URUGUAYAN COMMERCE WITH THE UNITED STATES.

We resume this topic from where we broke off in our article of June 23. Up to the present, the United States have enjoyed a proportion of 6 to 8 % of the importation commerce of Uruguay. So long as the commerce of this Republic remains at its present level, this proportion can only be increased by some modification in the well-established commercial relations existing between Uruguay and the principal European countries, relations which have been fairly constant for many years. It is just possible that extra effort on the part of N. American manufacturers and merchants may succeed in slightly raising this proportion in favor of the United States, but in our previous articles we have given our reasons for believing that no very important results need be expected in this direction.

There still remains to be considered the question of a general or special expansion of trade, from which the United States might benefit. If a general expansion of trade took place, we see no particular reason why the United States might not reap the lion's share of it. In an expanding market there is always room for new-comers, and in such a case firms or agencies having special relations with the United States might find a better opening for N. American goods than at present exists, for such opening would entail no formidable disturbance of the European relations to which we have referred.

But for our part, though we will probably be accused of chronic pessimism in the matter, we see little or no prospect of any such general expansion. Taking an average for the last ten or twelve years, the importing commerce of the Republic has been almost at a standstill; it has not even shown a vegetative increase in proportion to that of the population. In 1885 the importation was \$25,275,000 for a population of some 568,000 inhabitants, giving a coefficient of about \$43.5 per head; in 1895, after many fluctuations, the importation was \$24,596,000 for a population of about 560,000 inhabitants, reducing the coefficient to \$30.1 per head, a very heavy falling off. As we are constantly remarking, the policy on which the Government of the Republic has embarked since 1890 is distinctly opposed to any expansion of commerce. Commercial interests, notwithstanding their vital importance to the general prosperity of the country, are entirely unrepresented in the Government and in the Chambers; and, since 1890 at all events, commerce has been regarded as little else than an object for oppression and extortionate taxation. How little it is regarded is shown by two recent instances in which representative signed commercial petitions to the Senate were treated with rank discourtesy, one being returned without consideration on a puerile and perfectly futile pretext, the other being shelved without the consideration of an acknowledgment. Whenever a new tax is required, commerce is made the sufferer, until the burden is unbearable, and it is a wonder merchants and tradesmen do not shut up their stores and emigrate in a body. Not only are the taxes on commerce onerous, but they are exceedingly intricate and vexatious. Whilst these taxes and the enormous customs tariff endure, any real expansion of commerce is practically impossible, but the Government sternly resists any idea of decrease, and its only modifications are to make the taxes still more onerous and more vexatious. As an instance, the most important item of importation from the United States has been agricultural

machinery and utensils, but quite recently the Government has imposed a tax on these which will assuredly not tend to increase the commerce in them. We repeat, then, that we see little hopes of any general expansion of commerce until there is a radical change in the commercial policy of the Government, which is very unlikely whilst the present party remains in power.

There still remains the idea of a special expansion of commerce in favor of the United States. This could only be brought about by a commercial treaty making tariff concessions on both sides. Whether there is any idea or likelihood of this, we are quite unable to say. The United States, judging from recent intelligence, are inclined to return to McKinleyism and a high protective tariff which would tend to keep out the staple products of Uruguay such as wool and hides. And the Uruguayan Government, on its part, shows little inclination towards special tariff concessions, and it did make such, they would more probably be in favor of one of the European countries with which it has more important and closer relations than with the United States, or with its neighbors on the southern continent. In any case, such concessions are, in our thinking, an economical error. Commercial relations should be equal for all, and commerce should be allowed to expand, without Government interference, and least of all by such an unrepresentative Government as that of Uruguay, in natural directions. From time immemorial, experience has shown that interference on the part of government with commerce, or attempt to force it into special channels, results in more mischief than benefit. A tariff concession in favor of one country means an injustice to others and a disturbance of natural commercial relations. As the experience of England has shown, commerce never thrives better or expands more readily than under a reduced tariff without invidious discriminations. These, however, are general questions on which opinions differ considerably and which we need not discuss now.

