THE CABINET.

The new Cabinet Ministers were duly sworn in and received their portfolios from the hands of President Borda on Saturday afternoon. The occasion was made one of special ceremony. Amongst those present in the Audience Chamber at the Government House were the Ministers of the Tribunal of Justice, the Municipality, Generals Maximo and Salvador Tajos and other officers of the Military Tribunals, General O. Garcia and the officers of the Staff, the Commandant General of Marine and his staff officers, the Chiefs of Battalions, the superior officials of the public departments, the majority of the Senators and Deputies, and a large number of representatives of commerce and society. The officers were all in gala uniform, and the rest in ceremonial dress. The attendance, in fact, was enormous, testing the capacities of the Government House to the fullest, and it was generally remarked that it is very many years since there has been such a show of sympathy on a similar occasion, which may be regarded as a hopeful augury. Each of the Ministers was supported by a group of special friends; Dr. Miguel Herrera by a number of the "unconditional" deputies; Dr. Piñeiro del Campo by the students from the University, in which he is a professor of International Law, and Sr. Castro by members of the National Department of Engineers. The formal recognition by the President of the new Ministers was received by a hearty cheer to which the walls of the Government House have long been strangers. The ceremony over champagne was served in an adjoining room, and the Ministers took formal possession of their respective offices, where they were again overwhelmed with congratulations.

The idea has been started and has been well received of offering a public banquet to the President and his Ministers as a sign of sympathy with their declarations and their promises of a regenerative administration.

The New English Bank in Default. As was expected, the New English Bank has defaulted on the half year's interest which should have been paid yesterday on the *vales* or promissory notes issued to the creditors of the original English Bank under the arrangement of last year. On enquiring at the Anglo-Argentine Bank, which is the agent for payment, we were informed that no instructions whatever had been received in the matter. This default, of course, was expected from the moment it was announced that the New English Bank in London had suspended payment.

It is impossible to say anything as to the position of the numerous creditors in this market, the more especially since nothing can be ascertained respecting the position of the Bank in London. Some information, however, should arrive in the course of a mail or two. We presume the liquidation of the Bank will be commenced as soon as the necessary arrangements can be made. In this liquidation, as we understand it, the holders of the *vales* or promissory notes, that is to say the original creditors of the old Bank, get nothing until the new creditors created since the Bank resumed business—or more accurately speaking, the New English Bank commenced business—have been satisfied in full. Their getting anything at all, then, depends entirely on what surplus the Bank may have after satisfying the liabilities of its present business, and of this there

is no judging until accounts and balance sheet are presented. This, at least, is our surmise. The *vales* issued to the creditors here, state as follows (translation):—"In case of the Bank being liquidated and the assets and the unpaid capital not proving sufficient for the payment in full of all its creditors, then any claim for interests and capital on this *vale* shall be deferred to the other claims admitted in such liquidation, except the other *vales* of the same date and description, and the *vales* issued by the Bank to the creditors of the former English Bank of the River Plate Limited, all of which excepted *vales* are destined to remain in the same category as this *vale*." This is not particularly clear, as the *vale* in question is precisely one of those issued by the New English Bank to the creditors of the old Bank, nor is there any unpaid capital to be called up, at least not that we are aware of.

The creditors of the old English Bank, whose liquidation in this market proved so unsatisfactory, can now judge of the value of the arrangement thrust upon them, and more especially of the 15% of their credits in *vales* of the New Bank, which formed part of the composition. So far, interest on these *vales* has only been paid for the nine weeks from July 25 to September 30, and now the Bank has suspended payment just a few days before the first half-year's interest is due, and it is very doubtful when the creditors will get anything more on their credits, if ever.

The strange past of the business is that while the Bank has suspended payment in London and is in default in Montevideo, it continues to do business on a solvent basis in Buenos Aires and Rosario. This solvency in one part and insolvency in another, reminding one of the remarkable way in which the business in Montevideo was separated from the rest in the first liquidation, is an innovation in banking customs and morals which we do not profess to understand.

