MUNICIPAL GREED.

Resuming from yesterday our discussion of the proposed new municipal impost, we now come to those which are specially odious, as falling on food and articles of general consumption.

The first of these is a proposed tax of \$3 the month on every cart hawking meat, fruit, fish or vegetables within the radius of the markets. These already pay a licence quite disproportionate to their capital and profit, and this is simply another attempt to deprive the poorer class of consumer of a cheap method of obtaining provisions. The market fees charged by the Municipality are already extortionate; out of three markets they derive a yearly income of \$100,000; and an attempt is made to give them as much of a monopoly as possible by establishing a "radius" which is an indefensible iniquity, and by imposing extortionate licences on private establishments for the sale of food and provisions. It is these taxes that help to make living so dear in a land where meat and vegetables are extraordinarily abundant. This is the very reverse of enlightened legislation or taxation. In a country like this, the policy of which should be to attract immigration by making the necessities of life as accessible as possible, the sale of food, within hygienic conditions, should be absolutely free and unrestricted. It would be the act of an enlightened and progressive government to remove all taxes and restrictions on the sale of food, and to reduce market fees to a minimum. In any case it should be remembered that such taxes and restrictions fall with the greatest weight on the poorer classes, and by doubling or trebling their cost of living, raise the price of labour and reduce the purchasing power of money, and thus impede industrial progress. It is difficult to conceive a greater error in economical policy than such taxes as these, and yet our governing authorities, in their blindness or their greed, persist in them and seem unable to perceive the impediment they are to the development of the country. In old countries, like the European states, they are prejudicial and invariably odious; in a new country in want of immigrants, like this, they are positively suicidal, for the same money may be better raised by other means.

The next proposal is for the obligatory analysis of certain provisions. The comprehensive and onerous nature of this may be judged from the following tariff:—Vinegar, honey, sugar, ices, \$3 each. Syrups, chocolate, tea, coffee, chicory, spices, saffron, tomato preserve, pepper, table mustard, jellies, preserves, farinaceous foods, bread, biscuits, cakes, flour and flour-pastes (fideos) \$4 each. Soda and mineral waters, cider, milk, \$5 each. Wine, lard, butter, cheese, \$8 each. Beer, \$10. Alcohol, spirits, liquors, bitters, table oils, meat extracts, \$12. Colouring matters, \$15. These are to be enforced with a fine of \$5 for every sale of an article not analysed and stamped.

This monstrous proposal is merely a forerunner of Dr. Brian's objectionable anti-adulteration tax, the approval of which by the Chambers seems to be coolly taken for granted. As we said in relation to that, because a certain proportion, perhaps twenty per cent, of the provisions sold, are adulterated, not always noisily, it is proposed to tag all provisions with an expensive analysis, which will simply be another and entirely useless addition to the price of living. It will be a costly and troublesome tax to enforce, the greater part of the revenue from which will be absorbed by the collecting machinery, and, if the prevention of adulteration is really the object, which we rather doubt, the same end can be obtained by far less objectionable means.

In addition to this, the Municipality does not condescend to give any indication of how so complicated a tax is to be enforced. As the proposition stands it is absurd and unintelligible. To think that such world-known articles as Menier's or Fry's chocolate, Colman's mustard, Polson's cornflour, Crosse and Blackwell's jams, Bass's beer, Hennessy's cognac, Thompson's or Dawson's whiskey, Huntley and Palmer's biscuits, Liebig's meat extract, and many other similar articles of commonest commerce, may not be sold until they have received the approval of the local analyst, is simply an impertinence—it is an insult to common sense and a mere excuse for brigandage. There is no public object whatever to be gained by such analysis. It would be far more to the point to take steps to prevent the use of fraudulent trade marks and wrappers, but of this we hear nothing, perhaps because the fabrication of such is regarded as a legitimate national industry, as has practically become the case in Buenos Aires, where the phrase, "industria del pais" has almost become a synonym for the production of worthless and even poisonous articles destined to be sold in fraudulent covers imitating European goods.

