POLITICS.—THE REVOLUTION.

THE ELECTIONS.

Respecting the alleged revolution, it is still impossible to form a definite idea as to its object or importance, or to give definite ideas as to its progress. The absurd step of the Government in prohibiting the passage of any political reference by telegraph — a step which probably has quite as much to do with the elections as with any subversive movement — has deprived our contemporaries and ourselves of the usual sources of information, and consequently actual news is both scarce and uncertain.

One of the latest conjectures is to the effect that the disturbance in Cerro Largo is merely the outbreak of a long-standing feud or vendetta between the families of Saravia, the alleged leader, and of General Muñiz who is in command of the Government. The peculiarity is that both leaders are «blancos» in politics and the followers of both are wearing «blanco» badges. This would reduce the affair to a mere personal question of local importance. This conjecture, however, is not supported by the fact of armed bands having appeared in other Departments, which seems fairly certain, though denied officially. It seems certain that there has been a rising in Durazno, under Eusebio Carrasco, and in Nico Perez, under Juan José Muñoz, both «blancos» of influence. Similar reports, though not confirmed, appear from other places. Several of the Departmental capitals are practically in a state of siege, owing to the repressive measures taken, and the greatest uneasiness prevails. Very little credence is attached to the official telegrams stating that all is tranquil, and which are contradicted by private letters pressing in being largely employed, and has caused great alarm among the pacific labouring population, who are consequently doing their best to get quickly out of the way. This is proving a serious impediment to shearing and other agricultural operations, at an important period of the year.

Official telegrams from Melo and Artigas, dated Friday evening, represent the revolutionists as in full flight towards Rio Negro, pursued by General Muñiz and Col. Juárez, whose combined forces are said to be some 600. The revolutionists were said to be some 400 in number, well mounted, but badly armed, and they were dispersing in all directions. Their leaders were said to be Chiquito Saravia (a brother to Aparicio), Viramonte, Commandante Oviedo and Eusebio Carrasco. Nothing was known of Aparicio Saravia.

The above statement has not made much public impression, and on the other hand it is stated by the *Nacional* and from other sources that Chiquito Saravia, at the head of 800 men, has defeated Col. Aguiar and a police force in Cerro Largo, taking prisoners, arms and horses. A youth, son of Col. Muñiz, is also said to have been taken prisoner. There are reports of police officers and men having been killed or wounded

in skirmishes in various parts, but none of these are very certain.

Whether on account of the revolution or of the elections, the Government seems disposed to go to extreme measures, and it is generally expected that a state of siege will be proclaimed to-morrow or very soon. This already practically exists in some of the Departments. Telegraphic intervention has been extended to the offices of the Western & Brazilian Company, and no political or cipher messages are allowed to pass in any telegraphic office, whether for the Republic or abroad. This prevents news relative to the revolution coming from Rio Janeiro or Brazil. On Friday evening police officers prohibited a number of men, mostly young, from embarking in the river steamers, it being alleged that it was known they were going to Buenos Aires with revolutionary purposes. This act has been denounced by our contemporaries as entirely illegal, though in so far as some of the persons detained were minors it seems to us justified if done at the request of their parents. Passenger movement in the port has been placed under strict supervision, and boatmen may not take or land passengers after sunset without special permission. Even cargo traffic has been put under control, possibly to prevent the landing or embarking of arms. It is said that an order of arrest has been issued against Sr. E. Acevedo Diaz, the editor of the *Nacional*, whom the *Nacion* has denounced as a leader of the movement. On account of this he will not return from Buenos Aires for a while. The *Nacional* still professes entire innocence of the movement, and expresses neither approval nor disapproval, though continuing its violent attacks on the Government, in which, however, it is by no means alone. It is alleged that Government agents have been at work revising and reading the postal correspondence of «suspected» persons. These extreme measures are making a bad impression, as showing that the Government is either engaged in some plan against public liberties and guarantees (which would surprise nobody) or that the revolution is much more serious than events would yet seem to have shown. Perhaps they are also the result of nervousness arising from a bad conscience.

