THE PRESIDENTIAL PROBLEM.

We are within less than seven months of the forthcoming presidential election, and notwithstanding all the political ferment of recent months, nothing but doubt and obscurity still obscures the important problem of the future presidency of the country.

Yet, there rarely was a period when that problem presented itself with greater importance than at present.

After some ten years of steadily increasing political degradation and corruption which have sapped the life and tarnished the name of the neighbouring republic of Argentina, which appears at last to have entered, not without violence in the effort, on a serious attempt at regeneration which affords great room for hope and may lead to great results. The necessity for such a reaction—a revolution not of arms but of men and ideas—in Uruguay, is equally pressing. For more than ten years, we might even say for twenty, Uruguay has politically and morally been upon a downward path. Extravagance, bad faith, political corruption and financial immorality, have each done their worst, until the republic has sunk deep into an abyss of depression and discredit, and the public men at the head of affairs, as was the case in Argentina at the time of Celman and in the provinces until yesterday, enjoy neither confidence nor respect.

Worst of all, cunning means have been taken effectually to sap the independence of the Chambers, so that they no longer even nominally represent the interests of the people, and similar means have been employed to deprive the people of all vote, voice or influence in public affairs, so that whilst the dry shell or husk of a republican form of government is preserved, in reality the government is a despotic oligarchy in the hands of a narrow circle, and solely maintained in its power by the strength of military support, for which the people are taxed beyond endurance. As we recently said, it is hardly possible to imagine a continuation of such a situation without precipitating the result either of a regrettable revolution of the people against the government and the army, or without completing the discredit and ruin of the country resulting in a sacrifice of her independence.

The real problem to be resolved next March is, then, whether the government will remain in the hands of the party whose domination has proved so injurious to the country, or whether opening will be found for a reaction in favour of honesty, morality and restoration of the power to the people, such as is now taking place in Argentina. Our greatest hope for the latter lies in well-known fact that the march of events in the two republics has always been on similar lines, and therefore that as we have accompanied Argentina in her political corruption, her financial immorality and the consequent crisis, so it is possible we may accompany her in the reaction. And if this can be done without the disorders of revolution and the horrors of civil war, so much the better for us.

At the same time, it must be confessed that up to the present the problem shows no signs whatever of a solution in this eminently desirable direction. It must be remembered that the President has to be elected, not by the direct vote of the people, but by the Chambers, which will be renewed next November. And under the present perversion of political institutions, election to the Chambers depends entirely on the goodwill of the present President and governing party. And, so far, the legislative elections under the Herrera administration have been the corruptest imaginable, far more so than they were under Tajos, even more so than they were under the corrupt Santos. And with the new electoral laws it will be possible to carry this corruption to the furthest extreme, so that every spark of inde-

pendence in the Legislative body will be effectually eliminated. It may be said beforehand that the next legislature will practically be a dependency of the Executive composed of men who, instead of coming to the Chambers as representatives of the people and determined to protect their interests even at the cost of self-sacrifice, will come as political adventurers accepting a salary of \$12 a day in order to support the ideas instilled into them by the Executive and to protect the interests of their own party as opposed to those of the people and the Republic. From Chambers thus constituted there is little to be hoped for, nor is it hardly to be expected that, even if left the freedom of choice, they will elect a President of reactionary ideas which, while rescuing the Republic, would inevitably militate against their own private interests and possibly relegate many of them to that dishonorable obscurity from which they should never have emerged.

