Parliament.

Chamber of Representatives.

On Thursday, after some routine
business, Sr. Silva, on behalf of the
Committee of Finance, reminded the
Chamber that the moratorium of the
National Bank expired on the 23rd
instant, and the Committee had not
yet been able to report on the Bills
before it for carrying out the liquida-
tion. He therefore presented a Bill
prolonging the present moratorium
until the Chambers had pronounced
on the Bills in question.

Sr. Flores suggested that a definite
limit of time should be set to the
prolongation.

This was opposed by Sr. Silva,
who said he hoped the Report would
be ready in a few days.

The Bill was then approved in
general and in detail.

Sr. Flores then made a lengthy
and rather rambling speech in which
he called attention to the statements
that had been published respecting
the alleged secret mission of Sr.
Hordenana to Europe to solicit the
assistance of the European powers in
maintaining the neutrality of Urugu-
ay in case of war between Argen-
tina and Chili. This, he said, had
provoked from the press, including
the leading papers of Buenos Aires,
comments unfavorable not only to
the credit of the Government but to
the dignity of the country itself. He
concluded by moving that the Min-
ister of Foreign Affairs be invited
to the Chamber to give information
on the matter. If reserve was found
necessary the sitting could be
declared secret.

Sr. Zorilla opposed the motion on
the grounds that he did not believe
there was any such mission.

After some further remarks from
Sr. Flores the motion was put to the
vote and was negatived.

The Chamber then resumed dis-
cussion in detail of the Bill respect-
ing superannuation and pensioning of
public school teachers. Several fur-
ther articles were discussed and can-
dled when the hour sounded and
the sitting closed.

Politeama Theatre.

The Japs have made another grand
conquest. Pati herself could not
have drawn a larger or more fabu-
lous audience than that which
packed the Politeama Theatre from
floor to skylight on Thursday eve-
ning to witness the debut of Mr.
Comelli's Imperial Japanese Troupe.

Whether this was due to a desire to
applaud the conquerors of China, or
merely to the long recess there has
been from entertainments, we can
not say, but there the people
were in their hundreds and even
thousands, and Mr. Comelli beamed
with satisfaction from every
inch of his portly frame as the
crowds came rolling in. And yet
Sarah Bernhardt, Coquelin and
Novelli have played here to half-empty
houses. But they never conquered
China.

The performance gave thorough
satisfaction. It cannot be said there
was anything strikingly new in the
feats presented, but there was no
weak point, and every trick or item
was performed with that extraor-
dinary neatness and unflinching dex-
terity that have made the Japs
the wonders of this description.
Some of the balancing was truly
marvellous, and there was one
Japanese gentleman, the richness
of his apparel suggests that he
was a near relation to the Mikado,
who lay on his back, and tossed
swords, vases, nippers, umbrellas
and other unlikely articles, about
with his feet in a most bewildering
manner. And the nippers, the little
Japs, with their comical faces, shrill

cries and their imperturbable gravity
even when revolved in the
air like teetotums, they were the
delight of every one, and especial-
ly of the young folk. There
were only two or three of them, but
they contributed a lion's share of
the evening's diversion. The cos-
tumes worn, resplendent in gold
embroidery and brilliant colours,
were really very fine, and we are
sure every lady present longed for
an opportunity for closer examination
of these beautiful and artistic stuffs.
We can only reproach Mr. Comelli
with one deficiency in his Company.
He should have brought a few of the
pretty little Japanese women with
him. If they did no more than sit
on the stage in their picturesque
costumes and fan themselves, they
would add to the success of the even-
ing. There was an orchestra, but it
did not achieve the precision and
dexterity of the Japanese performers.
—We wish it did.

The Company appear for the next
four nights and on Sunday afternoon,
and we heartily recommend a visit.
We noticed a considerable number
of English faces in the Theatre on
Thursday.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives held a full
sitting on Thursday and passed a
Bill indefinitely extending the mor-
atorium of the National Bank. No one
thought it worth while to comment
on the neglect of the Executive,
which, knowing the moratorium was
about to expire, delayed presenting
its Bills, although it had ample
time for their preparation. On the
contrary, the Chamber would not
even adopt an amendment defining
the extension, and thus if the
Bills fail to pass, the Bank is
now qualified to sail on in perpe-
tual moratorium until the walls col-
lapse—or the fire occurs.

