NEWS OF THE DAY

Parliament.
In the Chamber of Representatives, on Saturday, after some routine business, the Bill from the Executive amending Article 51 of the Law of Elections was approved in general and in detail, without debate.

There being no further business on the order of the day, the sitting terminated.

The International Regatta.

The annual international boat-races took place on the Rio Lujan near Buenos Aires, on Saturday last, and under the management of the new Union of Rowing Clubs, was a great success, showing many improvements on the arrangements of recent years. The attendance was unusually large, and the new course met with general approval. The weather was exceedingly fine. The majority of prizes fell to the Germans. The following is the result of the events in which the Montevideo Rowing Club competed.

International Four Oared Shells. 2500 metres. The B.A.R.C. crew did not compete, starters being the Tigre B.C., Teutonia and M.V.R.C. The latter started off at great speed, and obtained a lead, but the steady, swinging stroke and greater power of the Teutonia crew proved too much for them, and the latter eventually won by several lengths. The Tigre crew was nowhere. The winning crew was composed of C. Hartbrodt, F. Van Houten, G. J. de Beer and J. T. van Houten.

Double Sculls, 1500 metres. M. V. R. C. represented by Arthur Davis and Dunbar was the favorite, rowing against B.A.R.C. and the Teutonia, but the latter, represented by F. Spott and H. van Houten was again too strong and won easily. A close contest for second place was won by M.V.R.C.

Pair-oared clinkers, 1500 metres. This was also won by the Teutonia crew, by lengths, beating B.A.R.C. and M.V.R.C., the latter represented by C. Sturzenegger and Alfred Davis.

Bridgett Challenge Cup for single sculls, one mile. R. Fliege of the M.V.R.C. won this easily for the third time in succession, it thus becoming his definite property. The other starters were H. van Houten, E. W. Bahntje and A. Gilderdale. This, then, is the only prize brought by Montevideo this year. The competitors returned from Buenos Aires yesterday morning and speak warmly of the hospitable manner in which they were treated there.

North-Eastern of Uruguay Railway.
The ordinary general meeting of the shareholders of the North-Eastern of Uruguay Railway Company, limited, was held on the 29th September at the offices, 7, Finsbury Circus, E.C.

Mr. Loftus Fitzwygram presided, and, in moving the adoption of the report, said he supposed this was one of the very few railways—perhaps the only one—in the River Plate which had not suffered from the vicissitudes that had prevailed there, and therefore they were able to pay their usual dividends of 7 per cent. on the preference and 6 per cent. on the ordinary shares for the half-year ended June 30 last, which, he thought, were fairly satisfactory, especially in these times. The Central Uruguay Company had paid its rent with promptitude, and he had no doubt would do so for many years to come. The management of the

railway was entirely in the hands of the Central Company, and he found from the report that it had been improved—that they had erected one new station, and made a bridge in the town of Montevideo which was very much required, besides opening two if not three cattle corridors, to facilitate that trade which was one of their principal industries.

Mr. George Cooper seconded the resolution, which was carried unanimously.

The Brazilian Revolution.
We have been favored by H. B. M. Acting Consul General, Mr. A. Grenfell with the copy of the following letter received by him from Capt. Laug of H. M. S. "Sirius."

H. M. S. "Sirius."
Rio Janeiro.
Nov. 7, 1893.

Sir,
I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your telegram of today's date, and beg that, on behalf of the Officers, Ships Companies and myself, you will tender to the British Residents and accept yourself, our sincere thanks for the generous sympathy which has been shown for us in our deep grief in the loss of our shipmates by the explosion of the powder magazine on Gobernador Island.

The following telegram from London, dated last Friday, appears in the Buenos Aires papers, though it does not seem to have been published here.—"In view of the protracted abnormal political situation in Brazil, and the refusal by most of the Powers to recognize the new Government of Santa Catalina to which the rebel fleet is supposed to belong, orders have been transmitted to the commanding officer of the British Naval forces in Rio Bay, to prevent any direct or indirect interference on the part of the rebel fleet in respect to any English merchandise or any cargo arriving under the British flag, and to guarantee all operations of unloading and loading in Rio Bay to every British vessel."

