ARGENTINA AND HER COLONISTS.

(B. A. Herald, Oct. 19.)

The Argentine Republic cannot rapidly develop its resources with a population of less than five millions. Its natural resources will make an imperceptible showing on an area so great as that encompassed by Argentine boundary lines. The only remedy for this defect or want lies in immigration. The only considerable advance the country has made in these directions has been directly attributable to immigration, a fact fully recognized by all our public men, who, so far as words go, are lavish in protestations of a desire to stimulate immigration. There have been some extraordinary efforts made to do this, such as sending favourites to Europe on a tour or for residence at public expense, nominally as immigration agents, who held out inducements having but a remote relation to facts, the result of which were best illustrated in the case of the steamship Dresden's consignments; indeed, passages were prepaid by the Government, none of which have been or will be collected by said Government, whatever tax-sharks may succeed in doing on their own account, but the real sine qua non of immigration does not seem to be understood. The immigrant wants peace, good order, safety of person and property and reasonable taxation—all other matters may pass, for anything the immigrant cares about them, but these conditions are just what are not forthcoming for the immigrant. He does not enjoy any guarantee of peace, continuance of order or just administration of law. He is not reasonably taxed, but extortionate burdens are laid upon him. He is not certain that he can reap the results of his labour from one season to another. He has no security that he may not be robbed and murdered. He knows that crimes are not punished, and that, practically, murder is not a crime, for the sentence of law against it is never executed. Immigration in any large current will not come to a country where such conditions exist. The work at our hand, and to be done in order to foment immigration, is the restoration of law and order in the camp and the making property and person safe therein. The story of the colonies of Santa Fé, written in blood, will do more to hinder immigration than thousands of rhetorical flourishes about sentimental nonsense which begins and ends in windy words. We have no means of knowing how much or how little the Government knows about these conditions, but, since they who form the Government are astute and experienced men of the world, it may be inferred that they must know that the peaceable Colonist has no surety of life or property, but that at any moment an influential ruffian and cut-throat may dispossess him of the results of years of labour and sacrifices. These outrages are not confined to Santa Fé, for the Province of Buenos Aires could push Santa Fé closely in a contest of abuses. The Colonies of Olavarría could match anything that Santa Fé could produce; indeed it was but a short time since that a hard-working settler, whose holding dated from the days of Indian raids, was dispossessed of his lands, his house was pulled down, his stock was scattered and his moveables were stolen, at the instigation of a villain who had close relations with La Plata, and who felt secure in following out any outrage, and the Government and the Land Office helped out the outrageous robbery. If Interventor Lopez wants to get a clue to follow up we are quite able to give it to him for investigation. These indescribable outrages and hardships must be stopped or immigration will cease. Every mail is an apostrophe which exhorts emigrants from Europe not to come here, and they will come only in small numbers in comparison with what would be the case were conditions somewhat like those which draw the emigrant to the United States.

Parliament. In the Chamber of Representatives, on Thursday, the amendments introduced by the Senator in the Annual Law of Licenses were approved without remark.

After a short discussion of no particular interest, the modifications recently proposed by the Executive in the War estimates were fully approved.

After some other routine business, the sitting closed at an early hour.

Charles François Gounod.

The great French composer whose death has just been announced by telegraph, was born at Paris, June 17, 1818. After the usual course of training in musical science, and the probationary attempts in composition common to professional novitiates, M. Gounod became known as a lyric composer for the stage by his pastoral of «Philemon and Baucis.» This was followed by «La Nonne Sanguante» «Sapho» a cantata; and «La Colombe.» Although these works contained unquestionable marks of genius, none achieved success. Indeed, few composers who have risen to eminence have had more failures at the outset of their career than the author of one of the most successful of modern operas, «Faust» which, although not actually the first successful work of Gounod, took all the lovers of operatic music by surprise. What rendered his success more remarkable was the fact that, though Gounod's masterpiece had been previously set to music a hundred times, not one of these efforts was considered worthy of the theme. M. Gounod is the composer, amongst other works, of a comic opera founded on Molière's «Médicine malgré lui» produced in London by the English Opera Company under the title of the «Mock Doctor» of «La Reine de Saba» «Mirella» brought out in London in 1864; «Romeo and Juliet» produced at Paris and London in 1867; and «Polyctes» produced at the Grand Opera, Paris, Oct. 7, 1878. He was elected a member of the French Institute, section of Music, in May, 1886, and was promoted to the rank of Commander of the Legion of Honour in Aug. 1877. His opera, «The Tribute of Zamora» was produced at the Grand Opera at Paris on April 1, 1881; and in the following year his sacred work, «The Redemption» was produced at the Birmingham Musical Festival. In 1885 his new oratorio, «Mors et Vita» was produced at the Albert Hall, and a second performance, by special command of the Queen (who was present) took place in Feb. 1888.