This feat performed, Deputy Flores
attempted to move an interpellation
of the Minister of Foreign Affairs
respecting the alleged diplomat-
ic mission of Sr. Hordenana, to
which we have referred previously.
The matter is one closely affecting
the national dignity, but the Cham-
ber refused to be interested in it
and negatived the motion. It would
not even trouble itself to ask
for definite information. This is one
more instance of the abdication of
legislative duties and prerogatives,
and equally an instance of the defect
of the system that makes an im-
portant interpellation dependent on
the vote of the majority and thus
obstructs independent legislators in
the performance of their duty.

There is little movement of report
from the Government House. Pre-
paration for the Budget is said to
continue. The lazaret scandal has
been the subject of treatment, to
which we refer elsewhere.

The *Siglo* of Thursday evening
had a political article headed "Rum-
ours" that has excited no little
comment. According to this a rup-
ture is imminent between President
Borda and ex-president Julio Hor-
rera. The bone of contention, it
is said, is the Luther contract for
the Port Studies. Dr. Herrera
has been intriguing to prevent
this being carried out, wishing
to prefer a scheme in which he
is more closely interested, and this has
angered Sr. Borda. Another motive
of divergence between the two
powers is said to be the ap-
proaching renewal of the seal fish-
ing concession. There are vari-
ous circumstances that give col-
our to the story, such as the know-
ledge that Dr. Herrera's special cir-
cle is by no means satisfied with
the situation, and the sudden volte-
face almost amounting to a direct
attack on the Government made
by Dr. Herrera's special organ
the *Heraldo* in reference to the
lazaret business. The *Siglo* further
says that Sr. Borda is feeling the way
for an alliance with General Tajes
party, which accounts for the recent
visit of General Munos to the
Government House. We shall watch
the matter with curiosity, though at
present it is rather too immature and
uncertain for comment. So far, we
should say, it is little more than
a quarrel over the division of the
spoils. There is an old proverb that
when thieves fall out, honest men
come by their own, but it might be
considered personal to apply it in
the present instance.

Respecting the annual Law of
Stamps and Stamped Paper, it is
said that the only reform proposed
this year is the introduction of much
severer penalties for infractions. We
had hoped for something better than
this from a Finance Minister who is
an experienced man of business. This
and other tributary laws are full of
petty, antiquated and unnecessary
details all of which act as obstruc-
tions to the free performance of
business. They seem to be framed in
the conception that business or in-
dustry is a public offense to be fined
and hindered at every step. No one
should appreciate this better than
the present Minister of Finance, and
no one is better qualified to give the
whole system the broad and radical
reform it requires, if he chose to bring
himself to the task.

THE QUARANTINE SCANDAL.

The lazaret abuses were men-
tioned, though not in formal Council,
between the President and his Min-
isters in the Government House on
Thursday. The report goes that one
or two of the Ministers did not hesi-
tate to express themselves strongly
respecting the exorbitant accounts
that have given rise to so much
criticism. This, however, does not
rest on official basis. We understand
that the Minister of War undertook
to enquire into the matter. It is
to be hoped that his enquiry
will be conducted in a differ-
ent manner to that he made
some three months ago into the
abuses in the general lazaret,
when the only persons examined
were the purveyors and other parties
responsible for the abuses.