The corruptive influences of this system cannot be exaggerated. We may see it in the present Chambers, which, putting aside some eight or ten, consist of a few men who have sacrificed talent and reputation for the sake of place and of a parcel of mediocrities who have no will at all of their own and cannot even speak in support of the measures they vote. Outside the Chambers we may see its effects in the holding of nearly all public posts by mediocrities with little talent and less public morality, and in the sacrifice of all departments of public administration, even such as the police and the post-office, to political partisanship or personal friendship. We may also see its effects in the alienation of some of the cleverest and most honorable men of the republic—men who might prove its salvation—from political life, and even in the dissensions and chaos of all the existing parties. The Apple of Discord, in the shape of the substitution of self-interest for patriotism and policy, has produced general confusion and degradation. All the evils of the situation may thus be traced to this system, and therefore it is precisely against this that reaction is most necessary. If their political rights could be restored to the people and their independence to the public men, regeneration would soon follow.

After all, then, the problem resolves itself not into the voice of the people or of the Chambers, but into the manner in which Dr. Herrera employs that which his official organ humorously calls the "directive influence." And in this, there has been no advance in the question from when we wrote some weeks ago. Several names have been mentioned as of men likely to be his candidate, but these have mostly been distinguished by their impossibility, it is scarcely conceivable that they would be brought forward seriously. At the same time, it must be added that as a rule during his administration, Dr. Herrera has been remarkably unfortunate—to use no stronger word—in his nominations, and whether as minister, legislator or high official, he seems to have regarded fitness for the post as the last qualification necessary to be considered. It is therefore possible he may treat the presidency of the Republic in the same manner, and end by nominating some peculiarly unfit candidate. No one would be particularly surprised at this. But, in that case, there is just the possibility that even Dr. Herrera's own party would revolt against such a candidate, and then the election might fall on the most powerful candidate in opposition. There is, of course, the bare contingency that Dr. Herrera may, like his predecessor General Tajos, abstain from exercising his influence, but that contingency is too remote to be considered yet.

At present, then, the situation may be summed up thus. No popular or reactionary candidate has appeared, nor would such a candidate have much chance under present electoral conditions. Dr. Herrera, the outgoing president, has all the machinery of the election under his direct control, and if he brings forward a strong candidate he will prove irresistible. But so far it cannot be said that Dr. Herrera has any candidate at all. There only remains at present, then, the candidature of General Tajos, who has a strong and acknowledged party at his back, and so far, although it is known not to be regarded with favour by the Herreraists, this has the best chances of success. It is not likely to be a popular or a reactionary candidature, it has many signal defects, but still it is, up to the present, the least impossible of any named. Whether it will remain so, it is vain to foretell.

Parliament.
In the Chamber of Represent-

atives, on Saturday, the Message was presented from the Executive including the Port Question and other matters in the subjects of the extraordinary sittings. The various matters were distributed to the corresponding Committees.

There being no quorum present, no further business was transacted.

Politeama Theatre.

"Mam'zelle Nitouche," on Saturday evening, did not attract a large audience; the piece, though merry enough, having been played here very frequently. The performance can hardly be ranked as a successful one, and therefore we dismiss it without further remark.

On Sunday, however, there was a crowded and fashionable audience, and the performance proved one of most successful imaginable, the audience proving their satisfaction by frequent and hearty applause. The opera, though old enough, was a novelty to the majority, but with its bright melodious music in the school of Rossini and Auber, and its lively and highly dramatic plot, it could hardly fail to please, and the wonder is that so excellent a piece should have fallen into comparative oblivion. It was, furthermore, remarkably well given by all concerned. Miss Marcolini was at her best as Nemes, a part which gave her several opportunities of exhibiting her exceptional vocal facility and skill, and she also acted her part very gracefully. In the tenor part of Zephonis, Mr. Engel outshone himself, his exquisite phrasing and delicate sentiment in singing the charming music allotted him delighting the audience. He, also, acted his part with great spirit and taste. A better impersonation, vocally and dramatically, could not be desired. Mr. Freiche was a very sympathetic prince, Mr. Dambrine sufficiently amusing as Pifear, and the remaining parts were also most satisfactorily filled, giving a very complete and even performance. The band showed signs of very necessary improvement, and even the ballet was good. The costumes were rich and handsome, but the scenery was little short of disreputable, especially the ghastly arrangement intended to represent the sea shore in the first act. We wonder that the enterprising proprietors of the theatre, Sres. Carbone and Cordara, who have introduced so many improvements in other matters, do not devote a little more attention to this. Such wretched scenery as that alluded to detracts from the effect of a good performance and assists in the condemnation of a poor one. We hope that the Charley Company will find occasion to repeat this very pleasing opera.