Marshal Macmahon. The death of Marshal Macmahon, which has just occurred in Paris, removes from the scene of modern military history one who, though he cannot be classed as a great man of the century, has for forty years held an important position in military affairs, and later as president of the French Republic.

Of Irish descent, he entered the French Army at the age of 17, and within five years was sent to see active service in the Algerian wars, where he rapidly obtained promotion, and by candour, valour and influence, he having married into a noble family, rose through every grade of the service, eventually succeeding General Carrobert in command of a division, where, when the assault on Sebastopol was decided, Macmahon was appointed to carry the works of the Malakoff. At that date he was but forty years old, and received the Grand Cross of the Legion of Honour for his meritorious services.

For his conspicuous part in the Italian campaign he received his baton, and was appointed Duke of Magenta. He represented France at the coronation of his future enemy William III. As Governor General of Algeria he was a failure. In the Franco-Prussian War Macmahon had command of the 1st Army corps at Strasbourg, and on Aug. 6, 1870, received with Frilly and Carrobert the celebrated attack of the Crown Prince at Woerth. Notwithstanding his 50,000 men and the strength of his position he had to succumb, and retired rapidly, but on the 30th was again beaten. On the 1st Sept, he had the misfortune to be Chief-in-Command at Sedan where he was wounded severely, and had to retire from the field, became a prisoner of war and was taken to Germany.

On his return in the following year he was made Commander in chief of the army, successfully conducted the siege of Paris against the Commune, and assisted Monsieur Thiers in the reorganization of the army. On Thiers resigning the Presidency in May 1873, Macmahon was unanimously elected in his place. His letter accepting the appointment is spoken of as a model of manly honesty and modesty. He was a man of thorough French sympathies, but of strong English and Conservative methods of thought. Not brilliant, but thorough,

and had the capacity of attracting the friendship of solid men. For the thorny road of French politics he was scarcely suited, and his term of Presidency was always bristling with difficulties, chiefly owing to the machinations of the Gambetta school.

Eventually on the Republican party obtaining a majority in the senatorial elections in 1879, and requesting the removal of the conspicuous anti-Republicans from the list of generals, Macmahon refused to assent, and resigned, being succeeded by Monsieur Grevy.—Times of Argentina.

The Brazilian Revolution.

Dr. Roy Barbosa, having been released from quarantine, arrived in Buenos Aires on Thursday, and has there unburdened his soul to the reporters. His declarations, however, are evidently so exaggerated that they can only be accepted with extreme caution, for they probably belong to the same imaginative class of fiction as that which inspires the «official» reports. We repeat some of his statements, as transmitted here by telegraph, and our readers may take them for what they are worth. On arriving at Rio Janeiro in the R. N. S. «Magdalena» he had intended to take his family on board and proceed to Bahia, but was informed that the government had issued an order for his arrest. This was confirmed by Captain Lang of the «Sirus» who notified the captain of the «Magdalena» not to deliver up any of his passengers to the authorities, and to prevent the arrest being carried out by force, sent a picket of 50 armed marines on board the Magdalena, with four officers and rapid firing cannon. The Brazilian Government being thus baffled, it gave orders for his arrest at Bahia, and sent two spies on board not to lose sight of him. However, he managed to escape to the «Aquidaba» and returned to the River Plate in the «Galicia» as already announced. The friends and relatives who visited him on board the «Magdalena» were arrested on their return to shore, and some of them are still amongst the 500 political prisoners detained in the Penitentiary at Rio Janeiro. Sr. Barbosa says that, according to the accounts of his friends, the Brazilian capital is the scene of anarchy and tyrannical rule of the time of Rosas. Carls daily arrive at the Caju Cemetery containing headless corpses. (It seems that even the reporter could not swallow this flight of Brazilian imagination.) Legislators and other political personages are publicly outraged by police spies, without regard for position or character. The Government being without resources to meet the expenses of the revolution, has made a clandestine emission of 75 million dollars in notes of the national treasury! The pay of the soldiers has been doubled, and that of the railway employees trebled! The government is cruelly persecuting the families of its political enemies, the more especially if the heads are not there to protect them, and many have had to take refuge in the interior or in houses protected by foreign flags. It is spending large sums in armament and war material.

We were entirely without direct news from Rio yesterday.