We think we have now traversed, though but roughly, the ground mapped out when we commenced this series of articles. We fear that the conclusions at which we have arrived are not very encouraging, nor can we offer any great hopes to our approaching visitors. But we have given the reasons for our ideas, and if we have judged wrongly, time and experience will soon correct us.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Bank Charter discussion continued in the Senate on Monday, and several more bases were sanctioned. The only amendment of interest was one secured by Dr. C. M. Ramirez, reducing the maximum of loans to Companies or individuals until the capital of the Bank is completed. We do not think a detailed report is necessary. There is still material for two or three days more discussion. To the above we should add that the question of the Office of Public Credit was touched upon, in the discussion. Some of its most important functions will be transferred to the Bank, and its abolition was proposed. The Minister of Finance, however, said that the Government was decided to maintain it, though he did not hint that the reduced functions would be counterbalanced by reduced expenses, as should be the case. The relations established between the Bank and the Office in the Charter are not very clear, nor have they been improved in the discussion, which ended leaving matters as they were.

The Representatives were entirely occupied, on Monday, by the special "secret" sitting to which we recently referred. According to the accounts that have transpired the proceedings were both unsatisfactory and stormy. The "collectivity" maintaining their most discreditable custom during the present period, would allow of no interpellation, refused to call the Government to account for its expenditure on armaments, and even refused to allow the matter to be discussed in public. Deputy Flores is known to have made a vigorous protest against this last resolution, and towards the end, it is said, there was an incident and an exchange of angry epithets between him and Deputy Manuel Suarez, which ended in the temporary suspension of the former, a very unusual proceeding here. After all, perhaps the Chamber was right to hold the sitting "secret," for it has much to be ashamed of in its conduct in the matter. It is only another instance of the entire aberration of the present period from institutional and representative Government. A Chamber which consents to discuss iniquitous taxes in secret, hardly retains the right to question the application of the money, and may as

well abandon that with the rest of its prerogatives.

The Bank affair remains in statu quo. In the absence of intelligible decisive news one way or the other, the market remains possessed with doubts, though they are not shared by the official party. A late report, which we hesitate to believe, mentions the name of Sr. Duncan Stewart as probable official nominee to the presidency of the Bank. Our contemporaries attribute considerable disgust to ex-president Julio Herrera and his party at the turn affairs are taking with regard to the Bank, and say that they intend make a vigorous effort to secure the nomination of one or more of their partisans on the directorate. With this view Dr. Herrera will propose an amendment to the Charter by which the Executive must submit the names of the President and Directors to the Senate for approval. (This amendment has been mentioned before, and would be advisable for other reasons.) Other intrigues of no very edifying nature are going on, to which we need not refer now. The general impression now is that, after all, the new Bank will be established in the premises of the ex-National Bank, despite its unfortunate antecedents.

There were no articles of political interest in our contemporaries of yesterday.

SHARP FIGHTING OUTSIDE BULAWAYO.

BULAWAYO, JUNE 6.—Active operations have taken place earlier than was expected. Late last night the American scout Burnham galloped back into Bulawayo and announced that only five miles away eastwards he had ridden into a big impi. Sir Frederick Carrington at once ordered Major Baden Powell to carry despatches notifying this fact to Colonel Beal's column, which was encamped six miles to the north. At the same time he ordered Captain Spreckley to start soon after dawn with 97 mounted men and two Maxims and one Hotchkiss in order to co-operate with Colonel Beal's column in at once attacking the impi. At the same time a message was sent by telegraph to Colonel Maefarlane instructing him to punish the rebels that night who might be in his immediate vicinity, it being Sir Frederick Carrington's determination to strike quickly and to engage the enemy in vigorous action wherever they may be. These tactics proved eminently successful. Captain Spreckley joined Colonel Beal on the Gwelo road at ten o'clock this morning, and speedily attacked the impi, which returned a rapid and sustained fire. After a short fusillade the mounted troops charged, and the natives then fled in utter rout. The force kept up the pursuit in an easterly direction until the horses were completely tired out. The rebel loss was between one and two hundred, while the force had two men seriously wounded and one horse killed. In their stampede to escape the enemy left behind a large quantity of Martini-Henry and Winchester repeating rifles which fell into the hands of the force. Pending the return of Captain Spreckley, after the engagement the Shiloh patrol remained in the town chiefly for garrison purposes.

