NEWS OF THE DAY

MONTEVIDEO, SATURDAY, MARCH 3, 1894.

As at the time of writing yesterday evening there was still no appearance of a conclusion of the enthralling struggle between the people and officialism for the presidency of the Republic, we have decided not to wait, but to go to press at our usual hour hoping that a favorable and pacific solution will be announced before the morning. All further comments are necessarily reserved until our next.

THE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION.

THE FOLLOWING WERE THE RESULTS OF THE FOURTH VOTING IN THE ASSEMBLY ON THURSDAY NIGHT, THIS CLEARLY DEFINING THE "INDEPENDENTS" AND "HERRERIST" PARTIES:

The sitting of the Assembly on Thursday was not resumed until close upon midnight, when formal account was taken of the command having been transferred temporarily to Sr. Dancan Stewart, and a resolution was passed suspending the sitting until 1.30 p.m. on the Friday. During the evening the public had been allowed access to the "bars" and showed an intense interest in the proceedings, which, especially during the debate over the handing over of the power to Sr. Stewart, was very animated. The suggestion that Sr. Stewart should occupy the post for a year raised a storm of disapprobation and a cry of "Foreigner." Sarcastic smiles were observable while Sres. Lenzi and Freire chanted the praises of Dr. Herrera and his policy.

We have omitted to state that during the afternoon a scare was created in the Plaza Constitucion through a shot escaping, accidentally it was pretended, from the guns of one of the soldiers. This caused a general scamper in all directions, but the alarm was soon quelled and order restored. There were one or two minor incidents with the police, who exhibited a totally unnecessary and improper attitude of repression towards the people, but there was not the least attempt at serious disturbance.

The long and most absurd exposure of the troop led to several cases of sunstroke and fainting. They looked well in their parade uniforms, but the uniform is entirely unsuitable to hot weather, and nearly all the soldiers were visibly affected by the heat.

The severest comment was provoked by the undisguised manner in which the "direct influence" of Dr. Herrera was at work and was employed to counteract the popular

aspirations. There was a constant flow of written and verbal messages between the "herreristas" in the Assembly and Dr. Herrera, virtually no longer president, in the Government House, so that it was very pertinently asked whether the election was being conducted by the Assembly or by Dr. Herrera? Comment was also provoked by his being accompanied home, after he had ceased to be president, by the Presidential Escort, though this was probably done to protect him from any hostile manifestation.

The lateness of the hour and the indecision of the result practically defrauded the people of giving Dr. Herrera the manifestation of antipathy which they had intended and which he had so thoroughly earned. Still, the public feeling was unmistakable. The appearance of Sr. Stewart at midnight was saluted with hisses and whistling which were extended to the "herrerista" members of the Assembly, whilst there were frequent and hearty cheers for Gomensoro, Tajés, Perez and the independent members. A group in front of the Government House indulged in hostile cries to Dr. Herrera. The police, grossly exceeding their duty, repressed these legitimate manifestations with unnecessary violence even drawing their outlasses upon the people, causing no little ill-feeling and remonstrance. At midnight they took upon themselves to clear the plazas, roughly ordering all the people home although not the least disorder was threatened. This was another abuse of their position, due of course to orders from the official party which has the greatest fear and hatred of any expression of opinion on the part of the people. On the other hand it may be stated that at no time during the day or night and at no place was there the least expression of sympathy for the government party or Dr. Herrera, and so evident and unanimous was public opinion on this point that even the hired ruffians of Government dared not lift up their voices. It was impossible to imagine anything more significant of the intense unpopularity of Dr. Herrera and his party.

YESTERDAY.

The exceptional strain of Thursday produced its natural reaction yesterday, and in the morning, whilst business was resumed as usual, nearly every one was a tired and even despondent look. About one o'clock a report was quickly circulated that a compromise had been effected in favour of Dr. Ellauri, and this was fostered by a bulletin from the official organ, the *Nacion* proclaiming the candidature of Dr. Ellauri as "the only patriotic solution to the situation." But even in this the official party could not act without trickery and falsehood, for, whilst it was pretended that the nomination had been accepted by him and all the parties, it soon transpired that this was not the case, he had only accepted conditionally on receiving the votes of the independent party, and to this General's Tajés and Perez absolutely refused to assent, maintaining the Gomensoro candidature to which their supporters all faithfully adhered. The deception of the official organs was quickly exposed by bulletins from the independent papers, greatly relieving the public mind.

The Assembly met again at 1.30, there being the same indecent exhibition of troops as on Thursday. The shops around the plazas and vicinity again put up their shutters, showing a mute protest against this outrage. A considerable crowd assembled in the plazas, though business duties naturally detained many elsewhere. The police went even further than on Thursday by stopping all transit in Calle Sarandi between the two plazas, an action for which there was not the faintest pretext of an excuse.

