POLITICAL NOTES.

The Chamber of Senators was
convened to a sitting on Wed-
nesday, and no quorum with entire
success.

There was a fair amount of move-
ment in the Government House on
Wednesday, and the President and
Ministers were the recipients of
several visitors in relation to
various pending matters.

It is announced that payment of
the local obligations for September
has at length concluded and that for
October has been commenced, in
cash, with the Legislative body.
This would appear as if the Min-
ister of Finance had changed his views
respecting the issue of Treasury
Certificates, though they must be
nearly printed by this time. As
January is now at an end, the hope
set forth by the official papers of
bringing these payments up to date
about February is as far from
realisation as ever. They are still
four months in arrears, and we seem
to be losing rather than gaining
ground. The payments from the
Custom House to the London Bank
have been \$329,143 against \$311,818
on the same date last month, so, in
so far as this is a criterion, the im-
provement in the Customs Receipts
has been very slight.

There has been one of the period-
ical revivals of rumours of political
and administrative changes, for
which, it is said, the return of the
Minister of War from the frontier
will be the signal. According to
these rumours, General Diaz will
abandon his portfolio to receive a
diplomatic post in Europe (we
are not aware of any vacancy),
and will be succeeded by Colonel
Zenon Tezanos, in whom the Pres-
ident reposes great confidence. The
place of Col. Tezanos as Chief of
the Light Artillery will be taken by
Col. Abella, and Sr. Federico Diaz
will succeed the latter as Chief of
Police of Montevideo. Several im-
portant changes are also anticipated
among the Departmental Jefe's Po-
litical. We repeat these rumours be-
cause they are very generally current,
and for once there is not much
diversity in the versions, but re-
membering past experience, we think
it as well to place them in quarantine
until verified by facts. No definite
date is yet given for the return of
the Minister of War from the frontier,
though he was expected this week.

Most of our contemporaries of yester-
day refer at some length to
the threatened new coin-
age of silver, and all agree
that it will be productive of
serious inconveniences to the market.
At present, points out the *Telegrafo*,
there is fully \$3,000,000 of silver
in the Republic, or \$360 per head of
the population. Adding another mil-
lion, there will be \$5 per head, ob-
viously a great excess, treating of
money only intended for small
change. At present silver is at a
discount of 1.50 to 2% in relation to
gold currency, but then the Law
fixing the maximum of silver

allowable in payments has only
been enforced in the banks and
revenue offices, gold being rarely
seen except for payments of \$40 or
\$50 and upwards. Even this is a
cause of loss to those who, receiving
most of their receipts in silver, have
to pay gold in to the banks or for
remittance abroad. With the issue
of another million it is certain that
the Law would be more generally
enforced and all persons who could
would refuse to receive silver pay-
ments above the legal maximum.

This would rapidly send silver
to a depreciation of 10 or even
20%, and the loss and inconvenience
caused would become very serious,
though the money changers would
find it very profitable. The profit
according to the Government is in-
sufficient to redeem one month of
the local obligations in arrears, and for
this transitory benefit it is proposed
to inflict on the market an injury
and inconvenience that may be felt
for several years to come. It is al-
ready eighteen months or more
since the last million was issued by
Dr. Herrera, and the discount on
that has remained steady, showing
plainly that the capacity of the mar-
ket to consume more silver has not
increased, and that it still suffers
from a plethora. The Government
might give some relief by allowing
silver to be received to any amount
in the Custom House and revenue
offices, but this it does not do, insist-
ing on receiving gold whilst gener-
ally paying silver, and no doubt
making a profit out of the difference.

Referring to the silver question,
the *Siglo* says that the contract (at 62
cents to the silver dollar) is a bad
one for the State. The latest quota-
tion of silver bars is 27 1/2 d. to the
standard ounce, at which rate the
silver necessary for coining a million
dollars would cost \$417,335 gold.
Adding 7% for expenses and 3%
for commission, the total cost would
be \$459,944, leaving to the State
a profit of some \$540,000, instead
of the \$380,000 of the present con-
tract. The *Razon*, however, regards
the present contract as more pro-
fitable than those of the Herrera
administration—and so it ought to
be, remembering the steady de-
preciation in the value of silver.