From New York and other telegrams we take the following:—"The statement that England had asked the U. S. State to exercise its friendly mediation to bring about an end to the revolution has been officially denied at Washington. It is said that Peixoto's representative in Berlin has purchased five double-screw torpedo boats to form part of his new squadron. Captain Rabigan has been charged with taking them to Brazilian waters.—William Knowan a retired officer of the British navy, says a London telegram, is organising a squadron which he will take to the assistance of Admiral Mello. He has already bought two vessels to be armed as cruisers, and is negotiating for two torpedo launches. Several officers of the British navy are preparing to join the expedition.—The Brazilian flag of green and yellow has been hoisted on the "Cid" which will in future be known as the "Niteroy," whilst the "Britannia" will be called the "America."—A Rio Janeiro telegram of Saturday says that Argentine citizens and interests will be protected in the Bay by the U. S. squadron.

To the above we may add that we are inclined to regard the tales of unlimited purchases of war vessels by Peixoto as apocryphal.

SUNDRIES.

—The busy season is approaching and, despite political troubles, there are serious symptoms of a revival and of a more prosperous summer than has been known for several years, both in city and camp. Merchants and tradesmen should take note of this, and should hasten to catch the rising tide by a judicious course of that advertising which they have neglected during the past period of depression. In considering this we hope they will not forget our columns. We have some first-class spaces at their disposal, which we are prepared to let at the very low rates still prevalent and we advise them to secure them without loss of time whilst still available at the present figures. They will thus not only once more bring themselves and their goods before the public, but will also assist us to wipe out some of the losses of past years during which we have not hesitated to continue publishing the paper at a steady loss in the hope of better times to come and in order to serve the community.

—The Representatives sat on Saturday, and sanctioned post-haste, the amendment proposed by the Executive in the recent Law of Elections. Perhaps it was just as well that there was no debate, or some unpleasant remarks might have been made about the Law itself.

—The resignation by Dr. Manuel Herrera y Espinosa of the portfolio of Foreign Affairs is expected to-day, as he has been proclaimed candidate for Deputy for Cerro Largo. He is almost the only Minister selected by Dr. Herrera that has escaped public satisfaction and escaped adverse criticism, and he will abandon his portfolio with general regret and respect. Other ministerial resignations, due to similar causes, are momentarily expected, and it is unlikely that the vacant portfolios will be filled before the new President assumes office next March.

—Referring to the above resignation, the *Nacion*, which we can only describe by the Spanish epithet *impagable*, announces that Dr. Herrera "has been proclaimed Deputy for Cerro Largo." This is a new way of doing things, even for the *impagable* government organ. According to this, then, even the pretence of an election is no longer to be maintained, but the Deputies are to be named by proclamation! Perhaps, however, there is more truth in this than the *Nacion* meant to reveal.

—The *Nacion* of Sunday, with an unusual candour, acknowledges that the supporters of Tajés are the personal and political enemies of Dr. Herrera and of the "official" party, otherwise called the "National Directive Committee of the Colorado party." That's just it, and in that enemy lies their strongest claim to public sympathy, for the public well know that Dr. Herrera and the aforesaid Committee are the deadliest enemies that the country has.

—A large number of the Colorado party are so disgusted with the intolerant, arrogant and dangerous attitude assumed by the self-elected "National Directive Committee," that they propose holding a public meeting of the constituents of the party to repudiate its action and to elect a genuine committee possessing the national and representative character that the present body lacks. If this be carried out, as we hope it will, it will be the deadliest blow the "official" party has yet had.

—The influence and power of the "official" party must not be measured by their bluster, or it would indeed be illimitable.

—The Republic will indeed have fallen low if it allows this "National Directive Committee," with Dr. Herrera pulling the strings behind, to nominate its legislators and president.