How is this extraordinary tax to be collected? Is every daily batch of bread or biscuits turned out of a local baker's oven to be analysed separately at a charge of \$4 each? If so, there will soon be a monstrous rise in the price of bread. Moreover, as the analysis is a work of time, the bread will be rather stale before its sale is authorised. Or is the analysis to be weekly, or monthly, or quarterly? In the case of milk, how can such a tax possibly be applied? Is the yield of each cow, or every can of milk brought into the city from the country, to be analysed daily at a charge of \$5 the time? If so, milk will soon be almost as expensive a luxury as champagne! Is every retail grocer to pay for a separate analysis each time he orders goods from the wholesale merchant? Is the importer to pay for an analysis on each consignment and on each of the numerous articles possibly contained in that consignment? If half a dozen different importers each order a consignment of the same goods, as may easily happen with Hennessy's brandies or Menier's chocolate, will each have to pay for a separate analysis, or will one analysis be considered sufficient for all? And in the case of standard imported articles, such as we have named above, the quality of which does not vary from year to year, will one analysis be considered sufficient, or will the unspeakable absurdity be perpetrated of a fresh analysis for each arrival? These are all important and complicated questions, and there are many similar ones that might arise, not a single one of which is provided for by the Municipality. In fact their sole idea seems to have been to devise an onerous, objectionable and useless tax, without the least consideration of its effects or of how it is to be applied. It is not surprising that one native contemporary asks if the Municipality have taken leave of their senses and another suggests that the entire proposal should be consigned to the waste paper basket without further consideration. The *Razon* also counsels them not to add more fuel, by such monstrous proposals, to the latent materials of dissatisfaction and perturbation.

Apart from the intrinsically objectionable nature of these proposals, it must be remembered that the Municipality has advanced nothing whatever, at least so far as the public are aware, to justify the demand for new resources, and that the Board has entirely ceased to be a representative body ever since it fell under the corruptive influence of Dr. Herrera and his shameless manipulations of the elections. At present it is composed for the greater part of men who are merely his tools and nominees and therefore deprived of public respect and representation as they should also be of authority and office. These, however, are matters to be considered apart.

Decrees have been issued appointing Dr. Pablo de Maria, ex-Rector of the University, an honorary member of the Council of Superior and Secondary Education, and Dr. Alfredo Navarro to the vacancy on the same Council caused by the death of Dr. Garai.

Some mild excitement has been caused by the news that three mitrailleuses or Gatling guns—were despatched to the frontier by train on Thursday evening, with the corresponding outfit and squads. The meaning of this unusual movement is not at present known, though it is conjectured that it corresponds to the oft-talked of *blanco* invasion which the Government still holds in dread, doubtless impelled by a deep consciousness of its own demerits and unpopularity. The guns are destined for the 4th Cavalry regiment under the command of Colonel Clark. General Esteban, Commander of the Frontiers, will leave the capital for the frontier to-day, but it is not known if he will take more armament with him. There is also talk of a sudden and mysterious visit paid to the President by an unknown envoy from Buenos Aires, supposed to bring news of the revolutionary movement the Government imagines to be brewing there. It is only fair to add that these matters are more the subject of curiosity than of apprehension outside official circles. No one wants to see the public peace and order disturbed, but at the same time no one cares two cents whether the government remains or falls—in fact the majority would probably prefer to see it fall, for we are getting into that state of mind towards the "dominant party" in which almost any change would be hailed as a relief. After four years of Herrera and two of Herrera-Borda, the resuscitation of Santos could be viewed with equanimity and with unmixed delight, whilst Tajos, who with all his faults was far the best president of the last twenty years, would be worshipped as a messiah.