The Brazilian Revolution. Reports from Buenos Aires give a harrowing account of the situation of the Brazilian refugees on board the Portuguese warships in quarantine there. These vessels, not of great size, have no accommodation for so large a number of men, whose situation is accordingly one of great distress, and cases of yellow fever and "beriberi" are appearing among them, whilst many are on the sick list from wounds and other causes. A complicated international question has arisen as to their disposal. The Argentine Government appears willing to intern them when out of quarantine, but the Portuguese Government seems inclined to regard them as its prisoners of war and has not yet made up its mind whether to take them to Portugal or to comply with the demand of the Brazilian Government for their unconditional delivery to the latter, when their fate at the hands of a ruffian like Peixoto may be guessed. Other powers also take an active interest in the question and have been bringing their influence to bear, though in what manner the telegrams, confused and unintelligible as usual, do not distinctly inform us. A telegram attributed to Rio and dated Sunday, says that the British and Italian Ministers at Washington have asked Secretary Gresham to instruct the U. S. Minister Thomson at Rio Janeiro to use his influence with the Brazilian government that it may desist from its claim on the refugees. President Cleveland, however, it is said, refused to do so on the grounds that Saldaña and his companions were conspiring to overthrow the constituted government. The telegram adds that this reply is considered impolitic and as given solely to favour Peixoto. (The appearance of this sentence makes us doubt that the telegram came from Rio, where the censorship is still in full swing.) It adds that the French and Italian Ministers refused to join in the request (it is not clear which request) and that it is now asked that the refugees may be given an asylum (where?) until the revolution in the South is suppressed. According to a Buenos Aires telegram some of the Foreign Ministers in Rio, but it is not said which, have been trying to persuade Peixoto in the latter sense, and meanwhile the Portuguese Commander has received orders from his government not to land any of the refugees except on Portuguese territory.

The affair is altogether too obscure and the information too incomplete for us venture on further comments.

SUNDRIES.

The swearing-in and reception of the new Ministers on Saturday was unexpectedly sympathetic, and showed that on the whole public

opinion is decidedly with the new government in its first steps. How enormous a change this already signifies in the situation can only be gauged by those who have lived here under the withering influences of the last four years.

It is worth noting that the ex-president did not spoil the above interesting ceremony by his presence, and several of his more characteristic partisans were also conspicuous by their absence. We do not suppose they were missed, and for our part the less that is seen of them in public life the better for the country. They cannot be eliminated too quickly.

An unsympathetic, not to say improper, note was again struck on Saturday by the police, who behaved very roughly and arbitrarily with the people congregated in front of the Government House to see what was going on. As the intentions of the crowd were entirely friendly, it would seem from this that the police, not satisfied with repressing manifestations against the previous and deservedly unpopular government, also intend to repress manifestations in favour of the new government. This is entirely a new development, and the sooner President Borda's attention is called to the matter the better. Perhaps, however, Col. Abella labours under the pitiful delusion that his traitorous fellow conspirator Herrera is still master of the situation.

There are three things of which President Borda cannot rid himself too soon to affirm his position in public esteem; those are Secretary Brian, Chief of Police Abella and the *Nacion*. We have reason to believe that all three are doomed and their disappearance is only a matter of time.

We had the pleasure on Sunday of a confidential conversation with one of the newly-appointed Ministers with whom we were well-acquainted before his elevation to the Ministry, and in whose word we have great confidence. He gave us some very reassuring declarations as to the situation, though of a nature we do not feel qualified to repeat as he distinctly said he did not wish to be "reported." We wished, however, that the *Nacion* had been present to hear the terms in which he spoke of it and of the injury it is capable of doing an honest government.

Dr. Julio Herrera, already qualified for the penitentiary, is now qualifying himself more than ever for a lunatic asylum. It is stated very positively that he has already commenced intriguing to secure his election to one of the senatorships vacant next November. We will say nothing of the unspeakable insult to the country to think that he should dream of returning to public life after his recent conspiracy, but the effrontery of the man verges on actual madness if he imagines that he could be elected by any possible honest means. Besides, there is something peculiarly audacious in the idea of the very man who has done the most to defraud and defy the public suffrage now appealing to the public suffrage! Before November it is to be hoped something will have been done to purify the electoral system and Dr. Herrera will then learn where he stands in public estimation, although he ought to know it already.

The decree naming the new departmental Jefe Político was expected to appear last night or else to-day. We understand that no many changes will be made at first, it being the intention of the Minister of Government to introduce the necessary reforms gradually, after he has had opportunity for a more thorough study of the situation. The Chief of Police of the Capital, however, cannot be changed too soon to satisfy the unanimous exigencies of the people and the press.

