legislation.

The discussion of the Budget was then resumed. Sr. Lenzi, in the desire to harmonize opinions, proposed the following motion, "That the General Budget of Expenses sanctioned by this Chamber for 1892-93 shall apply to the period 1893-94."

After a short discussion this was put to the vote and was approved.

The Bill concerning the sending of printed matter to the National Library was then approved in general and in detail, without debate.

The Bill relative to naval and military rank was then brought forward, and was still under discussion when the Chamber was counted out.

The Entertainment Society.

We went to the Lafone Memorial shortly after 8 o'clock on Wednesday evening in fear and trembling, thinking that on such a miserably wet evening not twenty persons would attend, and that it would therefore be necessary to have the performance postponed. However, we were most agreeably disappointed, for in spite of the steady rain, there assembled as large an audience as we have ever seen in the little Hall, and before a quarter to nine there was not a seat to spare. This was all the more gratifying, as this Society has so often been unfortunate in the matter of weather, and in the present case requires all the support attainable, its exchequer being low.

The stage fittings which had been devised for the occasion had a pretty effect, and proved very useful for the purpose. Still, they are capable of much improvement and development, which will no doubt come with time and further experiment. The smallness of the platform and of the Hall itself will, however, preclude their ever being used for any ambitious attempts.

The first part of the programme was of the nature of a concert, which had been organised by Mr. G. Lloyd Davies. Owing to certain circumstances, the original order of the programme had to be departed from, and Mr. Beausire's song was eliminated. The other numbers were all well received, though the audience, perhaps a little damped by the weather, did not call for any encores. Mr. Harry Marshall and Mr. C. Rogberg were both well appreciated in their admirably rendered solos. The duet "The Syren and Friar" between Mrs. Hore and Mr. Marshall was certainly one of the gems of the evening, as might be expected from two such experienced vocalists. Mrs. Morse's solo "A Day Dream" was sung very sweetly, and would have been far more effective if the lady had sung from the front of the platform instead of the side of the piano. The same may be said of the duet "An Evening Song" between Mrs. and Miss M. Morse. Miss Miles's piano solo "L'Automne" was given with

artistic skill and admirable execution and deserved more appreciation than it received, being rather interrupted by late arrivals in the audience. Mr. G. R. Schwartz, one of our most prominent amateur violinists, played Ernst's "Elegie" with his usual exquisite skill and expression. A choir of eight ladies and seven gentlemen, who showed the careful training they had received from Mr. Marshall, sang two part songs. Credit for valuable services as accompanists in this part is due to Miss Blanca Marshall and Mr. G. Lloyd Davies.

The second part was deprived of one of its attractions by the non-appearance of Mr. Still, who was to have played two new waltzes of his own composition. However, Miss Miles, Mr. O'Donoghue and Mr. Davies came forward as ready volunteers to fill the gap thus caused. The two irresistible comedians Mr. Stanham and Mr. Scoones appeared in what was gravely announced in the programme as a dramatic selection "Brutus and Cassius," but which, however, proved to be a clever parody, arranged by one or both of these gentlemen, of several well-known passages from Shakespeare, and more especially of the balcony scene from "Romeo and Juliet." Mr. Stanham as Juliet in a grotesque costume as Romeo, both proved uncommonly amusing, whilst their scholarly misinterpretation of the text and their up-to-date interpolations provoked frequent laughter.

The performance was brought to a successful conclusion by the farce "A Silent Woman." This was short and slender, but none the less amusing. Miss A. L. Jones as the pretended dumb girl and Mr. Fuller as the ardent lover both acted with spirit, and the efforts of the latter to make love into the ear-trumpet caused great laughter. Mr. Denstone efficiently interpreted the minor part of the father.

The Entertainment Society has thus made a successful start in its new departure, and we hope that before long we may be called upon to chronicle more extended triumphs.

### The Silver Coinage.

The petition which we have already mentioned as having been prepared against any further coinage of silver money, was presented to the Chamber of Commerce on Wednesday afternoon, being embodied in the form of a letter drawn up by Sr. R. Pese, in which are set forth the considerations we have previously stated. The Chamber met at once to consider it, and resolved without hesitation that it should be presented to Government in proper form. The petition, we may add, has received a practically unanimous support from the commercial and business classes concerned in the matter, being signed by all the Banks, financial houses, shipping agencies, importing houses, wholesale firms, exporting and manufacturing firms, by the "Centre of Retail Dealers" and a long list of retail houses. Altogether there are over 700 businesses represented and the petition is one of the most potent that has ever been presented. All these signatures were obtained in a few days.

