REGISTRATION OF FOREIGN TRADEMARKS

In relation to the recent Decrees concerning the registration of foreign trademarks by unqualified persons, the Minister of Fomento has just caused to be published a list of all the trademarks registered since July 1, 1893, numbered from 5 to 753, inclusive, in the Patent Office. POLITICAL NOTES.
The Legislature had a grand time of it on Wednesday, and brought the ordinary sittings to a close in a fashion worthy of their doughty deeds during the session. First of all the two Chambers met separately, at an earlier hour than usual, and rapidly sanctioned as many pensions and grants as could be squeezed into the limited time before them, hardly any application being neglected, though at the end grumbling was heard from some quarters that the golden stream had not reached their own special protégés. It would be difficult to say how much was added to the pension list in a short hour and a half.

Then came the General Assembly, and the important question of fixing the "diet money" or legislative salaries for the next period. All who hoped for reelection had a personal interest in this. Deputy Tavolara, who is never heard on other occasions, proposed, with the solemnity befitting the great occasion, that the salaries be restored to the original figure of \$15 for diet, or \$450 per month, without discount. (Our legislators expect to be paid for Sundays and fête days as well as working days.) This raised a double chorus of approval and disapproval. Senator Ramirez qualified the proposal as a monstrosity and hoped that for the credit of the Assembly it would be rejected and the salaries left as before. The Uruguayan parliament was the dearest in the world. He proposed that the voting should be nominal, which was accepted, Ex-president Julio Herrera protested against what he was pleased to call the "intimidation" of a nominal vote, and said that on this account he would vote for the increase, though he would not have done so otherwise. (The logic of this remark is beyond our weak mind entirely.) Deputy Tavolara grew quite eloquent on his only subject. Deputy Flores touched the raw when he said that the abuse consisted not so much in the high salaries as in the practice of sitting all the year round, thus making the salary an annual one, which was neither contemplated by the Constitution, required by public business, nor justified by the achievements of the Chambers. The proposed increase was then put to the vote and was approved by a narrow majority of 31 to 30, after which the excitement subsided and Sr. Tavolara resumed his seat brimming over with the self-satisfaction of one who has done a good and great deed. The voting was as follows—

After that, the conventional Message from the Executive was read, and the sessions declared closed. The convocation to extraordinary sessions will appear in a very few days.

The vote of the Assembly raising the diet money to \$450 the month, increases the legislative expenses, already exceedingly heavy, by some \$100,000 the year, which will now have to be added to the Budget. It has made the worst impression possible and is severely censured by our contemporaries. On another occasion we will comment on it at greater length.

Respecting the Bank Loan there is nothing new, nor does the official party make any sign to set the current rumours at rest. Whatever they know about it, they carefully keep to themselves. Yesterday afternoon there appeared another telegram from London, by the Havas agency, to the following effect:—

"The Journal of Finance declares, in reference to the new State Bank of Uruguay that, after reading the statutes of the formation of the establishment, one is convinced that it will be born practically condemned to be a failure." We have never heard of such a paper as the *Journal of Finance*, which leads us to regard the message with suspicion, though possibly this may be a telegraphic blunder for "the financial journals" in general.

Our contemporaries are again discussing the question of the threatened constitutional reform, and the *Siglo Veintiuno* thinks that since the ordinary sessions have passed without its having been broached, it must now be dropped, and the danger may be regarded as averted as the Executive cannot propose the subject during the extraordinary sessions. We are not sure that this point is certain, but we hope it may prove so.

The *Olympo* has brought from Antwerp another instalment of the new armament, namely 138 cases containing 2200 Mauser rifles and 50 cases of ammunition.

THE LOSS OF THE "DRUMMOND CASTLE."
PARIS, JUNE 17.—The Cape Liner Drummond Castle, bound for London, struck about midnight last night on a rock off the Ile de Molene, one of the small islands between Ushant and the coast of Finisterre. Within three minutes the vessel foundered with nearly all on board. The news was conveyed to the Maritime Prefecture at Brest by a telegram from the fishing village of Le Conquet, on the mainland, was communicated to the British Consul. One man was picked up at Ushant, and two off the island of Molene. Six bodies have been recovered at sea. The tug Laborieux, belonging to the French Admiralty, has left Brest for the scene of the wreck. The latest news from Le Conquet says that all on board perished save three.