From what is said now it seems by no means certain that Dr. Brian will receive the appointment of Secretary to the President, and that is the reason there has been so much delay in the nomination.

The *Nacion* has always shown great eagerness to denounce the independent press in no measured terms when contrary to its own special views, but it by no means shows eagerness to acknowledge the favorable and sympathetic expressions of many, if not all, of the same papers towards the new government. There is more in this than meets the eye, and it is simply another proof that the *Nacion*'s chief desire is to alienate the Government from public opinion, so that it may stand on the same bad eminence as its predecessor. Fortunately, however, it is not in the power of the *Nacion* to determine these things.

The *Siglo* expresses the hope that the new Minister of Finance will resume the long-neglected custom of publishing monthly Treasury balances, as the law enacts. Also, that he will do something to stir up the liquidation of the National Bank, which is in a most unsatisfactory condition, and about which there are as many ugly rumours as there were about the original disastrous establishment.

The *Bien* says:—"For many years there has not been seen such harmony between the people and the Government, and although for the present this harmony lies only in the

intentions, it is necessary not to be pessimistic and not to doubt but that the acts of the new Government will correspond to its clear and solemn promises. . . . If the President of the Republic is animated by profound convictions of a conciliatory policy and possesses the energy necessary to sustain them, any one of his Ministers that attempts to follow a different course will soon have to vacate his post in favour of a candidate whose views coincide more closely with those of the director of the national policy."

We have received the St. Andrew's Gazette for March, and a very interesting number it is, although rather behind hand in its news as to the Presidential election here. It contains an excellent and well-thought out article on "England's Responsibility to Argentina," some very interesting reminiscences of "Fifty Years Ago," the first instalment of Black's delightful novel "Stand Fast, Craig Royston," a host of other matter, and two first-class photographs of Buenos Aires and Glasgow respectively. In fact, a better and more readable magazine could not be demanded anywhere.

The Argentines, or more properly the Porteños, have a most ingenious way of procuring themselves an extra holiday once in a while. They find out some Argentine who died abroad some 50 or 60 years ago, just long enough for the majority of living persons to have forgotten all about him and whether he was worthy or not, they magnify him into a great hero, bring his remains—no, we beg pardon, his *ashes*, heroes don't have anything so vulgar as remains—to the country at considerable trouble and expense, satisfy their love of pageantry by a gorgeous funeral, and have a special holiday decreed for the occasion at which they enjoy themselves immensely in their own peculiar way. This ingenious plan has been worked with success once a year for the last eight or ten years, and promises to become an established custom, for, of course, the list of Argentine heroes is inexhaustible, and many of them must have very kindly died abroad on purpose to give rise to this little scheme.

The *Herald* gives a total of ten persons killed and 16 wounded in the recent provincial elections at Buenos Aires. And yet the Argentinians claim to be a civilised people.

Boito's splendid opera "Mefistofele" will be given at the Politeama this evening.

The General Assembly yesterday elected Dr. Domingo Gonzalez to the seat on the Superior Tribunal of Justice vacant by the departure of Dr. T. Diaz. As Dr. Pedro Garzon was the "cherrista" candidate the latter party may look on this as a defeat number one for the "directiva influence."

The terrible "Rosales" case is not over, after all. Some fresh question of jurisdiction has been raised, and it is now said that the Government will have to appoint a Council of War to try the whole case over again and issue a fresh sentence! When will the world hear the end of this miserable, ghastly and discreditable business?

With regard to the horrible murder of the cake-seller Latin last week, the post-mortem examination has revealed that there were 17 wounds made by two weapons of different dimensions, and that he was probably attacked simultaneously by two persons. This places the crime in a new light.

It is said that the Directors of the Salis Theatre have received a liberal offer for the conversion of the Theatre into a Skating Rink for the entire winter season.

Col. Bermudez, President of Peru, has died under a surgical operation and it appears probable there will be a fight as to his successor. Telegrams from Lima reveal a very uneasy situation in that capital and the people are in great alarm. Constitutionally he should be succeeded by the Vice-president Dr. Soler.

