POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives sat on Thursday. Drs. Castro and Schiaffino presented a Bill for regulating the mortgaging of administrative salaries. Sr. Castelli presented a Bill for authorizing the Municipality of Durazno to contract a loan of \$10,000 with the Bank of the Republic, to be applied to the building of three bridges in that Department. Dr. Espalter presented a Bill regulating the profession of notary. Referred to the corresponding Committee. Full approval was given to a resolution ordaining a call for new tenders for the printing work of the Chamber. The election of deputies to form part of the Permanent Commission during the extraordinary sessions then took place with the following result: Members, Drs. J. B. Schiaffino, J. Espalter, A. Dutort y Alvarez, C. A. Berro and M. C. Martinez; Substitutes, B. M. Cuñarro, A. Goso, D. Pous, A. R. Larreta and E. Regules. There was no further business of general interest.

The resignation of four members of the Nationalist Committee, referred to in our last, does not seem to be a very important affair, as there is no political question behind it, but merely a misunderstanding or slight irregularity of proceeding in the bosom of the Commission itself, which seems to have offended the tender «dignity» of the resigning members. No doubt this will be smoothed over without serious consequences, efforts to that effect being already on foot. On the other hand, the Directorate—or what remains of it—has decided to accept the resignation of Dr. Eduardo Acevedo Diaz, calling as his substitute Dr. E. Mas. This creates the peculiar situation that the *Nacional*, the press organ of the party is in discord with the Directorate of the party. The *Nacional*, however, has always been more of an exponent of the personal opinions of Dr. Diaz, than a representative organ of the party as a whole.

It is again stated that Dr. Campistegui will abandon the portfolio of Finance in February or March next, in order to undertake a tour in Europe, and it is even said that he has already taken steps to book his passage, on account of the great rush to Europe anticipated next year in view of the Paris Exposition.

Publication has been made of a lengthy Report, the result of the enquiry into charges of abusive practices in the Squadron of Security. From this Report it appears that the officers of this body—which is not a military body—were in the habit of treating their men with great harshness and brutality, inflicting severe corporal punishments and striking them with their swords for the most trivial offences. In addition to this, the men were made to work for unreasonable hours, sometimes being kept on duty from 5 a. m. to midnight. The Report, which has been drawn up by the Fiscal Dr. J. M. Reyes, is very outspoken, using such terms as «a severity which degenerates into a truly inhuman cruelty» «atrocities» and so forth. It further states that the officers have made themselves hated by the men, that the 2nd Chief Lieut. Sota, has specially distinguished himself for his severity and for refusing to allow complaints to reach his superior, and that the first

Chief has neglected his duty, only paying a short visit to the barracks daily, and being either ignorant or tolerant of the abuses committed there. Complaints as to bad food and other matters have also been verified. The only excuse the officers have to offer for their conduct is that they wished to instill military discipline to the corps—the implication being that military discipline is synonymous with harsh treatment and brutality (which we fear is too often the case). Amongst other items it may be mentioned that men who had been on duty at the theatres till midnight or 1 a. m. were compelled to rise with the rest at 5 a. m. and to strip to the waist to wash themselves in cold water, in the open yard, in this wintry weather.

In view of the above Report, which certainly reveals a most scandalous state of affairs, the Government has issued a Resolution severely reprimanding the officers in question and dismissing from their posts the 1st Chief Lt. Col. Montoro, the 2nd Chief Lt. Sotero Diaz, and the officials L. Secades, A. Camargo, F. Etchebare, E. Garcia Zuñiga and J. Silveira. The sub-lieutenant Garcia Zuñiga is further submitted to legal responsibilities for the injuries inflicted by him on the man Puelas. The Police Jefatura is instructed to draw up regulations for the future conduct of the Squadron, which is to be regarded henceforth as a purely civil police body.

The vigorous action of the Government in this scandalous matter has created an admirable impression, and is in striking contrast to the general conduct of its predecessors in similar cases. The affair may also be regarded as a victory for the press, which first called attention to the abuses being committed. It is also to be hoped that the affair will be a wholesome warning to the officers of many other bodies, who are only too apt to think, like their comrades in the present case, that military discipline is an excuse for brutality and inhuman treatment of their inferiors.

According to the reports current yesterday a «conciliation formula» had been found for solution of the vexed question of the suppression of the Urban Guards, but we are not yet able to state its nature.

Beethoven Concert.