Unless Government wishes to defy and thwart the market even more openly than it has done hitherto, it could hardly have the audacity to reject so powerful a petition. Nevertheless, the official organs pretend to make light of the matter, and, in the face of such overwhelming testimony to the contrary, endeavour to make out that the supply of silver is insufficient. They also revert to the old foolish insinuation that the movement arises from a desire to "make opposition" to the Government, as if business men had any concern in politics beyond the extent to which politics affect their interests, which are the interests of the country.

Outrage at Concordia.  
ASSAULT ON MR. CATLIN.  
(From the "Amigo del Pueblo.")  
The other night on returning from the Contería Central, Mr. Catlin, manager of the Pierce Artesian Well Works in the Plaza, thought that he might pass near the works and see if there was a man on guard as he had ordered. As he approached he saw a man taking away fuel and when he came up he found that the individual in question was a policeman. Mr. Catlin asked him what he was doing, to which the policeman replied that he was getting wood to make a fire for the purpose of making "maté." Mr. Catlin then told the man that he was stealing, as the wood belonged to the Artesian Well Company. The policeman finally told Mr.

Catlin that he was obeying superior orders. Mr. Catlin then went to the Jefatura or head police station with the policeman. On nearing the sentry, the policeman ran ahead and whispered something to the sentinel. Mr. Catlin thereupon approached and requested to know what the policeman had been saying. In reply the sentinel struck him with the butt-end of his Remington. Mr. Catlin protested energetically, whereupon several policemen came out and threatened to arrest him. Mr. Catlin then said:—"All right, I retire. You are decent people, thorough gentlemen, and I am the thief. I am the man who went to steal the wood."

Next day Mr. Catlin wrote to the U. States Minister in B. Aires giving him a full account of the affair. At the same time he informed the chief of Police of what had happened. The Chief immediately ordered the arrest of the policeman implicated in the affair.

These things will happen until we reform our police force. With the small stipend we pay and the treatment we give them, our police men cannot be persons of god antecedents. There may be eight or ten good men amongst them but the rest are thieves.  
Mr. Catlin is a distinguished gentleman and well-known in the capital. When Dr. Zeballos was Minister, he gave him a mission to the U. States.

We sincerely deplore the incident and repeat—so long as we do not reform our police, these things will happen.

### SUNDRIES.

We convey a cordial salute to all our French friends to-day on the occasion of their patriotic anniversary of the storming of the Bastille in 1789. This event was one of the most significant in all modern history, signalling the commencement of the overthrow—still by no means completed—of the power of the classes as exerted for the oppression of the masses.

The industrious fit of the Chambers was of very short duration. On Wednesday the Senators had no quorum and the Deputies were counted out shortly after half time.

The Representatives have at last come to the conclusion that the Budget which they sanctioned for 1893-94 may be applied to the current period of 1893-94. The amendments introduced by the Senate, however, still remain undecided upon, nor does the Chamber show much practical desire to consider them. Of course this means more delay.

Sr. J. W. Hansen has withdrawn the proposal he presented for building at Port at Coronilla and establishing a business for the exportation of live-stock, having been unable to form the necessary syndicate. The same project has, however, been taken up by Mr. Edward Cooper, who, we trust, may be successful in this progressive initiative.

The rain which commenced on Wednesday evening and continued all yesterday, is reported as general throughout the Republic, and as being unusually abundant, such as we have not had for a long time. It has been received on all sides with the greatest thankfulness, being a veritable rain of gold to the estancieros and farmers, whose camps have never yet properly recovered from the prolonged drought of nearly two years. Up to sunset yesterday the rain showed signs of continuing.

The Legislative Committee of the Representatives recommend an absolute and prompt rejection of Sr. Euse's recent petition containing an accusation of malversation against the President and the Minister of Government with regard to the acceptance of tenders for police uniforms. The Committee is of the opinion that Sr. Euse's charges have not the least legal foundation and that there is no proof at all of the statements he makes.

Yesterday's mail brought us a batch of exchanges from the West Coast, which we found chiefly occupied with tales of tortures inflicted on prisoners, abuses and cruelties committed by military officers, and miscarriages of justice, perpetrated through the miserable hole-and-corner secret manner of administration. These are diseases which seem to permeate the whole continent, and that show how far from civilisation Spanish America still is. The English and foreign press throughout the continent is doing good work in exposing and attacking these defects, which must ultimately give way before the advancing tide of European ideas.

Dr. Barriga, the silver contractor, arrived from Chili yesterday. He has just come in time to be informed that the country does not want any more of his silver.  
The numerous French residents will celebrate their national anniversary to-day in the usual manner. There will be receptions at the Legation, banquets, and balls given by the various French Societies.

Cholera is reported from Moscow, Kieff, and Transylvania. 40 deaths from cholera have occurred in the quarantine station of Elton, off Alexandria.  
In another column we give account of the outrage committed on Mr. C. Catlin, who is well-known to many of our readers here where he

is a frequent visitor, by the policeman at Concordia, Arg. Rep. This is another specimen of South American civilisation which supplies its own comment.