The British cruiser "Barraqueta" arrived here from Rio Janeiro yesterday morning and remains quarantined. She brings with her the tug "Doña Joanna" which she captured as the said tug was about to launch a torpedo at the "Aguadaban" making a treacherous use of the British flag to cover the attempt. This use of foreign flags seems to have been rather a favorite trick of that sweet creature Peixoto.

\$2043 was paid into the London Bank yesterday as balance of the foreign debt service for March.

From London telegrams we learn that a movement has been commenced in the Commons in favour of breaking up the large agricultural properties of the State (we did not know there were any) into small holdings. It is now denied that the European powers contemplate combining to repress anarchy. The liberals have gained two more by-elections, at Montgomery and Berwick. The movement against the House of Lords gains ground steadily. In Liverpool there has been an accident to a carriage occupied by the leading actors of the Prince of Wales Theatre, by which all of them were severely injured and Arthur Wilkinson was killed. (We do not think this is the Wilkinson who made himself so pop-

ular here with the Cleary Company.)

BUENOS AIRES

On Friday afternoon Mr. Ryder Hancock, manager of the Railway Clearing House, on the occasion of his marriage at La Plata with Miss Irene del Real, was the recipient of a picture about 4 ft. x 3 ft. 6 in., containing 35 separate portraits of the staff of the Clearing House, besides of many of the outside clerks, the centre portrait being that of Mr. Hancock himself, encircled by cabinets of the 5 principal officers of the establishment, Messrs John Allan, Rochet, Gorrisson, Bruce Percy and W. J. Shaw, all excellent productions and taken at La Platanese photographic establishment, the rest of the employees occupying smaller spaces; the whole mounted in a large massive frame with suitable engraved gold plaque containing the following inscription in Spanish:—"The employees of the Railway Clearing House dedicate the above to its worthy Secretary, Mr. Ryder Hancock, on the occasion of his marriage, March 1894." The gift was accompanied by a parchment scroll containing the signatures of the donors, and was presented to Mr. Hancock by Mr. J. Scott Allan, the sub-secretary; Mr. Rochet on behalf of the *apuntadores* and outside staff, presenting him with a handsome bronze clock and pair of candelabras. Mr. Hancock in acknowledgment, expressed the extreme gratification he felt as recipient of such handsome testimonials of the feelings entertained towards him by his fellow workers, gratification which he felt sure would be re-echoed by his wife and family.

Dr. Alcobendas, president of the Chamber of Deputies is at present engaged the New Congress Building. He proposes to have the work commenced by the month of June, the building is to be on the present site including the property corner of Defensa and Victoria belonging to the Banco de Crédito Real. Towards paying for the new building he proposes to sell the square of land in Calles Victoria, Rivadavia, Entre Rios and Pozos, which will be sufficient for the cost of the work.

A general meeting of the Progreso Club was held on Saturday, when Dr. Diego Gonzalez was re-elected president and Messrs Risso, Castro and Carlos M. Holmberg were appointed members of the Committee; Dr. Daniel J. Donovan and M. Marco del Pont being elected vicemembers. During the 6 months ending 25th February a net increase of 96 members was added to the Club, the total number being at that date 989.

A decree has been issued by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs according funeral honours to Nicolas Rodriguez Peña, a hero of the Independence, whose remains are shortly expected at Montevideo from the Pacific, in the charge of Lieut-Col. Calzadilla. On the arrival of the steamer in Montevideo, an Argentine man-of-war with a committee appointed by the Executive Power, will be sent down to embark the remains. It is moreover intended to create a feast-day, the day on which the remains are disembarked in Buenos Aires; the National flag to remain at half-mast on the public edifices; the garrison troops to form in the port, and the President and his Ministers to accompany the funeral cortege to the Recoleta. —B. A. Herald.

LONDON NOTES

MONDAY, MARCH 5.

Mr. Gladstone tendered his resignation of the Premiership to the Queen on Saturday. Her Majesty accepted it, and offered the vacant post to Lord Rosebery, who undertook to form a Ministry. Inquiries among Liberal and Radical members show that the selection of Lord Rosebery is being received with increasing favour. The so-called "revolt," has almost died away.

We greatly regret to state that Lord Tweedmouth died somewhat suddenly at Bath yesterday afternoon. Mr. Marjoribanks, chief whip of the Liberal party, of course succeeds him in the peerage, and is thus removed to the House of Lords at a moment when important ministerial arrangements are going forward.