Both papers await more definite
knowledge of the conditions of the
contract, to give a more final judg-
ment. The official organs still pre-
serve an absolute silence as to
matter, and it is asked that they
should condescend to give some in-
formation on a matter so closely
affecting the public.

The *Siglo* and several other papers
opportunistically recall the terms of
the Law authorising the Herrera gov-
ernment to contract for silver coinage,
and on which the present contract is
also founded without further refer-
ence to the Chambers. Fortunately
this exhausts the permission, which
was for three million dollars, and no
more can be coined without fresh
legislative sanction. That law or-
dained that account should be duly
rendered to the Chambers of the
profits arising from the operation, in
order that the Chambers might
determine how those profits should
be applied. It is well known that
Dr. Herrera calmly ignored this
clause of the Law and took French
leave to apply the profits to current
administrative expenses, and appar-
ently the present Government in-
tends to follow his illegal precedent.

Part of the money is also believed to
have gone in the extensive pur-
chases of armament, supposed to be
sanctioned in some hole-and-corner
secret sitting of the Chambers, about
which there was considerable mys-
tification and mystery, and very
open hints of profitable jobbery on
the part of the persons engaged. It
is now asked, not unreasonably, that
some account should be given of
the matter, and of the way in which
these profits have been disposed of,
with or without the authority of the
Chambers.

A shameful report has been
widely circulated that the Deputy
Dr. Brian, the President's Secretary
and "herrerista" factotum, is per-
sonally "interested" in the new
contract for silver coinage. We
would not repeat such a report but
that it has found its way into most
of the papers, and in reference to it
we can only echo the following re-
marks of the *Razon*:—"It is asserted
that the Secretary of the Republic
has an interest in the negotiation. We
are sorry for it for the credit of the
administration. A confidential em-
ployee of the Chief Magistrate
should not have a pecuniary interest
in the contracts signed by that mag-
istrate. The precedent is dangerous
in the extreme, and there is no
knowing to what it may lead. The
principal officials of the ministries
might also receive toll on the
operations authorised by their
superiors, and by an extension of
this principle through the
various public, civil and military
offices, under the instigation of so
high an example, the administration
would soon be connected into an im-
mense and permanent Panama.

Therefore we hope to see at once a
categorical contradiction of the re-
port.

Yesterday's *Nacion* defends at
length the Minister of Government's
Bill of Electoral Reform from its
numerous critics, and in doing so

commits some gross misstatements
about electoral procedures in Eng-
land, which, however, we have not
the space to refute to-day.

A deputation of tanners and leath-
er manufacturers has applied to the
Minister of Foment to have their
industry represented on the Com-
missions for revision of the Customs
valuations. The request will prob-
ably be granted. Of the firms already
named to these Commissions, the fol-
lowing have refused to serve, Petit,
Seré, Bolondo and Co.; Peixoto Mor-
ales and Co.; and Francisco Vilaró and
Co. One of these firms alleged in its
refusal that it considered the propo-
sed measures too restrictive to be of
any use in relation to the importance
of the reforms necessary. Replies
are still wanting from some six
firms, the rest having accepted.

An absurd polemic has been
carried on in our contemporaries
respecting the right of priority of
the Rural Association or of the
Centre of Industry and Commerce,
to organise the proposed Industrial
Exhibition. Such a dispute will
only damage a good cause, and
perhaps prevent the Exhibition from
being carried out at all. There is
no reason whatever that the two
corporations should not work to-
gether for the desired object.

The students concerned in the
abortive manifestation of last week
have published a rather superficial
manifesto respecting their attitude
and treatment. The matter has
already been discussed in the press
ad nauseam, and although the ex-
cessive violence of the police has
generally and severely condemned, it
cannot be forgotten that the students
put themselves in the wrong in the
first instance, by deliberate dis-
obedience, uncalculated and absurd
under the circumstances, of the
orders of the constituted authorities.