Experiments have been made at Washington with nickel for plates for armour-clads, and they been astonishingly successful.

Stamp collectors, of whom there are several amongst our readers, should be warned against a cigar shop in Calle 25 de Mayo, nearly at the corner of Misiones, which offers for sale rare stamps of N. S. Wales, Nevis, and other British colonies, most of which are vile forgeries. If genuine these stamps would be valuable. In Europe the sale of forged stamps is now a penal offence the same as any other fraud, but here it is carried on openly and we do not suppose the authorities would take the trouble to notice the matter even if formally appealed to.

We much regret to hear that the well-known English resident Mr. W. D. Evans is confined to his quinta by an indisposition which we hope will soon pass.

The Municipal Attorney Sr. Arrué has handed to the Committee of the Caridad Hospital the sum of \$800, bequeathed to it by a charitable individual whose name has not transpired.

The naval manœuvres at home have already led to an accident, the cruiser "Medea" having run into the torpedo boat, both being damaged. Coming so soon after the "Victoria" catastrophe, this has caused great impression, giving rise to the idea that the officers are not sufficiently careful in handling their vessels.

The Charley Opera Company will be here next Monday, and will make their debut at the Politeama on Tuesday, the opera being either "Favorita" or "Faust."

No news whatever arrived from Brazil yesterday, the telegraph being still intervened. Neither did any one think it worth while to manufacture any startling reports.

A Paris telegram says that during the first six months of the present year the Customs revenue has been 11 million francs less than for the same period last year, and 34 millions less than was estimated in the Budget. This is regarded as the effects of Mr. Meline's protectionist system, the repeal of which is now called for by all the papers.

The Committee of the Native Ciderella have resolved to invite President Herrera to their dance next week. He has signified his willingness to be present, but begs to be excused from dancing.

The "Nacion" gives an indirect denial to the recent rumours to the effect that the Constitution was to be manipulated so as to keep Dr. Herrera in the presidential seat at the end of his present term. We hope the "Nacion" may for once be speaking the truth, for we cannot imagine any greater calamity to the country than that foreshadowed by the rumour in question.

The Oviedo Theatre at Madrid has been burnt to the ground. No one was hurt.

A New York telegram says that the financial situation in several of the States is daily getting more precarious, and further failures are feared.  
Dr. Herrera has issued an invitation to his friends and allies to a "presidential tea" on Monday evening, on the occasion of the national fête of July 18.

A Berlin telegram says that the Emperor will visit Queen Victoria at the end of August.

The Custom House paid \$19,737 into the London Bank yesterday on account of the foreign debt service.

From London telegrams we learn that the court-martial on the loss of the "Victoria" will open at Malta next Monday.—Mr. Deasy M. P., recently fined £25 for some offence not stated, has resigned his seat.—England having intimated that the new French Ambassador Mr. Decroix is a persona grata, he will present his credentials forthwith.—There is excitement at St. John's, Newfoundland, owing to the French Admiral having refused an invitation to a ball on the Royal Wedding.—In the Rifle Contest at Bisley, the regulars were beaten by the volunteers.—The Municipal (2 Country Council) has decided to buy a large site for the erection of its general administrative offices, which will be built at a cost of two millions sterling.—There have been two big failures on the Stock Exchange and the monetary situation is uneasy.

BUENOS AIRES  
Arrangements are being made for a grand banquet to be given to the Ministers. It will take place in one of the theatres and the table will be laid for 500 guests.

Being asked whether all the provinces which have military forces are to be disarmed, Dr. del Valle replied: "The Argentine Constitution and laws have identical force in all parts of the territory of the Republic." Colonel Gil has returned to La Plata with his small detachment of soldiers and will remain there until all the "clandestine" arms have been given up.  
The Fiscal has been ordered to

send all the depositions and other documents relating to the "Rosales" case to the Minister of Marine so that he may study the same and decide on the course to be adopted in the matter. It is inconvenient that the Chief of the Staff should be the officer who was in command of the squadron of which the Rosales formed part. He may have to declare that he was in fault for leaving the Rosales in a storm, but doubtless, in that case he would, with Brutus-like stoicism inflict upon himself the full penalty of the law.

The Intentional Rugby Football match came off on Sunday afternoon at Lomas before about two hundred spectators, including many ladies, and ended in a win for England and Ireland by two tries, fourteen points to five points.