—The *Nacion* asserts that the Tajés candidature is dead and done for. If this be so, we shall see the unspeakable absurdity of elections without a candidate, for the "official" party either has no candidate, or else is so ashamed of him that it dare not publish his name.

—A party which is so ashamed of its candidate as to be afraid to proclaim him is a distinct novelty in politics, even in upside-down South America.

—Ugly rumours are afloat, which may or may not be calumnies of the opposition, that a store of revolvers and clubs is being laid by for use by the satellites and creatures of the "official" party at the elections, where-with to subdue independent voters. There are also strange tales current, which we make no pretence of understanding, of movements of the military and police forces on that day in order either to secure their operation or prevent their opposition in case their fidelity to the official cause is doubted. It is even said that the reorganisation of the detective force, so suddenly resolved upon, is nothing more than an electioneering manoeuvre.

—Uruguay would be a much happier country if it were not for her politics and a much more prosperous country if it were not for her politicians.

—Our readers are reminded that to-day and to-morrow are the last days for making entries for the Athletic Sports of December 8, and that the work of the Committee will be greatly impeded if entries are not made up to time. So far, we understand, very few entries have been received, in conformity with the foolish habit of always leaving them till the last minute. It is to be hoped, however, that they will now come in speedily, so that the Sports may be maintained at the high standard of recent years.

—There has been some warm fighting between insurrectionists and government troops at Cienfuegos, Cuba. The Spanish Colonies in Cuba and Havana are in a frequent state of ferment, owing to the unruly character of the colonists. Yet it they attained the independence for which they are struggling, they would not know how to employ it properly, but would merely give the world another example of failure as a Spanish-American Republic. The example of South America ought to deter them, but it does not.

—Speaking of the Regatta at Buenos Aires, a contemporary which is not always written in English says: "hundreds of young ladies charmed the scenery with their merry peals of laughter." If would have been very interesting if our contemporary had added how the scenery expressed its emotions when thus charmed. Did it get up and dance, did it turn flip-flops and cartwheels by the river side, or did it stand on its head and whistle "Tara-ra-boom-de-ays"? These details should not be omitted in an account pretending to be circumstantial.

—A native contemporary in Buenos Aires, taking it for granted that General Tajés will be elected President, gives the following as the

composition of his first cabinet:—Government, Dr. Juan Carlos Blanco; Foreign Affairs, Dr. Juan José de Herrera; Finance, Mauricio Llamas; War, General Edward Vazquez; Foment, Dr. José M. Castellanos. If this be anything more than a flight of imagination, Tajés' promise of a reactionary government will not have been made in vain. Such a cabinet would go further towards restoring public confidence than anything Dr. Herrera has yet attempted.

—The "mother country" equally with the South American Republics, appears to entertain very free notions as to the suspension and detention of telegrams. The following paragraph from the *Daily News* of October 7 will not be without its interest here, where we have seen much of these processes:—"Considerable surprise, our Madrid correspondents says, was caused in Madrid, when the English and all the European papers of Tuesday morning reached that city, and it was found that they did not contain any accounts of the battle at Melilla. Every-body knew that the telegraph lines were in excellent condition on Monday night, and that all the correspondents of newspapers and agencies abroad had lodged at the Central Office in Madrid hundreds of telegrams, long before midnight on Monday. All these telegrams are now known to have been detained for several hours by the Press Censor at the Ministry of the Interior, who cannot be made to understand that the international postal treaties only recognise the right of a Continental Government to suppress telegrams, and to reimburse the value of the same, but do not recognise any right to detain telegrams for several hours, inflicting damage to the senders, without any compensation. All Press telegrams and business telegrams containing political news are sent up from the telegraph office to the Ministry of the Interior, where they are made to wait until the officials translate and submit them to the Minister. Sometimes they are even tampered with, if unpalatable news is trusted to the Spanish wires. The Spanish provincial Press suffered the same treatment by order of the Government."