Respecting this important topic
we translate the following strong
remarks from yesterday's *Razon*.
After asking whether the Govern-
ment really intends to act with good
faith in a matter which has made so
profound and disastrous an impres-
sion both here and abroad, the *Razon*
proceeds:—"It is believed that the
purveying firm of Iriarri and Co.
is the centre of a more or less
official ring interested in swelling
by any means the profits of the La-
zaret, and this supposition is streng-
thened by the notice of concrete facts
denounced some time ago but which
the competent authorities did not at
once correct. Mariners and tugs of the
Marine Commandancy have effected
the transport of provisions, which
should have been done by the purvey-
ors at their own cost. For several
months the treatment of the quaran-
tined has been something incredible,
although the contract ordains that it
should be equal to that of the best
hotels in Montevideo. The tariff for
"extras," amongst which even
eggs are included, contains stupe-
fying prices. The service for the
disinfection of infected vessels is
performed with arbitrary delay,
and when any patients from an
epidemic disease are landed at the
"dirty lazaret," although they may
be steerage passengers, it seems that
each of them eats and drinks like a
legion of epicures in full health and
not accustomed to think of the
expense. The two accounts that have
been analysed by the press are
more than sufficient to justify
the presumption that the pur-
veyors have come to think them-
selves omnipotent.—This is the
true situation of the matter. The
Government may try to deceive
itself, but it will not deceive the
country. Vague declarations and
andouze notes will only serve to
confirm the public mistrust. It is
necessary for the Government to
show that it desires to sound the
truth of all the abuses denounced
and to apply to them an effective
remedy. The best thing, in this
case, would be the appointment of
a committee of respectable per-
sons charged with making a con-
scientious enquiry and with propos-
ing the measures reclaimed by ad-
ministrative morality as well as by
the good conduct of the Lazaret, so
that it may cease to be a South
American scandal. Only by this,
or by something still more rad-
ical, will Sr. Borda succeed in
dispelling the unhealthy atmo-
sphere in which this affair has
enveloped the commencement of his
administration. No one is more in-
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we are wrong, the country is equally

We have omitted to mention that
the free transit of Argentine live-
stock for Uruguayan Saladeros has
been reestablished. This had been
interrupted by the quarantines, great-
ly to the prejudice of the upriver
saladeros, some of which stopped
working in consequence. But Sr.
Sera, agent of the Harriague Sala-
dero interviewed Colonel Muro, Com-
mandant General of Marine, on the
subject, and Col. Muro said that
the suspension was solely due to
a misinterpretation of orders.
There was no intention of stopping
the transit of live-stock on account
of the cholera in Concordia, it was
only intended to take extra pre-
cautions in the operation. It is a
pity this was not explained sooner.
There is nothing new to report
respecting the lifting of the quaran-
tines, that highly desirable event
seems as far off as ever.

THE PODESTA RAILROAD.

The Commercial Judge Dr. E.
Garzon has issued a lengthy sentence
in this matter, finally quashing the
application for a moratorium. The
Judge reduces the actual claims of
the Banks, for balances in current
account, protested bills and other
matters now due over and above to
the following: British Bank, \$134,668;
Commercial Bank, \$55,669; London
Bank, \$49,935; Italian Bank, \$39,974;
London and Brazilian Bank, \$25,924;
Anglo Argentine Bank, \$26,500;
Spanish Bank, \$9,927, total, \$342,378.
The properties surrendered are valua-
ed as follows, house in calle Dayman,
\$38,743; house calle 18 de Julio
240 to 245, \$27,657; lands in Egu-
rita, Camino Gose and Rivera,
\$52,938; total \$169,244. The Judge
dismisses as not proven the plea
that the failure was due to extrai-

diary and unforeseen circumstances
the allegations on this head being
vague and unsubstantial, nor are
they supported by the correspon-
dence. The true cause of the suspen-
sion was the withdrawal of credit on
the part of the Banks of the Capital
on leading that the firm was secretly
substituting its values in the social
capital, and the deceptions practised
by Sr. Luisa Podesta senior. The
assets of the Judge reduces to a total
of \$322,127, against liabilities of
\$489,753, so that a moratorium
would not enable the firm to
pay its creditors in full. The question
of bad faith is reserved for another
occasion, when the bankrupts will
be called upon to make their defence.
Finally, the Judge declares the com-
mercial situation of the firm to be
not one of backwardness and tem-
porary difficulties, but one of ruti-
ne and perpetual insolvency, and
on these grounds he refuses the
moratorium.