JUNE 7.—Later reports state that the rebels suffered heavily in yesterday's fighting, losing quite 300. Many fell in the pursuit, for the mounted men shot them down with their revolvers and the friendships used their assegais with very great effect. Captain Spreckley leaves again to-day with a patrol of 100 mounted men 330 foot and 100 friendships, with the object of working through the Inyati and Silob districts. They take with them two days' rations. Fifty men will be left to garrison each place. The officer with the patrol are Captains Llewellyn, Mainwaring, Wren, Pettengridge, Grandwell, Gray, Selous, Whitaker, and Colenbrander. The names of the whites who were wounded in yesterday's encounter are Cecil Davey, of Gifford's Horse, and George Hamilton, of the Salisbury column, both severely, and Jacobus Cornbrink, of the Afrikaner Corps, slightly.

BATTLE IN THE SOUDAN.

DERVISH CAMP, FIKKET, JUNE 7.—This place was occupied by the Khedive's troops at seven this morning after a short fight of two hours' duration. The Sirdar disposed his forces in two columns, one of which took the river and the other the desert route. The River Column was composed of three Infantry Brigades, the first under Major Lewis, the second under Major MacDonald, the third under Major Maxwell. The Desert Column under Major Burn Murdoch was composed of artillery, mounted infantry, and the 12th Soudanese Battalion, and had with it two Maxims. All the troops left Akasheh last evening at five o'clock, the river column marching till two a.m., and after a brief halt advancing at 4.30 to attack the Dervish position. At the same time Major Burn Murdoch had occupied the hills to the east of Fikket, to cut off a retreat in that direction. The movement was entire-

ly successful. The Khor, the village, and the hill were all stubbornly held by the Dervishes, who probably numbered three thousand, with many Emirs, and a large number of horsemen. But steady work by the Egyptians, coupled with the dash of the Soudanese, made short work of the resistance offered by the enemy. Their rout was complete. The loss of the Dervishes was heavy and we have taken a large number of prisoners. Major Burn Murdoch is pursuing. Our casualties are probably under sixty. No white officers were killed.

The War Office publishes the following official account of the fighting.—From G. O. C., Egypt, to S. of S. for War. Cairo, 7.6.96, 4.40 p. m. Received 6 p. m. Following telegram received from Sirdar at Akasheh to-day. "I surprised the enemy at Fikket at dawn this morning. They resisted gallantly holding hills and villages. Were completely defeated in every position by our troops. Mounted troops acted on our left flank, completely turned enemy's position and cut off their retreat. I have captured their camps, containing all their camels, horses, donkeys, provisions, &c. Our casualties are slight, and no British officers or men wounded. All the troops behaved magnificently."

SUNDRIES.

Our composers were at their old tricks in yesterday's paper and committed two atrocious blunders and several minor ones. The first was to turn a 6 upside down in the total of the Customs Receipts, which should have been \$665,640 in place of \$965,640; the other was to depose Mr. Granville Stuart from his post as U. S. Minister in order to accredit to his charming wife, a slip which we may kindly attribute to an excess of gallantry on their part. The minor errors we leave our readers to discover for themselves.