In Montevideo itself everything seems remarkably quiet. The large majority of the people go about their daily tasks as usual, and superficially at all events, only show a modified interest in what may be happening. The agitation is confined to official, military and political circles, which have little in common with the daily business life of the city. Business is depressed, but that is no novelty.

As we have said, it is still quite impossible to form any definite idea of the real nature of the revolution or whatever the movement may be called. It seems to be composed of «blanco» elements, but at the same time is repudiated by the majority of the «blancos» nor is it recognised as the revolution which the extreme «blancos» were generally believed to be preparing. Even those who most frequently talked of revolution seem to have been taken by surprise. There has been no proclamation or «pronunciamiento», at least none that we have heard of, to afford an explanation. Our leading contemporaries seem equally in the dark. For this reason the public mind is kept in suspense, but we think we may state it as very certain that if the movement shows any signs of holding out, or is able to score a few small successes at the outset, it will very quickly be joined by a number of those now in doubt, and will become a serious affair. There is a strong revolutionary spirit abroad, both among the «blancos» and the independent «colorados», and these, to use a vulgar but expressive saying, are only waiting «to see which way the cat jumps», before deciding on their own line of conduct.

Yesterday's *Razon*, after analysing the various conflicting rumours as to the nature of the revolution, on which it finds itself unable to arrive at any conclusion, winds up its article as follows: — «The revolution is the work of Sr. Idiarte Borda, but not in the sense understood by the *Siglo*. It is doubly his work; first, because he has not known how to disarm it by means of prudent concessions which would have facilitated the concurrence of all parties in the electoral struggle — and secondly because he has not known how to forestall it by the constitutional means corresponding to the Executive Power. Sr. Borda, who found the country admirably disposed for a pacific evolution, repudiated all political compromise as unworthy of his pride. He was satisfied with force (power would be a better word), and since he held that, he hardly ever cared to employ it for the preservation of public order. He has not cared to create moral peace, and has not known how to preserve material peace. Will he know how to restore the latter rapidly? Will he profit by the lessons of experience? These are the questions asked by patriots in the present moments.»

The *Siglo* finds itself equally at a loss to explain the movement, and

strongly urges the Government to open the telegraph lines, so as to let the people know exactly what is occurring and so as to give grounds for the prevalent suspicion that its movements are dictated by shameful electoral purposes. It also warns the government that its present conduct may only precipitate the real «blanco» invasion of which there has been so much talk.

Several of the leading native papers of Buenos Aires publish articles commenting on the revolutionary movement, and for the most part agree in expressing the opinion that, whatever happens, the Government itself must be held primarily responsible for the provocations it has given the people.

Yesterday's *Nacion* kindly says that the «opposition» press, that is to say nearly all the papers in the Republic except itself, are the real revolutionary factors, on account of their attacks on the Government, which, it proclaims for the thousandth time, is the incarnation of honesty, purity, legality, constitutionality, moderation, and all the other political virtues. Such an opinion is worthy of the *Nacion*.

The Elections.

The parliamentary «elections» so-called, will take place throughout the Republic to-day. How farcical they will be, and how exceedingly little the people will have any share in them, our readers already know. They will simply be one more disaster added to the many political disasters and scandals that have degraded and depressed the Republic in the last six years. We cannot say what police or military measures will be taken, for no announcement has yet reached us. We will not venture to predict that there will be any disturbance or disorder — most probably no one except official voters will attempt to approach the polling tables, knowing it to be a mere waste of labour — but those who are not personally interested will do well to be on the safe side and keep out of harm's way.

Latest.

Aparicio Saravia is reported as having appeared in the Department of Tacuarembó, with a force variously estimated at 200 to 300 men.

The dispersion of the revolutionary body in Cerro Largo seems to be confirmed, though it is also said they are merely going to join Saravia. Official telegrams speak of the movement as practically broken up. No further bloodshed is reported. There are contradictory tales relative to the capture of Col. Aguiar by the revolutionists, and his prompt escape.

Great numbers of young men of the working classes are coming into the capital from the camp to avoid pressing. Many of these hope to make their way to Buenos Aires. Press gangs are said to be at work nightly in the various suburbs of Montevideo, Paso Molino, Barrio Reus, Union, etc. and even in some streets of the city itself. This is causing great discontent.

