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### PROTECTIONISM.

We resume the discussion of this topic at the point where we broke off on Friday.

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Under the term manufacture we understand as included all industrial processes for the conversion of raw material into the forms necessary for common use or offered to the consumer for purchase. Some exception, however, may be made in the preparation of food-material, such as the grinding of flour or the baking of bread, which for obvious reasons has to be done on the spot of consumption and hardly if it enters into calculations of commerce of importation.

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3. Cheap labour. This is an essential to manufacture as it is to production. Where an exaggerated price has to be paid for labour, the margin of profit which alone can tempt the employment of capital, is reduced to a vanishing point. But cheap labour is directly dependent on cheap living and this is rendered impossible by the exaggerated duties and taxes, carefully arranged so as to press heaviest on the consuming and industrial classes. The poor man here, is taxed twenty times more severely than the rich man, and hence it is that labour is perforce dear.
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drawn from the artisan classes. Moreover, the large majority of emigrants are Italian and Spanish, and neither of these nations are distinguished for manufacturing skill. As a proof of this assertion we may quote the very second rate work which is the general rule here in such matters as carpentering, building and typography. And where manufactures have been established, the products, as a rule, have been of such an inferior class that *industria del pais* (made in the country) has come to be a synonym for all that is bad and even false.

Without going further into the matter, we think we have said enough to show that the local conditions are not favourable to manufacture except on a very limited scale. Even utilising the raw material that is raised here, there still remain to be contended against the lack of metal, fuel, and of cheap and skilled labour. Nature herself has imposed certain limits which it is not in the power of man to pass, and until there is a radical change in both natural and social conditions there is very little probability of these River Plate countries being able to compete, either in the quality or quantity of manufactured articles necessary for civilised life, with those imported from countries more adapted for manufacture, such as Europe and the United States. It is sufficiently evident then, that, to a great measure, the River Plate must depend for manufactured articles, whether of necessity or of luxury, mainly on imported goods, for a considerable time to come. In fact, in such countries as these, in which cheap living should operate as the chief incentive to development, it may be laid down as an axiom that so long as any article can be imported at a cheaper price and better quality (for both factors should be considered) than it can be manufactured here, it is more to the advantage of the country to import it than to make it. Manufacture, as we have said, one of the factors in national wealth and development, but, unlike produce and commerce, it is a factor that only comes into play when the nation has reached a certain stage of advancement and population, and under certain natural conditions, all of which are at present quite wanting in the River Plate.

It will thus be seen that out of the three factors with which we are concerned, produce, commerce and manufacture, the first two are possible and profitable, but not the third. The rational conclusion then would be to foster the first two and to neglect the third, the more especially when the attempt to foster the third carries with it measures directly detrimental to the other two. This being so, it seems hardly credible, though it is the fact, that the River Plate governments have deliberately elected to do otherwise. They have the substance of production and commerce, and are deliberately sacrificing both, and more especially the latter, for an unattainable shadow of manufacture. Folly could hardly go further.

We will now say a word on the fallacious nature of the exaggerated import duties applied here, whether for purposes of revenue or protection.

With regard to revenue, we remember Sir W. Harcourt's recent dictum in the House Commons, "a high duty raises the price on every sale of the article taxed, whilst revenue is received on only a few." That a high price reduces the consumption needs no proof, and there have been sufficient examples in the River Plate that it is quite possible to kill the commerce in certain articles, thereby reducing the revenue on them to nil, by imposing too exorbitant a tax, thus directly defeating the object for which the tax was designed. A moderate tax on a large consumption is as productive or more so than a high tax on a restricted consumption, whilst the former favours commerce and indicates prosperity, and the latter does exactly the reverse. Between the two there should be no hesitation of choice, and yet the River Plate governments seem invariably to have chosen the worse. We have no rational doubt that a general reduction of the import tariffs, so far from reducing the Customs revenue, would increase it, by the stimulus that would be given to commerce and production.