If they were not satisfied with their
treatment they should have taken
the proper courses of appeal.

**Terrific Collision—330 Persons
Drowned.**

Yesterday's telegrams brought
news of a terrible maritime catas-
trophe occurred off the Needles, Isle
of Wight, on Wednesday morning.

The first-class passenger steamer
"Elbe" of the Nord-Deutscher Lloyd,
which had left Bremen the day be-
fore for New York, was run into
amidships by a small British steamer
the "Orathie," and sank immediately.

The weather was very rough, and
only one boat full of survivors,
numbering 24, reached Lowestoft
to tell the story. The remainder of
the passengers and crew, some 350
in number, were all lost.

The collision occurred in the early morn-
ing, before daybreak, when nearly
everyone was in bed. The news has
caused great consternation in
Bremen, the passengers being mostly
German or North American and the
crew all German. A later telegram
says that the "Elbe" sank in twenty
minutes, the number of victims being
330, of whom 163 belonged to the
crew. Owing to the intense dark-
ness the scene was one of terrible
confusion, whilst the cold rendered
manoeuvring difficult. The "Orathie"
has arrived at Aberdeen, where the
captain reported collision with an
unknown vessel that sank at once,
and alleged that he was unable to
render assistance owing to the dark-
ness and rough weather. The "Elbe"
was one of the finest vessels of the
German merchant service, register-
ing 4510 tons, and was built, like
her namesake of the Royal Mail
service, by John Elder and Co. of
Glasgow, in 1881. She had a val-
uable cargo on board. The
"Orathie" is a small tug of only 475
tons, and it is astonishing that she
should have been able to sink the
"Elbe" without seriously disabling
herself.

SUNDRIES.

We are asked to state that to-
morrow (Saturday) being the Feast
of the Purification of the Virgin
Mary, there will be Matins and
Ante-Communion Service at Holy
Trinity Church at 10 a.m. On Sun-
day, Communion will be celebrated
at 12.15 p.m., and there will be no
service at 8 a.m. Harvest Festival
Services will be held on Sunday,
February 17.

The *B. A. Standard*, with its
usual previousness, informs its
readers that the Athletic Associa-
tion of Uruguay "has died a natural
death." As is rather frequently the
case of late, the *Standard* is utterly
wrong, for the Association in ques-
tion is practically not born yet, and
is only awaiting the general meet-
ing that is formally to call it into
existence from its present embryonic
state. After that obstetric operation
has been performed, the *Standard*
will probably find the Association
very much alive and kicking.

At the meeting of subscribers to
the British Episcopal Church, held in
the British Consulate on Wednesday,
the outgoing trustees were re-elected
for the current year, namely Messrs.
F. Henderson (treasurer) R. Win-
gate and James Towers. The Act of

Parliament regulating their proceed-
ings was made known to several of
those present for the first time, and
it was resolved that it should be
more strictly complied with in the
future. We regret to say that the
financial position of the Church is not
so good as might be desired.

We have always regarded ju-
venile cigarette smoking as one of
the worst evils of this country,
and in fact look upon it as large-
ly responsible for the want of
mental, physical and moral balance
so frequently seen in both youths
and men here. We therefore
copy with entire approval the
following remarks from the *B. A.*
Standard.—"Here's a point in which
Argentina might imitate her big
sister in the North to great advan-
tage. The evils entailed by allow-
ing boys to smoke are now fully un-
derstood in the United States, at least in
New York, where boys under 16
caught smoking in the pub-
lic streets are now liable to
arrest under a new and very wise
law, which also provides a penalty
for tobaccoists who sell cigarettes
to minors. Here, it is downright
painful to see how small boys smoke
with the aplomb of a man of 40. In
good society, however, boys never
smoke before their parents, whatever
they do behind their backs. The
after consequences of premature
smoking in boys are terrible—im-
paired memory, dyspepsia, anemia,
loss of vital power when men, stun-
ted growth, and many other evils.

