

In the Court of Appeal yesterday, the arguments on the appeal against the injunctions to restrain Madame Tussaud (Limited) and Mr. Louis Tussaud from exhibiting waxwork figures of Mr. Monson were concluded. The Court reserved judgment.

Mr. Justice Mathew and Mr. Justice Collins had before them in the Queen's Bench Division the case in which Mr. Frank Wyatt, of the Trafalgar-square Theatre, sought to obtain judgment against Mr. E. H. Hartmont for 4791. and costs. It was said that Mr. Hartmont agreed to bear half the risk of the production and run of two pieces at the theatre. When asked for his portion of the loss he denied liability. An accountant had found that the defendant was liable for 4791. if Mr. Wyatt's claim for the inclusion of salary were good, and for 3741. apart from salary. The Court said that if the defendant would pay the plaintiff the 3741. by to-day the case would be referred back to the arbitrator for him to deal with any other question in dispute.

The hearing of the divorce suit of Rogers v. Rogers (the Queen's Proctor intervening) was concluded by Sir Francis Jeune, who, holding that condonation had taken place, rescinded the decree nisi granted to Mrs. Rogers, and dismissed her petition. At the same time, he said there was no reason why subsequent misconduct by the respondent should not form ground for a fresh petition.

Charles Ernest Lindus was again brought up at the Mansion House on the charge of shooting his wife and Mr. G. S. Jacobs, a solicitor, in the latter's office. Both the injured persons were still too ill to appear, but some remarkable statements by the accused were put in. Another remand was granted.

Mr. Samuel Laing, presiding over the half-yearly meeting of the London, Brighton, and South Coast Railway Company, held yesterday, said that in whatever form the Employers' Liability Bill might ultimately pass, whether with or without any provision for allowing contracting-out in special cases, he did not think it would make much difference in their existing practice, as their insurance fund was on a liberal scale, and was very popular with the men. He saw no reason why it should be discontinued. He could see nothing in the railway returns for the past year, apart from exceptional causes, to lead him to suppose that the wealth and well-being of the nation had been permanently affected by the severe and long continued depression of important branches of trade and agriculture.

Sir Edward Watkin presided over the half-yearly meeting of the Manchester, Sheffield and Lincolnshire Railway Company, held at Manchester. He attributed the falling off in dividend mainly to the coal strike, which had resulted in a net loss to the company of 276,190l. It had been calculated that the money lost through the strike amounted to 33 millions sterling. An amendment to effect changes in the directorate found no second, and the report, as moved by the chairman, was adopted.

FRIDAY, JAN. 26.
In the House of Lords yesterday, the second reading of the Local Government Bill was moved by the Marquis of Ripon, who stated some of its chief provisions. Lord Salisbury, who followed, did not oppose the second reading, but showed that he desired to see amendments in relation to charities, the compulsory hiring of land for allotments, and the poor law. Other speakers included the Archbishop of Canterbury, Lord Monckton, the Duke of Devonshire, Lord Carrington, and Earl Spencer, the second reading being agreed to without a division.

The Speaker has nominated Lord Shafto, formerly a judge of the Scotch Court of Session, to be chairman of the Coal Owners and Miners' Conciliation Board. Lord Shafto has accepted the office.

We regret to announce that Sir Gerald Porter died in London yesterday afternoon at the early age of 35. He had not been in good health since returning from his important mission in Uganda. At first he suffered from what was supposed to be malarial fever, but typhoid supervened, and he gradually sank.

Saturday, the 17th March, has been agreed upon as the date for the Oxford and Cambridge boat-race.

At yesterday's meeting of the School Board for London, the first after the winter holidays, there was a long debate on the religious question. In the end it was decided that the scheme of Biblical and religious teaching which was settled by the first Board should be adhered to, but that a resolution of the Board should be amended so as to read that in the schools provided by the Board the Bible shall be read, and there shall be given such explanations and such instruction therefrom in the principles of the Christian religion and of morality as are suited to the capacities of the children.

A correspondent at Capetown states that Sir H. Loch has informed Mr. Rhodes that as soon as the administrative system proposed for Matabeleland has been approved by his Majesty's Government, the Imperial Matabeleland Police will be withdrawn, and the cost and responsibility of maintaining law and order will be left to the Chartered Company. The Company has agreed to pay the Bechuanaland chief Khama and his men the wage stipulated for the number of days they were in the field.

of dynamite, attributed to the Anarchists, also took place at the harbour works at Barcelona yesterday. Two men were killed and several others wounded.

A telegram received in Paris from St. Louis, Senegal, states that a French column has occupied Timbuctoo.

The Court of Appeal yesterday dismissed the appeal of the Imperial Union Accident Assurance Company (Limited), from a verdict at the Carlisle Assizes, awarding the widow of the late Mr. Joseph Stoddart, a farmer and innkeeper of Westmoreland, 300l., the amount of a policy of insurance against death from accident, which Mr. Stoddart had effected. The claim had been disputed on the ground that the evidence did not establish that death was caused by accidental violence, and that condition in the policy had not been complied with.

