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After all, it seems, the list of military promotions was by no means confined to the modest number mentioned on Tuesday. The Decree has now appeared announcing the promotion, «with the acquiescence of the Permanent Commission», to the rank of Colonels, of the brevet Colonels Pedro Ibarra Borda, Lino Fernandez, Martin Echeverry, Agustín Turbey, Miguel Muelas, Julio Gutierrez, and the Lieutenant Colonel Enrique Britos, seven in all. It is whispered that there is yet another list in the background, but of this nothing definite is known. A contemporary relates, as a sinister circumstance, that when its reporter applied to an officer of the Army Staff for a list of the new promotions, the reply was that he had the list but was forbidden to give it for publication «by superior order.» This requires no comment.

Another promotion that has attracted some criticism is that of Sr. Alfredo Nebel to the rank of captain on the retired or «passive» list. Sr. Nebel served many years ago in the National Guard, attaining the modest rank of 1st Lieutenant. Lately he has chiefly been known as occupying various financial posts under Dr. Julio Herrera and as one of the liquidating Committee of the National Bank. How this entitles him to promotion to a captain is «one of those things no fellow can understand.»

The *Siglo* gives it on the authority of «an elevated person in officialism» that the Government has now accumulated a reserve of \$1,100,000, and that it has had to buy two new safes to guard so much treasure! We think it would be much more to the credit of its financial administration to bring its budgetary obligations, now some four months in arrears, up to date, than to hold back money for purposes which the people regard with suspicion. To keep in the coffers money due to creditors is, to say the least of it, a new and original method of economy and of accumulating capital.

Some of our contemporaries are again referring to the scheme for a new State Bank. As, however, it is said that the capital is to be composed of the \$1,200,000 of unissued Consolidated Debt, absolutely unattainable for such a purpose, and of part of the two millions recently voted, and which so far only exist in imagination, the notion may be dismissed as idle and foolish. It is possible that the Government may have some such idea for the disposal of the accumulated treasure mentioned above, but in such a case it will have to forego the contemplated purchase of armament, and we do not think that very likely.

We learn that protests are being prepared in commercial circles against the recent decrees of the Minister of Finance relative to transit commerce, etc. That is the best way to deal with the matter. What is wanted still more is a strong petition for a revision of the customs tariffs and an exposition of the direct and indirect injuries they are doing to the interests both of commerce and the revenue.

The Decree has been issued appointing Dr. Eduardo Brito del Pino, Decano of the Faculty of Right, as interim Rector of the University, and also convoking the Council of Doctors to present the term of three names from which the Executive will make the definite appointment. We hear that a considerable number of the students are still absenting themselves from the classes. This is rather foolish, for they have made all the protest necessary in the case.

Last night the Minister of War offered an official banquet, in the Charpentier Restaurant, to the officers of the foreign men of war in port who accompanied the Government to the fêtes of last Sunday. The principal military and naval authorities and officers of the capital were invited to meet them.

It is expected that Government will recommend to the Chambers the sanction of Dr. Palomeque's Bill for making the tributary laws permanent instead of annual. As we have said before, it will be a fatality for public interests if these laws are not reformed first, for at present most of them are in the most

oppressive and vexatious state imaginable, the legislation of the last five years having made them worse each time they were amended.