It is stated that next week the Chamber of Deputies will renew its secret sittings over the new taxes—those of the Executive, not the Municipality. In relation to this the *Siglo* makes a curious statement. Originally the proposal to impose an additional Customs Duty of 2 1/2 % was opposed by a majority of four to three. But when it came to signing the respective reports, "official influence" prevailed and the numbers were reversed, thus giving a majority in favor of the proposal. The *Siglo* adds that the proposal, in fact all the taxes, have already an assured majority in the Chamber. This is bad news for the commercial and progressive interests of the country, which seem destined to suffer as much or more from the antagonism of the present Government as they did from that of Dr. Herrera. The country is now beginning to realise the bitter meaning of the cry "no reaction" raised as the watchword of Dr. Herrera's party at the last presidential election. As then, so now, their real policy towards the country may be condensed as "Backwards and Downwards." This is what they meant by no reaction and they are carrying it to the bitter end.

The more we see of Sr. Beccario's Company the more we are astonished that he is able to give such really excellent performances at such cheap prices. Principals, orchestra, chorus and ballet are all equally up to mark and leave no opening for seriously adverse criticism. The *St. Lusiardi* was almost an ideal *Gilda*, young, attractive, with a sweet voice and good school, her only faults were those of inexperience. When she loses these she may also lose the redeeming qualities of youth and freshness. Signoretti is a marvel among tenors and too thorough an artist to make any slips. He was encoined in his two principal arias. The baritone Sr. Cesarotto (replacing Sr. Sivoi) gave an admirable rendering of *Rigoletto* and the Conde was a most fascinating gipsy. Even the chorus was a treat, it sang so well in tune. We have seen the opera far worse given at double the price. This evening the old favorite "Ballo in Maschera" with the same artists and a new soprano Sta. Gheldini.

—English merchants and ship-owners are not likely to give a large share of patronage to the North Sea and Baltic Canal—the waterway which was opened with such fanfare in June. It has been thought from the first that the tariff of charges was too high, and since the opening this fact has been amply demonstrated, but this is not the only reason why the canal has already become exceedingly unpopular. Correspondence has appeared in the German papers containing a series of charges against the canal administration. There is too much red tape in the service. Unnecessary and vexatious formalities delay the traffic. The pilots are not polite, and the subordinate officials are insolent. The few shippers who have thus far used the canal are of opinion that the old and dangerous waterway round Denmark served them better. Another ground of dissatisfaction lies in the fact that the traffic through the canal has hitherto been limited to the daytime, notwithstanding the excellent installation of electric light. Add to this the question of dues, and the case becomes a pretty strong one. For small steamers and for sailing ships the burden is so heavy that very few indeed will use this short route to the Baltic. The passage through the Sound is free, while that through the canal costs for a little steamer no less than \$18, without reckoning pilotage dues. No wonder the German Press is clamouring for an inquiry.

—A London telegram says that three British cruisers have been ordered to La Guayra to make a naval demonstration to persuade Venezuela to settle the long-pending limit question. More injustice to South America!

—The cruiser "Barraqueta" which arrived from Rio Janeiro on Wednesday will leave this afternoon for Port Stanley, taking mails.

—The *Zulus* who came here with Wirth's Circus, being dissatisfied with their treatment, have left it and have all contrived to find employment in the city or suburbs, thanks to some friends of color. We expect the Brothers Wirth are more to be congratulated on the riddance of some inconvenient subjects than the new masters of the *Zulus* on their acquisition.

—The Paris Correspondent of a London daily writes:—The idea of a Universal Exhibition in 1900 finds favour in the sight of hotel keepers and lodging-house keepers only. Paris was little better than a gigantic music hall and Japanese tea-house during the last World's Fair at the Champ-de-Mars. Every Universal Exhibition that I remember here has been fraught with permanent disadvantage, and especially to those with small fixed incomes. Prices go up in Exhibition times never to go down. The riff-raff of the world is shot into Paris. Of course there are advantages, and there are always interesting things to see at universal exhibitions, but it would be more beneficial if all the millions sterling that are to be swallowed by the World's Fair of 1900 were spent in sending school children to pass their holidays abroad.