The social concert of the Beethoven Society, given on Thursday evening, despite a very interesting programme, was hardly so entirely successful as some of its predecessors. For one thing, the audience, not so large as usual owing to counter attractions elsewhere, was cold in its applause, and its want of enthusiasm seemed to communicate itself to the performers. Another drawback in the orchestral pieces was the absence of a harp, which had a very important share in some of the selections; its place being but indifferently supplied by a piano of not very brilliant tone. This may have been the result of a temporary and unavoidable accident, but it certainly detracted from the effect of the music, and it is to be hoped for the sake of the Society that it will not happen again. The general playing of the orchestra showed an improvement in some respects, and the strings were again deserving of the highest praise, doing some really excellent work, but we must again comment on the occasional want of accord between the strings and the wind. All the five selections from Gounod were well played, though the *Festral March* and the *Ave Maria* suffered from the want of the harp. They deserved more applause than they obtained, the audience giving the only encore of the evening to the «Funeral March of a Marionette» the «popular» item on the programme. Of the selections from Saint-Saëns that which pleased most was the majestic prelude to his oratorio «The Deluge», the violin solo of which was splendidly rendered by Sr. Scarabelli, admirably accompanied by the other strings. The French Military March and the *Danse d'Amour* from «Ascanio» were also very fine, though the audience were again slow to applaud. Miss Falleri played two selections on the pianoforte. The first of these was Chopin's Etude No. 7, one of his most beautiful conceptions, popularly supposed to depict a lover at the death bed of his mistress, and the other a «Nocturne» from Schumann, difficult and intricate rather than beautiful. Both pieces were admirably rendered, with skill and expression, but this effect was rather diminished by the poor tone of the piano (was the instrument suffering from the weather?). We are sorry that we cannot speak of this concert quite so enthusiastically as we have of some of its predecessors, but we have no doubt that the drawbacks we have mentioned will be remedied on the next occasion.

The Value of Small Inventions.
The inventor of the roller skate made £200,000. The «ginet-pointed screw» has been responsible for more wealth than most silvermines. One hundred thousand pounds in first-class securities would not represent the fortune made by the man who first thought of copper tips to children's shoes. Even a little thing like the common needle threader is worth £2,000 a year to its owner, while the «Return Ball»—a wooden ball fastened on a piece of elastic—yields £10,000 per annum; this is only one of many profitable toys. We may mention the «Dancing Jim Crow», which produces £15,000 a year; the «Wheel of Life», worth in all full £100,000; the walking figure «Joan Gilpin», and the «Chameleon top». The sale of the last-named toy has been enormous, and the profits also enormous. Indeed, the «Chameleon top» as a profitable invention, has probably excelled any one discovery in modern times, however valuable and important this may have been. As far as profits are concerned, the invention of toys pays better than those of anything else. Money has been, and always can be, made more easily out of simple patented inventions than out of any investment or occupation. Great discoveries take so many years, and cost so much to perfect that the fortunes made from them are small compared with those we have instanced. The man who discovered that a candle, if tapered at the end, would stick firmly into its socket, patented the idea and afterwards founded the largest candle factory in the world. Might not any one have thought of this simple device? Out of the millions who own umbrellas, how many realise that these unfortunately indispensable articles represent wealth untold! The frame, the cover, the materials used are all the result of numberless experiments and patents. An umbrella years ago used to be made of whalebone and gingham. It weighed as much as a portmanteau. Alpaca was substituted for gingham, then silk for alpaca. Each change meant a fortune to the inventor who brought it about. For a long time the ribs were solid; then Samuel Fox arose, took the umbrella and cut grooves along its ribs. He designed the «Patent Paragon Frame», and lived to see his invention used universally. At the death of Samuel Fox his heir bequeathed to the extent of £179,000—the residue of a total profit of at least half a million.—*Patent Record.*

A MYSTERIOUS ISLAND IN THE PACIFIC.

Much attention has been given of late to what we may call the strange case of Clipperton Island. It is not more than three miles in circumference, and it lies in the Western Pacific something like 800 miles west of Mexico. In the wide expanse of the Pacific Ocean it shows like a mere speck, so small as to be of no value, seemingly, save as a refuge for a few of the army of beach combers «who have burst all bounds of habit and have wandered far away» in the course of their downward progress. But the ownership of Clipperton Island has of late been claimed by no fewer than four countries—Mexico, the United States, France and Great Britain; and when it is added that the island is a favourite haunt of sea birds, and that many tons of valuable guano are waiting to be picked up, the reason for this unwonted solicitude even in an era of land-grabbing will be apparent. Clipperton Island is of interest in another direction. It is one of those numerous stretches of land set in the midst of the seas, sunny and otherwise, which, after their first discovery, for many years elude all endeavours to locate them again. It has now been, as it were, nailed down in one particular spot in the ocean—that is to say, its exact position has been finally determined by warships sent out for the express purpose of searching for it and settling all doubts as to its existence; and the only thing remaining now is that the question of ownership should be settled. It happens that there is another island about 400 miles south-west of Clipperton, and rich in the same deposits that make that place worth possessing for which adventurous miners are at this moment looking.