There is now a great hub-bub in
New York on the subject, and we
commend the following paragraph
to the Board of Education:—"J. El-
ward Swanstrom, President of the
Brooklyn Board of Education, in
speaking to a reporter for The
New York Times in reference
to the cigarette nuisance yester-
day, said:—'I am in hearty
sympathy with the resolution of
Colonel Culyer. The cigarette habit
among the boys in the public schools
has been growing of late, and it is
high time that it was stopped. The
smoking of cigarettes by public
school boys renders them incapable
of properly attending to their les-
sons, it has a tendency to impair
their faculties, and it is injurious
to their physical being. It makes
them drowsy. In many cases the
parents do not know of the evil
habit which their sons are con-
tracting, and the boys take care
that their parents will not find the
cigarettes in their clothing. I hope
the police Commissioner will enforce
the matter, as it is in the best in-
terests of the city.'"

The R. M. S. "Thames" left
Rio Janeiro on Wednesday and
therefore should arrive to-morrow.

A Stink of Iniquity is the
happy misprint by which a Buenos
Aires contemporary refers to the
lazaret at Flores Island.

We make our best Sunday bow
to the *B. A. Standard* in return for
its highly complimentary references
to our recent articles on the re-
signation of Dr. Saenz Peña.

The Captain of the British
Steamer "Olympo" has published a
very severe letter in the *Times* of
Argentina about the inhuman treat-
ment he received from the health
authorities in Brazil. As the question
is one of public interest, we will re-
produce the letter in our next issue.

A Cairo telegram says that the
Egyptian press accuse the British
administration of not complying
with its promises, of increasing the
taxation, and creating unnecessary
posts for English occupants. Rubbish.

An exceedingly severe storm is
reported from the North Sea, causing
many wrecks of fishing craft.

The German Landtag is now
discussing the Bill limiting the right
of association and meeting. Restrict-
ions of the people's liberties and in-
crease of their burdens seem to be
the principal occupations of the
German government under the pre-
sent Emperor, whose ideas are decid-
edly anti-progressive.

Notwithstanding the terrible
example recently given by the
lamented death of Dr. L. V. Lopez,
which ought to have been sufficient
to banish the barbarous practice
of duelling for some time, a
duel with pistols was fought
yesterday morning on the Camino
Piedras Blancas, between Sr. Carlos
Blizzen and Sr. Victor Arreguine, on
account of some "personal" causes.

Two shots were exchanged at twenty
five paces, happily without effect,
and then every one embraced. Four
seconds and two doctors assisted at
this breach of the law. The police
were conspicuous by their absence,
and we do not suppose any one will
be punished, even by public opinion.

A third and final performance
of the infantile production of "La
Verbena" will be given in the Solis
Theatre on Sunday next.

General Madriaga is reported as
rather better, with hopes of recovery.
His marriage in *extremis* seems to
have done him good.

Affairs in Rio Janeiro are re-
ported as quiet, owing to the string-
ent measures taken by the Govern-
ment to repress the lawless partisans
of Peixoto, but it is expected that
President Moraes will take the op-
portunity of changing his Ministers
in favor of men of greater energy
and of more decided anti-Peixoto

antecedents. He does not like ex-
presidents—nor do we.

The death has occurred of Don
Ricardo Alvarez, for many years a
member of the Chambers in the
"blanco" interest.

The Custom House paid \$19,969
into the London Bank yesterday on
account of the foreign debt service.

From London telegrams we
learn that the Government has
bought up the rights of the East
Africa Company, and will shortly
send large reinforcements to their
colonies.—The *Admiralty Gazette*
asserts Mr. Chamberlain has formally
joined the Conservative party, and
will probably be named First Lord of
the Admiralty in the next Conserva-
tive Cabinet.

BUENOS AIRES.

During 1894, there were regis-
tered in the Capital 25,886 births,
13726 deaths and 5024 marriages.
The fees received by the Civil Re-
gistry amounted to \$208,190. This
sum includes \$5004 for marriage
liberates, which, according to the law,
ought to be delivered free.