SUNDRIES.

The Ferrari Italian Opera Com-
pany left Genoa for the River Plate
on Monday last. As usual they will
first perform in Buenos Aires.

At the approaching Consistory
the Pope will name three new Car-
dinals, and it is anticipated that one
of them will be a South American.

Telegrams from Cairo state that
important archeological discoveries
have been made in the vicinity of
the oasis Khardieh (Upper Egypt).
Several distinguished engineers have
left for that region.

Portalis, the French editor of the
Lyne Siegle, whose extradition to
France the Argentine Government
recently refused for want of suffi-
cient proof against him, has slipped
away to Chile, where he passes in
Valparaiso as M. Ramadier, a French
merchant, travelling for pleasure.

Lord Hobhouse's Sunday Bill,
which we mention elsewhere, pro-
mises to do away with one of the
monstrosities of English legislation
respecting Sunday recreation, and
we hope it will soon be followed by
the kindred Bill for opening Mu-
seums and Art Galleries on Sunday.

We know of few things more ab-
surdly hypocritical than the Sab-
batarianism which leaves the ta-
vers openwhilst closing the door
upon wholesome diversion, whether
physical, intellectual or artistic.
Fortunately for religion and common
sense Sabbatarianism is rapidly be-
coming an error of the past.

The *New York Tribune*, which
is one of the most solid and respon-
sible of American papers, speaks as
follows, respecting British rule in
Egypt:—"Whatever may be thought
of England's original seizure of
Egypt, thirteen years ago, and how-
ever much Mr. Gladstone's action
therein may be condemned, one great
fact seems indisputable. That is,
than British rule in Egypt has
been incalculably beneficial, and
that is true, not merely with regard
to the foreign bondholders, for
whose interests Mr. Gladstone was so
sollicitous, but even more with
regard to the Egyptian people. The
whole government administration
has been reformed in the interest of
justice and economy; the debt has
been refunded; taxes have been
decreased; important public works
have been executed, and the annual
budget shows a handsome surplus.
These results may not be altogether
welcome to the hords of Arab and
Turkish politicians, who had long
plundered and oppressed the peo-
ple at will, but the people them-
selves appreciate them gratefully
and regard their British protectors
with confidence and affection." Not-
withstanding this frank acknowl-
edgment, any hint of establishing a
humble rule in South America, where
it is quite as much wanted, for the
sake of bondholders and of people, as
in Egypt, seems to fill the average N.
American mind with inexplicable
horror.

In a few weeks high social
circles in Buenos Aires will witness
the marriage between Mr. Fermin
Irigoyen, son of Senator Bernardo de
Irigoyen and the distinguished Miss
Laura Liendo of Montevideo.

The Buenos Aires Amateur
Drama Club, says a contemporary
report, make a good start this season
in the way of their club performances
and will begin the year with the
two-act comedy by Andrew Hall day
entitled "Checkmate," which is a
most amusing piece. The principal
characters will be played by Mrs.
Kratke, Miss Bagley and Messrs
Ceol McKean, W. G. Mackern and
Louis Longfield, while the minor
parts will bring out some new talent.
This will most probably be follow-
ed by a three-act comedy, but nothing
has yet been definitely settled. The
first performance will be due about
the 20th of May, rehearsals having
commenced already.

The dislike of the Roman Cath-
olic Church for Freemasonry has
found expression in the publication
of a series of violent attacks on
Freemasonry in a Lyons newspaper
called "La France Libre," which has
a Roman Catholic editor. Freemasons
in Lyons have been the subject of
personal denunciations. Lists of
names have been given, and em-
ployers have been exhorted to have
nothing to do with those who were
thus denounced. Among the persons
thus brought into prominence is an
organist at one of the Lyons churches,
and the result was that he was
dismissed from his employment. In
consequence of this he has brought
an action for libel against the paper,
claiming 3,000 francs damages. A
printer who is also aggrieved in the
same way has brought an action to
recover 2,000 francs. The case, which
attracted to the court a large gather-
ing of priests and friends of the
Clerical party, resulted in a verdict
for the plaintiffs for the amount
claimed, but judgement was post-
poned.