As late as July last a vessel named *Moonlight* left Altata, Mexico, on a voyage in search of this latest mysterious island, and spent fifty-two days of fruitless labour towards this end. Her captain failed to find the place, and, fearing that his provisions and water would run short, returned home to report that either the rough charts of old Captain Martin and his associates were in error, or else that some strange seismic phenomenon had caused the lost isle to disappear, years ago, perhaps, for all that mortal soul knows. Spice is added to this romance by the fact that another Frisco captain located the place definitely a year

or two before and found a small colony there—which colony is still on the island shipping guano in their own schooners, manned by numbers of their own party, to the leading ports on the Pacific slope of North and South America. Quite a number of expeditions have of late been made with the object of wresting this valuable secret from the handful of men in whose possession it is, and of participating in the spoils; and one of these days we will, no doubt, hear of a sanguinary fight for the supremacy between the present colonists and a party of marauders. Although the stories told about the unknown island vary considerably, they all agree that it exists somewhere about 400 or 500 miles south-west of Clipperton, in a low coral atoll covered with the richest phosphates. The place also has its legends of pirates' treasures, which may or may not have had any foundation in fact. One of the expeditions of recent date which have been fitted out to look for the island was the *Vine* expedition. That vessel's owner claims to have secured his knowledge of the place from the old sea captain named Martin, above referred to, who died some years ago, and who left an old chart among his belongings, which told of a small island in the South Pacific, not down on the regular charts, enormously rich in guano.

SUNDRIES.

The social and musical event of this evening will be the debut of the Opera Company at the Solis Theatre. Those who have been privileged to attend rehearsals assert that the Company will fully justify the preliminary announcements that have been made and will be found most satisfactory. The opera for this evening will be Verdi's grand composition «Aida», the artists being Sr. Sincio and Montalcino, Sres. Appi, Sincio, Sagurota and others. Sr. Polacco directs the orchestra. To-morrow the star Sr. Regina Pacini will appear in «Lucia», accompanied by the tenor Sr. Queirolo. Gala functions in honor of the national anniversary will be given on Monday and Tuesday evenings.

The French residents were all en fête yesterday for the celebration of their patriotic anniversary of the taking of the Bastille. A variety of functions were provided, the celebration being rendered unusually animated this year by the presence in port of the French warship «Protet», which fired an elaborate salute at noon. All the vessels in port put out their bunting in honor of the occasion.

The official papers have been forwarded to the Brazilian Government applying for the extradition of Morales, the assassin of the Ortiz family, recently arrested over the frontier.

The fasting man Succu, in Buenos Aires, has now accomplished over 20 days of his self-imposed fast. His weight is reduced to 66 kilos, but otherwise his physical conditions seem sound. He takes nothing except mineral water, which he also employs for washing purposes. He is said to be much annoyed by perpetual calls on the telephone to ask if he feels hungry and to invite him to dinner—samples of the good taste and kindly feeling of the Buenos Aires people we suppose. (The annoyance could easily be got rid of by removing the telephone. Or, he might send his secretary to answer the questions and eat the dinners.)

Not long ago, in attention to reiterated complaints in the press, orders were issued that the garrison regiments, when marching through the streets of the city, should do so in narrow file and with as little interruption as possible to the tram and general traffic. The order was observed for a week or two, but we note that it is already being disregarded and that the old vexatious interruptions are being made.

The telegrams are making a fuss over what they call the mobilisation of the British navy, but from what we understand this is merely the customary annual autumn manoeuvres taking place a little earlier than usual, and no special significance is to be attached to them. One hundred and twenty warships are taking part.

The engagement is announced in Buenos Aires of Miss Stella Blagden to Mr. Arthur Lacey.