Sunday was the Saint's day of
San Fernando and was a great day
in that aristocratic town. The Church
was the centre of attraction, where
services were held all day, the re-
ligious services being relieved by
lotteries, fireworks, the music of
brass bands, greased pole climbing
and other sacred services ap-
propriate to Sunday and a Saint's
day.

On Monday, Colonel Espina, in
private dress, and General Reynolds,
in uniform, called on the Chief of
the Staff, and afterwards had an in-
terview of half an hour's duration with
the President of the Republic.

A manifestation in honour of
Benjamin Zorrilla was made on Mon-
day in the saloons of the National
Council of Education, where all the
schoolmasters and schoolmistresses
of the public schools of the Capital,
many teachers and others attended
to hear a farewell address delivered
by the Secretary of the Council, Sr.
Mori, to which Dr. Zorrilla replied
in an eloquent speech.

About 200 dressmakers held a
meeting on Sunday for the purpose
of forming a society for mutual pro-
tection. As a preliminary measure,
a provisional committee was formed,
consisting of Sras. Mausolle, Camisi,
Gudoy, Morel de Beron and Gonzalez.
Another meeting will be held next
Sunday.

We have been informed that
Mrs. Webber of Suipacha (widow of
Mr. James Webber, who died a short
time ago) has received a letter from
General Osborn announcing that the
lawsuit commenced by her deceased
husband, many years ago, against
the Municipality of Chicago, for

the nature of the country; all that is wanting is a "scab law" similar to that which existed in Australia, and a determination, equal to that of the Australians, for inexorably enforcing its provisions.—*B. A. Herald.*

A very sad death occurred on Tuesday in the common lodging-house at Garay 2545. A girl, 18 years of age, was attacked in the morning by symptoms of cholera. Such was the panic, by which her own family and the other inmates of the building were seized, that they one and all abandoned her in the most cruel manner to her fate. When the doctor arrived the girl was found already dead, lying in a corner of one of the rooms. All her clothes had been removed by her heartless family along with their goods and chattels, so that it has not yet been even possible to ascertain who she was. A man was also found in a street in Flores, apparently ill with cholera. He stated that he had on the previous day arrived from Moron, and was at once removed to the lazaretto. These are the only cases which were reported in the city. In Rosario 2 fresh cases are announced and one on board a vessel recently arrived there from Buenos Aires.

A telegram from Chile states that the Deputies have agreed to increase the guarantee on the Clark Railway by £100,000.—*B. A. Standard.*

LONDON NOTES.

TUESDAY, JAN. 1.

This morning is published a list of the New Year Honours. Mr. Cecil Rhodes is to be sworn of the Privy Council. Baronets are conferred on Mr. John Barran, M.P., Mr. George Newnes, M.P., Dr. J. Russell Reynolds, and Dr. John Erio Erichsen. Nine gentlemen, including Mr. John Baker, M.P., Dr. A. C. Mackenzie, President of the Royal Academy of Music and Mr. Charles Scooter, General Manager of the London and South Western Railway, receive knighthoods. A number of promotions and appointments in the several orders of distinction are also announced.

Both parties held meetings in the Evening Division last evening, but no very elaborate arrangements have yet been made for the election work. It is expected that the poll will take place three or four weeks hence.

Watch-night Services were held last night in many of the Metropolitan churches and Nonconformist places of worship. St Paul's and Westminster Abbey were amongst those in which special services were not conducted.

The third fancy dress ball of the season was held at Covent Garden Theatre last night.

No further catastrophes of any note are reported as the result of the gales and snowstorms of Friday night and Saturday last, but they seem to have continued in a modified form throughout yesterday. Such was the violence of the sea at Holyhead that the wrecked hull of the Osseo, whose loss with over twenty lives was announced yesterday, has been completely dashed to pieces against the breakwater, and no vestige of her now remains but some driftwood floating in the harbour.

Yesterday the Military Court of Appeal in Paris confirmed the sentence passed on Captain Dreyfus. The formal degradation of that officer will take place on Saturday.