Between 3 and 4, responding to a hasty summons, a group of fully 8000 citizens assembled in the Plaza Independencia and, forming in column, marched to the house of Dr. Ellauri with the intention of beseeching him not to accept the presidency as Sr. Gomensoro was the only popular candidate. Dr. Ellauri refused to see the delegates of the manifestation, who had to express their ideas through a messenger, receiving no reply! The column then marched to the house of General Tajés and Gomensoro to salute them, cheering on the way, and being received with every mark of sympathy by the people on the route.

The hitherto peaceful record of the struggle was broken about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon by a most unjustifiable attack of a group of some 20 mounted men of the Presidential Escort, headed by Col. Lucas Rodríguez, on a group of citizens who were holding a peaceful manifestation in front of the house of General Perez in Calle Colonia. The soldiers were

told by General Salvador Tajés, who was on the balcony, that the manifestations were in their perfect right, but they would listen to no reason and charged the crowd with their drawn lances. A terrible confusion ensued and many revolver shots were fired, resulting in the wounding of some ten persons, including two of the Escort and two inoffensive children who were standing by. The wounded people, two of whom have rather severe injuries, were taken into the neighbouring houses for assistance. This act of unwarrantable brutality has produced the most sinister effect in the city, as it is a proof that the "official" party will not hesitate at violence and bloodshed in their determination to violate public opinion. The bad impression was deepened when it was learnt that the battalions in the plazas had received orders to load their arms, and the artillery men to train their guns into position.

At the hour we determined to close our paper, nothing definite could be learned as to the proceedings in the Assembly, which were being conducted with closed doors. It was understood however that the patriotic band of independents were still heroically resisting the attempt to impose an official candidate, and were still in a majority. The public excitement was intense and the feeling against the "herrerista" party and its infamous procedures indescribably bitter, and it is certain that if the official candidate comes in there will be a popular explosion of wrath. It is said however, that Dr. Ellauri refuses to accept the presidency unless he has a majority of two thirds, which at present seems an impossibility. We are compelled to reserve all further news until our next.

The Brazilian Revolution.

Whilst the *Standard* in Buenos Aires is trying to work up a sensational case against the alleged non-protection of British vessels in Rio Harbour, the *Times of Argentina* prints the following letter, which is worth reproducing as giving another side to the case.

Sir, I notice that the senior English daily of this city is at present engaged in deifying and condemning the very careful diplomacy and tact displayed by the senior officer of the British fleet in Rio de Janeiro. The public are being woefully misled and the facts are the other way. The proof is that the steamer commanded by the same captain who gave your contemporary the interesting copy for seven days' issue, discharged on his present voyage 3400 tons in thirteen days. Any agent or shipping man must admit this is good good despatch for Rio, even under normal conditions. The much-vaulted protection accorded to the shipping of other nationalities which consists of a bluejacket being placed in a prominent position on the lighters conveying their cargo ashore is very naturally condemned by our officers as a needless exposure of life and he has throughout the whole of the struggle afforded ample protection to British commerce, but is, and in my opinion rightly, very satirical and bitter against British ship-owners, who, for a doubtful extra profit, will persist in sending their vessels to Rio during the present unhealthy and dangerous times. The much-belauded prompt action of the Yankee admiral in getting steam up on the six vessels under his command and circling the rebel fleet to enforce them to permit two American merchantmen to proceed to the wharf was in direct contravention to the conditions of the *modus vivendi* adopted after much consultation between the foreign powers and Saldana de Gama, and which was working smoothly and to benefit to the major part of the merchantmen sailing and steamers in port.—Yours, etc.,—Fair-play.

We have reason to believe that the alleged telegram from London pretending to give the comments on the mysterious "Nasmyth" case, was concocted in Buenos Aires, and that the quotations were in reality extracts from the London comments on the action of Admiral Benham a month ago, skillfully cooked by the concocter to fit into the "Nasmyth" business. It would be interesting to find out who is at the bottom of this perpetual concoction of fictions and generally malicious news, and why it is that such telegrams are fattered on to Montevideo when they invariably make their first appearance in Buenos Aires. Some respectable paper there ought really to investigate and expose the matter, for this circulation of false news is a discredit to journalism and prejudicial to every paper in the Plate.

We quote the following from the *Herald*.—Newspapers received from Sta. Catalina give the news of the taking of the City of Laja by the rebels. The city capitulated with 430 men; the armament given up consisted of 700 rifles, 6 Krupp guns, 2 Gatling guns, 200 rounds of cannon ammunition and 200,000 rifle cartridges. The siege lasted for 25 days, fighting taking place nearly every day, the rebels taking house after house and barricades. The shrapnel, shells and dynamite have caused terrible losses. The place was defended by Colonel Carneiro, Serra Martins, Amyntas, Dulcidion and Loecorda. It was a bloody engagement on the 7th of February that decided the fate of the city. The rebels were commanded by General Gumesindo Saraiva, commander in chief and generals of brigade Pirigiba and L. Pinto. The three first mentioned colonels defending the place died of their wounds 24 hours after the fight.