**The Uruguayan Debt Service.**  
Referring to the recently published notice to the effect that the retention necessary for the local service of the debt would in future only be made at the end of the quarter, the *North British Daily Mail* says:—

"At last we have an official communication from the Uruguayan Government bearing upon the dispute between the Council of Foreign Bondholders and the Government with respect to means for meeting the foreign debt service, and it does not come, as one would have expected, in reply to the communication of Sir John Lubbock. On three different occasions the Uruguayan Government has only been necessary for the service of the debt by appropriating money that had been set apart for the legal service of the debt in Montevideo. We are now told that in future no proportion of the 45 per cent. of the Customs revenue will be retained daily for the local service, on the grounds that such retention is for the moment considered inopportune." Apparently every penny will be remitted to Europe until the last month in each quarter, when it is presumed the Government hope to be able to appropriate the amount necessary for the service of the debt in Montevideo. This explanation is eloquent. Sir John Lubbock has not been answered. The broad question at issue—whether or not the Uruguayan Government would pay out of other sources of revenue any deficiency in the coupon. According to the statement issued the Uruguayan Government will not provide for this contingency. This juggling with the revenue necessary for the local service certainly strengthens very much the view of those European critics who are looking forward to a fresh Uruguayan default at no distant date.

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Yesterday was St. John's day, and all the Jacks, Jennies, Juans, Juanas, Juanitas, Jeans, Jeannettes, etc., in the city, to the number of several thousands, were *en fête*, whilst peripatetic brass bands of a dreadful character ambulated from house to house, playing most heart-rending serenades, possibly in the hope that some one would bribe them to move on. They were easily corruptible; ten cents did the trick efficiently. They did not seem to have any special tune for the occasion, but wandered at will from "My Queen" waltz and "Yankee Doodle" to "Ah! que la morte," and the march in "Aida." Sometimes they sweetly varied the effect by playing all the tunes they knew simultaneously, one tune to each instrument. This was very pretty and quite Wagnerian. It was also a field-day with the Masons of the Acacia lodge, the banquet for the installation of the new "boss," Mr. Bentley Swindau being held. On this subject we will make no profane remarks.

Further extensive petitions in the matter of the Mortgage Bank versus the Banco Popular have been presented and published. Life is too short to study them.

The decree has been issued declaring the ports of Toulon and Cete as "infected," and other French ports in the Mediterranean as "suspected" and imposing the corresponding quarantine on vessels arriving there. This is sheer obstruction, for there is no epidemic of cholera in France, and if the germs were present on board ship, the twenty to twenty-five days journey across the Atlantic would be more than sufficient to develop them. But in the matter of quarantine it is hopeless to look for moderation or reason, as witness the manner in which the obstructive quarantine on Brazil is maintained, to the detriment of commerce and traffic.

The final performance of the French Company at the San Felipe Theatre will take place this evening, with the performance of the amusing comedy "La Boule," known in English as "The Snowball."

What we understand will be the last performance—unless there are some more—will be given at the Circus this evening. We are not sure whether there will be any performance this afternoon.

Although Montevideo is not always kind to theatrical companies, they seem sometimes to have great difficulty in tearing themselves away, for they find it necessary to give three or four last performances.

We were authoritatively informed that there is no truth in the report that the fatal microbe said to be discovered in the *aguas corrientes* belonged to the numerous Herrera family. In fact, we understand that it is of a much less virulent character.

As an example of the carelessness of the Post Office in the distribution of letters, we may mention that yesterday we had delivered to us a newspaper from Buenos Aires, addressed plainly and in printed characters to the "Chilian Times, Valparaiso." If Valparaiso correspondence is delivered here in this fashion, it is quite possible that some of our missing newspapers and letters have been sent on to Valparaiso.

It is certainly characteristic that, whilst complaint is swelling on every side of the unreliability and dilatoriness of the P. O., and of the high tariffs exacted, 40 to 100 per cent higher than in any part of Europe or N. America, the *Nacion* should blossom forth with an article laudatory of the P. O., and of the advances it has made during the present administration. Those advances are mostly like those of the crab, backwards. Like every other public department under Government influence, the P. O. has steadily deteriorated.