Sir W. H. Wills, Liberal, and Mr. Gore, Independent, were nominated yesterday for Bristol East.

Witnesses gave evidence before the Committee on the Unemployed, yesterday, with regard to the distress caused at Pontypool and Swansea by the partial stoppage of tinplate works.

Disturbances are reported to have occurred at Leicester, Northampton, and Irthlingborough, in connection with the struggle in the shoe trade, the demonstrations in all cases being directed against non-union operatives engaged in federated factories. In the two former towns some stone-throwing by youths accompanied the demonstrations, but owing to the intervention of a sufficient force of police the disturbances did not assume very threatening proportions. A Correspondent at Leicester sees no prospect of a speedy settlement of the conflict.

The London County at its meeting yesterday reappointed most of its committees, the membership being tolerably equally divided between the Progressive and Moderate parties. A paragraph in the Fire Brigade Committee's report suggested that an increased estimate should be passed in connection with the proposed construction by the Works Committee of the new fire station at Fulham. Mr. Westcott moved an amendment in favour of inviting tenders from contractors. This having been negatived by 62 votes against 56, the recommendation of the Committee was adopted. It was agreed that the London Valuation and Assessment Bill should be reconsidered by the Parliamentary Committee, with a view to its being brought before the Council in form agreeable to both parties. A Committee's recommendation raised the question of Sir Peter Edlin's position. Mr. Kitchin moved to compel the Council to exercise the power it is seeking to grant Sir Peter a pension. This amendment, which also sought to fix the amount of the pension, was rejected by 59 votes against 55.

Li Hung-Chang arrived yesterday at Simonoseki, and was received on landing by a representative of the Japanese Foreign Office. It is believed that the attack by Chinese bands on the Japanese at Chiu-lun may give the latter a pretext for landing in force in the extreme north of Corea.

In the Queen's Bench Division yesterday, Mr. Justice Hawkins and a special jury continued the hearing of the action for breach of promise of marriage brought by Miss Alice White against Mr. E. S. Ferguson. The plaintiff was cross-examined as to the circumstances under which she had visited places of public entertainment with the defendant. For the defence, it was contended that no promise had ever been made, and that the intercourse was nothing more than a flirtation. The trial was further adjourned.

There was 2,821 births and 2,817 deaths in London last week, the births being 23 and the deaths 951 above the average for the same week of the last ten years. The death rate per thousand per annum, which had been 84.0, 85.5, and 41.2 in the preceding three weeks fell last week to 83.4. Deaths attributed to influenza numbered 849, against 111, 296, and 473 in the preceding three weeks. Those from diseases of the respiratory organs declined to 1,031, having in the three previous weeks been 1,120, 1,448 and 1,366. There were only 27 deaths from diphtheria, and four from enteric fever.

Between the 1st April and the 16th inst. the receipts into the Exchequer amounted to 89,345,521.1s. as compared with 86,236,947.1s. of the corresponding period of the last financial year, and the expenditure to 88,880,493.1s., as against 85,205,922.1s. On Saturday last the Treasury balances stood at 7,845,760.1s., and on the same day in the previous year at 6,946,418.1s.

At the adjourned meeting of the directors and general court of the Bank of England yesterday, Mr. Adrian Hope made a personal statement as to some transactions he had had with the Bank, and was answered by Mr. Benson, M.P., a director.

THURSDAY, MARCH 21.

A Special Correspondent who is investigating into the Armenian atrocities sends an instalment of the evidence he has been collecting in an account of the Sassoun massacres. It was taken down from the lips of a Turkish soldier who, in the execution of his duty, was an eye-witness of the terrible scenes. The Correspondent describes the massacre of innocent people as the most fiendishly premeditated outrage that has ever fouled the pages of modern history.