We have to thank the *Southern Cross* of Buenos Aires for the following very friendly remarks.—"Our esteemed contemporary the *Montevideo Times* has begun the 8th year of its honest, independent, and useful existence. It is a faithful echo of Uruguayan affairs, and in a general way its opinions on River Plate questions are of the soundest to be had. Its methods are honorable; its views are fearless and disinterested; and its editorial work is cleanly and ably done, year in year out. It is one of our most welcome exchanges, and while congratulating it on its birthday we wish it long and happy years of increasing popularity and prosperity."

July is the eminently republican month of the year, and includes the following notable republican anniversaries:—4th, Independence of the United States; 5th, Independence of Venezuela; 9th, Independence of Argentina; 14th, fall of the Bastille; 16th, Independence of New Granada (Colombia); 18th, Swearing of the Uruguayan Constitution; 21st, Swearing of Argentine Independence; 25th, Independence of Peru.

In the advertisement of the Winter Sports to be held by the Cricket Club on the 18th instant, the events now appear in the order in which they will take place. There have been some slight changes in the programme. The Animal Race has been suppressed (was there a scarcity of animals?) and there has been added a Surprise Race for boys under 15, and a Committee Race, which will also be a surprise. The time for commencing has been altered to the hour of 1.30.

We remind subscribers to the British Cemetery that the Annual General Meeting will be held at the Consulate at 4.30 p. m. to-day.

Messrs. Falcone is to succeed Messrs. Satolli as Papal Nuncio at Washington.

The report about a startling development in the Butler murder case is now denied, but the impression prevails that the prolonged investigation is at last about to reach some definite result.

Sr. Monedero, a Spanish conjuror and illusionist of whom report speaks highly, has arrived here and will perform at the Solis Theatre on Saturday, Sunday and Tuesday evenings next.

Next week the Pavillon will be occupied by the Anselmi Circus Troupe from Buenos Aires, with various sensational and spectacular items in the programme.

The Military Tribunal has just condemned to death the soldier Benito Cabrera, of the 3rd Cavalry Regiment, for the murder Claudio Berrueta, Sergeant in the same Regiment, committed at Melo, on July 26, 1894. This is the second military death sentence within a fortnight, but as the usual appeals have to be heard, it is impossible to say if they will be carried out.

A morning telegram says that Sir Hercules Robinson has been appointed Lord (?) Commander of the forces at the Cape Colony, where he is already Governor. We doubt the

announcement, for although Sir Hercules did once serve in the Fusi-liers, he is now a civil, not a military, functionary, and it is not usual to give such the command of forces that are anticipating active service.

A Valparaiso telegram announces the loss of the Chilean coal steamer "Tbaque" off the island of Santa Maria. Part of the crew arrived at Lota in a boat, but the rest, who were in another boat, have not been heard of, and it is feared the are lost.

A shocking crime was committed on Monday evening in a wretched hotel in Calle Republica near the barracks of the 4th Cazadores. The inhabitant of this, a woman of bad reputation named Esperanza Martinez, was attacked by her paramour, a soldier from the barracks, who stabbed her violently in three places, pursuing her into the street after she was wounded. She was taken to the Hospital, but is not expected to survive. Her would-be assassin is one Mariano Castro, scarcely more than a boy, being only 16 years of age. Shortly after the crime he was arrested in the barracks, sleeping tranquilly. He has embarked early on a career of vice and crime, but it is to be hoped the law will restrain him from such deeds in future.

Housekeeping at Bulawayo must be rather expensive at present, as reports just to hand state the price of milk at 36s. per gallon, and many other provisions, the supply of which is affected by the cattle plague and the native outbreak, at proportionately high rates. Notwithstanding this, at least one young Afrikaner couple in the larger have since the commencement of the siege entered upon the responsibilities of marriage. In this connection it is interesting to note that, according to "The Bulawayo Sketch," a dozen babies have been born during the same period within the fortified area.