The *Nacion* says that the postal tariff might be reduced, and several useful reforms introduced were it not for the state of the Treasury and the resistance of the public to fresh charges. Neither of these items, however, were taken into the slightest account when it was a question of some entirely unnecessary and objectionable military expenses, neither useful nor creditable to the Republic. The interests of the P. O. are those of commerce and progress and development, without bearing upon politics or militarism, and for that reason alone have been thrust in the background. The Treasury can far better spare \$20,000 or \$25,000 for the improvement of the P. O. service, which would be an assistance to commerce, than it can spare the \$50,000 recently voted for "urban companies," only wanted for electioneering purposes and to defeat the suffrage of the people. Or, dismiss a few of the useless bad characters who pose as generals and colonels to the discredit of the Republic, and there will be plenty of money for P. O. improvements.

The departure of the splendid Chilean armour-clad, Captain Prat, from Toulon, was marked by disagreeable episodes. Her officers and crew, it appears, had contracted debts in Toulon and La Seyne to the extent, as the *Temps* reports, of 30,000 francs. When the creditors, however,

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presented themselves, they were very roughly treated, and were not allowed to come on board. Complaints concerning the conduct of the Chileans have, therefore, been addressed to the Consuls of the Republic at Toulon and Marseilles. The disappointed creditors, moreover, have taken steps to bring their grievance to the notice of the Chilean Minister at Paris. In justice to Chilean officers it should be said that those of the Presidente Errazuriz and Presidente Pinto left very pleasant recollections behind them.—*Army and Navy Gazette.*

—The other night, in the House of Commons, Mr. Darling interrogated the Government as to the statement in the press to the effect that an Irish Republican flag had been hoisted by a vessel called the *Hazel Kirke*, at the recent naval review at New York, and that that emblem had been saluted by foreign vessels in the harbour. The honourable gentleman wanted to know whether our Foreign Office had any information, or proposed to adopt any step with a view to the vindication of the national honour, in case of such an incident having in reality taken place as described. The whole affair has been cleared up by the American papers since to hand, containing full particulars of the review in question. Those show that the *Hazel Kirke* did not hoist an Irish flag at all, but only the Brazilian flag, which is mainly coloured green. She was hired by the Brazilian Consul to take a party to the review. Her ensign was mistaken by some ardent Irish-American patriots for the flag of their dream, and they cheered accordingly. The saluting ships of course made no such mistake, but duly honoured the colours of Brazil.—*S. A. Journal.*

The Western Buenos Aires Railway has just paid \$102,000 m/n for the stamp necessary for its entry in the Commercial Register. A good many stamp-collectors would like to have that stamp. But, what a robbery it represents! It is this that enterprise and industry and employment of capital and development of the country are encouraged—in the River Plate. Genuine brigands would not exact half as much. The thieves in Government, surpass all the thieves outside it. Some \$600 more or less for an act of registration which would have been overcharged a \$60! When we contemplate this, we begin to think another revolution is necessary.

When we read in a provincial newspaper that at a school exhibiting a distinguished authoress of eight to ten read an original essay on "the system of elemental and advanced education best adapted to Mankind," we begin to think that it is time for Herbert Spencer and Bain and all the over-grown grown-up philosophers to take a back-seat. In order, however, that they may not remain in pernicious idleness, they might turn the tables by obliging us with their ideas on "Dolls and Dollhouses," or on "A Scientific classification of Toilets."

The "Magdalena" not having arrived till the afternoon yesterday, no mails need be expected until this morning, or perhaps tomorrow, according to the goodwill of the P. O.

The postponed race meeting will take place at Maroñas to-day, weather once more permitting. The selections are Pintado, Devota, Donnina, Aigrette, and Progresso.

A Berlin telegram says that Prof. Emmerich of Munich and Dr. Hubos of Tokio have discovered that cholera is due to poisoning by nitric acid produced by the comma bacillus. If the discovery is confirmed, it is thought that it will not be difficult to find a remedy.