ROYAL MAIL STEAM PACKET COMPANY.

At the general meeting of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, Limited, at Cannon-street Hotel, on Wednesday, October 28, Mr. T. R. Tufnell presided. — In moving the adoption of the report, the Chairman observed that it was a long time since he had the pleasure of meeting the shareholders with a report such as he presented that day. There was an increase on earnings with a reduction in expenditure. It would not have been unsatisfactory to observe that after writing off something like £50,000 for depreciation they had been able to reduce the balance at the debit of the repair and renewal account by £22,000, and make distribution among the shareholders at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum. On the credit side of the account there was a diminution of the postal earnings caused by a reduction in the Government subsidy, payable under the new contract which came into force on July 1, 1895. Under the head of freight there was an increase of £3,000, nearly all upon the Brazil route. It was divided in equal proportions, but it was divided between all the three items — outward, intercolonial, and homeward; and he was glad to be able to tell them it was partly owing to some improvement in the rates of freight. There was no pleasure without its alloy, and steamship owners appeared to be specially handicapped; for no sooner had rates begun to improve than up went the price of coal at all foreign stations, and that took some of the gilt off the gingerbread. In passage money there was an increase, chiefly on the Brazil route, and occasioned partly by increase of emigration from the Peninsula ports. On the other side the first and most important item showed a decrease in coal charges of over £12,000. One-half of that was due to reduced consumption, the other half to a reduction partly in freight and partly in the cost of coal. There were only four items on that side of the account which showed any increase, and in two of these the amount was so trifling that he did not think it called for any comment. In port charges they would see there was an increase of over £1,000, which was

caused by their having called at a great number of ports on the road — of course, with the view of obtaining more passengers and cargo. The increase in the next item (general service, £960) was chiefly the commission paid upon the additional freight and passage money thus earned. All the other charges showed a reduction, amounting in the case of those expenses to nearly £1,700. On the whole the expenses had diminished by £14,200, and, adding the increase on the other side, the result of the general working was an improvement of £28,500 in the revenue account, which he hoped the shareholders would regard as satisfactory. Passing over profit and loss, they came to repair and renewal account, which showed at the commencement of the year a debtor balance of £58,500. The charges against the account during the last half-year had been £8,000 less than during the corresponding period of last year. That was equally divided between ship and engine repairs. The result of this reduction, coupled with the additional amount transferred from revenue account, had reduced this debtor balance of £58,500 to £36,580. Then they came to the first insurance account, and it was gratifying to find from the admirable manner in which their ships were navigated that the whole charge for the half-year was so low; so that, after making distribution to the shareholders of 30s. per share, they were able to carry forward a balance of just over £4,000. Turning to the report, they would find a reference to the new ships which had been constructed with a view to improving their Brazil service. The «La Plata», the first of these, had not yet completed the first voyage; but, from all that they had heard, her performance appeared to have been entirely satisfactory. The second ship the «Minio», sailed from Southampton on the 22nd, and after calling at the Peninsula ports, proceeded on her voyage to the Brazil toll of passengers and cargo. He also referred to the death of Captain Bevis, who for sixteen years had been the company's superintendent for Southampton. — Vice-Admiral A. J. Coatsfield seconded the adoption of the report, and, after a short discussion, it was adopted.

SUNDRIES.

— We should be wanting in common gratitude if we did not express our obligations for the numerous expressions of sympathy that we received during our troubles of the last fortnight, occasioned by the strike. They entered into the situation fully and generously, and not from any one of them have we heard any complaint on account of the irregularities and deficiencies of our appearance. To copy Hamlet, we care only say «Beggars as we are, we are even poor in thanks.»

— We also think it necessary to express our obligations to the Lithographic Establishment «La Sud Americana» of Pedrosa and Co., Calle Treinta y Tres 87, who undertook the work of lithographing our paper, performing the task with most commendable execution, promptitude, and at a most moderate charge. This is the same firm that lithographed the illustrated programmes for the Entertainment Society.