On Monday, in a conventillo in the Reduto, a poor old woman named Rufina Pedrosa, who had been missing for some days, was found lying across her bed, quite dead, in a large pool of blood. At first it was thought some horrible crime had been committed, but medical examination should that she had died from the natural cause of an internal hemorrhage. The death had occurred two or three days before and decomposition had already set in. Her door was looked on the inside, and the neighbours had to break it open to effect an entrance.

Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, Colonial Secretary in the present Cabinet, celebrates his 60th birthday to-day.

Two young ladies have distinguished themselves in the recent University examinations here, namely Miss Tala Rovira and Miss Paulina Luisi, obtaining the classification of "excellent" in physics and mathematics respectively. We understand that they both propose to embrace a medical career.

The debut of the Ferrari Opera Company at the Solis Theatre will probably take place on the 18th instant with Rossini's "William Tell."

Mrs. and Miss Broughton announce the removal of their school to 261 Calle Colonia, corner of Calle Yi.

Yet another tragedy to record. Yesterday morning, in the Barraca of Sr. B. Aguerre, in La Union, the body of a man was found suspended by his clothing from the spikes of the gate. He was identified as one Gabriel Latorre, a peon employed on the establishment, and a habitual drunkard. The conjecture is that whilst climbing the gate to enter the barraca, as he was known to do sometimes when he had forgotten the key, he had slipped, his clothes had caught on the spikes, and he was throttled by his own weight, being too drunk to recover himself.

The marriage was celebrated in Paysandú, on Sunday, of Dr. Joaquin Rivas to Miss Angelica Horta.

There have been serious and continued shocks of earthquake in the Isle of Cyprus, causing great material damage. The capital Larnaca has especially suffered, and the authorities and inhabitants have abandoned it in a panic.

The National Democratic Convention at Chicago, for the proclamation of a democratic candidate to the presidency and vice-presidency of the United States, opened yesterday. To-day's telegrams should inform us of the results.

A telegram announces the death of General Young, U. S. Minister at Guayaquil.

The Artillery Volunteers from Boston have arrived at London. They number 325.

The London Standard, says a telegram, in a violent article accuses Germany of fomenting the rebellion of the natives in South Africa.

The man "John Rodde Brookes" arrested on a charge of swindling in Australia, has now been transferred to the Correctional Prison, where he will remain until the extradition papers arrive.

LONDON NOTES.

MONDAY, JUNE 8.

The Prince of Wales on Saturday opened the East London Trades, Industries, and Arts Exhibition. He was accompanied by the Princess of Wales and by Princesses Victoria and Maud. Alluding to the victory of Persepolis (to which reference was made by Mr. A. F. Hills, who read an address of welcome,) the Prince returned thanks for the very kind way in which he had been received as a sportsman. It was always a matter of satisfaction to an Englishman, he added, to succeed in anything he undertook, and it was very gratifying to have won with a horse bred by himself. He then went on to speak in commendation of the exhibition and of East-end industries.

In the Royal Thames Yacht Club's Channel match from the Nore to Dover on Saturday, the Emperor William scored his second victory for the season, beating the Britannia with an English-built and English-sailed boat—Meteor II.

On Saturday each of the four condemned prisoners in Newgate was informed that the Home Secretary was unable to advise the Queen to grant a reprieve, and that the sentences will be duly carried out. Fowler, Milson, and Seaman will, as at present arranged, be executed to-morrow morning, and Mrs. Dyer on Wednesday morning.

At the Central Criminal Court, on Saturday, the case for the Crown against the men Hall and Watts, charged with burglary and violent assault on a jeweller at Lewisham, was closed, and the defence was entered upon. The line taken was to set up an alibi, a witness being called who declared that he saw the two men at Liverpool in January. The convict Carter, who has already been sentenced for his share in the crime, was also called. He swore that the two accused men were not his confederates. Neither were Fowler and Milson, but he declined to give the names of his associates, on the ground that they had been good to him and he would not incriminate them. The trial was adjourned till to-day, when it is expected to finish.