—English ports having been declared "clean," the Board of Health has issued the decree admitting to free pratique all vessels that have left those ports since the 1st instant. They might have made the date a month earlier, without any fear and with decided advantage to shipping interests.

—Mr. J. M. Murray, the popular cashier of the London and River Plate Bank has returned from a well-earned holiday, in the "Nile," and is now submitted to the pleasures of quarantine on Flores Island.

—On retiring from the Directorship of the Penitentiary, Col. Pereira has received a testimonial of appreciation from all his subordinates, and another from all his prisoners. They ought to know.

—By order of the criminal Judge, the members of the ex-Municipal Board of Flores, Sres. Fernandez, Goto, Labastie, Ferrer and Baraño, have been arrested and brought to the capital for trial on the charge of fraudulent use of public money which lately led to their suspension.

—The *criollo* drama "Juan Soldado" will be given at the Politeama this evening.

—A Madrid telegram says it is "officially proved" that the English are selling arms and cartridges to the Moors surrounding Melilla. The news has produced great indignation in Spain, and the Spanish Minister in London has been ordered to make an energetic protest. The Spaniards have been gaining the advantage in recent skirmishes. The Infante Antonio has left for the scene of war.

—Some forty anarchists and a gang of coiners have been arrested by the Barcelona police. The anarchists are getting defiant and hold their meetings openly in spite of strict prohibitions. Martial law has been declared throughout the province.

—The Custom House paid \$21,231 into the London Bank yesterday in account of the foreign debt service.

—From London telegrams we learn that the Government has given orders that King Lobengula (who it would now seem has not been taken prisoner) should be driven back to the further side of the Zambezi, but that no attempt should be made to cross the river.—Mr. F. May, first cashier of the Bank of England, whose signature is familiar upon the bank notes, has resigned and will be succeeded by the first accountant Mr. Bowen.—Favorable news has been received of the Nansen polar expedition which has found the Kara sea unusually free from ice.—There has been bad weather on the east coast, and many wrecks.—The authorities have been advised that some of the most dangerous of the anarchists have left Spain for England. Strict watch will be kept on their movements.—Her Majesty will leave for Florence at the end of November.—A clause has been inserted in the Parish Councils Bill allowing women, single or married, to vote and to sit on the Councils.—Bank of England shares have fallen two points. The fall is attributed to the bad state of the market and of business in general.

The *Times* correspondent in Toulon has sent a sensational telegram expatiating on the weakness of the British squadron in the Mediterranean, and urging an increase.—Twenty-two new torpedo boats have been ordered to be built by the Russian government.

BUENOS AIRES

—The engineer Ringuet inspected, on behalf of the Government, the construction of the bridge over the Rio Mojorolo, Salta, and received for his services a cheque for \$4000 on the National Bank in liquidation, but, as the liquidators could not pay the cheque, Mr. Ringuet sold it in the market for \$2838, and he claims to be paid the difference by the Government. The Public Works Office has reported in favour of the claim, but it seems to us that the Government, knowing that the cheque was only worth its price in the market, must have intended Mr. Ringuet to receive only the actual and not the nominal value of the cheque.