The Future of South American Trade.
An article in our contemporary, the *Imperial Institute Journal*, contains the following interesting passage:—«The careful student may easily discern one powerful undercurrent, which, if not counteracted, will materially decrease the trade between this country and South America. The Monroe doctrine claims the whole of the Northern Continent as the final heritage of the Government symbolised by the stars and stripes. This, however, is not enough. An incidental development of this ambition is a greed for the trade of the Southern Continent, and that not at a distant date, but in our own times. The contingency of South America favours this ambition, and our merchants find themselves face to face with a keen competition which will not be over-borne except by great courage, tact, and enterprise. The imports of the Latin-American countries, including South America, Mexico, the Central American States, and the Spanish West Indies, amount to about £120,000,000 per annum, and of this about £30,000,000 are contributed by the United Kingdom. This is an important trade, and we ought not to imperil it by any sluggishness or lack of enterprise. We should rather regard this total as the basis and prelude of a greater trade, and do all that we can to extend it. The shrewd and restless American is on our track. Meanwhile, as we have already pointed out, the commercial prospects continue to improve. Argentina, weary of intrigues, revolutions, and politics, settles down to trade and commerce, and promises to do her utmost to develop her resources and pay her debts; Chili and Peru, at no distant date two States militant, are now engaged in peaceful rivalry, and enjoying improving prospects and cultivating them. Brazil rejoices this season in a splendid crop of coffee, and finds her salvation in that crop. She has grown weary of pre-nunciamentos, and discerns that honest trade is more profitable than the exciting pastime which successive adventures have sought to introduce. Brazilian trade is good to be cultivated now. These South American markets may, with advantage, be cultivated, with a cautious moderation. The old world supplies little margin for new markets, and the dark places of the earth which we are redeeming from barbarism are not yet sufficiently civilised to furnish all the new markets we require.»

Our humorous friend «Stand-by O'Gorman» is unusually amusing in the account he sends to the *B. A. Standard* of the gala function at the Politeama last Sunday, when the «high life» of the city was mainly conspicuous by its absence. He says: «The rest of the boxes and the pit were filled with men and women in grand toilettes for the first time in South America.» If he had added «for the first time in their lives» we think it would not have been untrue as regards a great many of them, for such an extraordinary gathering was never seen here before at an official gala function. The truth behind the scenes is that the Government, determined to see a full house, bought up all the available seats and then found a difficulty in disposing of them, as all the better-class people, not bound by official ties, either went to the Solis or stopped away entirely. There is a legend that not a few of these seats found their way to Sr. Arteaga's sweated sempstresses, who thus found themselves in the stalls of a theatre for the first time in their hard-working lives, but we expect this is a malicious invention of the enemy.

Our theatre manners are advancing slowly. Some ten years ago the stalls of the theatres were almost entirely occupied by men, it being considered quite an impropriety that a lady should sit anywhere but in the boxes or the *caveau*—the tier under the gallery reserved entirely for the fair sex. Until the visit of Patti, now seven years ago, it was a rare thing for either ladies or gentlemen to go to the opera in full toilet, and those who did so were generally set down as English eccentricities. Even at state or official functions, evening dress was the exception outside the official party. But with the advent of Patti a change set in, and this season has completed the transformation. At the *Solis* this season, full dress has been almost de rigueur in all the principal parts of the house, and the reverse is now quite as much the exception as it was the rule formerly; whilst the stalls contain even more ladies than gentlemen. At the Politeama full dress has not been so general, but it has long ceased to be unusual, whether for operatic or ordinary functions. The custom may be more extravagant, but it certainly adds enormously to the appearance of the theatre when full.

We read in a contemporary, «It will come as a shock to the advocates of rational costume for women that knickerbockers have been prohibited in Chicago. The new

sumptuary law setting forth the kind of costume cyclists may wear when riding their machines within the jurisdiction of the city authorities was formally passed by the Board of Aldermen. Henceforth, instead of tight or even moderately loose knickerbockers, all cyclists will have to don a costume bicyclist from the ankles up, and the jacket portion is to be made high at the throat. The wearing of knickerbockers and the exposure of stockings is strictly forbidden. The law applies equally to men and women.» This is certainly about the most ridiculous thing we have read for a long time. No more graceful or serviceable garments than stockings and knickerbockers, for the lower limbs of either sex, have yet been invented, yet these Chicago wiseacres apparently consider them indecent, or at all events improper and to be suppressed. This is worthy of the exaggerated puritanism that swathed the supports of its chairs, tables and pianos in frilled wrappers, and that blushed with horror at mention of the word *leg*. It seems to us that a Common-Sense Anti-Puritan league is wanted in Chicago. We wonder if it is also considered improper for hosiers to expose stockings for sale in their shop windows, and if the word stockings is to be expurgated from polite society. Perhaps we shall also hear of an order for the suppression of the pictorial advertisements of underclothing in the ladies' magazines. Or perhaps underclothing itself will be suppressed altogether, as something too entirely shocking to be seen, mentioned or even thought about!