Telegrams say there was a thorough London fog in Buenos Aires yesterday. Perhaps we may be favoured with it here to-day.

Deputy Millevoje, the paper *La Cocarde*, and an Englishman named Norton are to be criminally prosecuted for their recent attempt at dragging England into the Panama mess.

According to latest news from Berlin, the tide has turned, and there is now a small majority of 8 or 10 in favour of the military Bills. It seems also that the Socialists have not gained so many seats as was thought, but that their strength in the Reichstag is much the same as before.

It transpires that early last week a quarrel took place in Calle Yaro between a sergeant and a private in the Light Artillery. The former used his cut-throat and inflicted two wounds from which the private died in the Hospital next day. Being military, the affair has been hitherto hushed up. The murderer has been submitted to the Military Tribunal. As it is only a private he has killed, he will probably get off with a year's imprisonment, unless, perhaps, the Tribunal think that the murdering of a private is a luxury reserved for commissioned officers, and double the penalty.

The Custom House paid \$12,321 into the London Bank yesterday on account of the foreign debt service.

From London telegrams we learn that the Infanta Eulalia is expected to represent Spain at the Royal Wedding.—The Bank of England reserve fund has been increased

BUENOS AIRES.—The Senate has passed the bill authorizing the Executive Power to intervene in the province of Catamarca for the purpose, exclusively, of organizing the Legislative and Judicial Powers and to pay the necessary expenses out of the general revenue.

—It is stated positively that Dr. Lorenzo Anadon, Senator for Santa Fé, is to be the new Minister of the Interior. He belongs to the National party, but he showed a spirit of independence in the discussion of the diploma of Senator Rojas.

—Dr. Ayerza will, at the request of Dr. Pinedo, withdraw his resignation of the directorship of the department of Public Assistance.

—A telegram has been sent to Capt. Correa to leave Birkenhead immediately with the "Independencia" and to come straight here. The 25 de Mayo is to enter Montevideo for repairs. Already! The Government has bought 500 tons of coal for the squadron. The crews of the Almirante Brown, Libertad, 25 de Mayo, and Patagonia are to land and occupy the marine barracks, where they will be drilled so as to take part in the parade on July 9th.

—It is feared that the accident sustained by Dr. Diaz will prove fatal. A further amputation has been made, gangrene having set in.

—We regret to state that General Bartolome Mitre is confined to his bed by a severe cold.

—It is stated that Dr. Manuel Quintana has refused the offer of the presidency of the National Office Union.

—It is rumored that the Senate Committee of the Interior will report in favour of the construction of the Central Station by the State.

LONDON NOTES

FRIDAY, MAY 26.

Lord Salisbury again visited Belfast yesterday. At noon he went to the Ulster Hall, where addresses were presented to him from religious, political, and semi-political bodies, and he claimed this, in reply, as evidence of the width and depth of the feeling throughout Ireland against Home Rule. Whilst predicting that victory would ultimately attend their efforts, he challenged the statement made by Mr. Gladstone in the House of Commons that resolute government had failed. Next he went on to argue that Ireland had prospered under the Act of Union, pointing as evidence of this to the fact that they had been able to go through a potato famine and the dislocation in agriculture which had followed the introduction of Free Trade. In the afternoon, he left for the Duke of Abercorn's seat, Baroncourt, and will deliver a speech at Derry to-day.

As their honorary colonel, the Duke of York was present yesterday at an inspection of the Royal Suffolk Hussars in Ickworth Park, near Bury St. Edmunds. He afterwards rode at the head of the regiment into that town.

The Royal Military Tournament was opened at the Agricultural Hall yesterday. A feature of great interest was the parade of the Indian Cavalry and the Australian Light Horse and Artillery, who were inspected by Prince Edward of Saxe-Weimar. In the mounted competitions, representatives of Victoria and New South Wales did remarkably well, winning the first ties in lemon cutting, tent pegging, and heads and posts.