The thirtieth anniversary banquet of the Homes for Little Boys, Farnham and Swanley, was held on Saturday evening at the Hotel Métropole, the Duke of Fife presiding. The Cambridge Local Examination lists are published this morning. The centres in the metropolitan radius have furnished more than 1,600, of the 6,090 candidates who have been classified, and nearly 500 of these have carried off honours.

The body of Madame Patey was laid to rest in Brompton Cemetery on Saturday afternoon. There was a dense crowd of spectators, many of those present being well-known vocalists. The flowers sent not only covered the coffin, but also completely filled a carriage which followed. Renewed fighting took place on Saturday between the British forces on the Gambia and the followers of Fodi-Silah. Major Madden occupied the stockaded village of Basumballa after slight resistance. The enemy,

however, returned in force and attacked the position. Several fighting took place, and nine men of the West India Regiment were wounded. Admiral Bedford has landed the body of a seaman who has died of his wounds.

Judgment was given in the Queen's Bench Division, on Saturday, in the libel action brought by Mr. and Mrs. Martin against the Trustees of the British Museum. Mr. Baron Pollock having heard a summary of the points of law involved on behalf of the plaintiffs, said he was of opinion that the verdict and judgment must be entered for the defendants upon the findings of the jury. He came to the conclusion that there was no publication, especially as the Trustees made no profit out of lending the books.

Mr. Arthur Wicks, who is being sued for breach of promise by Miss Chattle, a lady barber, gave evidence on his own behalf in the Queen's Bench Division on Saturday before Mr. Justice Wright. He maintained that the plaintiff knew at the time she was seduced by him that he was a married man, and was content to be his mistress, but admitted that many of his statements to her and to other persons as to intentions were "all lies." The hearing was again adjourned.

In the case of Sanderson v. Sanderson and Sanderson, heard in the Divorce Court on Saturday, the petitioner sought a divorce from his wife on account of her alleged adultery with the co-respondent. Both gentlemen were engaged in business in the City, and it was shown that the petitioner married the respondent after an irregular intimacy. The jury found for the petitioner, but as the co-respondent denied that he knew at the time that the respondent was married he was not condemned in costs.

In the football field on Saturday, the Rest of England won a fine game with Yorkshire by two goals and two tries to three tries at Leeds. Another defeat of Newport by Cardiff is recorded. Under Association rules progress was made with the Amateur, London, and Charity Cup; the four clubs left in the first-named are Casuals, Old Carlisle, Shrewsbury Foresters, and Bishop Auckland. There were several surprises in the League competition, due in some degree to the absence of leading men at Belfast, where England and Ireland played a drawn game.

MR. GLADSTONE'S RESIGNATION.

(FROM "THE COURT CIRCULAR.") Windsor, March 3.

The Queen held a Council to-day at half-past one o'clock, at which were present the Earl of Kimberley, K.G., Lord President of the Council and Secretary of State for India; Earl Spencer, K.G., First Lord of the Admiralty; the Marquis of Ripon, K.G., Secretary of State for the Colonies; the Right Hon. W.E. Gladstone, M.P., First Lord of the Treasury and Lord Privy Seal; and the Right Hon. Sir William Vernon Harcourt, M.P., Chancellor of the Exchequer.

The Earl of Kimberley had an audience of her Majesty.

Sir Charles Linnex Peel, K.C.B., was in attendance as Clerk of the Council, Lord Aton and Colonel Edward Pelham Clinton were in attendance as Lord and Groom-in-Waiting.

After the Council the Right Hon. W.E. Gladstone had an audience of the Queen, and tendered his resignation, which was graciously accepted by her Majesty.

The Queen summoned the Earl of Rosebery, K.G., Secretary for Foreign Affairs, and offered him the post of Prime Minister vacated by the Right Hon. W.E. Gladstone, M.P.

The Earl of Rosebery has accepted her Majesty's offer.

MR. GLADSTONE AND THE QUEEN.

