Another Capture.

He is a young man of about 27, of good family and appearance and pleasant manners, and, as we hear, had made himself a favorite on board during the voyage out, no suspicions having been entertained of his character. Some £900 was found in his possession. He lett a wife and child behind him, but, as seems generally the case, had another companion with him on board, who will be sent back to England in the «Tagus».

#### BUENOS AIRES

RESIGNATION OF THE CABINET: At a Cabinet Meeting held on Saturday, the President of the Republic refused to appoint Dr. del Valle as Interventor in Buenos Aires, and all the Ministers therefore presented their resignations.
Dr. del Valle's was in the follow-

ing words: «To the President of the Sir, I present my resignation of

the post of Secretary of State for War and Marine, so that your Excellency may govern with the persons who have just given a new direction

to your policy. I am, &o ,
A. DEL VALLE.>
Dr. Demaria's letter was not quite so pithy. He said that obstacles, not proceeding from himself and which he is unable to overcome, prevent him from fulfilling the obligations imposed upon him by the oath which he took upon assuming his post, and therefore he presented his undeclin-able resignation. He added that he considers it to be a primordial duty of the President not to use any influence over the votes of the legislators in Congress, but it is notorious that persons unconected with the Cabinet solicited votes in the Prevention in the Province.

In return for this loan, Schweitzer offered to sign a bill for the balf million,and also to assign to the Government various sums owed by the latter to the Banco Constructor de La Plata, of which he was Managing Director, as well as various shares of his Company and other bonds in his possession, valued altogether at more than five million dollars paper currency. Before any answer had been re-

turned, Schweitzer handed to Dr. Pacheco a bill in his layour for £100,-000 drawn on the Anglo-Australian

In December 1890, Schweitzer informed the Government, that he had deposited to the order of the Government in the English Bauk of the River Plate 8000 shares of the Banco Constructor de La Plata, accompanied by a deed signed by the Board of the Company, assigning to the Government the sum of about \$800,000, which amount was owed by it for various buildings and lands already erected and transferred by the Company to the Government

Finally, a decree was signed, in December 1889, by Dr. Juarez Cel-man and Dr. Pacheco, his Finance Minister, by which the Government accepted the bill for £100,000, guaranteed by the shares and transferences mentioned above, in exchange for Schweitzer's bill for half a million of gold dollars.

During the course of the investi-gations recently made by Dr. Demaria, Dr. Juarez Celman and Señor Hansen were called on for explana-tions, and these gentlemen admitted that the half million was handed to Schweitzer, to aid him in bearing gold on the Bolsa.

Plata, however, subsequently maintained befere the Government that the guarantees given by Schweizer were really valueless, because the act of transference had been signed at a meeting when an insufficient number of members were present to form a quorum, and that further, by the laws of the land, all acts performed by the Directors of anonymous Societies were valueless, when they exceeded the limits accorded by the statutes of their company.

The present Government has finally instructed Dr. Passo to lay the responsibility of the transaction upon Dr. Juarez Celman and his Minister Pacheco, on the ground that the National Constitution expressly lays down that the President of the Resible for all the acts which they may

#### LATEST.

The new ministry has been definitely constituted as follows:-Interior, Manuel Quintana; Finance, José Terry; War, General Campos; Public Instruction, Edward Costa; Foreign Affairs, Virasoro.
One of the first acts of the new

Minister of War was to telegraph at General Arias at La Plata, to proceed at once with the disarming of the radical forces.

According to latest telegrams the situation in Buenos Aires is most uneasy, and the government itself is in great alarm. The police and fire-brigade have been kept under arms, and troops brought into the city from Santa Catalina. The new cabinet is not well received, and there are fears that the Celman element will recover its power. Saenz Peña is looked on as a lost man, and a revolution of the radical party would surprise no one. It is said that the order of disarmament at La Plata has not been carried out, but that the radicals have retained great quantities of arms, and are again gathering forces together. Dr. Demaria is said to have declared that he had decrees prepared for the prosecution of many individuals who had made free with public money, but that Saenz Peña refused to sign them. The Chambers, which are in open conflict with the Executive, are said to contemplate a martial law, unless the Executive takes the initiative and proclaims a state of seige, which is probable. Pease, Mr. Balfour, Mr. Gladstone, Mr. Chamberlain, Sir W. Harcourt, Mr. J. Redmond, Sir H. James, and others. At ten colock the matter others. At ten o'clock the matter was put to the vote, when Mr. Gladstone's proposal was carried by a majority of 27. Clause 9, as amended, was then carried by a majority of 29.
