LONDON NOTES

TUESDAY, JULY 11.

In a short sitting yesterday the House of Lords read the Rivers Pollution Prevention Bill a third time and advanced one or two other measures a stage.

In the Commons, Mr. Asquith announced that he had sanctioned the grant of an extra day's pay and of three days' extra leave to all the members of the Metropolitan Police force who were on duty on the day of the Royal wedding last week.

The first division was on an amendment moved by Mr. John Redmond to omit the first sub-section of the clause, so that the Irish representation might remain as now—103 members.

A State ball was given at Buckingham Palace last night. General orders and instructions for the forthcoming naval manoeuvres were issued yesterday.

The Duke of York, in remembrance of his wedding, has presented a very pretty souvenir to each of the principal members of the Prince of Wales and his own household.

CATASTROPHES AT THE WORLD'S FAIR. CHICAGO, JULY 10.

A terrible fire, resulting in the death of nearly thirty firemen, occurred to-day in a cold storage warehouse in the grounds of the World's Fair.

A Paris correspondent states that M. Lozé, the Prefect of Police, who has been regarded as in some measure responsible for the disorder in the Paris streets, is to be removed to the diplomatic post.

A terrible storm is reported from Chicago as having visited that city and Lake Michigan on Sunday. The grounds of the Exhibition are seriously damaged and many of the buildings have also suffered severely.

Thirty firemen lost their lives yesterday in a fire at the World's Fair, Chicago. While the men were engaged on the centre cupola of a burning building in the grounds, the structure collapsed, plunging them into fire.

Mrs. Bancroft was thrown from a hansom cab in Jermyn-street yesterday and severely injured. Happily no bones were broken.

The Dewbury fund in aid of the sufferers from the Combs Colliery disaster amounted last night to about 10,000. Efforts are to be made to obtain some portions of money lying to the credit of similar funds on which there now very few claims.

A return match between Gentlemen and Players was commenced at Lord's yesterday, when the Gen-

lemen ran up a score of 253 and sent back three of the Players for 35 runs. Kent were batting against Somersetshire all the time that play was possible at Tanton yesterday, and scored 224 for four wickets.

Rain also interfered with cricket at Leeds, where the Australians secured an advantage over Yorkshire. At Manchester, Lancashire, after dismissing Derbyshire for 166, made 21 for one wicket.

In the Queen's Bench Division yesterday, before Mr. Justice Hawkins and a special jury, the hearing of an action was commenced in which Mr. C. Zierenberg and his wife sought to recover damages from Mr. Labouchere for alleged libel in respect to an article published in "Truth," commenting upon the manner in which the St. James's Home for Female Inebriates at Kennington was conducted by them.

Mrs. Zierenberg was called, but her evidence had not been concluded at the adjournment. Sir Francis Jeune had before him yesterday a case in which Mr. Atkinson, a ship's fireman, sought a divorce on the ground, as alleged, that his wife had been guilty of misconduct with his brother.

On hearing the facts the President said that there was the clearest possible connivance, and that the petition would be dismissed. Mr. Justice Grantham, in charging the grand jury at Maidstone Assizes yesterday, passed some exceedingly severe strictures upon the manner in which the case against Noel, who is accused of the murder of his wife at Ramsgate, had been got up by the police.

There was not enough evidence in the case, he said, to hang a dog, much less a man, and the case ought not, in his opinion, to have been sent for trial. If the grand jury took the same view of the so-called "evidences" that he did, they would throw out the bill. In that case additional evidence might be used against the prisoner, whereas if he were tried and acquitted no further proceedings could be instituted.

Mr. John Deasy, M. P., surrendered at the London Sessions yesterday, to answer the indictment charging him with having improperly assaulted Ellen Lewis, a domestic servant, at the house in which he lodged at Warwick-street, Pimlico. Evidence similar to that given at the Police Court having been adduced, Sir Edward Clarke, for the defence, urged that it was contradictory and inconclusive. Mr. Deasy then gave his version of the matter, and the trial was adjourned till to-day.

mount higher and higher, until the firemen were almost concealed from view. One of the men sprang from the landing far out into the air, but was dashed to pieces on the roof of the building eighty feet below.

Four others followed his example and met with similar fate. The upper portion of the cupola was then seen to give way, and the remaining firemen were swallowed up in the burning mass of timbers.

Shortly after the outbreak between fifty and seventy firemen mounted to the roof of the building. The flames, however, reached the structure beneath them, and the roof was seen to fall in some places.

Ladders were put up, but the heat was so great that it was extremely dangerous to ascend them. Some members of the brigade, however, braved it, and succeeded amid the cheers of the spectators in saving several of their comrades. The other unfortunate men, however, went down with the falling roof.

Marshall Murphy, one of the most fearless officers in Chicago, escaped by sliding down a rope and jumping to the roof of an adjoining building. It is believed that thirty men have been killed and fifty or sixty others injured. A number of small buildings outside the grounds have been badly scorched, but none of the Fair buildings have been damaged.

The firemen kept a stream of water playing upon them. The crowd which assembled in the grounds to watch the fire reached very large proportions since during the excitement thousands of people climbed over the fences and joined the throng of those who had paid for admission. The building which has been destroyed, although seldom entered by visitors, was, from an architectural point of view, one of the most notable features of Jackson Park. It was situated a short distance from the elevated railroad, and instantly attracted attention by reason of its high tower and peculiar Venetian windows.

The warehouse, which cost a quarter of a million dollars, was stocked with meats, fruits, and wines, and the total loss will probably amount to half a million dollars. It was built and occupied by the Hercules Ironworks Company, Manufacturers of Refrigerating Machinery. 155 A. M.

The French Commissioner, on learning the serious nature of the fire, sent twenty-five French marines to help the Lumbian Guard in maintaining order. The National Commission, which was sitting at the time, adjourned hastily, and its members proceeded to the scene of the conflagration.

For some time the officials were greatly concerned lest the flames should spread to the buildings of the Exhibition. The excitement reached its climax when the first man jumped from the tower. A shout of terror went up from the crowd, women fainted, and many men fell on their knees and prayed. The efforts of the fire brigade were almost paralyzed by the loss of so many of its members, and the excitement was increased by the arrival on the spot of the entire ambulance corps of the city.