—The exact amount of the shares subscribed for the Prince George's Hall is \$163,700, which will probably be increased by some subscriptions in England before Mr. Krabbé returns. The land will cost about \$50,000 and the estimated cost of carrying out the plans of the building, prepared by Mr. J. W. Hopkins, is \$115,000, which will provide a hall three metres longer and wider than the Italian Hall, and built in a superior style, and comprising entrance hall, caretaker's room, ladies' and gentlemen's cloak rooms, portable stage, supper room, ladies' and gentlemen's dressing room, ladies' and gentlemen's dressing rooms, gallery all round, with a passage at the side and *patio* at the back. The design provides that the Hall shall be set back from the street, so that at any future time shops, with private houses above, can be added. The committee inspected various sites, but finally selected one in Calle Cuyo, between Paraná and Montevideo, as the most suitable. This measures 20 by 70 metres and can be purchased at \$50 per square metre. The chairman said that the Amateur Dramatic Club would be permanent tenants and the Cienfuegos dances would be held in the hall (the charge made for the use of the Italian Hall for these dances is \$186 a night). The Choral Union will also probably use the hall, as well as other nationalities, when its superiority is made manifest. He concluded by stating that, as prices for land were advancing and it was getting known among property owners that such a site was needed, the committee were of opinion that no time should be lost in purchasing the ground, as several plots had advanced in price during their negotiations. Mr. Ogilvie complained that, as the Dramatic Society had been specially provided for, the English Literary Society, which would be prepared to pay \$4000 to \$5000 per year, should have had more consideration. The chairman replied that the case of the Literary Society had been most carefully considered, and the committee had most reluctantly decided against it, on the ground that the cost of the land in a central position would have absorbed all the capital. Mr. Cumming said that the Dramatic Club would require a permanent office and would probably pay not less than \$2000 a year. The following gentlemen were elected as directors of the Company:—Messrs. Boodle, Boutell, Bowen, Carlisle, J. M. Drysdale, Gibson, Hopkins, Krabbé, Mackintosh and Runciman.—*B. A. Herald.*

LONDON NOTES

MONDAY, OCTOBER 9.

On Saturday afternoon the Metropolitan Fire Brigade were reviewed in Hyde Park. Mrs. Hutton, wife of the Chairman of the County Council, presented medals to officers and men who had won them by exemplary conduct during long service or by conspicuous bravery.

A party of gentlemen, including Mr. William Simpson, Mr. B. Quaritch, and Mr. Maurice D. Conway, made a pilgrimage on Saturday to the grave of Edward Fitzgerald, the translator of Omar Khayyam, at the little village of Boulogne, near Woodbridge. There they planted two rose trees raised at Kew Gardens, where roses grown from hips taken by Mr. Simpson from Omar Khayyam's grave have been grafted on to the English rose.

We regret to announce the death of the Rev. Dr. John Edmond, Presbyterian minister of Park Chapel, Highbury.

"Utopia (Limited), or the Flowers of Progress," the first opera by Mr. W. S. Gilbert and Sir Arthur Sullivan since 1893, was produced before a crowded audience at the Savoy Theatre on Saturday night. Its success was indisputable.

A New York Correspondent tells us that in the race on Saturday between the Valkyrie and Vigilant, the American yacht beat her rival by over five minutes. Another race will take place to-day, but over a triangular course.

The Elcho Shield, won at the recent Bisley meeting by the English Eight, was conveyed to the Guildhall on Saturday with custom-

any ceremony. The Lord Mayor undertook its safe custody. Later, the company dined at the Mansion House, where the Duke of Cambridge responded to the national toast.

The Grand Prix du Conseil Municipal was run for yesterday at Longchamps, and resulted in the victory of Callistrato, who had been regarded as without a chance of winning. Buccaneri, the only English horse in the race, failed to get a place.

Saturday's football furnished many good games and some surprises. In the first division of the League the feature was the victory of Sheffield United over Sunderland. Blackburn Rovers, Burnley, and Aston Villa respectively beat Preston North End, Everton, and Notts Forest. Burslem lost their first match in the second grade. In the South, London Coleridians were successful over Clapton, Woolwich Arsenal over the Casuals, and Old Westminsters over the Crusaders. Under Rugby Union rules Blackheath defeated Middlesex Wanderers, and London Scottish the Clapham Rovers, the score in both instances being very substantial. Richmond lost to Cooper's Hill. Newport (Mon.) won another game. There was also play in the Lancashire and Yorkshire competitions.

An inquest was held by Dr. Danford Thomas on Saturday on the body of Frederick William Whitehead, the man who shot himself in the early hours of Wednesday morning last after firing at a young woman in Claremont-square, Pentonville. The jury found that the deceased committed suicide when temporarily insane.

During the further investigation at Bowstreet on Saturday of a charge against Richard Lowry Lomax, an artist, of attempting to obtain 200l. by means of a forged cheque, a singular letter was read, intended for a lady with whom the accused had been corresponding with a view to matrimony. Another remand was granted.