There is a certain Book still respected by not a few, which tells us that «man (meaning the whole human race) was made in God's image.» How comes it, these, that some of the most ardent followers of that Book are so ashamed of that image that they consider the pictorial representation of it, or the exposure of any part of it, or even its exhibition in a tight-fitting garment that reveals its natural outlines, as something entirely improper, scandalous and prohibitable? This is a poor compliment to the God they pretend to worship. Or is it that the shame arises from the consciousness that the image has so greatly deteriorated in their own persons that concealment is advisable, if only for artistic reasons? Let these ultra-puritans explain.

We read in the *B. A. Herald*,—«A number of Uruguayan citizens met on Sunday afternoon in the office of Mr. Canale, Calle Zabala 15, for the purpose of organizing a Military Legion without party affiliations of any kind whatever. The primary object of the Legion is to offer assistance to Argentina in case of an international war. A provisional committee was appointed, comprising many of the leading Uruguayan residents in this Capital.» The step is a premature one, which cannot be commended, and these hasty Uruguayans would find themselves in an awkward position if their Government should, as it probably would when the emergency arises, issue a declaration of neutrality. In any case it is bad taste on their part thus to speculate on the chances of an international quarrel which is now unlikely, and which all patriotic persons will try to avoid.

The Marquis of Lorne has been elected as Unionist member for South Manchester district. Apropos of this a London contemporary remarks:—«The Marquis of Lorne, who enters the House of Commons for the first time, adds—as son-in-law of the Sovereign—a new and unparalleled feature to its personnel from his near relationship-in-law to the Sovereign. In modern times the nearest connection between a member of the House of Commons and the Sovereign was that between Colonel Luttrell, the notorious opponent of Wilkes in Middlesex, and George III. Colonel Luttrell's sister, Mrs. Horton, married, as her second husband, the Duke of Cumberland, one of the brothers of George III.»

During the great fêtes which will be given in Rome for the 20th September (the 25th anniversary of the entry into the city by the Italian troops), several statues will be inaugurated to Italian patriots, as well as a commemorative column at Porta Pia. On the 20th the inauguration of the monument to Garibaldi will take place, and on the following days that of monuments to Cavour, Minghetti, Villa Giori, Pietro Cossa, and to the brothers Cairoli.

Members of the M. V. Cricket Club are reminded of the Annual General Meeting to be held in the Waterworks Offices at 8.30 p.m. this evening.

The now famous «strawberry cow» of the *B. A. Standard* must have been twins, one of which has found its way to Montevideo, and to the care of Stand-by O'Gorman. The milk of this ruminant is evidently very strong for it has induced Stand-by to send two telegrams on the same subject, the vastly important one of the gala function at the Politeama. On this occasion Stand-by, deeply impressed by the high-life that was not there, did not act up to his class name. So far from standing by, he sat down and took a book—no, a front—seat. We wonder

if it was one of those the Government paid for out of the public pocket?—The homeward sailing of the P. S. N. Co's «Orcana» is transferred to Sept. 4.

«Masseu's «Maon» will be repeated at the Politeama Theatre tomorrow evening. There is no performance there tonight. Rossini's «William Tell», that has not been heard here for many years, will probably be given on Saturday. The tenor Duo is said to excel in this opera.

An extraordinary telegram has appeared to the effect that at Sierra Leone «a professor of the Protestant religion» has been lynched for being caught in the act of cannibalism!

A bad impression is being made in Rio Janeiro by the disorders of the unruly peixotistas, who are opposing the pacification that has been welcomed by all respectable Brazilians. The papers call for the suppression of these riots with a stern hand.

The Spanish Government is protesting against the assistance afforded the Cuban revolutionists by the Brazilians.

The death occurred on Tuesday afternoon, almost suddenly, of Dr. Francisco Colombo, a physician of high esteem in the Italian and other communities. He was 65 years old and had practised here for nearly 30 years. He was especially noted for his benevolent works among the poorer Italian classes and working men's societies.

The sensation of the day in Buenos Aires has been the arrest of General Bosch, Captain Nuñez and Vice Admiral Solier for insubordination and the divulging of official secrets.