Last evening the annual dinner of the Royal General Theatrical Fund was held at the Hotel Metropole, under the chairmanship of Mr. Pineroy, who, with Mr. Bancroft, Mr. Comyns Carr, Mr. Irving, and Mr. Toole, addressed the company. About 1,000 were collected.

Lady Reay yesterday opened part of the disused burial ground attached to Poplar Church as a public pleasure garden. Lord Meath, who took part in the proceedings, gave an account of the useful work of the Metropolitan Public Gardens Association, at whose expense the ground had been laid out.

The Royal Horticultural Society opened a magnificent show of summer flowers in the Inner Temple Gardens yesterday and will continue it to-day.

At Ramsgate yesterday the coroner's inquiry respecting the murder of Mrs. Noel was resumed, when the husband was examined at great length. He declared that he had never borrowed a revolver nor ever

been possessed of such a weapon. The inquest was again adjourned.

A Berlin Correspondent states that the aristocratic wing of the Catholic Centre in the Reichstag, under Baron Schorlemer, has seceded from the body of the party on the question of the Army Bill, and will now support the Government.

Playing at Manchester yesterday the Australians dismissed Lancashire for 97, and then ran up a score of 167 for six wickets. At the Oval, Middlesex, after getting Surrey out for 122, put on 244 runs, and still have four wickets in hand. Sussex secured a great advantage over Somerset at Brighton, dismissing the Westerners for 137 and running up a total of 346 for eight wickets. At Maidstone Gloucestershire scored 218, and then took four of the Kent wickets for 50 runs. Northumberland had the best of their day's play at Lord's with the M.C.C. and Ground. A stronger team representing the M.C.C. and Ground went to Cambridge, and, battling against the University, compiled a total of 268. In the time which remained for play, the University scored 69 for one wicket. Matches were also commenced between Leicestershire and Yorkshire, and Warwickshire and Nottingham.

Percy Albert Blake, who is accused of burglariously entering the premises of Mr. Vaughan, a pawnbroker in the Strand, was again brought up at Bow-street yesterday, when it was alleged that there had been a mistake as to his identity. Sir John Bridge, however, decided to commit him for trial.

Two boys were brought before the magistrates at Harlesden yesterday for throwing stones at London and North Western trains. One of them pleaded that they threw the stones at the engine. As they had been in prison for four days one was fined 11, and costs, with the alternative of fourteen days' hard labour, and the other ordered to receive six strokes with the birch rod.

Somebody with short memory has circulated a statement that Mr. Gladstone has had a disagreement with the Queen regarding an application to Parliament for a marriage grant to the Duke of York. Mr. Gladstone, as might have been expected, has, through a secretary, stated that there is no truth in the statement, and that no such grant will be asked for by the Government. It ought not to be already forgotten that in 1889 the Prince of Wales's Children Act was passed, declaring that it was desirable to prevent the necessity for repeated applications to Parliament on behalf of the Queen's family, and to establish the principle that the provision for the Royal children should be made out of grants adequate for that purpose assigned to their parents. By this Act the annual sum of 36,000l. was granted to trustees of the Prince of Wales. Out of that sum the provision necessary for the Duke of York's marriage can be made.

Tunis is celebrating this week its transportation into a modern seaport. Hitherto passengers by the steamers of the Messageries Maritimes have had to land at Goletta in small boats, the vessels not being able to come nearer than half a mile to that port, which is seven and a half miles down the lagoon from the capital of the Bex. The construction of a harbour thirty acres in extent and twenty-three feet in depth in the European part of the town was begun in 1888, and this has been joined to the sea by a channel over six miles in length and 70 feet in breadth. On each side there are jetties lighted by the electric light. The tourist will gain four or five hours in the passage from Marseilles, which is at present 36 hours. At Tunis the Arab town remains intact, having been respected even by the tramway. Two French Ministers and about ninety deputies and senators have arrived there to attend the opening ceremony. The fêtes, which last until Sunday, include camel races.

