LONDON NOTES

THURSDAY, AUGUST 3.

In the House of Commons yesterday Committee of Supply was set up. On a vote of 2,110,500, on account of the Foreign and Civil Services, two subjects of importance were discussed. First Sir R. Temple moved to reduce the item for the Foreign Office by 1,000, to seek an explanation on the difficulty between France and Siam. Mr. Curzon, Mr. Balfour, Sir William Harcourt, and others took part in the debate. Sir E. Grey regretted that the Conservatives had determined to discuss the French policy at a time when negotiations of a delicate character were proceeding. When the papers were published it would be found, he said, that the Government had laid down strongly and emphatically enough what British interests were, and had taken adequate steps to protect them. The treatment of Armenian prisoners in Angora occupied the remainder of the sitting.

A Correspondent at Bangkok telegraphs that the cruiser Pallas has moved outside of blockade limits, and that the gunboat Swift has sailed for Singapore. The Linnet still remains at Bangkok. The blockade will be raised to-day. From Saigon it is announced that Captain Thoreux has started with a company of troops for the Upper Mekong. The Chinese Minister in Paris has been instructed to make a strong protest against the blockade of Siamese ports.

Addressing a meeting of the Liberal and Radical electors of South Hackney, last night, Sir Charles Russell expressed his belief that the Government was stronger to-day than when it was formed twelve months ago, and the Liberal and Radical party as represented in the House of Commons had never in our time been more thoroughly united and in earnest. His speech was chiefly devoted to the subject of the Home Rule Bill.

This morning is published the text of a letter which Mr. W. H. Greenleaf, M.P. for Hereford, has forwarded to the local Liberal organization, expressing his belief that the Government was stronger to-day than when it was formed twelve months ago, and the Liberal and Radical party as represented in the House of Commons had never in our time been more thoroughly united and in earnest. His speech was chiefly devoted to the subject of the Home Rule Bill.

Sectional meetings in connection with the annual gathering of the British Medical Association, were held yesterday at Newcastle. The third general meeting took place in the afternoon, when Bristol was chosen as the place of next year's assembly, and Dr. Long Fox, of that city, was made president elect. The association having already approved the principle of admitting lady members, now expanded the prohibitory by-law.

Resolutions passed yesterday by the Executive Committee of the Miners' Federation, assembled in London, called upon the Durham and Northumberland miners to ask for an advance in wages, and, with respect to the suggestion, said to have been made by the coal-owners, that the notices of reduction should be withdrawn if the men would not ask for increased wages until prices came back to the 1891 level, recommended that it should be considered at a conference in London on the 22nd inst.

Yesterday over 20,000 persons attended the National Eisteddfod, which was held at Pontypridd, under the presidency of Sir David Evans, ex-Lord Mayor of London. Six choirs competed for a prize of 200 guineas for the best and 50 guineas for the second. Dr. Mackenzie declared the Rhymney Choir first and the Cardiff second. He spoke highly of the singing.

Presiding at the meeting of the London, Chatham, and Dover Railway yesterday, Mr. J. S. Forbes said it must be a satisfaction to all of them that the gross receipts had increased notwithstanding adverse circumstances. One great consolation they had this half-year would be thought make that meeting a red-letter one in the history of the company. The litigation between themselves and the South Eastern Railway was now at an end, and the two companies had mutually agreed to bury the hatchet.

Over a course of 140 miles the race for the German Emperor's Challenge Shield took place yesterday. Only two of the six yachts entered started, the Prince of Wales's Britannia and Satineta. The former arriving home at ten o'clock, was declared the victor. In the evening the Queen gave a State banquet at Osborne.

By carrying their overnight score from 805 for eight wickets to 843 before their last batsman was dismissed, the Australians yesterday beat the world record in first-class cricket by 40 runs. Against this enormous total the University men could do little, though owing to want of time, the match was not brought to a definite conclusion. In the match between Rugby and Marlborough, at Lord's, the Midland boys gained a useful lead of 63 on the first innings.

Evidence as to his connection with the directorship of the Lands Allotment Company was yesterday given at the Court of Bankruptcy by the Rev. Dr. Dawson Burns. He protested that he had always acted in good faith and for the interest of the shareholders. As soon as he found that the Company was being extended in a way he could not sufficiently supervise he resigned. It was possible that his name might attract some investors, but, on the other hand, it might deter others.

which showed that considerable dissension existed between the deceased and his brother. Mrs. Richards, the widow, explained that she suspected the parcel directly it was delivered and that these feelings appeared to be shared by her husband. A verdict of wilful murder against some person or persons unknown was returned by the jury.