This evening will be given the familiar "Carmen," in which Mlles. Marcolini and Hausmann and M.M. Engel and Freiche will perform.

Capture of an Absconding Cashier.

Some eleven weeks ago, a man named George Nelson Newsome, the cashier of the Dawsbury Branch of the Huddersfield Banking Co. Limited, absconded with a large sum of money belonging to the bank. He went over to the States in the Campania, accompanied by a "flash" female, and for some little time went round gaily, spending money freely and enjoying himself finely. The detectives, however, were after him, and, thanks to the vagaries of his female companion, were able to trace him from one town to another. Finally he reached New York, and there he was just missed by two hours. It was then found he had embarked on the steamer "Iona" for the River Plate. As it happened there was a quicker steamer down, and consequently the police arrived here some three days before him and were enabled to wait for him at leisure. The "Iona" came into this port on Sunday, and in the afternoon Mr. Wilson, the Secretary of the British Legation, the detective officer from England and a representation of the local authorities, went on board, obtained an interview with Mr. Thompson, who was the name Newsome had assumed, and quietly slipped a pair of handcuffs on his wrists. He was brought ashore and is now lodged in the Cabildo, awaiting the arrival of the extradition papers, when he will be shipped to England for trial. This smart capture was effected by Mr. Shore, the Chief Inspector of the Dawsbury police, who has thus run his man to earth after a chase half round the world, and who deserves congratulating on his activity.

We may add that every assistance in the capture was given by the local police, who acted very courteously in the matter.

THE REVOLUTION IN ARGENTINA.
We give some items from our Buenos Aires contemporaries of Saturday and Sunday—

There was nothing new from the seat of war on Friday, reinforcements are said to be continually arriving at the general headquarters at Temperley and Pereira where they are being drilled and put into fighting order. It was reported in the morning that a partial attack was made on La Plata by some of the revolutionists who were repulsed, this news proved to be unfounded,

as one of the Radical leaders, D. Delfor Delvalle, stated yesterday when he put in an appearance on 'Change and was heartily cheered by his numerous friends; he said that revolutionary leaders are paying for all they get on the road in the shape of food and clothing; he made an appeal to his friends for funds towards carrying out the good work of restoring the liberties of the people, and the sum of \$7000 was collected within half an hour.

The provisional Government of the Province of Santa Fé has been constituted as follows:—Governor, Mariano N. Candiotti; Vice, Agustín Landó; Minister of Government, Martín Rodríguez Galisteo; Finance, Joaquín Lejarras; Justice, Lisandro de la Torre, junr. A Committee has been formed in Rosario to raise money for the help of the wounded and the sum of \$8000 was collected on Thursday.

Dr. Hipólito Irigoyen has ordered that in the towns captured by the Radicals the inhabitants shall be allowed freely to choose their local authorities.

A telegram from Rosario on Saturday stated that a counter-revolution was being attempted in the South of the province by Valerio Carreras, ex-Gefe Politico of General Lopez department.

On Saturday afternoon a detachment of Costa's cavalry was encountered by Rawson's advance guard near Villa Elisa and was driven back.

General Bosch applied to the Minister of War for a gunboat to take him to La Plata, but the application was refused, as the Minister said it would make it appear that the Government was intervening between the two hostile parties. It appears that General Bosch went to La Plata in a small steamer and had a long conference with the Governor, endeavouring, it is said, to persuade the latter to resign. Dr. Costa intends, however, to fight, and he has a force of 2000 men with eight guns and an ample supply of rifles and ammunition. The City is also well-provisioned and supplies come in freely. As for money, of course he can take all he wants out of the Provincial Bank.

