

saction. Since we are bound to have the silver, whether we want it or no, let us at least hope that the new coins will be an improvement on those of the Barriga issue.

—Whilst half Argentina has been in revolt against official corruption and extravagance, the Argentine legislators, unable or unwilling to read the signs of the times, are voting pensions and grants wholesale. In the present situation of the country this is sheer dishonesty, but perhaps the legislators think that because the revolution is dominated, there is no necessity to reform their ways, and they may continue on their old bad and disastrous courses. It is evident the Chambers will have to go before the new era commences.

—Argentina has an honest Executive and a corrupt Legislature. The former should now make it its business to sweep away the latter, then the country may have a chance.

—Dr. Valentín Virasoro, Argentine Minister of Foreign Affairs, has resigned his portfolio, having been proclaimed candidate for the Governorship of Corrientes. At the instance of the President, the resignation has been temporarily withdrawn, to avoid a cabinet crisis at the present juncture.

—A Havas telegram from Rio Janeiro says that the bombardment continues, without the rebel vessels gaining any advantage. The French and British Ministers have approached the Government to take precautions in case of violence or sacking, but the Government has assured them it was strong enough to maintain order. It appears that the reported shooting of Deputy Saabra on board the "Aquadaban" was all an invention.

—It transpires that the affair in the 4th Obseques Barracks of which we spoke yesterday was neither accident nor suicide, but a deliberate murder resulting from a previous quarrel. The murderer Ruiz Diaz was taken out of the Penitentiary some two years ago, where he was under sentence for a murderous attack on his own father. If such men are drafted into the army and trusted with weapons, instead of being properly punished for their crimes, it is not surprising that further crimes ensue.

—We have received the first number of *El Eco Militar*, a bi-weekly journal which has set itself the double task of defending military interests and supporting the Tajes candidature. It opens with a smart attack on the Herrera administration for its jobbery and bungling in the recent purchase of Mauser rifles.

—Argentine affairs continue to calm down. The interdiction on the telegraphs has been raised.

—Payment of the local obligations for May is not concluded yet. We are thus now over four months in arrears.

—We are informed that the visit of the Spanish actor Vico is deferred to November, he having determined not to break his season in Buenos Aires.

—A New York telegram says that work in the Colorado silver mines is resumed, 3500 miners having returned to their places. From New Orleans we learn that there has been another frightful storm, killing 24 persons and doing enormous material damage.

—The Custom House paid \$8,898 into the London Bank yesterday on account of the foreign debt service.

—From London telegrams we learn that the freedom of the city of Edinburgh has been conferred on the Duke of York.—The cholera has quite disappeared from England, and the public health is excellent.—Argentine securities have risen on the news of the suppression of the revolution.—The marriage of the Cesa waltch to the Princess Victoria of Wales is again spoken of.—During the last quarter, the revenue diminished in £500,000. This constant fall is seriously occupying the Cabinet.—Principal Jowett, of Balliol, is dead, aged 76.—The small-pox hospital at Bradford has been destroyed by fire. 70 patients were valiantly saved by the attendants.

red on Thursday afternoon near Chester, Massachusetts, when an express train on the Boston and Albany Railway fell through a bridge into the river. Fifteen passengers were killed and thirty-six injured, six of them fatally.

The Dominion Line steamer *Sarnia* arrived at Queenstown yesterday morning in tow of the Allan Line Monte Video. She broke her thrust shaft on the 4th ult., and as was found impossible to repair the damage the vessel was put under sail. The waterer was too fine however, and she drifted about for twenty-one days before the Allan liner came in sight.

The annual National Dahlia Show opened yesterday at the Crystal Palace.

Partridge shooting opened favourably yesterday, considering the shortness of cover in many parts.