The second match between Mr. Stoddart's team and an eleven of All Australia was continued at Melbourne yesterday, when the Englishmen commenced their second innings. The wicket had completely recovered from the heavy rains at the end of last week, and was in fine condition. The visitors made an excellent stand, their record for the day being 287 runs for four wickets. The chief honours fell to Mr. Stoddart, who coming in first wicket down, batted in his best style, and was 150 not out when stumps were drawn, his partner being Peel not out 18. Ward accounted for 41, and Brown for 38.

The Revenue Returns issued last night show that there has been a greater gain in the third quarter of the financial year than in either of the preceding quarters. In the first quarter the gain amounted to £71,624; in the second it came out at £77,564; and now in the third it is £1,240,600, making for the nine months which ended yesterday a net increase of 2,869,788. That was in the revenue paid into the Exchequer. In the total produce of the revenue, which includes sums paid out again to the local taxation account, the net increase for the nine months over the corresponding nine months of last year was £289,136. The great gain of the quarter has been in Customs, Excise, and Stamps.

A REPLY TO LORD SALISBURY.

The Editor of "The National Review" has in January courteously placed his columns at the disposal of Mr. Haldane for the purpose of a reply to Lord Salisbury's article in December on the House of Lords. Mr. Haldane has studied the Constitutional history of the question with great care, and he furnishes the general reader with a very useful summary of the methods in which the House of Commons, from 1407 to 1860, vindicated its control over finance. The moral is that a simple resolution passed by the representatives of the people has sufficed in the past to compel the acquiescence of the Lords. Mr. Haldane's view, in which we entirely concur, is that if the constituencies at a general election expressed approval of the Resolution by returning a Liberal majority, the House of Lords must give way, or assume a revolutionary attitude, which would justify the extreme use of the unlimited prerogative vested in the Crown.

Mr. Haldane thinks the Resolution should declare "the new principle that the Commons are for the future to be the sole judges of the will of the constituencies." But is this a new principle? How far the House of Commons does, as a matter of fact, at a given moment represent the opinion of the nation can only be determined by dissolving Parliament. While the House of Commons exist it must be taken to represent the people, and going behind the House of Commons, except by a formal appeal to the electors, has always been unconstitutional. If it were otherwise the House of Commons would have no authority at all, and might as well cease to exist. The external and available evidence went to show that from 1887 to 1892 the House of Commons had ceased to be, what it ought to be, a reflection of the popular will. But the House of Lords endorsed all its proceedings with unreasoning and uncritical faith, as if it had only just been elected. In 1893 the same House of Lords intimated its opinion by ten to one that a House of Commons little more than a year old had no right to speak for the country. A more violent and indecent illustration of partisanship could not well be imagined. Mr. Haldane points out that the Lords have invented the doctrine that majorities must be large. This is really new, and extremely absurd. For the Liberal majority of 40 at General Election of 1892 was returned by quite as great preponderance of voting strength in the constituencies as was the Tory majority of 116 in 1886. It is the Lords who are the reckless innovators, and the Commons who are standing by the ancient ways.

TRUE PHYSICAL REST.

There is an old story of an Indian and a "pale face," who after a long day's journey lay down in a deserted cabin at nightfall to rest. The Indian, wrapping himself in his blanket, stretched himself on the floor of the cabin, with his feet to the fire, and was soon asleep. His companion meantime has espied a feather bed in another room, and congratulating himself on his discovery, jumped in and was also soon in a doze.

With the first rays of the morning light the Indian rose refreshed and ready for the day's task. He went to arouse his comrade, when lo! he found him dead from the exhaustion of the previous day.

Luxurious repose is never true physical rest.

To enjoy that blessing to its fullest extent freedom from restraint must be allowed every part of the body. A firm surface is required—one that will tend to keep the body stretched out at full length, that the lungs and heart may feel no sense of restriction by compression of the chest walls, and that the blood may have uninterrupted course in every direction.