Mr. Gladstone's last visit to the Queen as a Minister of the Crown was removed by more than half-a-century from his first, which took place on September 3, 1841. It was on August 30 of that year that, upon the fall of the Melbourne Ministry, Sir Robert Peel received her Majesty's commands to form an Administration; and among those whom the new Premier summoned to have interviews with him on the following morning was Mr. Gladstone, then member for Newark, as he had been since 1832. The day afterwards Peel submitted the list of his Ministry to the Queen, and this included Mr. Gladstone as Vice-President of the Board of Trade. This position did not carry with it a seat in the Cabinet; but on September 3, when the members of the new Administration went to Claremont to be sworn, Mr. Gladstone received a summons to attend, it being, as was said by the newspapers of the time, "her Majesty's gracious pleasure to confer the honour of a Privy-Councillor upon him." But, although this was his first official visit to the Queen, Mr. Gladstone, within a very few weeks after her accession to the Throne, had had occasion to make public reference to her Majesty which can with pleasure be recalled now. On August 9, 1837, he was present at a dinner given by the Manchester Conservatives to celebrate his then recent candidature for their borough; and, in the course of his speech, he denounced the electioneering use to which he asserted the name of the young Sovereign had been put. Sir Henry Brough (then Treasurer of the Navy and of Customs, and afterwards Lord Comptroler) had been saying that the Queen had definite and firm opinions upon all the questions of the day. "What!" exclaimed Mr. Gladstone, "does Sir Henry Brough conceive that amidst the shades of Kensington Gardens the Princess Victoria has been studying the

question of Irish Municipal Corporation; that she has taken her morning walks with the Division List in her hand, and has over her evening tea, discussed the probability of Tory or Whig ascendancy? There was sufficient evidence, he held, to know that she had never meddled with party politics; and he expressed the firm belief that her Majesty—who had been given a sound and careful education, who had been versed in all becoming accomplishments, made intimately acquainted with the history of her country, and brought up in the knowledge and fear of God—would be found to unite with female delicacy and grace a masculine vigour of understanding, and that determined tone of character which had honourably distinguished so many members of her illustrious house. The prophecy is one which Mr. Gladstone can to-day recall with absolute satisfaction, and the Queen with pride.

MR. GLADSTONE.

A Colossal figure has retreated from the public scene; but we want a certain perspective to form a true idea of its magnitude. We need also the full effect of contrast. It is no disparagement of Mr. Gladstone's successors to say that it must, for a time at least, be their hard fate to make us only the more sensible of our loss in his retirement. He leaves a void in the popular imagination and in the popular heart. Many years must pass in our history before any such extraordinary union of qualities can be found in a political leader. Others may have the same intellectual pre-eminence, others again the same passion for progress, or the same energy and strength of will. Mr. Gladstone has these in rare combination, yet the portent of their union in one individual is not enough to explain his hold on the sympathies of the people. The secret is to be found in character, in the popular belief that the greatest of Mr. Gladstone's victories was his victory over himself. The reverence for him is by no means the reverence for a man who has been always successful, or even always right. It is a reverence for one who has been always true, who has had the courage to walk by his own light wherever it led him. The people understand this kind of heroism by instinct. They see issues as a whole, and they are able to look beyond the zigzags of the path to the end of the journey. In every earnest mind there is perhaps something of that conflict between tradition and reason, between prepossessions and convictions, which has been exhibited on a scale of Alpine grandeur in Mr. Gladstone's career. The study of that career is the study of the making of a great mind, and it has all the interest of the revelation of a formative process.

Mr. Gladstone entered into public life with almost everything against him but his heroic strength of character. His political principles were those which his filial devotion had contrasted from a Tory ancestry and his enthusiasm from the associations of Oxford. He thought that the Oxford movement had regenerated the Church, and had strengthened it for the reconquest of an alienated nation. He naturally believed that this regenerated Church was divine, and that the State, being only human, there could be no question of supremacy between them. Many other beliefs went with these beliefs of his youth. They had a coherence and interdependence which served to make them a whole edifice of antiquarian reaction in politics, and in almost every school of thought standing four square to all the winds of Heaven. Mr. Gladstone had a stronger prison house of this kind than most of his contemporaries, but he was a stronger man. He escaped from it, and in the almost superhuman energy and courage of the endeavour lies the interest of his career. His Toryism gradually yielded to his intellectual sense of the truth of Free Trade, and his ecclesiasticism to the perception that the Church of his almost idolatrous preference was but one of many broken lights. Many might have claimed a share in the formation of his earlier prejudices and his earlier errors, but to himself alone belonged the credit of his conversion. Never in all our political history has there been such a splendid compensation in new service for old shortcomings in the popular cause. Almost any one of Mr. Gladstone's chief legislative achievements would have served to give the author of it an enduring name. The union of them is dazzling in its accumulation of the glories of statesmanship. The first great Budget swept away at one stroke more than a hundred and thirty duties, many of them duties on the first necessities of life. The second, which followed the Treaty of Commerce with France, and which was intended to give effect to it, was a fiscal revolution. It limited the tariff to only forty-eight articles, and, above all things, it repealed the paper duty. This last reform alone might have served to make the political fortune of any statesman. Its effects will endure to this latest posterity, and it is not too much to say that it has transferred power from a class to the entire nation. It was the immediate cause of Mr. Disraeli's Reform Bill; and to its author and Mr. Bright together we owe it that the Bill was eventually transformed into one of the most comprehensive measures of our time.