The R. M. S. «Thames» left Rio Janeiro at midday on Tuesday and should arrive here to-morrow afternoon.

The Custom House paid \$10,463 into the London Bank yesterday on account of the foreign debt service.

BUENOS AIRES.
—By invitation of the President of the Oriental Club, nearly 500 of the citizens of our neighbouring Republic and students met on Sunday afternoon in Plaza de Mayo, and a line of march was taken up towards the Uruguayan Legation. Great enthusiasm prevailed and *vinos* were repeatedly given for Uruguay and Argentina, the National Guards, and Dr. Britos the President of the Club. Several speeches were delivered at the Legation, among the orators were Drs. Frías and Britos. The reception at the Oriental Club in the evening was a splendid affair; the *élite* of Uruguayan society in Buenos Aires were present. The orchestra and chorus under the direction of Forlotti and Mr. Escalante rehearsed the pieces which were sung at the Opera House last night. Several select readings and songs were given by Obregon, Pastoriza, Romero and others.

—Mariano Carrera, one of the accusers of the Chief of Police, has appealed against Dr. Bustamante's order for the stay of all proceedings in the case.

—Captain Manuel José García-Mansilla has accepted the post of Chief of the Staff of the Navy. The general opinion is that this is an excellent appointment.

—A telegram from San Juan announces that a fire occurred early Monday morning in the house of Sr. Eleodoro Martínez, and it was totally destroyed. The losses are estimated at \$300,000, of which one-half was covered by insurances.

—General Bosch has presented his resignation of the command of the 2nd division of the army and his post as member of the supreme council of war, the latter because the Government did not pay attention to some suggestions of the Council.

—*B. A. Herald.*
—The scandalous system of «rings» and «trusts» that has done such wicked mischief in the United States is being planted here also, and will prove a *Upas* tree to the scanty population of the republic. The sugar monopoly is fast making headway, and now the *Capital* of Rosario utters a note of warning against a big Wheat Ring that is incubating. Three or four of the largest holders of wheat in the country are putting their pates and purses together to carry out the business; and some 80 «acopiadores» have joined them. The object is not to sell a grain of wheat till October, and thus force the exporters who have contracts to fill, to pay higher prices.

—A sad accident occurred on Monday in front of Congress-Hall. Don Emilio Castro, ex Governor of the Province of B. Aires, was run over by a mail-cart and so severely bruised that owing to his advanced age it is feared that serious consequences may ensue.

—A shocking affair occurred on Monday night at the doors of the «Círculo de Armas» in Calle Corrientes. Messrs Biais and Marcos Cernadas, brothers-in-law, Cernadas is married to Biais' sister,—have for long been on very unbrotherly terms and last night after some high words had passed between them, Cernadas drew his revolver and fired three shots at Biais. One of them took effect in his stomach and it is greatly feared

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that it may prove fatal. When will our "jeune dame" have the courage to abandon the miserable and fatal habit of carrying revolvers eternally in their pockets, instead of leaving them at home ready only for the burglar-fraternity.

The bitter animosity between Dr. Pinero the Head of the Lunatic Asylum and his brother in medical lore, Dr. Ramos Mejia, has culminated at last in a challenge sent by the former to the President of the Health Board. Dr. Pinero's seconds are General Reynolds and Mr. Rochetti, while those of Dr. Ramos Mejia are Mr. Rojas Saez Peña and General Capdevila. The conditions have not yet been arranged but the arms will probably be sabres. Both are men of about 40 years of age and it is earnestly to be hoped that their own high sense of duty will overcome their baser passions and prevent the realization of an appeal to arms.—B. A. Standard.

LONDON NOTES.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 31.

On the two polls taken on Monday and declared yesterday, there was no change in the balance of parties. Mr. Arthur O'Connor, Nationalist, was re-elected for East Donegal by a majority of 662; while Sir Thomas Lea, Liberal Unionist, was again returned for South Londonderry, his majority being 452. The only poll now remaining is that for Orkney and Shetland.

A Cabinet Council was held in Downing-street yesterday. The Duke of Argyll and Miss McNeill were married at Ripon yesterday by the Bishop.