—A meeting has taken place in Caracas, capital of Venezuela, in favor of distressed Cuba, and it was resolved to ask the Government to recognise the revolutionists as belligerents, and to use its influence with other South American governments to do the same. It was argued, with every reason, that the Cubans were only doing what had been done by all S. America early in the century. We may add that the apathy with which their cause is regarded in River Plate, where the Republics, whatever their failings, have so greatly benefited by their independence, is far from explicable. Is there no paper here or in Buenos Aires with sufficient courage to initiate a propaganda or open a subscription in their behalf. So far as we have seen the English papers here are the only ones that have expressed a word of sympathy with their cause.

The Revd. D. McGurk B. D. of Lomas will conduct Special Services in the Methodist Episcopal Church every evening during the week ending October 5 at 8 o'clock. All English Speaking residents invited to attend.

BUENOS AIRES.

—Mr. Thomas Rogers representing the firm of S. B. and B. W. Fleisher of Philadelphia has arrived in this market with the object of purchasing wools for the factory which he represents. He has already visited the several produce markets in company of Mr. Carlos Lix Klett the well known produce broker and of Mr. Enrique M. Nelson director of the valuable publication *La Produccion Argentina*. Mr. Rogers was presented to the well known firm of Devotto Balbiani and Co by Minister Buchanan, with whom Mr. Rogers have engaged to act as purchasers of wool of the new clip. It is satisfactory to hear of new American purchasers arriving in this market to operate in Argentine wools.

—The shipment of stock which arrived by the *ss Saxony* for Mr. D. Maclean is thus described by the *Live Stock Journal*.—Many of the animals had distinguished themselves at "Royals" and other shows in England and Scotland, and among them was the celebrated roan bull Count Victor, bred by Mr. Willis. He has won twelve first and six champion prizes. Roland Gwyn, a two-year beautiful roan which won second prize at the Royal Northern, Aberdeen, the only time he was ever shown by Mr. Law. Staffordshire Boy, a nice roan yearling, bred by Mr. Morris and shown by Mr. Blundell, when he won four first prizes, a medal, and the Shorthorn Society's prize this year. Marathon, a red two-year old, bred by Mr. Duthie, who won seven first prizes and several special ones. He is a bull of great substance and constitution. Red Prince, a nice red, bred by Mr. McWilliam that was second at Keith, Sir Lionel, a roan, bred by Mr. H. R. McKee, a very massive bull, with good points, and a prizewinner. Ringleader, a beautiful red bull, bred by Lord Lovat, which has not been exhibited, but had been shown this year would have been hard to beat. Lord John, a nice roan, bred by the Duke of Richmond and Gordon, who was a winner at Elgin. Meredith, a red, bred by Mr. Geo. Bruce, Grandison, a very superior Hereford bull, bred by the Earl of Hereford, and winner of prizes in 1894-5. A Polled Aberdeen-Angus bull and heifer, bred by Mr. William Gordon-Cumming and Mr. Smith. The female Shorthorns comprised that beautiful cow Warrior's Plume 2nd, with her o. c. bred by Mr. Beattie, and winner of four first prizes and three medals; Royal Charity, a nice red, with her red o. c. bred by Mr. Mills, who has won eleven first and second prizes. The four two-year old heifers are so well known in the show-rings that their names will be sufficient. They are Mr. Harrison's roan Blanche and Gratta. The first won seven first, five seconds, and a challenge cup; the latter won twelve first and eighteen second in England, Scotland, and Ireland. Pearl was bought from Mr. Hill; she won two firsts and was second at Highland Show at Dumfries, etc. Stanley Butterfly, a roan, just two years old, was bred by Mr. Crook, and she was the winner of twelve prizes. All these heifers are supposed to be safe in calf. The sheep comprised about forty rams, and Oxford, the former bred by Messrs. Pears, Wright, Clarke, and Taylor, Sharpe, and the Oxford by Messrs. Gillet and Green. They are very choice lot. The cattle are to be sold at auction on Saturday.