The Radical Committee has appointed Dr. Juan Carlos Belgrano as provincial Governor of the Province of Buenos Aires and he has established his seat of government at Temperley. It is believed that Dr. Hipólito Irigoyen will be one of his Ministers.

The Governor of Corrientes has complained to Congress that the National Government has infringed the prerogatives of the executive and judicial powers of the province and he asks Congress to make this intervention cease and to authorize the mobilization of the National Guard to enable him to suppress seditious movements in various parts of the province. The Governor has ordered the mobilisation of the National Guard of the province, and has had the leading men of the Opposition in various departments arrested. The Governor has admitted these facts in a telegraphic conference with the Minister of the Interior. There is every probability that an insurrection will break out in the province.

All is tranquil in San Luis province. The new Government is engaged in reorganizing the administrative departments and it is preparing a decree relating to irrigation.
—On Congress will rest the responsibility of the bloodshed at La Plata. It should have voted to stop civil war, and that it did not will be an everlasting disgrace to that body. There ought to be a legal method by which the National Executive without red tape or delay could step in to stop civil war in the Provinces. Present laws are seen to be most defective.—(Herald.)

An important item of news is, that the Revolutionists are now possessed of a battery of field artillery; whence such a formidable element has come from, has however not transpired, but there is no question about its existence, and that it is thoroughly equipped and ammunitioned for active service.
LATEST.
Resignation and flight of Costa.
We give the substance of the telegrams received since our last, some of which were published as a bulletin yesterday morning—
The situation seems to have remained stationary until Sunday evening, when general satisfaction was created by the announcement that Costa had at length decided to resign the Governorship. This was received with rejoicing in Buenos Aires and with enthusiasm in the ranks of the radical forces, Costa, it appears, slunk away from La Plata on Sunday evening, embarking on board a small steamer at Ensenada, and arrived at Buenos Aires yesterday morning. He left a note resigning the command to the vice-governor Del Carril, but the latter, it is said, refuses to accept it, and will offer no further resistance to the federal troops, which were expected to enter La Plata yesterday evening. The National Government has been asked to intervene to prevent the troops committing excesses in La Plata, and Ministers Del Valle and Quintana accordingly left Buenos Aires for La Plata yesterday

afternoon with two battalions. It appears there were dissidences and violent scenes amongst Costa's party before he was persuaded to resign.
On Sunday afternoon, Dr. Alem visited the radical encampment at Temperley, where he was received with great enthusiasm. A telegram says there are 7450 men under arms there, but the number is probably much exaggerated. Dr. Carlos Pellegrini, on his way to Cordoba, was arrested for a few hours by the revolutionists, but afterwards allowed to proceed. Com. Mena has been set at liberty. Pedro Costa, brother of the Governor, was taken prisoner whilst trying to escape from Chascomús.

SUNDRIES.

—Now that further subjects are included in the extraordinary sittings, it is to be hoped that the Chambers will show a little more activity than they have done in the last few weeks.

The port of Naples has been decreed infected, and a quarantine order will be issued immediately.

—Our native contemporaries give most garbled accounts of the capture of the absconding cashier Newsome. Amongst other extraordinary things they say that he could not be arrested in New York, because there is no extradition treaty between England and the States! This is news.

—It is a pity the police were not as smart in capturing that exemplary scoundrel James Balfour as they have been with Newsome.

—Grand news for theatre-goers. The impresario Ciocchi was here on Saturday, and has engaged the Solis Theatre for the appearance of Sarah Bernhardt and her company, now in Buenos Aires. The great Sarah will be here about the 22nd, and will give six or eight performances, including her latest pieces "Tosca" and "Cleopatra."

—The new Royal Mail steamer the "Nile" was to have left Southampton on her first trip to the River Plate, yesterday.