TUESDAY, JUNE 9.

The House of Lords re-assembled yesterday after the Whitehouse recess. Questioned by the Earl of Camperdown, the marquis of Lansdowne read telegrams from the Sirdar as to the battle in the Sudan. These showed that the enemy lost about 800 killed, including Emir Hamuda, who commanded, and several other Emirs of importance while nearly 450 prisoners had been taken.

In the Commons questions were answered by Mr. Curzon with regard to the rising in Crete and the battle in the Sudan. Replying to Mr. B. Jones, the Home Secretary said that the subpoena served on the Chief Warder at Newgate for the convict Mrs. Dyer was invalid, and it had been returned. The Crown did not intend to offer any evidence against Mrs. Palmer. An unexpected course was taken with respect to the Irish Land Bill. Mr. Gerald Balfour having moved the second reading, Mr. John Morley and other members criticised the measure. Mr. Arthur Balfour then suggested that if the debate were closed that night an early day might be given for the Committee stage, and in that case he hoped that amendments would be confined to important points. Eventually the second reading was agreed to, and it was arranged that next Friday should be given to Committee on the Bill, to-night being devoted to Supply instead. Mr. T. M. Healy's proposal to refer the Bill to a Grand Committee was rejected by 153 votes to 92, a majority of 61.

Further details of the fighting with the Dervishes at Firket are given in a telegram from the Egyptian force. Several important Emirs, besides the Emir Hamuda, were among the killed. Four hundred and fifty prisoners were taken, but many of the enemy refused to surrender and fought till they were cut down. The Dervish losses are believed to be at least eight hundred killed.

Mr. Jules Simon passed away peacefully shortly before midday yesterday. The Emperor William is to be represented at the funeral by a special Envoy. In his message of condolence to Mme. Simon he speaks of the deceased's visit to Berlin in 1890, and says: "General disarmament which would have been a blessing for the two nations, was unfortunately rendered impossible by a childish and heedless demonstration on the part of the League of Patriots."

The anniversary of the coronation of the Emperor Francis Joseph as King of Hungary was celebrated with much solemnity at Budapest yesterday. The Magnates and representatives of all the Counties and Free Towns escorted the Crown of St. Stephen to the new Parliament building, where the Mincial Act was solemnly read in the presence both Houses of the Legislature.

The German Emperor's yacht Meteor again beat the Prince of Wales's Britannia yesterday, this being in one of the matches of the Royal Cinque Ports Yacht Club, at Dover.

The Prince of Wales, on behalf of Council of the Hospital Sunday Fund, yesterday presented Mr. Henry C. Bartlett with an album of photographs and autographs in recognition of his services to that organization. The Duke of York attended the ceremony, which took place under the presidency of the Lord Mayor, at the Mansion House.

Class lists were issued yesterday at Cambridge in the Moral Science Tripos. Miss Ramsey, daughter of Professor Ramsey, of Glasgow Uni-

Madame Sarah Bernhardt appeared at the Comedy Theatre last night in "Adrienne Lecouvreur," and had a rapturous welcome from a large audience, among whom were the Prince and Princess of Wales.

After the heavy rain the bowlers held the upper hand in most of the cricket matches commenced yesterday. At Wembley Park the Australians were dismissed for 105 by an English eleven, who were themselves out for 65, the visitors in their second attempt losing three wickets for 29 runs. At Lords three innings were completed, two by Kent for 108 and 93, and one by the M. C. C. for 52, the Club also making eight without loss. On the Trent Bridge Ground, Nottingham disposed of Cambridge University for 113, and put on 180 for six wickets. Lancashire and Derbyshire each completed an innings at Derby, the visitors for 111 and the home team for 153. Gloucestershire scored 160 at Birmingham against Warwickshire, who responded with 108 for three wickets. Hampshire had the best of the day's play with Sussex at Southampton, leaving off with eight wickets in hand in their second innings and 135 runs on. Owing to rain, no play was possible at Bradford between Yorkshire and Surrey.