We should never be guilty of supposing that the person whom we see sitting in a chair with his chin pressing on his sunken chest is enjoying true physical rest, no matter how fast asleep he may appear to be. The tendency of the body to gravitate toward the lowest part of a feather bed is beyond remedy. In this position the whole body is often so curled up that no one part is free from the constriction. The chest walls are caved in, and the whole body suffers from the consequent lack of proper oxygenation of the blood and the restriction which is placed upon its general circulation. The blood moves sluggishly, and as a result the condition of "fat and flabby" is superinduced.

This condition is never likely to follow the constant use of a firm hair mattress, for the blood has no chance to get dropical from too sluggish a circulation.

Perfect physical repose, like perfect physical activity, is dependent upon a proper equilibrium of the bodily functions during slumber.

The story of the Indian and the white man might easily have been founded on fact.

POLITICAL PROSPECTS IN GERMANY.

BERLIN, DEC. 31.

The prospects with which Germany enters upon the New Year are not exactly favourable. The peculiar circumstances attending Count Capri's sudden fall, the danger threatening Liberalism in the shape of the new Bill against Social Democrats, and the impending financial proposals of the Government foretell nothing pleasant for the future. When Prince Hohenlohe came into office nobody would have believed that one of the first acts of his Government would be the attempt to prosecute Herr Liebknecht for lese-majesty. Even now it is not believed that this was his work, but even if he only tolerated it this makes no difference in judging his position. Measures, not men, stamp the political situation. It is rather strange that just now, when a Bavarian has become Chancellor, the old jealousy between Prussia and the other German States is reawakening. In the leading South German papers one may read protests against possible Prussianisation.

The beer boycott, now at an end, has again shown the strength of the Social Democratic party and organization. The victory of the party was achieved after a very violent struggle. One must not forget that the breweries had the power of capital and of government on their side. It is not impossible that the Government, which regards the suppression of social democracy as its principal task, may think it necessary in face of this new proof of the strength of the Social Democratic organization to proceed with the strictest measures against it. The victory in the beer-boycott question may then become the start-

ing-point for a fresh struggle between the Social Democrats and the Government, a war in which Liberalism in general might easily be the principal sufferer.

As regards foreign policy, the year concludes as favourably as it began. The certainly slight tension prevailing between Germany and France in consequence of the Dreyfus case is more than counterbalanced by the intimate personal friendship between the Emperor William and the new Czar, whose love for peace seems not to be less than that of his deceased father. As regards England and Germany, their relations are in every respect satisfactory, notwithstanding a few trifling differences in Colonial affairs and the efforts of the Colonial Jingoists here.

THE INVENTION OF THE BICYCLE.

A monument recently been erected at Bar-le-Duc to the two Michaux, father and son, who are credited with the invention of the modern bicycle. The *Petit Lyonnais* tells the story of the invention as follows:— "The Michaux had a small locksmith shop in Paris. One day a bizarre machine was given to them to repair—a small saddle resting upon a snake-like frame and holding together two light wheels. The machine was put in motion by the 'rider' striking the ground with the tips of his toes. The queer thing was painted yellow, and called a draisine, from its inventor, the German forester K. V. Drais. A 'ride' on this was very tiring, impossible uphill, and, above all, ungraceful. But the young bloods in the time of the Second Empire managed very well with it, and got lots of fun out of the machine. Young Ernest Michaux conceived the idea of adding pedals to the front wheel, and became thus the inventor of the modern velocipede. His idea found little favour at first; more attention was given to the triocycle. As early as 1863 a Paris hatter named Brunel visited his customers on a triocycle. The International Exhibition of 1867, however, gave an impulse to bicycle riding, by drawing the attention of the public to several new improvements added by the Michaux. The Prince Imperial learned to ride and the aristocracy, with the Prince of Sagan at their head, followed his example. The latter had two high-wheeled machines built to order. One was of aluminium bronze with wheels of rosewood; the other was built entirely of steel, beautifully engraved with hunting scenes. The bicycle school of the Michaux was now almost full. They could no longer fill all orders, and formed a company for the manufacture of their machines. They also built a velodrome, with an asphalted track, on which also a kind of hurdle race could be run. Here was a ditch, which had to be crossed on a narrow plank, and a kind of Irish back. Lawsuits among the partners broke up the concern, the war of 1870 came, and people had other things to speak about. In the mean time the English and Americans improved the invention, and it was reintroduced into France from across the sea."