—Sunday's races at Maroñas were well-attended and successful. The grand Premio Revancha, after an exciting race, was carried off by Beverly, Donna 2 and Granada 3. Sport \$404. The winners of the other events were: Devota, \$610; Albion, \$1770; Remember, \$665; and Mirreille, \$2272.

—The trial of the forger Norton, and Ducret the editor of La Cocarde, has concluded in Paris, the former is condemned to three years' imprisonment, and the latter to one. Mr. Clemenceau, who had brought a civil action, was awarded one franc damages!

—A Chicago telegram says that the man Dogan, arrested in connection with the fire in the Exhibition buildings, has confessed that he and many others (the telegram says a hundred), nearly all employees, set fire to the store in order to prevent discovery of the robberies they had committed.

—Italy seems to have been running Argentina pretty close in banking scandals and clandestine emissions. The following is the substance of a recent telegram from Rome.—The Solicitor General, who was entrusted with the task of inspecting the treasuries of the Banks of emission, has completed his labours and to-day laid his report before the Government. This document accuses the managements of these establishments of the grossest irregularities, as after the most careful investigation, had been made, it was found, that fraudulent emission to the amount of 60 million francs had been placed in circulation. Not only was this found to be the case, but a deficit appears in the treasuries of 28 million, and it was also discovered that false notes to the value of 41 millions were lying in the vaults of the Banks. Several Bank officials of high standing are implicated in these frauds.

—The latest London papers contain a lengthened account of a grand function at Brompton Oratory, placing England under the patronage of St. Peter. Cardinal Vaughan presided, and Rev. Father Bridgett preached; the latter is superior of the Redemptorist Fathers at Clapham, and brother to Mr. Consul Bridgett of Buenos Aires.

—The Custom House paid \$21,109 into the London Bank yesterday on account of the foreign debt service.

LONDON NOTES

SATURDAY, JULY 8.

In the House of Lords yesterday some conversation took place with regard to the Naval Reserve. Earl Spencer showed that the Admiralty were sensible of the importance of increasing the strength and efficiency of that force.

At the morning sitting of the Commons, Mr. T. W. Russell moved the adjournment, to call attention to the administration of affairs in County Clare. This was defeated by aid of the closure. Mr. Conyngham then obtained leave to make a personal statement in reference to the letter he had written impugning the conduct of the Speaker. As no apology was made, the Speaker

warmly resented the attack upon him. The letter was declared to be a breach of the privileges of the House, and Mr. Gladstone moved that Mr. Conyngham be suspended for a week. Eventually, however, Mr. Conyngham offered an apology, and the matter was allowed to drop. Only thirty-five minutes remained for committee on the Home Rule Bill. Before the adjournment, however, the Chairman ruled a batch of amendments out of order, including Mr. Labouchere's in regard to the retention of the Irish Members. Soon after the reassembling for the evening sitting, the House was counted out, while a discussion was proceeding on the blocking of Bills.

Lord Salisbury was entertained at dinner last night by the Junior Constitutional Club. In the course of a speech he strongly condemned the means adopted by the Government for passing the Home Rule Bill. The Lord Mayor has received a letter requesting him to convey to the citizens of London the warm appreciation of the Duke and Duchess of York of the affectionate welcome they received on Thursday. The Queen, who returned to Windsor yesterday, has expressed the greatest satisfaction with the way in which arrangements for the Royal wedding were carried out.

More than 20,000 persons, visited Richmond last night to view the brilliantly illuminated river fête between Glover's Island and Richmond Railway Bridge, which was held to celebrate the marriage of the Duke of York and Princess May. Signor Mascagni's latest opera "Ranzano" was performed at Covent Garden last night, for the first time in England, under the personal conductorship of the composer.

Two North British passenger trains came into collision at Bridgeton yesterday, with the result that two carriages were telescoped and six passengers injured.