Ben Watts and William Hall were both convicted at the Central Criminal Court yesterday of robbery with violence upon Mr. Evans, a Lewisham jeweller. Mr. Justice Hawkins sentenced each of them to 15 years' penal servitude.

Sentence of eight months' hard labour was passed at the London Sessions yesterday on Horace Van Praagh, a well-dressed man, convicted of indecently assaulting Alice Beswick on the Metropolitan Railway.

The Uses of Aluminium.

A scientific investigation was recently undertaken by the Imperial German Health Bureau to inquire into the suitability of the use of aluminium for cooking utensils. They proved that this metal is entirely free from communicating to food any poisonous salt such as is given off by copper, tin, or lead. To make sure that no injurious effect need be feared if aluminium be taken into the system, two physicians, aged respectively twenty-six and thirty-five, volunteered to act as subjects. To each of these was administered daily with their lunch about fifteen grains of aluminium tartrate, for the period of one month. By the end of that time neither had lost flesh or appetite, nor felt the slightest discomfort. For cooking purposes this metal seems to be peculiarly adapted, seeing it is a splendid conductor and retainer of heat, while it has also the advantage of being non-poisonous and non-corroding.

Paternal Legislation in Germany.

BERLIN, JUNE 8.—A very interesting incident occurred at today's sitting of the Imperial Diet during the debate on the third reading of the New Trades Bill. The Bill contains a paragraph prohibiting commercial travellers from travelling on retail business. The Liberals, National Liberals, and Social Democrats opposed this paragraph, while the Centre Party and Conservatives supported the House. Prince Alexander Hohenlohe, the Chancellor's son, who has a seat for an Alsatian constituency, rose and strongly criticised the Bill submitted by his father. "We ought," he exclaimed, "to have done with laws giving the police the right of interfering with one's private business." He went on to say that the tendency to restrict the freedom of trade and personal liberty was the malady of our time, and that the State was always meddling with the private affairs of the people. This the State had neither the right nor the duty to do. The whole Left, including the Social Democrats, accompanied the speech with prolonged cheers. One may imagine the perplexed faces of the Ministers and members of the Federal Council. It is a pity the Chancellor himself was not present, for what was coming in the situation would have been enhanced. The incident gives one

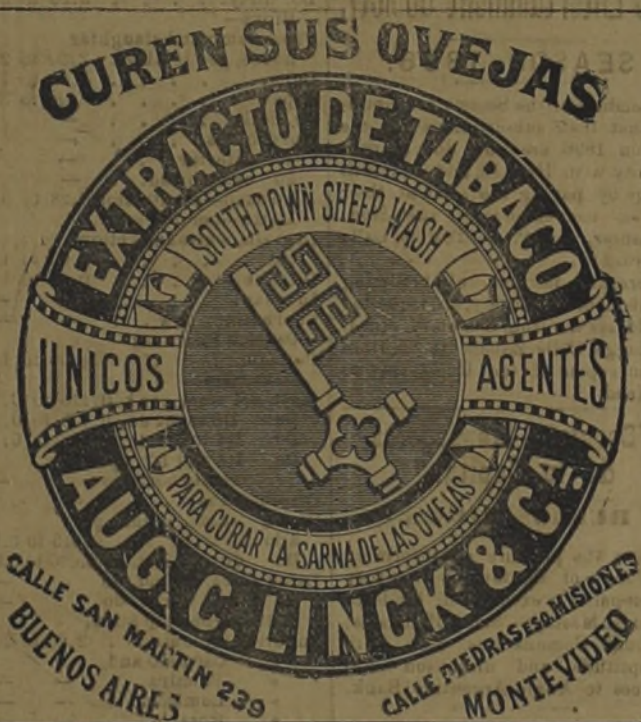