—We regret to announce the death of Dr. Joaquin Requena y Garcia. He was an Uruguayan citizen, son of Dr. Joaquin Requena, an eminent lawyer. The deceased had occupied important public posts in the Oriental Republic, including that of Minister of Foreign Affairs. He was prime mover in the last revolutionary movement in that country and has since resided in Montevideo, where, as well as in Montevideo, he was united by social ties with the leading families, and was generally esteemed as a sincere patriot. He leaves a numerous family.

—On Tuesday, the Senate of the Province of Buenos Aires passed the bill for regulating the execution of the law of Congress granting a *moratoria* to the Provincial Bank. All

the articles, except the last, of the Electoral Reform bill were approved.

A fire occurred on Tuesday night in the *alpargata* factory of Messrs. Hardy and Co., in Calle Constitución, between Lima and Lalta. It was extinguished after two hours' vigorous work by the fire brigade. The losses are estimated at \$10,000.

If the municipality can get its way we are to have another boulevard like the Avenida de Mayo, running from Plaza Constitución to Cinco Esquinas, between Artes and Cerrito. We must be grand, even if we are bankrupt.

Congress is made up of members who have no real constituencies except their respective factions or parties, and consequently they do not care in the least what the people want nor will they heed it until the people unite to give voice and power to their desires. These men are governed by no moral principle and are amenable only to fear. They should be dealt with accordingly.—B. A. Herald.

LONDON NOTES.

FRIDAY, SEPT. 6.

Parliament was formally prorogued yesterday until Monday, November 12. There were only a few spectators to witness the ceremony in the House of Lords. The Commissioners were the Lord Chancellor, the Duke of Norfolk, Viscount Cross, the Earl of Limerick, and Lord Belper. At the earlier sitting of the House of Commons, held for the purpose of passing the Appropriation Bill, there was a limited attendance.

The polling for South Kerry took place yesterday. It rained heavily throughout the day. The poll will be declared this afternoon.

In the course of an interview with a Correspondent, yesterday, Mr. J. Jenkins, President of the Trade Union Congress, now sitting at Cardiff, explained his position, and defended the firm line he had taken in the conduct of its business. At the Congress itself the chief subject discussed was that of alien immigration, and a resolution in favour of Parliamentary action in respect of it was carried.

A telegram from Constantinople states that several Turkish officials have been dismissed from their posts at places in the plain of Moosh in consequence of malpractices. The Liberal "Vossische Zeitung" of Berlin urges the adoption of energetic measures, in view of the continued obstinacy of the Porte with regard to American reforms.

An attempt was made yesterday in Paris to blow up Rothschild's Bank by means of an infernal machine. A man who, it is stated, had been watched for some time by the police was observed to throw a tin box with a fuse attached into the doorway of the building. The fuse failed to burn, however, and no damage was done. The man, who was captured after desperate resistance, declared himself to be an Anarchist, and states that his bomb was filled with blasting powder.

The Lord Mayor leaves London this morning for Paris, where he will be received at the Elysee by M. Félix Faure, President of the Republic. Before leaving Paris for Bordeaux on Monday he is also to have an interview with M. Hanotaux, Minister of Foreign Affairs.

At the Crystal Palace last evening Messrs. Brock gave a grand display of fireworks, for their benefit, under favourable conditions. Many novelties were introduced, and were received with applause by a crowd of spectators.

By a ballot of members it has been finally decided that football shall not take place at the Oval during the present season.

Brilliant weather was experienced at Hastings yesterday when the first match of the cricket week was commenced. After winning the toss the Southern representatives were at the wicket most of the day, their last wicket falling at 226. Afterwards the North lost two good men for 27. On a wicket damaged by rain the scoring at Scarborough in the Yorkshire v England fixture was small; the country in their first innings made 83, and the England Eleven 121.