At yesterday's meeting of the London County Council the inadequate water supply in the East-end was discussed, and two important statements were read—one by the Parliamentary agent, showing the absurdity of the contention that the Council's opposition to the Company's Bill of 1893 has any relevance to the deficiency; the other, by Mr. Binnie, the Council's engineer, stating that the Company are not suffering from a deficient supply, but that the water is being lost through leaks in the pipes occasioned by the protracted frost.

Delegates to the International Geographical Congress and to the Medical Congress were present at a reception given by the Baroness Burdett Coutts at Holly Lodge yesterday. At night the anniversary dinner of the Royal Geographical Society was held at the Hotel Métropole, and under the circumstances this partook of a great extent of the nature of an international event, many of the leading geographers of Europe being among the guests.

The British Medical Congress was opened yesterday with a service in St. Paul's Cathedral, where the Archbishop of Canterbury preached to a large congregation. At a meeting in Exeter Hall during the afternoon Sir J. Russell Reynolds assumed the presidency in succession to Dr. E. Long Fox. In the evening the presidential address was given.

Most of the time of the representative sessions of the Wesleyan Conference at Plymouth was occupied yesterday in the discussion of the itinerary question. Resolutions on the subject proposed by the Rev. Hugh Price Hughes, for extending the term of three years in special cases, were adopted.

Mr. E. M. Coldwell, formerly M.P. for North Lambeth, who was one of the directors charged with fraud in connection with the Balfour group of companies, died suddenly on Monday evening at his house, at Bournemouth. At the inquest, held yesterday, it was stated that he had frequently declared that his financial worries and the criminal action against him were killing him. Medical evidence that death was due to syncope was adduced, and the jury returned a verdict accordingly.

The Constantinople Correspondent of the "Berliner Tageblatt" telegraphs that the Porte has at last decided to accept the project of reforms for Armenia. He says that this result is due to the pressure exercised by Sir Philip Currie, who communicated to the Government a confidential note from Lord Salisbury.

Both Yorkshire and Surrey yesterday added to their list of successes this season, the northern county at Bradford defeating Gloucestershire by eight wickets, and Surrey at Derby winning their match against the home side by an innings and 43 runs. Lancashire, at Birmingham, left off with the best of the game against Warwickshire. Hampshire, at Leicester, gave a capital account of themselves, scoring in their second innings 316 for the loss of six wickets.

Goodwood races were opened yesterday under pleasant conditions, and before a company which included the Prince of Wales and Prince Christian. The principal event was the running for the Stewards' Cup, which Wase Virgin secured, defeating Undecided and Amador, who took second and third places, and nineteen others. The Craven Stakes fell to Drogo, the Charlton Walker Handicap to Red Hat, the Ham Stakes to Labrador, the West Dean Stakes to Oyster Catcher, the Richmond Stakes to Persimmon, and the Gratwicke Stakes to Matchmaker.

A case arising out of election disturbances in Norfolk came before the magistrates at Smallburgh yesterday, when Lord Wodehouse was summoned for assaulting John Gaymer, a prominent Conservative of North Walsham, and William Saul, a driver, was charged with aiding and abetting. In the result Lord Wodehouse was fined 3s. 7d., with 12s. 6d. costs, and Saul was fined 1s. and costs, which Lord Wodehouse paid. Others were fined for stone throwing.

There was an exciting scene in the Queen's Bench Division, yesterday, before the case of "Kempshall v. Holland" was disposed of. The plaintiff, Mrs. Catherine Kempshall, sought to recover 10,000l. from Mr. Edgar S. Holland, a gentleman of means, residing at Liverpool, for an alleged breach of promise of marriage. Conducting her case herself, she was repeatedly stopped by Mr. Baron Pollock, who told her that she must keep her evidence to the point whether the defendant promised to marry her and then broke his promise. In the result the jury found that she had made out no case, and judgment was accordingly entered for the defendant. Whereupon the plaintiff became very violent, and tried to scale the desk used by the Queen's counsel. She was removed from the Court after a desperate struggle.

After the termination of the action for alleged breach of promise of marriage, Mrs. Kempshall was tried at the Central Criminal Court on the charge of shooting at Mr. Holland's sister with intent to murder her. She was found not guilty, and also not guilty of a common assault. In discharging her Mr. Justice Collins advised her to refrain from molesting any one.