The Irish Church measures again were on the same colossal scale. But for Mr. Gladstone we should have had Mr. Disraeli's bidding a host of endowed and dependent churches. He saw that the true principle was not the levelling up to a universal universal subservience of religion to the State, but a levelling down to a general independence. The speech in

which he introduced the Irish Church Bill of 1869 is, with the scheme it embodies, one of the most astonishing examples of creative genius in politics in the whole field of statesmanship. It was a whole treatise on a most comprehensive scheme of policy; and while, in its ultimate effects, it saved the public conscience from the scandal it abolished, it also started the institution it only seemed to threaten on a new and more prosperous career. Irish Church reform was but a part of a vast scheme of policy; and the announcement of that scheme, made at the time, included a reform of the Irish law, the completion of the work of electoral reform, and a national system of education. Any one of these, as we have said, would have been enduring titles to glory for any other statesman. If we add to them the recent measures which have given local self-government to rural England, and to the whole country, and which, with no less certainty, have secured the ultimate triumph of Home Rule, we have a series of labours of Hercules in constructive statesmanship without a parallel, perhaps, in the political history of our own, or of any other time.—*Daily News*, Mch. 5.

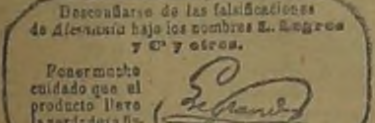

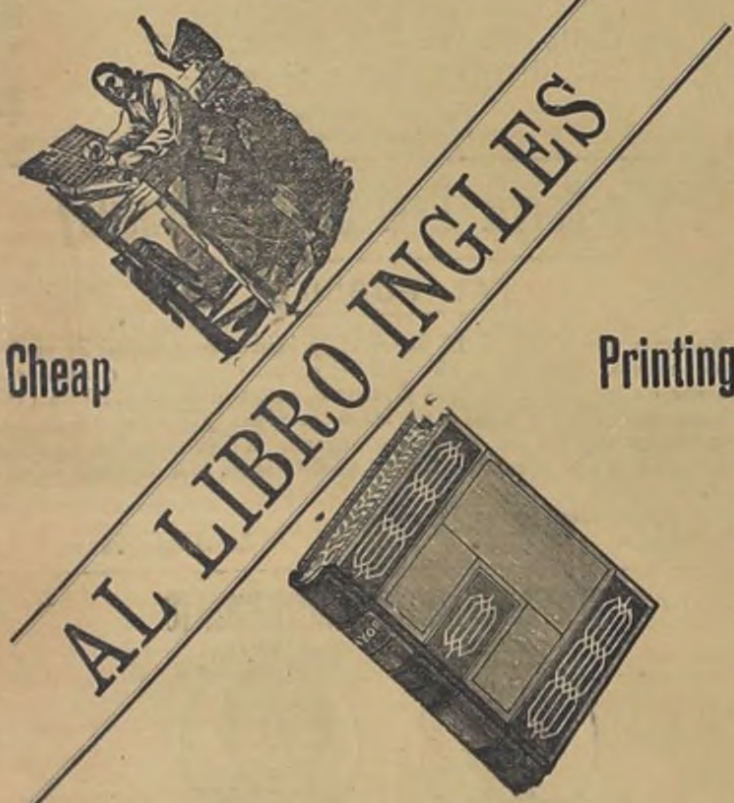