SUNDRIES.

The Custom House receipts for February were \$912,393, against \$745,193 in the same month last year.

The man who ordered all the troops into the plazas armed with ball cartridges and loaded cannon, on such a purely civil occasion as a presidential election ought to be publicly whipped. Unfortunately militarism precludes any notion of duty to the people or of honest disobedience to improper orders, or else both officers and men should have replied that it was no duty of theirs to intimidate the people, influence the election or interfere with manifestations of public opinion. If the military could only realise this, such monstrous exhibitions would be impossible.

If Dr. Herrera's was a civil government, as his organs falsely pretend, why this hideous display of militarism? Civil government is based on the will of the people, not on bayonets, rifles and artillery.

Dr. Herrera forgot yesterday that he was no longer President of the Republic, but merely one of the menest and least respected citizens in it, and was still manoeuvring and scheming and plotting and interfering with matters which were no longer his business. Is there no one who can tell him, and make him understand, that Uruguay will have no more of him and his, and that the only part left him to

play is to go and repent in obscurity of the calamities brought upon the country by his vanity, treachery, incapacity and selfishness. Is he absolutely blind, or is he determined to force the country into disorder and revolution to get rid of his detested presence.

The *Nacion*, false to the last, said yesterday that Dr. Herrera left the Government House "amid a just ovation of sympathy." The falsehood is treble, for there was no sympathy, no ovation, nor would it have been just. Equally false is the *Nacion's* assertion that the presidency remained in the hands of a citizen "who responds to the noblest national aspirations." When will the *Nacion* learn to favour its pages with even a modicum of truth?

General Casimiro Garcia was confirmed in his post as Chief of the Staff on Thursday afternoon. We understand that his appointment will bring about the resignation of the majority of the Staff Officers.

The report circulated yesterday morning of the death of General Etcheverry was incorrect, but he is hardly expected to survive.

We learn that another batch of military changes and appointments was issued at the last moment on Thursday, of which we will give particulars tomorrow. Interim President Stewart issued decrees yesterday temporarily confirming all the existing appointments.

In our reference yesterday to the removal of Mr. G. Lloyd Davies to Buenos Aires we should have said that he goes to take charge of the branch there of Messrs. Wilson, Sons and Co., Limited, the management remaining, as heretofore, in the hands of Mr. Harley, in this city.

Says a Buenos Aires contemporary.—"The Manager of the Southern Railway has given notice that none of the employees of the Railway are to inscribe their names in the Civil Register, because, when they do so, they are taken away from their duties to act as members of voting tables (&c.). We should think the Argentine Government would be fully justified in taking severe notice of this most arbitrary and unheard-of interference with civic rights and duties, whilst the employees themselves should also resist it to the utmost. Is it possible that this manager can have realised the significance of his action and that he is practically depriving his employees of their citizenship?"

A subscriber takes us to task for spelling "herrerista" with a small *h*. Does he think herrera worthy of a capital letter?

Mr. F. W. Weldon, formerly manager of the London and River Plate Bank, left yesterday in the R. M. S. "Elbe" on his return to England. A considerable number of friends went to see him off.

The indefatigable photographer FitzPatrick has already got out some excellent views of the scenes in the Plaza Constitucion on Thursday.

It appears that it is not the great Adolina Patti who has died, but the concert singer Madame Fatey, also a celebrity in the musical world. The similarity of names caused the mistake.

The performance at the Politeama on Thursday was suspended in view of the political excitement. This evening will be given Verdi's "Ernani" by the principal artists of the Company.

There were serious political disturbances in Valparaiso on Thursday night, the mob attacking a meeting of government partisans, many people being wounded and a club building burnt. Great excitement prevails and further disorders are feared.

The only news obtainable about the elections in Brazil is the following telegram published yesterday.—"Rio, March 1. The legislative elections have taken place. All tranquil! The elections of Prudente Moraes as president and Victorino Pereira as vice seem assured."

The Custom House paid \$2324 into the London Bank yesterday on account of the foreign debt service. The total payments for February have been made up to \$426,164.93.

From London telegrams we learn the important news that the resignation by Mr. Gladstone of the premiership is a certainty and has been confirmed by the *Daily News*, Lord Rosebery will probably be named Premier, without a dissolution of the Cabinet. It is added that Mr. Gladstone retains his seat in the House, and the Government will adhere to the Home Rule Bill, which will soon be presented again.

BUENOS AIRES.

The sailor, Diedrich Loop, who was transferred from the German bark Gerda to the floating hospital died on Tuesday from yellow fever. The body was cremated after an autopsy. The other sailors of the Gerda are progressing satisfactorily.

On Wednesday morning, in Rosario, Fernando Olivé, cashier of the Bank of Spain and Rosario, committed suicide. That bank is not connected with the Spanish Bank of this city.

According to the Municipal statistical report for January, the city of Buenos Aires contained on January 31st, 528,728 inhabitants. The