In the House of Commons yesterday the Municipal Franchise (Ireland) Bill, which would give to Irish municipalities reforms long enjoyed in England and Scotland, was read a second time and referred to the Grand Committee on Law. A Bill to amend the system under which justices of the peace are appointed was supported by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, who further said that the Lord Chancellor viewed it with favour. On a division it was read a second time by a majority of 38—201 votes to 163.

In the absence, through illness, of Lord Rosebery, the Lord Chancellor presided last night at the Hotel Metropole, over a festival dinner, given in aid of the Evelina Hospital for Sick Children, Southwark Bridge-road, S.E. Subscriptions were announced to the amount of 2,550.1s., including a donation of 1,000.1s. from Baron F. de Rothschild. M.P. (the founder), and one of 500.1s. from the Prime Minister.

Mr. Asquith delivered his presidential address to the Cambridge

and County Liberal Club last night. In his speech he dwelt on the question of Welsh Disestablishment and Disendowment, and on the attitude of the Unionist party towards the Government on the question of the Indian import duties.

A Correspondent who is describing the struggle in the shoe trade yesterday visited Stafford and made inquiries as to the reason why that town, whose speciality as the manufacture of "best" and "medium" ladies' goods, has not hitherto been affected by the strike. In Leicester matters have been quiet, but the prospect of any peaceable settlement seems as remote as ever. Mr. Labourer has addressed a letter of Mr. Griffiths, chairman to the Masters' Federation, announcing that Mr. Childers, Sir Charles Dilke, Sir Henry James, Mr. Mundella, and Sir Alber Rolit had consented to sit on a board of arbitration to deal with all questions submitted either by the Federation or the Union. He has received a reply which does not make the chances of an immediate settlement very hopeful. There have been further disturbances at Northampton. Mr. Inskip, secretary of the men's organization, is confined to his house with influenza.

A tremendous explosion of dynamite occurred on Tuesday evening on the Rhine not far from Cleves. Two boats, containing about 15 tons of the explosive, were blown into the air, and a third took fire and was also destroyed. Six persons were killed. Considerable damage was done to property in the neighbourhood, and the shock was felt at great distances from the spot.

There were a couple of county football matches yesterday. Surrey won a Rugby game with Sussex at Croydon by 12 points to five, and Hampshire beat Kent under Association Rules by eight goals to one.

Mr. A. C. Langham opened an inquest yesterday on the remains of William Holbrook, the gardener who was killed by the explosion of a cylinder of compressed oxygen at Fenchurch-street railway station on Friday last. Evidence was given to the effect that three minutes before the explosion Holbrook was sitting on a seat at the station lighting his pipe, and it was suggested that at the time of the explosion he had cylinder under his arm. Witnesses were also heard as to the railway regulations with regard to the carriage of explosives, the inquiry being then adjourned for a week. It is hoped that Dr. Dupré will be called on behalf of the Home Office.

In the Queen's Bench Division yesterday, the hearing of Miss White's action for breach of promise of marriage against Mr. E. S. Ferguson was resumed and concluded. The defendant, in cross-examination by Mr. Finlay, admitted that on receipt of a telegram from the plaintiff stating that she was in great distress, he himself, when in Cardiff, wrote a reply in the name of his clerk, alleging that he was in Spain. Counsel having addressed the Court, Mr. Justice Hawkins summed up, and the jury, without leaving the box, found a verdict for the plaintiff with 500.1s. damages. Judgement was entered accordingly, with costs.

The prosecution of four directors and an auditor of the Balfour group of companies was continued at the Guildhall before Mr. Alderman Davies. Mr. Mathews, who prosecuted for the Treasury at the instance of the Official Receiver, announced that further charges would be brought against Mr. Brock, Major Wright, and Mr. Coldwells of making false entries and publishing false balance sheets of the Building Societies Company, and of conspiracy with Jabez Balfour in respect of the Liberator Society. He then opened that part of the case relating to the Liberator Building Society, and evidence in support of his statements will be heard to-day.