Many are the uses of money, but Mr. Joseph Newton, late of the Royal Mint, points out there is at least one use which is not generally known. This is the availability of coins for letter weighing when the ordinary postal weights do not happen to be at hand. Commencing with the sovereign this weighs a very safe quarter-ounce, for foreign postage, two equalling of course a half-ounce, and four one ounce. The next denomination, the crown piece, is just on the right side of one ounce in weight and the half-crown of half-an-ounce. Five separate shillings and a sixpence, for the ounce, and half-ounce, will do as well. Descending from gold and silver to hard-working bronze, it is found that either three penny pieces, or five halfpence, or ten farthings, will respectively make up one ounce. Another peculiarity in regard to the halfpenny is noted by Mr. Newton. That is its diameter, which is precisely one inch, so that twelve halfpence laid flat, and in touch, are equal to one foot, and thirty-six to one yard.

Liliuokalani, the Princess of Hawaii, is at present residing at the large shoe-making village of Burton Latimer, in Northamptonshire, occupying with an elderly lady companion a pretty house, half cottage and half villa. The house is in a small garden and is very pleasantly situated, and the young lady is esteemed by the few Burton people with whom she has become acquainted. It was at Great Harrowden Hall, about three miles from Burton, that the exiled Princess was educated.

THE JUDGING OF EXHIBITS AT THE WORD'S FAIR. CHICAGO, MAY 25. The representatives of seventeen foreign nations taking part in the

World's fair have signed an agreement to withdraw the exhibits of their respective countries from the examination for awards unless the jury system be adopted. These countries include Great Britain, Germany, Austria, France, Denmark, Italy, Russia, Japan, Portugal, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Belgium, and British Guiana. One of the foreign Commissioners who has not joined the protest has stated, in reply to an interviewer, that he considers the decision of the seventeen countries an unfortunate blow to the Exhibition. "The system proposed by the Bureau of Awards, of which Mr. Boyd Thatcher is President, would, the Commissioner continued, not be satisfactory even if the juries were international in their character. At the same time, I should hardly think that any country would care to withdraw its exhibits from competition, although we all disapprove the system of single awards." Mr. Thatcher's idea is that an expert should examine every exhibit and make a report upon which the verdict of the Bureau of Awards should be based. He says that he notified the foreign representatives of his rules, which are the result of two years' study, and are absolutely unalterable. He also maintains that the Commission is almost unanimous in sustaining them.

Mr. Davis, the Director-General of the Exhibition, has been overwhelmed with protests, but is unable to do anything in the matter, although he has expressed the opinion that the withdrawal of exhibits from competition would be deplorable.

ENGLISH SEAMEN IN AMERICAN PORTS.

According to a telegram from New York, the British ships have lost seventy men by desertion, which, taking everything into consideration, is not a large percentage, although we could have wished that none had gone at all. It must be remembered that the combined temptations of the Exhibition, to see which men would naturally be attracted, and also employment at higher rates of pay, which well-trained seamen gunners and artificers would be pretty certain to obtain, are just those which the blue-jacket would find it difficult to resist. We have yet, however, to have this report confirmed, and it would be instructive if the authorities would presently let us know the ranks and ratings and class for conduct of the men who succumbed to the allurements which the United States offer to our men, and which England offers to Americans, and which, as a rule, prevent the men-of-war of the respective nations visiting one another.—Amy and Navy Gazette.

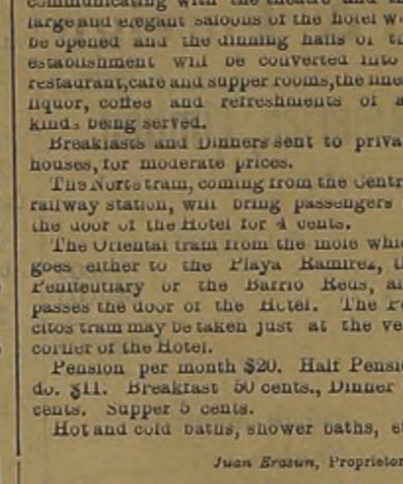