SUNDRIES.

The Representatives sat for a short time on Thursday, and transacted some business of minor interest.

The Minister of Finances has received a telegram from Glyn Mills Currie and Co of London acknowledging receipt of the remittance to complete the sum necessary for the service of the November coupon of the Consolidated Debt, and stating that payment of the same has already been announced. This leads the Nation to remind its readers that there only remains one coupon, that of February next, to be paid by the present administration.

Payment for that is fairly certain as the revenue is now entering on the best term of the year, and hence the foreign creditors may feel fairly comfortable, so that the Nation has done well to recall the fact. The approaching end of the Herrera administration cannot fail to be a consolatory item to the foreign creditors, and if the country is fortunate enough to secure in his successor a man enjoying any measure of public confidence or to be depended upon to react against the present situation, there is no doubt the quotation of the Debt will rise substantially and may once more attain a respectable figure.

The official organs are continuing their rabid campaign of what they fondly imagine to be politics, but which in reality is only an exposition of how little they understand of politics and of how mean and interested their ideas are. If they only could conceive the disgust they arouse in honest and sensible breasts and the injury they are doing their party and their country, they might be induced to retire into their proper obscurity.

Since the official organs are so rabidly opposed to the only candidatures which have hitherto received any formal recognition, let them reply by bringing forward some respectable or powerful candidate of their own, if any such can be found in present official circles. At present they have no declared candidate, and

therefore occupy no legitimate place in the controversy, and all their diatribes and objurgations have no more value than the baying of dogs at the moon—in fact, like the dogs, they are only a nuisance.

If there be the slightest truth in the oft-reiterated assertion of the Nation that all the electing is to be done by that fraction of the «Colorado» party of which it imagines itself the representative, the country may go into mourning at once in anticipation of another term of disaster, of discredit and of subjugation to its worst enemies, namely those whom the Nation extols as the «friends of the situation».

The elections are approaching, and those politicians who misdirect the country will once more exhibit to the world how little they know of politics, how little they possess of patriotism or disinterestedness or tolerance or respect for public opinion or any other civic virtues, and how their so-called elections are not even a faint imitation of elections as known in honorable and civilized countries. It would be far sooner if they abandoned the farce and held no more elections until they learnt what elections mean and how to conduct them on honest principles and to abide by them when so conducted.

Whether stimulated by the example of the English community or not, we cannot say, but an effort at amateur theatricals is about to be made in native circles, two young ladies and two gentlemen of prominent native families having prepared the comedy «Mi Secretario y Yo» which will be presented at the Soirée to be given by the Catholic Club next Monday. This departure is quite a new one in native circles, who have hitherto been considered to look upon such efforts with suspicion as only permitted to the freer manners of the English, to whom any social eccentricities are allowable, but as the performance on this occasion takes place under the wing of the Catholic Club, no one can any longer venture to doubt its perfect propriety. The experiment has our best wishes for a success which will lead to further efforts in the same direction, and so tend to break down the unnatural and unwholesome barriers of reserve which old Spanish traditions still raise in many native circles. It is an advance in civilisation which deserves noting.

We learn that the Municipality has in view the prolongation of the Avenida Rondeau for some 45 squares, or nearly 3 miles; further, thus extending it to meet one of the principal departmental roads. The engineer Lamolle and his staff have already commenced the surveying work necessary for this, with the view of seeing what expropriations of land will be necessary. The Avenida Rondeau is already one of the finest streets in the city, or even in the continent, and this extension if carried out will be of great importance, and make it indeed a credit to the town and the Municipality.

The signature of Angel Brian having appeared in one of the lists of adhesion to the Tajás candidature, the secretary of the President of the Republic, who likewise rejoices in that appellation, has hastened to let the world know that it is not he who signed, but quite another Angel. So be it.

We understand that Frank Brown will shortly give a benefit for the British Hospital Bazaar, but have not yet received definite particulars.

We regret to learn from a London telegram of the alarming illness of Herbert Spencer, the greatest philosophic writer of the century and one of the acknowledged leaders of modern thought, a man of encyclopaedic learning, and with a marvellous power for the arrangement and presentation of facts. He is 73 years old, and his health has always been delicate, partly owing to his intense devotion to study.

has at last given a sentence which we can heartily applaud. It has sentenced a sergeant named Silveira to 21 months' imprisonment for resisting and attacking the police authorities in the execution of their duty. Unfortunately, the Council has also stultified itself by exonerating another soldier who assisted in the same offence, on the absurd plea that he was drunk and therefore not responsible! So that if a man wishes to commit a crime, he has only to get drunk to do it with comparative impunity! The Council has laid down the excellent doctrine that respect to the public authorities is even more incumbent on the military than on the other inhabitants. We would like, however, to see this doctrine applied not only to the subordinates but to the officers who are generally the worse offenders, and who think their uniform a safeguard for the commission of any abuse.