Dealing at the Central Criminal Court with the case of extensive bank frauds, Mr. Justice Collins sentenced Francis Alfred Beaumont and Walter Arthur Playdell, who had been found guilty of forging and uttering numerous circular credit notes on Messrs. Contis and Co., the former to ten years and the latter to eight years' penal servitude. John Carr, who had been convicted of forgery only, was sent to penal servitude for six years.

There were 2,675 births and 1,940 deaths in London last week, the former being 68 below and the latter 247 above the average for the same week of the last ten years. The annual death rate per thousand, which had been steadily rising till it reached 23.7 in the preceding week, was last week 23.0. Fatal cases of diarrhoea rose to 397, or 137 more than the average for the week. Deaths from diphtheria (48) exceeded the average by 14; while those from measles (94) exceeded the average by 40, and those from scarlet fever (14) were 6 below the average. Only two deaths were directly attributed to influenza.

Between the 1st April and the 27th instant, the receipts into the Exchequer amounted to 29,388,897l., as compared with 26,561,951l. in the corresponding period of the last financial year, and the expenditure to 32,604,510l., as against 33,661,457l. On Saturday last the Treasury balances stood at 2,669,923l., and on the same day in the previous year at 1,548,503l.

CLIPPINGS.

It has been rumoured for some time that the Pope has concluded a careful and important work which is to serve as a programme of social order. Before making anything public he is asking the opinion of the most eminent German, Swiss, English, and Italian sociologists. The Pope's idea is to use the funds of many religious corporations, which are almost useless abroad, for the institutions he has in his mind to fund, and for this purpose he has invited some great men of the Company of Jesus, as well as Father Leon of the Capuchins, Count Loë, the Swiss Deputy Curia, and several learned Italians, to confer with him. The conferences are to commence next autumn, and at their close a new encyclical letter will be published, and be the sign of the practical carrying out of the Pope's ideas. According to what is reported, and sounds probable enough, the Pope will seek to demonstrate from the non-success of the State Socialism advocated by the Emperor William and Bismarck that only "Church Socialism" can bestow peace and happiness on the people, and that no Socialism is possible without the idealism of faith, which, moderating human passion, urges to the good work that it is impossible to hope for from Atheism and Naturalism.

A French writer has been studying the figures of past censuses, with a view to disprove the commonly-accepted theory that the population of France is decreasing. The simple fact is, he says, that it increases less fast than in other countries, but that it increases for all that. The only time when there was a diminution was after the war of 1870, but that diminution was apparent, not real, as it was caused by the cession of Alsace and best part of Lorraine to Germany. Since then the loss has been more than made up, for the population now is 38,000,000 more than it was in 1869, when the lost provinces were still included in the calculation. Nor do the figures available, he declares, bear out the common supposition that the Napoleonic wars caused a great decrease of population in France. Thus, while the population in 1784 was 24 3/4 millions, in 1801, after all the butcheries of civil and foreign wars, it was 27 1/2 millions; in 1806, in the very midst of the Napoleonic régime, it was over 29 millions, and in 1821, just six years after Waterloo, it had risen to close on 30 1/2 millions.

What we owe to astronomy is the burden of an article by Dr. Simon Newcomb, the great American astronomer (self-made, like our late Astronomer-Royal). After recalling the absolute dependence of sailors upon the stars, before the invention of the mariner's compass, he reminds us that even now no lengthy voyage can be safely made without their aid through astronomical observations. Nor could we, apart from these, have any maps at all accurately constructed, save of comparatively limited areas. By observations on the Meridian passage of sun and stars we learn our distance east or west of Greenwich. Our distance north or south of the

Equator is given by finding the altitude of the Pole star or of one of the others, when upon the Meridian. Few people appreciate how accurately this can be done. A thoroughly-trained observer could tell his altitude within five miles by instruments unassisted with telescope or microscope. Good instruments would reduce his error to 100ft., whilst the very best results are known to be accurate within 30ft. It is because of this that astronomers have recently discovered a strange rolling of the Poles, which are found to describe a continuous series of spiral loops, about 100ft. across. Again, it must not be forgotten that we depend entirely upon astronomy for correct time.