For being intoxicated whilst in charge of a horse and cab in the City Joseph Keats was yesterday sent to prison for a term of 21 days. As prisoner was driving near the Mansion House on the evening of the 7th ult., he whipped his horse and came into collision with a tandem tricycle. Both of the riders were injured—one, a lady, somewhat seriously. Prisoner's licence was revoked.

BOMB-THROWING IN PARIS.

ATTEMPT UPON ROTHSCHILD'S BANK.

PARIS, SEPT. 5.
A tin box bearing a Van Houten cocoa label, and having in a hole in the lid, a lighted fuse, was, at 3.15 this afternoon, flung into the carriage entrance of Rothschild's Bank in the Rue La Fayette. A policeman was standing under the doorway gossiping with the concierge and an office servant. They saw that the box came from the hand of a dirty-looking fellow, who cast it from him after stopping for a moment to strike a match and light the fuse. He then ran on. The three men ran after him, when he made a sudden turn into the Rue Rosini, and nearly got away. Other policemen, seeing the chase, joined in it. The presumed bomb-thrower was caught after a desperate resistance, and is now in detention. He was first taken to the Châtelet d'Antin Police Station, a great crowd following. No paper to establish his identity, nor chemical, was found on him, but a large razor. He is young—probably not more than twenty—very dark, has a delicate

black moustache, but a strong face, and is tall and stalwart. He wears dirty grey trousers, a short, loose jacket of sailor's blue cloth, a striped and collarless flannel shirt, and his black hair is cut close to the skull. A letter was found in his pocket addressed to a common lodging-house in the Boulevard Mortier, where a search was made this evening for chemicals under the eye of M. Girard, of the Municipal Laboratory. Nothing more is yet known. The only words wrung out of the prisoner are, "I am an anarchist, and proud to be so."

The tin box is at the City Laboratory. The lid is fastened on with galvanised wire. Should it prove to contain a strong explosive it must have done great damage but for the failure of the fuse to burn the whole way. It is rather curious that the man should have his address in his pocket. It is an elementary rule among militant Anarchists to carry no paper on them which could lead to their being identified.

PARIS, SEPT. 5.

The author of the attempted outrage has been transferred to the central police-station, where he has been visited by M. Paybaraud, the director at the Police Prefecture of the Service of Inquiry and Surveillance over the Anarchists. M. Paybaraud declares that he has been struck with the extreme resemblance of the miscreant to the anarchist Pawiels who committed the outrage in the Ladeleine, and that he would be surprised to find that they were brothers. On being re-examined the prisoner abandoned his attitude of silence, but obstinately refused to give his name, all efforts to make him do so being without success. He made an open confession of Anarchism, and declared that his placing of a bomb in the Rothschild Bank today was to be regarded as a genuine Anarchist attempt. The explosive letter, he added, was merely a hoax. The bomb found to-day alone could produce a salutary effect. He further informed M. Girard, Chief of the Municipal Laboratory, that he had himself made the bomb, and that he only regretted he had not taken sufficient precautions to secure its explosion. He had intended to light the fuse with the end of a lighted cigarette, but the ashes on the latter prevented the fuse from catching fire, and then owing to the arrival of a police agent he was further balked in his purpose of exploding the machine by throwing it. Questioned as to the contents he would only admit the presence of chlorate of potassium. "But," he remarked to M. Girard, "you are sharp enough to open it and then you will see what is inside."