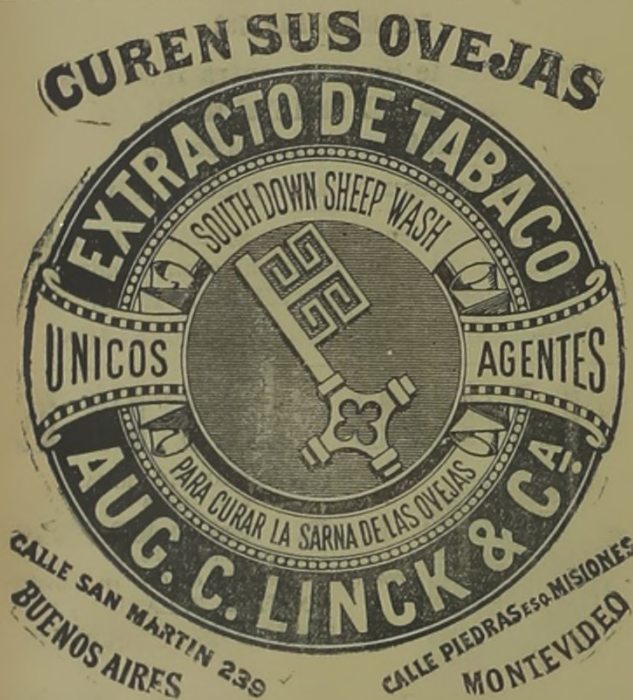

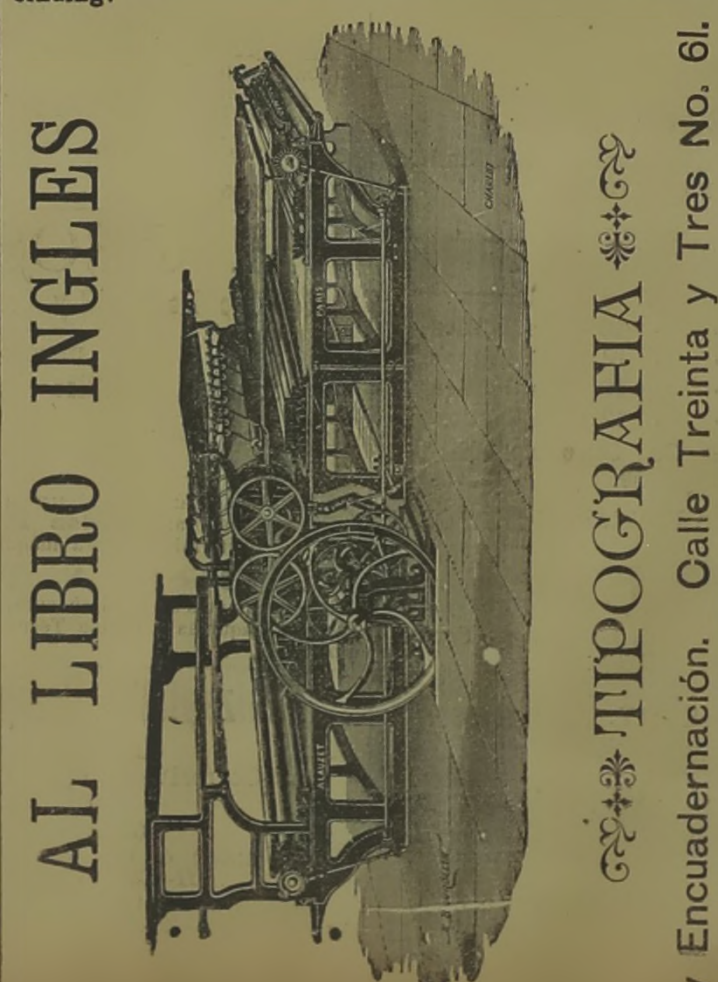