According to the Registrar-General's returns, there were 1,730 deaths in London last week, and 2,497 births, each record being below the average numbers in the corresponding weeks of the last ten years. The annual death rate per thousand fell indeed from 22.5 to 21.0. There was a decrease not only in the fatal cases of small-pox, but in the number of patients under treatment. Deaths from scarlet fever, diphtheria, whooping-cough, and enteric fever were, however, above, but those from diarrhoea were below the corrected averages.

Between the 1st April and the 29th ult., the receipts into the Exchequer amounted to 25,766,148s., as compared with 27,056,590s. in the corresponding period of the last financial year, and the expenditure to 31,639,350s., as against 32,655,491s. On Saturday last the Treasury balances stood at 1,204,933l., and on the same date in the previous year at 2,035,298l.

FRIDAY, AUG. 4.

In the House of Commons, yesterday, Sir E. Grey, replying to a question as to whether it was true, as stated in "The Daily News," that the Pallas, Swift, and Pigmy had gone outside the so-called blockade limits at Bangkok, said he could give no details of the movements of the vessels, but believed the Swift was going on a cruise for the health of her crew. No change had been made in the original instructions that sufficient gunboats should be on the spot to protect British property at Bangkok. In Committee of Supply the reported retrocession of territory to the Sultan of Zanzibar, the negotiations with France in respect of Newfoundland, the importation of Canadian cattle to Scotland and various other subjects were discussed. The vote on account was agreed to, and progress was reported.

A Correspondent at Bangkok, telegraphing late last night, says that the blockade against Siam is still strictly enforced.

Mr. A. J. Balfour, M.P., yesterday delivered an address on the Currency Question to a largely attended meeting of City men, held in the Egyptian Hall of the Mansion House, under the presidency of the Lord Mayor. Insisting upon the fact that he spoke only as a private individual he instanced the recent action of the Indian Government, as showing that the present position of affairs was intolerable in a great community which had a silver standard. He then argued strongly in favour of a double standard which was, in his opinion, far better than a single standard in point of stability, accessibility, and internationality. He believed there was not a single business man in the City who would not look with horror and apprehension at other nations following the example of England in having only a gold standard. He considered it was of the greatest importance to maintain the stability and value of silver.

Mr. Hayes Fisher, M.P., addressed a meeting of the Council of the Fulham Conservative Association last night with respect to the fight in the House of Commons, and threw upon Mr. Logan all the blame of having begun the disturbance. A unanimous vote of satisfaction with Mr. Fisher's statement was passed by the meeting.

Several subjects of interest, including the increase of diphtheria in London, the spread of infection by tramps, the evil effects of Indian hemp smoking in the East, and the suppression of cholera both here and abroad were dealt with, yesterday, at the resumed meeting of the British Medical Association at Newcastle. The annual dinner of the Association was held in the evening.

A series of accidents occurred during the yacht racing at Cowes yesterday. The Prince of Wales's Britannia had to be scratched for the Town Cup because she had sprung her mast and the Meteor owing to the squally weather. One of the gusts threw the Naveson on her starboard beam and her mainmast had to be freed before she righted. The German Emperor gave a grand dinner party at night on board the Hohenzollern, amongst those present being the Prince and Princess of Wales, Duke and Duchess of York, and several other Royal personages.

The Australians playing against Essex yesterday on the County Ground, Leyton, made a total in their first innings of 250 against their opponents' 72, with 8 to go in. In the Surrey v. Kent match, at the Oval, the latter county scored 275 for their first innings, and the former 9 in theirs for one wicket. The Rugby and Marlborough Schools match at Lord's resulted in the last-named team running up a second innings score of 308, Rugby making 165 with 5 wickets to fall. Hampshire's first innings score against

Sussex was 158, the home county making a similar number for 9 wickets down. Derbyshire, in their first innings against Yorkshire, made 146, and the latter 41 for three wickets. Owing to the rain, the Preston and Harrow Wanderers match was declared a draw, and that of Lancashire and Gloucestershire could not be proceeded with.

A firework manufacturer of Garretts Lane, Wandsworth, was convicted yesterday, at the South-Western Police-court, on four summonses, of breaches of the Explosives Act. Mr. Denman fined him 50l., with 5l. 6s. costs.

THE VICTORIA COURT-MARTIAL

MALTA, JULY 26.