Adulteration meets us everywhere. The treatment to which otto of roses has always been subjected seems hardly to have been checked by the prohibition imposed by the Bulgarian Government on the importation into Bulgaria of the adulterating medium, essence of geranium. Indeed, says Vice-Consul Wratisslaw, the quantity of otto which reaches the European markets in a pure state must be very small. Last summer the British Chamber of Commerce at Constantinople sent a delegate to the principal otto producing centre, with a view to procuring an absolutely pure sample. This gentleman, however, was obliged to return empty handed, for he ascertained that though the otto may not be tampered with after reaching the merchant's hands, there is no means of ensuring that the peasant whose stock the latter buys up has not already adulterated it. Supervision during distillation is no guarantee, for the ingenious peasant is in the habit of sprinkling essence of geranium over the freshly-gathered roses before distillation in order to increase the yield.

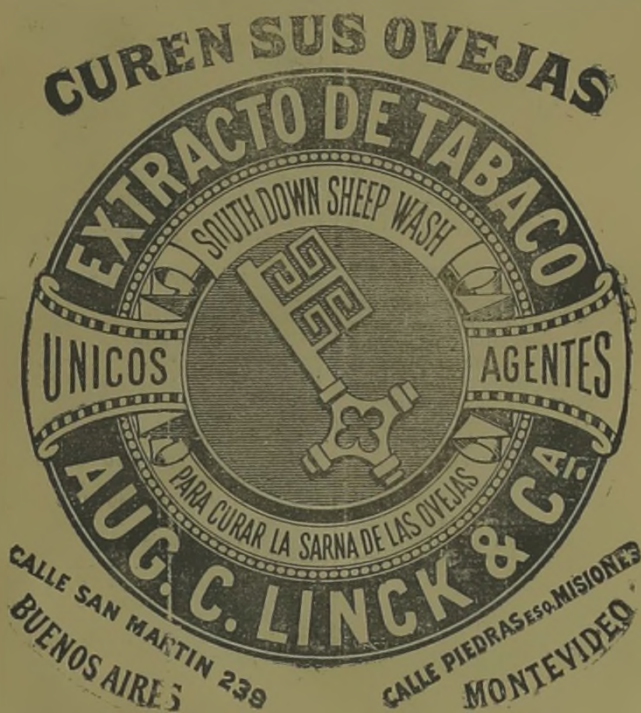

(A SHORT STORY.)

Tiny white fleecy clouds drifted slowly across the deep, intense blue of the sky, a light breeze tempered the heat, and as the train, rapidly working up to full speed, got out into the open country, the wide, glorious, varying landscape lay basking in the warm, brilliant, glowing sunlight like a world just fresh from Eden. The vivid green of the trees and meadows, fields full of daisies, buttercups, and poppies, the fresh, fragrant hay, the cool, shimmering, winding rivers, the rich woods, and alternate hill and valley, made a feast of beauty for anyone who could appreciate it. And it appreciated by a young man in one of the third-class carriages, who had a window seat, and consequently endless opportunities of gazing out at the flying scenery. He was about thirty-five, rather good-looking, tall and strong, with curly dark hair and cold dark eyes—though now they wore a softer expression than usual—and he was bronzed and tanned by ten years' knocking about in the colonies. He had been in England just a week, spent chiefly in London, but now he was hurrying down to a certain sweet little Devonshire village and to a certain picturesque little cottage, embowered in roses, honeysuckle and jasmine, which he well remembered of old. His mind was busy with the past, as he leaned back in his seat, lazily puffing a cigar, utterly oblivious of his fellow-travellers, and recalled his last visit to that same old cottage and the history of the succeeding years. Foremost among all these mind-pictures was a sweet, dark, pigunt girl-face, such a bright, fresh, saucy face it was, crowned with curly chestnut hair which never would keep in proper order,—he remembered how the tiny tendrils curled about the small pink ears, and nestled in the white neck. The face belonged to his cousin Phyllis, who had been first his playmate and sister, then his sweet heart and the lady of his love. And he had treated her badly; yes, very badly—he gave an involuntary wriggle in his seat at that point of his meditations. Still, "Confession is good for the soul," and he felt a sort of complacency at his own magnanimity in making this admission. Yes, undoubtedly he had behaved badly to his little cousin. He had set himself to win her love (not a very difficult matter), had entreated in passionate pleadings for it, and then—well, then—he had suddenly discovered that there were other things in life than love, and he had backed out of the affair in a peculiarly mean and unmanly way. It is true that his troublesome little member, his heart, had made vigorous protest at first, but he had "sat upon" it so relentlessly, that it had soon ceased in despair, while as for Phyllis, he had told himself that she was very young and would get over it; he did not believe in people dying of broken hearts nowadays—that was all exploded nonsense, and a fellow could not be expected to be tied to a woman's apron-strings.