Yesterday, General von Caprivi introduced his amended Army Bill to the new German Reichstag, by a brief speech, in which there was little that had not been repeated many times before. In asking the House, however, to trust the Government sufficiently to vote the measure at once and to wait till next winter to hear by what financial means it was to be made practicable, the Chancellor stated that no fresh taxes would be imposed upon agriculture.

Another immense company assembled at Henley yesterday, when the final heats in the Regatta were contested in magnificent weather. The winners came out thus: The Stewards' Challenge Cup, Magdalen College, Oxford; the Grand Challenge Cup, Leander Boat Club; the Diamond Sculls, Guy Nickalls; the Thames Challenge Cup, Thames Rowing Club; the Visitors' Challenge Cup, Third Trinity, Cambridge; the Wyfold Challenge Cup, Molesey Boat Club; the Ladies' Challenge Plate, Eton College; and the Silver Goblets, Oxford University B.C.

Owing chiefly to a fine display of batting by Mr. Brann, who ran up a score of 159, Sussex left off at Lord's yesterday with much the best of the match with Middlesex, who with two wickets down in their second innings, now want 58 runs to avert an innings defeat. With four wickets in hand, the Gentlemen require 54 runs to defeat the Players at the Oval. Somerset fared badly in their match with Yorkshire, the Northern county winning by an innings and 13 runs. The Australians were victorious over Leicestershire by an innings and 61 runs. Dublin University defeated Oxford University by eight wickets.

Mr. James Tims, L. C. C., was tried at the London Sessions yesterday for attempting to obtain 14s. 6d. from the London and North Western Railway Company by false pretences in reference to a railway ticket from Broadstreet to Leamington. He had asked for the money on returning a ticket which he said had not been used, and which the company said had been lost by a lady. He was found guilty, and Sir Peter Edlin sentenced him to three months' imprisonment as a second class misdemeanant.

After a hearing which extended over several days, judgment was given yesterday in the Savary case. Mr. Justice Barnes dismissed the petitions both of the wife, who prayed for a judicial separation, and of the husband, who sought a divorce on the ground of the alleged misconduct of the wife with her coachman. The coachman was given his costs.

The trial of Police-constable George Samuel Cooke on the charge of murdering a young woman at Wormwood Scrubs, on the night of the 6th June, was commenced at the Central Criminal Court yesterday before Mr. Justice Hawkins. The prisoner pleaded "Not guilty." Mr. C. Mathews opened the case for the prosecution, and police, medical, and other evidence was afterwards heard, the proceedings being then adjourned.

Thomas Dunford, a porter was sentenced at the Marlborough-street Police-court to three months' imprisonment for stealing a gold watch and chain from Mr. C. P. Villiers M.P.

In the height of the crush in Piccadilly, during the waiting for the bridal procession, an act of kindness was done, so simple yet beneficial, that it is worth recording as an example for adoption in analogous circumstances. By instructions of Baron Ferdinand de Rothschild his servants filled cans of water, and with a plentiful supply of glasses, served out much-needed refreshment to the crowd massed outside the barriade facing the house. In numerous cases of fainting which took place in the neighbourhood this thoughtful kindness was invaluable.

At the Lambeth Police-court yesterday Charles Kelvie, a carver, of Peckham, was charged with shooting, under somewhat singular circumstances, Mrs. Bury, the wife of a carpenter, who resides next door to him. The prisoner was remanded.

The forty-second annual meeting of the Birkbeck Building Society was held yesterday. In their report the directors express the opinion that the Society to-day stands higher in public estimation than it has ever done before.

THE LOSS OF THE "VICTORIA"

ARMY AND NAVY GAZETTE.