Sir Francis Jeune commenced the hearing of evidence in support of a petition for divorce presented by Mr. John Danvers Harold, a corn-merchant at the Mohawk Minstrels, and known professionally as "Johnny Danvers." Misconduct on the part of the wife with Mr. William Hayner, stated to be a public-house manager, was alleged, while the wife said that there had been both condonation and cruelty. The petitioner having been examined, the case was adjourned.

James Rowland Robert Fitt was brought before the Clerkenwell magistrate on a charge of falsifying certain books of the North London Permanent Commercial Building Society, of which he was secretary, with intent to defraud. Counsel said that 37,866l. were unaccounted for, and that probably the Treasury would take up the case. The accused was remanded in custody.

Mrs. Olive Majestic, wife of a well-to-do gentleman residing at Hamersmith, was committed for trial from the Marylebone Police-court on a charge of stealing fourteen yards of silk, valued at 3l. 5s., from Mr. Whiteley's at Westbourne-grove. Bail was allowed.

Presiding yesterday over the meeting of the South-Eastern Railway Company, Sir Edward Watkin, M.P., said that the company, like several of its neighbours, had suffered considerable loss of revenue during the last half of 1893. The revenue from all sources had decreased by 467,291l., as compared with the corresponding corresponding period of the previous year, while the outgoings had increased by 5,288l. Two amendments to the motion for the adoption of the report were proposed, but after some remarks by Sir George Russell, M.P., the first was withdrawn. The second was persisted in, the mover, Mr. White, declaring, amid loud cries of dissent, that there was a want of confidence in Sir Edward Watkin as to the policy he had pursued. On this amendment being defeated, Mr. White insisted upon a poll which, having been taken, resulted in a victory for the Board by an enormous majority.

REVIVAL OF TRADE IN THE UNITED STATES.

New York, January 21.—The improvement in general business throughout the country reported a week ago has been maintained, but has not made further progress, proving the correctness of the belief in a revival which is slow though sure. The fact that the National Treasury has manifested resources for tiding over the crisis has greatly contributed to the restoration of confidence. The tariff debate will continue for another week in the lower House. The full extent of the changes on duties will then be known, thus enabling industries to revise on a firm basis. The surplus of the New York banks over legal requirements has further advanced to an unprecedented extent, and now amounts to \$102,754,450. President Ives has issued a circular to the Northern Pacific stockholders, sharply criticising the action of the receivers, and asking the stockholders to unite in payment of the assessment for the purpose of protecting their interests in the coming reorganisation. —*Reuter.*

CLIPPINGS.

A judgment which, a Paris Correspondent says, will interest strangers visiting that city, was given by the Tribunal of Commerce. In July a Madame Labre was on the top of an omnibus in the Champs-Élysées when a wagon was passing in a different direction, and about to turn a corner. It was laden with masts that projected considerably before and behind the vehicle. As the wagon was wheeling round a mast struck the lady on the shin bone and inflicted a compound fracture. The wagoner drove off, and was never heard of. Madame Labre brought an action for damages against the omnibus company, which pleaded that it was not to blame. Her counsel, however, pleaded that there was an implied contract on the part of the company to convey its fares in absolute safety. The conductor and driver should have been on the look out, but whether they were or not did not bear upon the case. The Tribunal adopted this view. If the company chose it might seek out the wagoner and sue his employer for the amount of damages it had to pay to Madame Labre—namely, 320l. The Civil Tribunal has always ruled in the sense of responsibility being only incurred through negligence.

In spite of the learned historian by whom the story has been related, there is still a wide-spread popular belief that there existed in the Middle Ages a female Pope. Pope Joan, as she is called, has even given her name to a game of cards which is mentioned in Sheridan's "School for Scandal." The tradition with regard to the female Pope has

been traced back to the eleventh century, but she is said to have lived much earlier, her Pontificate having taken place in the ninth century, and having lasted for more than two years. The name she is alleged to have assumed is John VII. At the last meeting of the Academy of Inscriptions in Paris, M. Mantz de Gibbon, who cannot be suspected of Catholic prejudices, considered had been "annihilated" by two Protestant critics, Blondel and Bayle. M. Mantz characterises the legend as a vulgar fable invented in the Middle Ages. Never, he declares, after a careful study of the question, has a woman worn the tiara, and moreover, there was no interregnum at the period when the pretended John VII. governed the Church.

—River Plate Wool.—There continues to be some little demand for available lots of unwashed wool in Antwerp, and sales for the week ended January 20 show a total of 300 bales, amongst which 250 bales Montevideo old clip merino and No. 1 Merino (about 87 per cent.) at 1l. 32 1/2 to 1l. 37 1/2, or making washed on the basis of 3l. 55c. to 3l. 60c. In new clip 20 bales Buenos Aires lambs (36 per cent) sold at 1l. 20c. 13 bales Montevideo locks and bellies (28 to 29 per cent) 90c. and 18 bales Buenos Aires bellies (very bary) 77 1/2 to 85c. Some reports business has been done in the term market, writes Mr. A. Elberman, so that the contracts give a total of 1,030,000 kilos, tops and 250 bales unwashed wool; on the whole, however, the tone is quiet, with a generally easier tendency.