Then, with a certain restlessness upon him, he had gone abroad, with vague magnificent dreams of doing something wonderful,—and had not done it. But he had succeeded well enough to satisfy any one with more modest demands. He had toiled, and travelled, and seen a great deal of the world, and in all these years he had thought little enough of England or of Phyllis,—he had no close family ties,—until last autumn, when he had had a sharp attack of influenza, which had pulled him down miserably, and filled him with a sick longing for the old country and the old faces. The world had suddenly become a howling wilderness; he got an exaggerated disgust of colonial ways; so that when he was unexpectedly offered the chance of returning to England, in the interests of the firm to which he belonged, he seized upon it with avidity, and would have considered it a special interposition of Providence upon his behalf, if he had been in the habit of thinking of Providence at all. He had matured his plans on the voyage, while smoking and staring out to sea day by day, avoiding haughtily his fellow-travellers, so as to win from the ladies the epithet of "brute," and from the men that of the "morose Englishman," and speedily settling his most pressing business engagements, he was now on the way to Phyllis's home with the intention of asking her to be his wife. He knew she was not married though the letters of another cousin, and he had no anticipation of any difficulty in getting what he wanted. She had always loved him, poor child! she should have her reward now. Why, she must be twenty-nine since they had last met. He hoped she was not "faded," he did not want a faded woman for his wife—but that he could settle when he had seen her, he told himself. So stretching out his long legs with a yawn, he sat up, threw

his cigar out of the window, and became conscious that the train was just entering Exeter. The discovery made him restless: it could not be long now. He bought a paper from a newsboy, scanned negligently the different columns, crumpled it all up into a ball in disgust, flung it under the opposite seat, and finally drew a great breath of relief as they steamed into Unberleigh station with its magnificent wealth of roses everywhere. How sweet they were, he thought, as he sprang on to the platform, passed out into the road, and then began his two-mile walk into the country, through lovely, leafy lanes and sunny, silent fields! How beautiful it all looked in the golden evening sunshine! Australia might be well enough, but it was not England; and then he gave a short contemptuous laugh at his own enthusiasm, and strode on more rapidly, until a sudden turn of the road brought his heart into his mouth with such a throb as to almost stop his breath, for there stood the well-remembered cottage, where he had spent so many weeks and months of his boyhood, looking almost exactly as it had always done; the jasmine and honeysuckle over the porch, the roses by the window might be a trifle more luxuriant perhaps, the box bordering was higher, and a new gate replaced the old one upon which he used to swing, but the hollyhocks kept their own corner. The great clumps of white lilies were in their old place, the heartsease bloomed in the usual spot, and half-way up the path a large cat—yes, the very same big black Tom he used to tease—sat placidly regarding him. He stooped and stroked him with unwonted tenderness as he passed on to the porch. The door stood open, as it used to do, and as he knocked he wondered if he should find them out and have to wait in solitary impatience for their return; but no, he heard a door shut, a light step came swiftly along the passage—"from the kitchen," he said mentally—and Phyllis herself stood before him. He knew her at once. Faded? Not a bit of it! Only matured, as fresh and bright as ever, not pretty absolutely, she had never been that, but just the Phyllis of old, with the same curly chestnut hair, only now it was massed and worn in the prevailing fashion; her very gown, a soft white delaine, reminded him of a muslin of bygone days. Her clear brown eyes met his inquiringly.