The law of self-preservation compels us to dry our tears, and to brace our nerves for further efforts in the cause of safeguarding the Empire. With the short space of a few months we have had three of our finest and most powerful battleships placed hors de combat—the *Howe*, the *Camperdown*, and the *Victoria*. What steps are the Government taking to replace them? For economical reasons, which many among us deem highly injudicious, our margin of security is kept very low. It has now entirely disappeared, as those who care may see demonstrated by words spoken not so long since in the House of Lords by the First Lord of the Admiralty. A battleship takes long to build. This sad event cannot alter the fact that the security of British interests depends upon the maintenance of an effective Fleet of these vessels strong enough to ensure the command of the seas. Nor does it lessen the value of the battleship as a fighting machine. Lord Roberts has just told us that the safety of India in certain circumstances will depend upon our being able to land there some fifty thousand additional soldiers without delay. How it we are unable to pass them over sea because an enemy bars the way? Where will India be then? We have faith that, as Lord Rosebery said at the Trinity House banquet, "The nation will be true to itself, and if greater calls are imposed on it by such a calamity as this, the nation will not be slow to respond." But as Mr. Arnold Foster truly remarks, "the sooner the money is voted the sooner a new ship will be begun, and the sooner a new ship will be completed."

BROAD ARROW.
Lord Rosebery struck a true note at the Trinity House when he held that this was a catastrophe to rally round, not to shrink from, and it is little to be doubted that the Admiralty and the Navy will take up that attitude as soon as the first shock is over. Undoubtedly, however, the loss of the *Victoria* will have an immensely modifying effect on most points of naval policy all over the world. Questions will arise as to manœuvring; as to low freeboard and initial stability; as to the system of distributing compartments; as to the retention of watertight doors and connections between adjacent compartments, as to closer study and more accurate ascertainment of the movements of ships under different conditions of helm and speed; as to the compulsory influence of the heavy gun on design, and as to the arguments for and against moderate dimensions in ships of war. These and many cognate questions are already raised, and will continue to be discussed; and some, in consequence of the spur given, may be advanced several stages; and thus, out of terrible evil, good may come.

THE EFFECTS OF OPIUM SMOKING
Exact knowledge of the effects of opium smoking is yet wanting, and it is still an open question whether the habit of smoking opium is really as baleful as some persons allege—that it is for instance, more baleful than the habit of smoking tobacco. M. E. Baret, a French naval surgeon, has made some very interesting observations, which were recently reported in his "Notes de Géographie et d'Ethnographie Médicales," published in the *Archives de Médecine Navale et Coloniale* (October and December numbers of 1892) "Opium smokers," writes M. Baret (p.405), "are not wanting in Tientsin. The *Chandou* (substance for smoking) that is sold in this town is not at all of a good quality, and is always largely mixed with native opium cultivated and gathered in the provinces of Kouei-Tcheou and Yun-nan; because if the officials in China deplore the use of opium in their country, it is not on account of the rather illusory and very much exaggerated evil effects on the population, but on account of the important outflow of the precious metals which it causes. Therefore they encourage the culture of the poppy in the in the spath

west provinces of the empire, where it grows very well, hoping first to establish a competition with the Indian opium, and soon, perhaps, to diminish its importation considerably—a simple question of economy." M. Baret states that during the four winter months at Tientsin, and now and again during the three years in the country districts of China, he has collected a large number of observations on opium smokers, which have led him to the following conclusions:—1. Opium smoke is not either morally or physically, the destructive and degrading agent that certain moralists have declared it to be. 2. Its use is not more dangerous than the use of tobacco or of fermented drinks. 3. Its abuse is less dangerous to the individual than the abuse of alcohol. He adds that in the unanimous opinion of the Chinese doctors, corroborated by that of numbers of European and American practitioners of China, India, and the Malay countries, the habitual use of opium is an excellent prophylactic against malaria, and especially against all pernicious forms of paludism. Finally, it is stated that opium smoked occasionally, when, for example, it is necessary to make a great effort without being able to obtain nourishment, acts as a general tonic, and an economising agent superior to alcohol and to coca. As to its mental action, it is the most powerful psychical tonic that exists. *British Medical Journal*.