— Says a late London paper, — «Campaign badges are being very largely worn in America. Most of them are in the form of pins. The Republican pin bears the full-faced portrait of Mr. McKinley set in the national flag, nine stars glistening in white on a blue field above his head, while the lower part of the semi-circular border is framed by the red and white stripes. The followers of Mr. Bryan have adopted a similar device, though in his case the stars are largely conspicuous by their absence, and the stripes are placed the wrong way about. There is, by the way, considerable resemblance between the two men, especially about the broad high forehead, the clear-cut nose, and the firm set mouth and chin. Mr. Bryan, according to his picture, wears a low collar, while Major McKinley goes in for a high one. It is eminently characteristic of the genius of the nation which believes so greatly in advertising that the campaign

badges are backed with advertisements of cigarettes and other articles.»

— The Christmas Card season is once more upon us. Cards posted up to next Saturday's mail will reach England before the end of the year, it not actually in time for delivery on Christmas Day. Mr. Callender of Sarandi 142 has a capital assortment of Cards of new designs, the humorous ones being specially good, and they have the additional recommendation of being as cheap as the barbarous duty exacted on these articles will permit. Jacobsen and Galli also have a good assortment of a more elaborate description.

— Dr. F. E. Gladstone has been telling an amusing examination story to the Royal College of Organists. The examiner evidently had in his mind the time it takes for sound to travel; and he asked: «When a regiment is marching with the band playing, do the soldiers' legs all move at the same time?» And a candidate, without a smile on his face, quietly replied: «The soldiers' legs obviously cannot all move together, because the left legs move at one time and the right at another.»

— Von Bülow divided all opera-composers into two classes, those who add to the repertory of the barrel organ, and those who borrow from the same.

— We remind cricket players of the match M. V. C. O. versus C. U. R. C. O. to be played at Peñarol to-day. The weather is most unsettled, a circumstance necessary to mention in juxtaposition.

— The Children's Zarzuela Company is announced to appear at the Solis Theatre next Tuesday. They have won high commendation in the Buenos Aires papers, though for a part we do not care much for these kind of performances, nor can we regard them as genuine art. They are no innovation, however, for they played the same even in Shakespeare's time. In Hamlet, the tragedians of the city are represented as having been driven from their occupation by «an outcry of children, little eyes, that cry out on the top of the question and are most tyrannically elated for; these are now the fashion.»

— The event of to-morrow (Monday) will be the first Annual Dinner of the St. Andrew's Society of Uruguay, at the Hotel Central. The bill of fare, which includes a glorious Haggis and a proper proportion of «mountain dew» is most tempting, and the banquet will be followed by an interesting programme of speeches, toasts, songs and recitations. Although the occasion is essentially a Scotch one, it is hoped that admirers of the Rose and Shamrock will also be present. Tickets may still be had on application to Mr. M. Adam, and one little gold sovereign covers the cost of dinner, wines, etcetera (there is to be plenty of the last named), and an excellent evening's amusement.

— The illness of ex-president Julio Herrera reached an acute stage on Friday evening, and reports were even circulated that he had succumbed. A surgical operation was performed which gave him much relief, and yesterday he was said to be rather better, though still in a high fever. Contradictory accounts still appear as to the real nature of his complaint.

— One telegram having stated that the London Times approved the Statutes of the Bank of the Republic of Uruguay, another has followed it stating that the *Times* has severely attacked the Bank. Is a pity these telegrams cannot agree.

— Affairs in the Philippines continue to look very serious. British and other men of war have been ordered to Manila from the Chinese and Japanese stations.

— The Portuguese Government has issued a Decree authorising the importation of wheat to cover the deficit in the harvest of the present year.

— The Brazilian Deputies have approved the Italo-Brazilian convention, which is now referred to the Senate.

BUENOS AIRES.