Constance Helen Phelan and her husband, Daniel Francis Phelan, persons of independent means, were remanded on bail at Chester Castle, on Saturday, charged with cruelly ill-treating their infant sons. Mrs. Phelan has previously been tried for a similar offence on the younger child.

TUESDAY, OCT. 10.

Accompanied by the Duke and Duchess of York, the Prince of Wales yesterday visited South London, and opened first the Fine Art Gallery in the Peckham-road and then the new Camberwell Central Library and Recreation Ground. Everywhere the Royal party had a most hearty welcome. At the Gallery the Prince expressed the pleasure it gave him to see so many works of art, and at the Library spoke in highly complimentary terms of the arrangements of the building. He wished both institutions every success.

Later in the day the Duke and Duchess of York went on to Poplar and laid the foundation stone of new buildings which are being erected in East India Dock-road by the Missions to Seamen for seamen and sailor lads in the port of London. These buildings include an institute, a coffee bar, and a mission church. The cost of the Institute, 5,850l., has been undertaken by Lord Brassey; but a sum of 5,000l. is still required to meet the other part of the expense to be incurred.

Mr. Leonard Courtney, speaking at Fowey last night, declared that the Gladstonians were glad that the House of Lords had rejected the Home Rule Bill, and that they would themselves have recoiled from passing it into law had they the power to do so in the House of Commons.

Lord Randolph Churchill, addressing a meeting at Huddersfield, strongly denounced the Home Rule Bill, and in regard to it described Mr. Gladstone as a common quack.

Mr. Cecil Rhodes has reached Fort Salisbury, and reports favourably on the working of the Beira Railway. Two additional troops of Bechuanaland Border Police are being raised. The column from Fort Tuli are to join the column from Mafeking, and will be ready to-morrow. The columns from Fort Victoria and Charter left on Friday last.

Representatives of the Miners' and Coal-owners Federations yesterday met the Mayors of Sheffield and other northern towns to confer on the possibility of settling the dispute in the coal trade. At the outset a suggestion of the Mayors that the masters and men should first meet in private was accepted, but at the end of two hours, as no agreement seemed probable, the Mayors were invited to join the conference and state their proposals. These were that the men should return to the pits and work at the present rate of wages for six weeks, that on and after Dec. 4 a reduction of ten out of the forty per cent. advance in wages since 1888 should be enforced, and that a board of conciliation should be formed as between the two bodies on the wages question. These proposals will immediately be laid before the executives of the two Federations. In the London market there was a fall of three or four shillings on Staffordshire coal as feared from colliery proprietor and factor.

The preliminary meetings of the Congregational Union which take place in London this week, were opened yesterday, when the principal gatherings were in the Memorial Hall, the City Temple, and King's Cross Chapel. During the day a subscription list was opened for the benefit of the miners' wives and children.

A handsome memorial to Archbishop Magee was unveiled in Peterborough Cathedral yesterday by the Duke of Rutland.

It is expected from the nature of the competitions in the programme

that the Dairy Show which opens at the Agricultural Hall to-day will be of unusual interest.

The Valkyrie was again beaten in the yacht race at New York yesterday.

George Cooper, a young man who refused his address and behaved with cool indifference in the dock, was charged before the North London magistrate yesterday with firing a revolver at John Mayes, with intention to kill or injure him, at Hackney. The offence was said to have been committed on the prosecutor requesting the prisoner to desist from throwing stones at fowls. Mr. Lane decided to send the case for trial, but later ordered a remand that search might be made for the revolver.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 11.

Under the presidency of Mr. Chambers, a meeting of the Coalowners' Federation was held at Derby yesterday, when the proposals made by the Mayors at Sheffield were considered. The suggestion that the pits should be opened immediately at the old rate of wages was rejected, but a resolution was passed which, whilst reaffirming the conviction that the state of trade entitled the owners to the reduction originally asked for, declared that with the object and desire of ending the distress and the general dislocation of trade, the masters would be willing to allow the men to commence work at a present reduction of 15 per cent., and to meet the men with a view to the establishment of a tribunal of conciliation to deal with the question of the future advance or reduction of wages.