Four stockbrokers were yesterday charged at the Guildhall Police-court with disorderly conduct, and two of them with assault on the police. The case arose out of the crowded state of Throgmorton-street when the Stock Exchange is closed, and the attempts of the police to keep a clear passage for foot and other traffic. Two of the defendants were discharged. The others were fined 10.1s. and 6.1s. respectively.

A NEW SUNDAY BILL.

Lord Hobhouse has brought into the House of Lords a Bill to amend an Act passed in the year 1781 for "preventing certain Abuses and Prophanations on the Lord's Day called Sunday." This Act is still law, and in a prosecution lately undertaken at Leeds the jury expressed the opinion that it should be repealed, and the Judge—Mr. Justice Mathew—signified his agreement with them. A lecture had been delivered in a hall in Leeds on a Sunday afternoon on "The Distinctive Characteristics of the English, Scotch, and Irish People." The audience were admitted by payments at the door, or by tickets previously bought. This taking of money, though it was only for the purpose of meeting the expenses, and not for profit, constituted the hall a disorderly house under the Act, and the jury were reluctantly obliged to find a verdict to that effect. This verdict exposed the keeper of the lot house to a penalty of 200.1s.; the manager, conductor, and chairman to a penalty of 100.1s.; and the door-keeper, servant, or person who receives money or tickets, to a fine of 50.1s., the fines to go to the person suing. In the Leeds case the three gentlemen sued were held by Mr. Justice Mathew, and afterwards by the Court of Appeal, not to be the responsible persons, and the prosecution broke down on that ground alone. But the law remains, and, on Sundays, public lectures or discussions on any subject whatever to which persons are admitted for money are as completely under the

ban as public entertainments or amusements. It is not proposed to repeal the law, but only to amend it. Lord Hobhouse's Bill has only two enacting clauses. It provides, in the first place, that the Act of 1781 shall not apply to lectures, addresses, or science, ethics, social duties, literature, art, or any kindred subject, whether followed by discussion or not, nor to music, if the proceeds are undertaken by their promoters with a view to the public good, and not by way of trade or for the pecuniary benefit of the promoters. The Bill further provides that no prosecution under the Act of 1781 shall be undertaken without the previous consent in writing of the Attorney-General. There are probably very few persons in the present day who will object to these wise and reasonable modifications of the law. Without repealing the Act of 1781, as the Leeds jury suggested, Lord Hobhouse's Bill does all that the jurymen had in view. It legalises such Sunday Lectures as are provided by the Sunday Lecture Society at St. George's Hall, and such as those which were the subject of the Leeds prosecution. While it thus gives liberty of action to public spirited persons who get up courses of lectures, it leaves no opening for traders in amusement. Under the present law a preacher who held a Plesant Sunday Afternoon in his schoolroom, and charged a penny entrance, might find himself liable to heavy fines. The sole question is the one of charge. Anything seems to be legal on Sunday if no charge is made; Lord Hobhouse merely proposes to allow a charge to be made in certain carefully defined cases, provided that no pecuniary profit is desired or made.—Daily News.

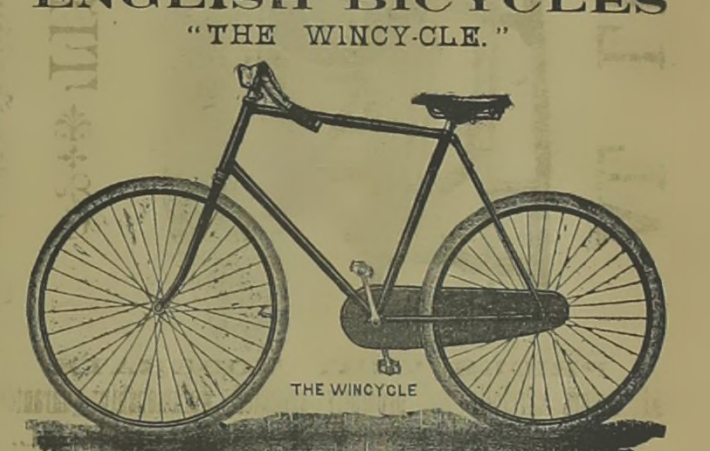