On Tuesday afternoon, a Message from the Governor of the Province of Buenos Aires was received in the Provincial Chamber of Deputies. It sets forth the facts relating to the surrender of arms to the National Government, gives a history of the formation of the Gaol Guard, which it declares, was only a guarantee of order and security, defends the accumulation of arms and ammunition on the same ground, and concludes by declaring that although the decree of the National Government had been obeyed, it reserves to itself the right of appeal to the proper authority (not mentioned) Sr. Cornelio Romero opened the debate on the Message in a sense favourable to the Governor.

On Sunday night, between Quilmes and Wilde, more than 600 metres of the double line of telephone wires of the Telegraph-Telephone Company, were cut and carried away.

The Minister of Finance has sent a bill to Congress prohibiting any issue of bank notes in any part of the Republic which is not authorized by a National law; also prohibiting the issue of notes, bills, bonds or certificates of which the form, inscription or shape is such that they may be mistaken for National currency. All issues put into circulation under the different names of bonds, titles of credit, treasury bills, &c., are to be withdrawn by the respective Governments, banks or private individuals issuing same, within a year.

At a general meeting of the Agrarian League held on Monday, it was resolved to give the present National Government all possible support in normalizing the general situation of the country and particularly of the Province of Buenos Aires, and also to oppose the nomination of the Provincial Government at the approaching elections.—B. A. Herald.

A fire broke out at 6 p. m. on Tuesday in the Central Produce Market in Nos. 5 and 6 Deposits, where large quantities of grain were stored. The alarm soon spread, and the different Fire Brigades were quickly in motion; the distance between the Produce Market and the different stations being considerable, it was close upon 7 p. m. before the City Brigade under Commander Calaza reached the scene of action quickly followed by the Volunteer Fire Brigade of the Boca, as well as by the floating Steam Fire-Engine. The fire had however taken considerable proportions, and it was evident that the main efforts had to be concentrated against the propagation of the conflagration to the other deposits. Fortunately there was no lack of water, as is generally the case in all fires, and by the strenuous efforts of the different Fire Brigades, the devastating element was got well under by 8.30 p. m., when all fears of its extension to the other deposits vanished. The portion of the Building, where the fire was concentrated is seriously damaged, part of the roof having fallen in, as well as three floors of the three storeys. The damage done is reputed to be considerable, the grain and other produce, therein deposited, being entirely consumed. Considerable damage by water was also occasioned to the produce deposited in the adjacent deposits, and we understand that little or nothing is covered by insurance. The fire still continued at midnight, but was thoroughly under control, and a word of praise is due to officers and men for the efficient work done in preventing the spread of the flames. The fact that there was no wind to fan the conflagration, and the Building being entirely isolated, contributed in a very great extent to the success of the firemen's efforts at concentrating the fire within the aforesaid deposits. The cause of the fire is unknown.—Times of Argentina.

THE OCCUPATION OF EGYPT.  
A FRENCH TRIBUTE TO BRITISH REFORMS.  
PARIS, JUNE 7.  
The "Figaro" to-day publishes a long article headed, "The British in Egypt," and signed "Felix Dubois," in which the writer states the results of an investigation which he undertook into the administration of Egyptian affairs under British auspices.

"I frankly confess," says M. Dubois in the outset, "that I started for

Egypt two months ago with the idea of bringing back something corresponding to Gladstone's Bulgarian atrocities.

«Since the British tutelage began,» he proceeds, «Egypt has incontestably and from every point of view made notable progress.»

Similarly eloquent testimony is borne by the correspondent to the perfect regularity with which the three great Departments of War, Finance, and Public Works are carried on under British control.

M. Dubois proceeds to ask whether the French have not themselves to thank for the British occupation, and states that M. de Reversaux, the present French Minister in Egypt, has by his amenity, tact, and firmness preserved the positions which the French still retained, and even regained some of those which had been lost.

Reviewing in detail the services by these officers, the correspondent remarks that Colonel Scott-Moncrieff is an extremely curious type of Quaker, who carries on irrigation works with a Bible in his hand, his motto being: «God, embankments and canals.»

With respect to the question of evacuation, the writer of this remarkable article scouts the idea that any complaints were heard, and the British functionaries have inspired, if not sympathy, at least the general respect.

FOREIGNERS IN FRANCE.

PARIS, JUNE 8.

M. Maurice Barris, the Boulangist Deputy and a writer of some talent, is preparing an anti-alien measure, of which he gives a sketch in the «Figaro.»

It is noted that one of the most striking results of the Indian Census—apart from the extraordinary increase of Mohammedanism—is the discovery that many of the Indian peoples, who are traditionally believed to be of stay-at-home habits, had been described as such even in the Census of 1881.

A remarkable regatta is to be held at Lake Geneva, Wisconsin, on August 14 and on the ten following days. The Chicago Navy is sending delegates to confer with the crews at Oxford, Cambridge, Berlin, Dublin, and Australia.