A telegram received at Lloyd's from Ushant says:—"Drummond Castle, London, wrecked last midnight, supposed on rocks. About three minutes after stranding vessel sank. One man only, Mr. Marquardt, saved. Ushant. Six bodies also picked up, of which one is an officer of the boat, age about 25 years, small, fair moustache and one fair girl, aged 6 years. Vessel completely disappeared. Another ship's boat was launched. Remainder supposed lost."

A further telegram to Lloyd's from Ushant states that the Drummond Castle sank on Tuesday evening, about eleven o'clock, and that three men have been saved.

A still later message was received at 9.30 at Lloyd's as follows, from the lighthouse keeper at Ushant: "The following were the names of the bodies recovered: Ellis, fourth officer; W. Whipp, passenger; Alice

Reed, little girl; Cohen, passenger."

About midnight the following telegram was received in London from the British Consul at Brest in reply to the request for fuller information sent from Messrs. Donald Currie and Co.: "Information true. Drummond Castle (supposed) struck on rocks west Molene, midnight of 16th inst. Sank immediately. No chance to take to boats. Present information one saved Ushant and two Molene. Names not yet given. Six bodies recovered Ushant. Government tug now on the spot searching. Further information later."

The news of the disaster to the Caps liner Drummond Castle, owned by Messrs. Donald Currie and Company, and inward bound from Delagoa Bay, Natal, and Cape Town, was received in London yesterday afternoon about four o'clock. The first reports indicated sufficiently the serious nature of what had happened, but it was some hours before the whole extent of the catastrophe became known. A telegram from Ushant, the most westerly of the islands off the coast of Brittany, brought the first intimation of the disaster. This was confirmed in the first place by a despatch to the company from their own agent there, who, however, was able to give no particulars. It was not until shortly after seven o'clock that a statement was published by the owners containing two telegrams which had been received at the offices in Fenchurch-street. The first was from the chief lighthouse keeper at Ushant, and was as follows:—"Drummond Castle wrecked about midnight on the 16th, Ushant. Urgent sole survivor at Ushant, two others at Ile Molene. Six bodies recovered, including one officer of the ship about 25 years of age, small light moustache, and young girl about six years old. Bodies placed in special house. Kindly telegraph instructions as to burial. Ship sank in three minutes."

The second telegram, also dated Ushant, 4.10 p.m., said: "Drummond Castle total loss off Ushant. Am probably sole survivor. Proceeding London. MAQUARDT."

The officials of the company at once telegraphed to Capetown and Las Palmas for a complete list of passengers on board. The latest cable advised 143 passengers, while the officers and crew numbered 104 in all. In continuation of their statement the owners say: "Two representatives left London this afternoon for Brest and Ushant. They will attend the burial of the bodies recovered, which will take place on Friday. The British Consul at Brest has been requested to render all possible assistance to the survivors, and to take charge of any passengers' effects which may be recovered. The owners desire to express the deepest sorrow for this great loss of life, and their sympathy with the relatives and friends of all on board the Drummond Castle. This is the first occasion in which the life of any passenger has been lost through shipwreck or accident to any vessel of the company."

Wedding.
A very pretty and successful wedding was that celebrated on Wednesday evening of Mr. A. B. Powers, manager of the Montevideo Telephone Company, and Miss Miller. The service was read by the Rev. W. Groves, and took place in the residence of the bride's parents at Calle Reconquista 104, which was most tastefully arranged for the occasion and decorated with a profusion of bouquets and garlands. The young and pretty bride looked most charming in her bridal dress of white satin and orange blossoms, and everyone agreed that the bridegroom deserved hearty congratulations on his good luck in securing so fair a prize. A profuse show of wedding presents was exhibited in a side room, and a not less profuse supply of champagne and other refreshments attracted due share of attention in the dining room. There was a large gathering of English and native friends to celebrate the auspicious occasion, including quite a bevy of pretty girls, among whom the bride's sisters, in bridesmaids costumes of soft cream-coloured material, were conspicuous. After the ceremony dancing commenced and was kept up with great animation until an early hour of the following morning, long before which the newly married couple had departed to their new home in Calle Dayman, accompanied by innumerable good wishes, to which ours are united.