Sir John Gorst spoke at a very noisy meeting held last night at the Central Hall, Shoreditch, to hear addresses on the labour question and the unemployed. He argued that as the congestion of unskilled labour in the towns was due to the rush from the land for higher wages, the remedy must be to find inducements for the people to return to the land and remain on it.

The first session held by the Congregational Union yesterday took place in the City Temple, where Mr. Albert Spicer, M.P., delivered his presidential address. Mr. Spicer reviewed the Outlook of Congregationalism from the Standpoint of a Layman, and made various suggestions by which the Sunday services and the ministerial work generally may become more useful. A proposal by the Rev. J. Guinness Rogers, that a fund should be opened for the relief of sufferers from the coal strike, especially miners' wives and children, was adopted and liberally responded to. Discussions followed on papers relating to qualifications for the ministry and the means of maintaining the ministry in rural districts. In the afternoon a conference of women, a conference of the Colonial Missionary Society and the Congregational Prayer Union claimed attention. Dr. Walter Smith, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Free Church of Scotland, preached in the City Temple in the evening.

The London Wesleyan Methodist Council yesterday passed a resolution praying the House of Commons not to agree to the amendments of the Bill to the Places of Worship Sites Bill, and affirming that Nonconformists would rather abandon the Bill than accept those amendments, which would render the measure nugatory.

At the meeting of the London County Council yesterday, an animated debate took place with regard to certain suggested alterations to the Shaftesbury Memorial Fountain, at Piccadilly-circus. One or two improvements were resolved upon. Other business transacted during the sitting had reference to precautions against cholera, a proposal to provide work for the unemployed during the winter, and the election of representatives of the Council on the Thames Conservancy Board. Mr. Henry Parsons, whose case recently came before the courts, was re-appointed a District Surveyor.

In the examination schools at Oxford yesterday, a conference on secondary education was opened under the presidency of the Vice-Chancellor. There was a large attendance, almost every department of educational work being represented. The subjects for consideration included the need of various types of secondary education in England, with special reference to the curricula and graduation of first grade schools, classical and modern second grade schools, and higher grade Board schools respectively; the provision of preparatory schools for the upper grades of secondary schools; and the relation between secondary schools and the Universities.

On the reopening of the Austrian Reichsrath yesterday Count Taaffe, the Premier, amid general surprise, introduced a Bill embodying important reforms in the electoral law, and the extension of the franchise. The scheme stops short of universal suffrage, but it is proposed to give the vote to every citizen who may have received a certain measure of instruction in a public school, and completed his military service without having incurred severe punishment.

Several serious accidents are reported from the World's Fair, where "Chicago Day" was celebrated on Monday. The demand for transport facilities was unprecedented in the history of the city, and the visitors during the day are believed to have numbered 750,000 persons. The crush at various points was terrible. Two men were knocked down and killed by cars, and 125 persons were injured, and had to be conveyed to the hospitals.

A New York Correspondent states that Mr. and Mrs. Kendal appeared in that city on Monday night in the first American representation of "The Second Mr. Tanqueray," and that the reception accorded them indicated that their popularity there is undiminished. Mr. Piner's play

is regarded as the most audacious, and probably the most successful, piece produced there in recent years. The critics agree in praising its strength and general construction of the drama, but condemn its moral tone.

A new burlesque of a nondescript order entitled "Little Christopher Columbus" was brought out at the Lyric Theatre last night.

The competitions at the Dairy Show in the Agricultural Hall were watched with keen interest by large crowds yesterday. During the day the awards in the principal live stock classes were announced.

A telegram from Capetown says that it is expected that a combined advance will be made against Lobengula's kral by the forces from Forts Charter and Victoria from the east, and by the Bechuanaland force from the south.