The Victoria Court-Martial re-assembled at twenty minutes to ten this morning, but sat privately until ten minutes past ten. On the resumption of public proceedings Lieutenant Bradshaw, of the Camperdown, who acted as flag-lieutenant to Rear-Admiral Markham, was recalled. The witness asked to be allowed to amend his former evidence in certain particulars, and stated that when the Commander-in-Chief signalled "What are you waiting for?" he did not report it to Rear-Admiral Markham until afterwards. The President pointed out that this was in contradiction with the tenor of Rear-Admiral Markham's despatch on the point in question, but the witness adhered to his statement. Asked if Rear-Admiral Markham's reply "I did not understand your signal," was made after the Camperdown had begun to turn, he replied affirmatively. The signal was, "I did not understand," and not "I do not understand."

Rear-Admiral Markham being recalled, and having the discrepancy remarked upon by the President pointed out to him, did not insist that it was the flag-lieutenant who reported to him in the first place the signal, "What are you waiting for?" It might have been somebody else. The decision he took was affected by that signal. The witness further said that in performing a manoeuvre; when a collision was imminent that manoeuvre must be disregarded. There could then be no question of carrying out the manoeuvre, the collision had to be averted, and the rule of the road must necessarily be adhered to.

After an official statement had been put in regarding the damage done to the Camperdown's bow and the damage estimated to have been done to the Victoria, the case for the prosecution closed.

When the Court re-assembled after luncheon, Captain Bourke, replying to the President's question, said that he did not wish to call for the defence any of the witnesses who had been called for the prosecution.

Rear-Admiral Markham also replied in the negative to the same question, but said he wished to protest against a certain sentence contained in the evidence of Captain Noel, of H.M.S. Nile, given before the Court yesterday, and which he wished to have expunged from the minutes of the Court. The President, however, informed him that this request could not be granted. After Captain Bourke had intimated that he would be ready to begin his defence at 9.30 tomorrow morning, the Court adjourned.

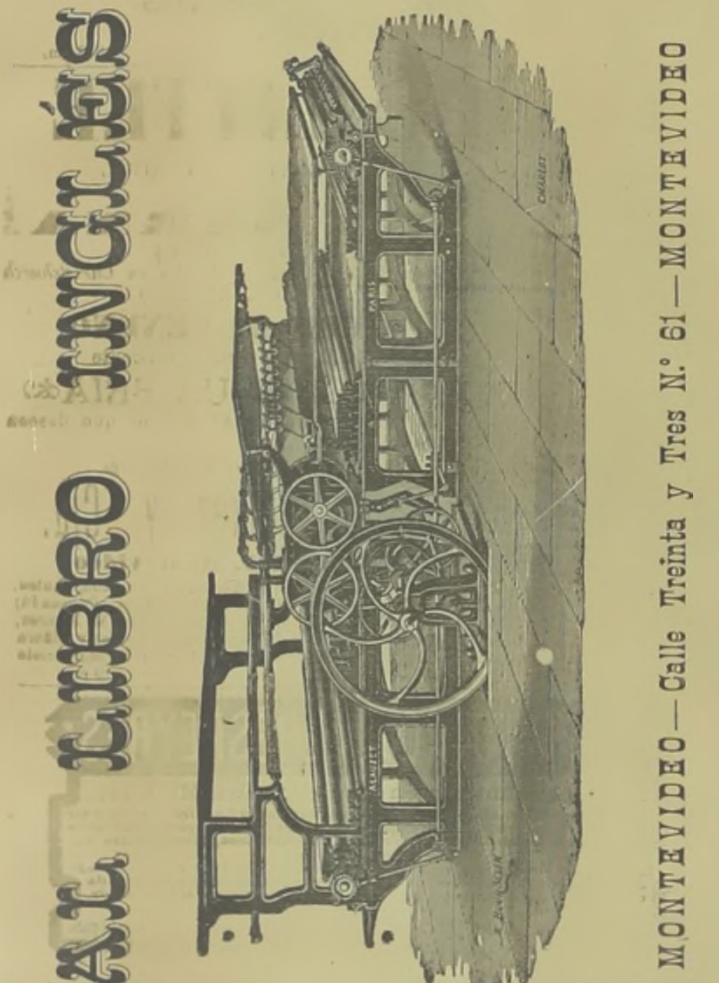

"A man who spent the greater part of his life in the East left it to me," I said. "I thought—what are you doing, man? You told me you had been baptized by the man whose name you borrowed."

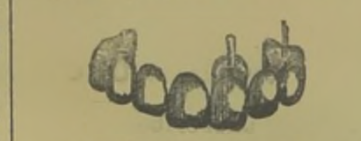