The prisoner's demeanour during his examination was very determined, and he gave expression in distinct and well-chosen language to Anarchist opinions of the most pronounced type. The name of the police officer who first arrested him is Roger. The bomb consists of an ordinary half-pound cocoa tin. M. Girard will make a thorough examination of it to-morrow, and it is expected that his report will be ready before noon. The journal "La Poste" says: "The prisoner is about 30 years of age. He is of medium height, has an abnormally developed forehead and a clean-shaven face, with the exception of a short moustache. He has a sullen stare, a pale complexion, and continually clenches his fists. The man has refused to give his name and profession. His dress consists of a dark jacket, grey trousers, and a collarless red-patterned shirt. The infernal machine is a Van Houten cocoa tin of small dimensions, from eight to ten centimetres in height, bound round with a string, and with a handle of iron wire. Beneath this handle there is a hole about as big as a three-penny bit, through which a whitish substance may be seen. The prisoner pretends that the machine is a genuine bomb, and that he had intended to light the fuse, but had not sufficient time to do so."

He was again questioned in gaol this evening, but persisted in his previous declarations. He obstinately refused to give his name, saying that he did not wish to bring dishonour upon his family. He stated that he was 33 years of age. The prisoner will be taken to the Anthropometrical Department to-morrow, and the officials will then ascertain whether he has ever come under their notice before. With regard to the composition of the bomb, the miscreant has declared that it contained 15 grammes of blasting powder. There was no projectile in it. In the course of his further examination, the prisoner said that he had travelled much all over France, but had remained only a short time in any one place in order not to excite suspicion. In Algiers, however, he had resided for two years. He professed to entertain a profound contempt for work, inasmuch as every-body lived at the expense of society. The news of the outrage spread very rapidly through the city and caused a great sensation among all classes.

A LAND AND WATER STEAMBOAT.
An interesting steamer is just about to be started on some lakes a few miles distant from Copenhagen, the peculiar feature being that the steamer has to make a short journey overland, the two lakes being divided by a strip of land. Across this a railway has been constructed, crossing a high road, which necessitates a gradient on both sides of 1 in 50, the rails being ordinary rails. At the two ends the rails have been carried into and under the water on a wooden structure. By means of piles the steamer is guided on to the rails, which correspond in position with two wheels fixed on each side of the steamer. The steamer goes then on to the rails at full speed, and travels up the rails on the one side

and down the incline on the other, into the water, where the propeller again takes over its function. The engine is comparatively powerful, and in addition to the usual propeller shaft there is another shaft, which, by means of a chain, works the small wheels on which the steamer crosses the rails. The boat also has a powerful brake to moderate its speed down the incline. The steamer is 44 feet long, capable of holding seventy passengers, and the engine indicates 27 horse-power. All the trials have passed off perfectly satisfactorily.—Scientific American.

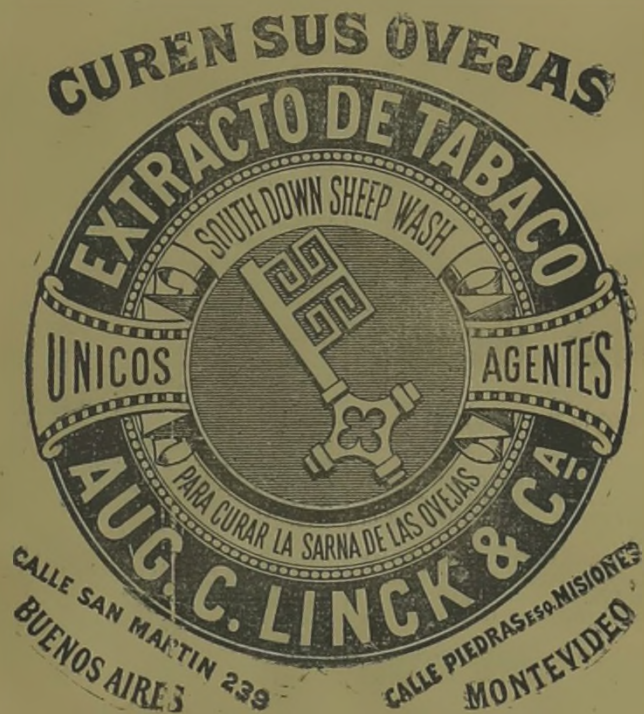