The funeral of Marshall Macmahon will take place at the end of the month in the Invalides. Queen Victoria and other European sovereigns have sent telegrams of condolence.

The relations between Turkey and Austro-Hungary are reported as strained, the cause of irritation being the influence of Austria in the affairs of Serbia and Bulgaria.

Some ugly reports have recently been floated as to a serious deficit in the Police Budget, the pay of the men being two or three months behind the payments provided for the purpose by the Treasury. The official organ of the Nation indignantly denies even the possibility of such a thing occurring, but the opposition papers which started the tale insist on their assertions, and ask for an investigation. The present government, however, is not fond of investigations, except where subordinates are concerned.

The advocates of paper money in this Republic, who are fond of quoting the benefits (?) it has produced in Argentina, have received a fatal blow in the financial report of the Argentine Government, apropos of the arrangement of the foreign debt, and quoted at some length in yesterday's *Stiplo*. We translate the following passage:—«The injuries which inconvertible paper brings to the country are incalculable, and consequently much superior to the advantages pointed out by its advocates. It raises the rate of interest, imports uncertainty into all operations, depreciates the value of the national products, establishes a premium in favor of all foreign merchandise, renders difficult the international economic relations of the country, promotes the abuse of emission, fosters gambling, and finally corrupts both people and government».

A New York telegram states that the house No. 41 West Avenue has been completely destroyed by fire, causing great material damage. Stupidly enough the telegram omits to say who or what were the occupants of the house, and thus the information is of little value.

About 12 p.m. on Thursday, a fire broke out on board the British bark «Dunstaffney» 830 tons, bound from Buenos Aires to Valparaíso in ballast, and anchored in the outer anchorage. Assistance was given by the tugs of the marine commandancy, and of Lusich and Escobier and Co, and it was not until 3 a.m. that the flames were extinguished, the bark being considerably damaged. The origin of the fire is unknown. Only a few days ago there was an outbreak of fire on board the same vessel, by which the captain's cabin, books and instruments were partially destroyed. We cannot say if the vessel was insured.

The Custom House paid \$4,953 into the London Bank yesterday on account of the foreign debt service.

London telegrams contain very contradictory and confusing accounts about the miners strike, which it would appear is still on foot. The existence of cholera in Antwerp is officially denied.—Next Sunday the socialists will demonstrate in Tratalgar Square in favor of universal suffrage.—The British fleet left Tarento for Spezia yesterday.

BUENOS AIRES —Lt. Col. Damuzio was condemned to death, and the naval officers Montaña, Sarmiento and O'Connor, were sentenced to imprisonment for an indeterminate period for the crime of rebellion in taking possession of the «Murature» and another torpedo boat and making an attack upon the squadron in the Outer Roads. These sentences have now been commuted. Damuzio is to have 20 years' imprisonment, Montaña 10 years and Sarmiento and O'Connor each five years. They have all been sent to the Penitentiary. We venture to predict that they will be free men again within six months.

Don Eduardo Madero, concessionaire of the port works, is very ill; he is very sorry to announce, very ill; he is attended by Doctors Pirovano and Constanza.—The Bolsa was the scene of a terrible murder on Wednesday, about 3:30 p.m. It appears that Mr. Juffini, a well-known dealer in flour, and a broker in the same line named Delino, both members of the Bolsa, had a dispute about the payment of \$300 which Delino claimed, and not being

able to come to any settlement, they decided on presenting their case to the Chamber of Syndics for their resolution. Yesterday at 3 p.m. was the time fixed for hearing the case, which was decided against Delfino.

On Tuesday night, another enormous course of people assembled at the Rink to witness the third race of the match between Snowden and Ridgely, and they were rewarded by seeing a splendid race, and the Record time made of 6 mins. 54 4/5 secs. for this distance.

LONDON NOTES

In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. Asquith stated, in answer to Mr. Paul, that it might frustrate the ends of justice if he were to say where William Henry Hulbert was supposed to be, but that all possible steps had been and were being taken to bring this man to justice.

An allegation that some Welsh farmers do not give evidence before the Welsh Land Commission because they are afraid of their ministers and deacons was made yesterday by Mr. Wm. Humphreys, the Conservative candidate for the Eifion division at the last general election.