— United States Minister and Mrs. Buchanan gave a dinner on Thursday night at the Royal Hotel to about a dozen Americans who are staying in the Hotel. The menu was got up in true Thanksgiving style, special pains have been taken to prepare the national dishes. Those present were Minister and Mrs. Buchanan, master Don Buchanan, Consul Baker, Mr. and Mrs. Stephen, Mrs. and Master George Stephen, Mrs. and Mrs. Varick, Mr. Trejelles and Miss Trejelles, Miss Gates, Miss Farnell, Miss Robl and Messrs. Pratt, Legler and Allen.

— We are informed that there is every probability of the extradition treaty between Argentina and the United States becoming a law in the near future. The United States Congress meets in about two weeks in Washington and it is expected that the treaty will be acted on early in the session as it is President Cleveland's desire to have it sanctioned during his term of office. The treaty is quite similar to the one between this country and England.

— We notice that two expert mining engineers Robert Neil Williams

and J. E. Carney have just arrived from California and are staying at the Royal Hotel. They have come here in the interest of California and Buenos Aires capitalists and are prepared to make an exhaustive report on the mines in the Argentine Republic, upon which report, if favourable, a large amount of capital will be put into Argentine mining properties.

Among the passengers by the "Clyde" are Mr. and Mrs. Varick of New York who have been spending several months in the city. Mr. Varick is the special representative of the Union Nut and Bolt company of New York and recently sold out the company's interests in this city to Varela and Company. They have formed very pleasant associations here and take with them a delightful recollection of the city and an unbounded faith in its future. We shall expect to see Mr. Varick in Buenos Aires again before many years.—B. A. Herald.

LONDON NOTES.

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 2.
Saturday was kept as "Flag Day" by the supporters of Mr. McKinley throughout the United States. In New York a monster procession numbering at least 125,000 men filed through the streets, 16 abreast, from ten in the morning till late in the afternoon. Each man carried a small flag, and all the houses flew the Stars and Stripes. It is estimated that a million spectators were in the streets through which the procession passed. Similar demonstrations were made in all the large cities.

Prince Bismarck has replied, through his Hamburg organ, to the statement made on Tuesday by the official "Reichsanzeiger" on the subject of the secret treaty. A Berlin Correspondent is able to state positively that the recent disclosures were the work of Prince Bismarck himself and not of members of his family; also that certain clauses of that treaty have even now not been made known. These, it is believed, would demonstrate Prince Bismarck's bad faith to Austria.

Dr. Creighton, Bishop of Peterborough, has been appointed to the Bishopric of London in succession to Dr. Temple, translated to the Archbishopric of Canterbury.

Mr. J. Chamberlain, M. P., was on Saturday elected Lord Rector of Glasgow University. He obtained 751 votes against 517 given to Mr. Augustine Birrell, M. P., a majority of 234. The election was marked by scenes of great turbulence. All the windows of a music hall, known as the Skating Palace, were smashed with sticks, stones, or vegetables. The hose was turned on the crowd and ultimately eight of the ringleaders were arrested. These were subsequently admitted to bail.

Lord Wolsley, opening the new headquarters of the Tower Hamlets Royal Engineer Volunteers on Saturday evening, spoke of the Volunteers generally as being now part and parcel of her Majesty's forces. There was every desire at headquarters, he said, to give them all possible encouragement. Their weak point was their shooting. He paid a high compliment to the physique and discipline of the Tower Hamlets Engineers.

The Lady Mayoress on Saturday presented the prizes to the successful students of the Guildhall School of Music, at the Guildhall, in the presence of a great number of visitors. A concert was given by the students on the occasion.

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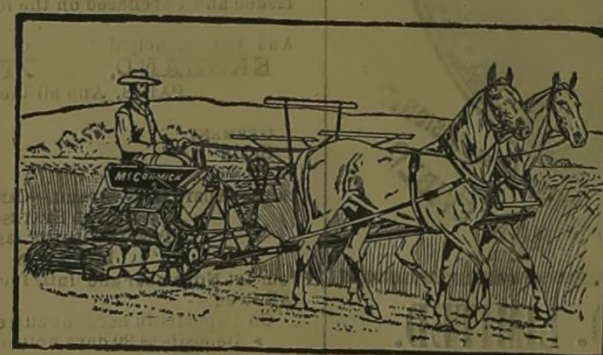