At Nottingham, yesterday, the Australian cricketer completed their first innings for 343, and the Nottingham were all out for 63; the latter, following on, made 53 for one wicket. At Scarborough, the match between Yorkshire and the South of England was marred by rain; the South continued their first innings, but did not conclude it, making 176 for four wickets. At Lord's, the last match of the season—M. C. C. v Cambridge—was begun; the former concluded their first innings for 180, and the latter made 162 for five wickets.

An interview took place yesterday between Mr. Monson, now lying in Inverary Gaol charged with having caused the death of Lieut. Hambrough, and his wife. The Procurator-General left Scotland yesterday for Ventnor, Isle of Wight, to superintend the exhumation of the body of the deceased. It was reported at Inverary that there was as yet no trace of the engineer Scott, who was one of the shooting party when Lieut. Hambrough met his death.

At the Thames Police-court yesterday, Charles William Gentry, master of the Mile-end Workhouse, and Edward Lauderdale, manager to Messrs. Dobinson, Stewart, and Co., of Watling-street, appeared again to answer to a charge of combining to defraud the guardians of Mile-end Old-town, and were committed for trial.

At Brighton yesterday, Paul Jole and Celestin Joly were committed for trial on a charge of having obtained a large sum of money from William Thomas Childs Pardoe, described as a gentleman of independent means, by threats.

LONDON NOTES
SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 2.

The House of Lords advanced several Bills yesterday, and then adjourned during pleasure, in order that the Home Rule Bill might be read formally a first time as soon as it had been passed by the other House. At ten minutes past one the Bill was brought in and read a first time.

In the House of Commons, Mr. Campbell-Bannerman, answering a question by Mr. Hanbury, said that Lord Roberts was not eligible for the divisional command at Aldershot because his appointment would be derogatory to the dignity of the great office which he had for so many years filled in India. Mr. Gladstone, replying to a question with regard to Mazonland, stated that Mr. Rhodes anticipated that he could in a short time place on the spot for service, if required, one thousand men fully armed and mounted, and that the Government regarded that as an announcement as satisfactory. The twelve o'clock rule was suspended, and the debate on the third reading of the Home Rule Bill was resumed by Mr. Justin M. Carthy, who declared that he and his friends accepted the Bill as a final settlement—an announcement cheered by the Irish members. Mr. Chamberlain, Sir E. Grey, Colonel Sanderson, Mr. Perks, Lord F. Hamilton, Mr. Wallace, Mr. T. P. O'Connor, and Mr. Balfour spoke, and Mr. J. Morley wound up the debate. On a division there were for the Bill, 301; against, 268—a Government majority of 34. The Bill was then read a third time amidst loud and prolonged ministerial cheers.

A deputation of London cabdrivers waited upon Mr. Asquith yesterday, to represent their grievances in regard to "privileged" cabs at railway stations, unlicensed railway omnibuses, "bilkers," and the granting of drivers' licences to boys. Mr. Asquith promised inquiry as to the complaints made against the railway companies, said he did not think the question of boy licences was a very important or difficult one, and as to "bilkers" he expressed sympathy with the cabmen, but remarked that it was more easy to condemn the grievance than to devise an adequate remedy for it.

Lord Roberts received the freedom of the city of Waterloo yesterday. At a meeting of Welsh members held yesterday, a resolution in favour of taking independent action was defeated, and an amendment was carried in which they expressed reliance that the Government would place the Welsh Disestablishment Bill in such a position in the Ministerial programme for next year as would enable the House of Commons to carry it through all its stages, but at the same time they notified to the Government that unless the Bill was placed in that position they would take an independent course.

At the Millrow Collieries, Llanca-shire, a number of men who had returned to work have been brutally ill-treated by the strikers. Yesterday the pits at Ilkstone, Derbyshire, were visited by about two thousand strikers, and, in spite of the presence of the police, the men engaged in getting coal were induced to cease working.

More deaths from what is supposed to have been Asiatic cholera have occurred at Grimby; and at Hull a woman has died under circumstances which have led to medical experts in London being communicated with.