A very pleasant and quiet wedding was celebrated on Wednesday, says the *B. A. Standard*, at the Scotch Church, when the marriage of Mr. William Jones and the charming Miss Ellen Robertson, both of Montevideo, took place. The Revd. Lyall Wilson officiated, and after the service the party went to the Catalanes Restaurant, where a nice breakfast was served a large number of friends of the happy couple being present. We offer our congratulations to the bride and bridegroom.

A Buenos Aires contemporary states that the first Lodge in the River Plate of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows is now being started in Buenos Aires by

Dr. Mayer, the U. S. Consul. The order numbers about 900,000 members in the United States. The American organization is in affiliation with the Manchester Unity of Odd Fellows of England which numbers 900,000 members. During the year 1897 the order in the United States paid out \$3,364,629 for the relief of members, widowed families, education of orphans and burying the dead.

General Giletti di San Giuseppe, who has been pardoned by President Loubet, after being sentenced to five years' imprisonment for espionage on the French frontier, has arrived at Rome and was immediately put under strict arrest by order of General Mirri, Minister of War, and lodged in the military prison. A decree was read to him depriving him of the rank of a general of brigade, and all right to a pension or any other military prerogatives. The Italian Ambassador in Paris had promised the French Government, on the part of King Humbert, that General Giletti would be punished, previous to his being pardoned by President Loubet.

The Rev. G. G. Froggatt, who has been for some time Pastor of the Third Methodist Episcopal Church in Buenos Aires, has been transferred to the pastorate of the Church in Chillicothe, the Rev. Martin Anejo, whom he succeeds, taking his place in Buenos Aires.

One of our doctor readers sends us the following letter, which he received from a patient last week: «Dear Doctor, I had a few words with my wife last evening. Please send me a bottle of lotion.»

It was at a noted cycle depot, and Cousin Phil was showing round Aunt Janet and Cousin Ruby, from Cornwall, the latter taking the opportunity of a visit to town to select a machine, and being anxious to secure the latest pattern of saddle. The party was shown samples of a well-known firm of saddle makers. «There», said the young man, pointing out a kidney-shaped specimen of anatomical perfection, «that's about the most suitable you'll find on the market.» «Yes, madam», chimed in the salesman, quoting from a printed circular, setting forth its merits, «as by H. B. H. the Princess of Wales and the King of Portugal.» «Bless me! who'd 'a' thought it!» ejaculated the old lady, critically examining the twin cushions «But, lor», she added, reflectively, «what a squeeze it must be for 'em, sitting so close!»

The police are said to have laid their hands on a gang of thieves, whose *modus operandi* was to narcotise hair victims before robbing them. They were four in number and had effected several petty robberies by these means.

We regret to record the death, which took place on Wednesday, of Mrs. W. Scarisbrick, née Bolton, wife of Mr. Scarisbrick of the Waterworks Company, in her 87th year. The deceased lady will be remembered several years ago as a brilliant amateur singer, having taken the part of Josephine in the amateur production of «H. M. S. Pinafore» with signal success, and having sung at many amateur concerts as well as in the choir.

Contradictory reports are flying about as to the date of General Roca's visit, and as to whether he will call here before or after his visit to Rio Janeiro. We presume they will soon be solved by an official intimation. Meanwhile preparations continue for his reception. Amongst other things, the Custom House and moles are being «done up» for the great occasion. They did want a new coat of paint rather badly.

It is stated telegraphically (which means open to contradiction) that the Czar will shortly visit Paris, Berlin and Vienna with the object of assuring the results of the Peace Conference and arranging for another Conference next year.

Yesterday's telegrams reported two wrecks of British vessels. The ship «Carlisle Castle» was wrecked in a storm off Rockingham (N. W. Australia) with loss of seven lives and a valuable cargo; and the str. «City of York» (a steamer of that name was in this port a few days ago) off Rothness (N. Rothness) Islands, with loss of eleven lives.

According to a Washington telegram, General Alger has declared that the recruiting of 10,000 volunteers for the Philippines has had complete success. Another telegram says that not 200 volunteers have enlisted, there being no confidence in the conduct of the campaign by General Otis. We do not pretend to reconcile the statements, which are a sample of the eternal telegraphic contradictions.

H. M. S. «Beagle» and «Swallow» returned to this port, from Colonia and Paysandu respectively, yesterday.

The R. M. S. «Clyde» arrived yesterday afternoon, but too late to be visited. Her mails will be delivered this morning.

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LONDON NOTES

FRIDAY, JUNE 16.
The House of Lords was sitting for little more than a quarter of an hour yesterday. The Education of Children Bill, and the London Government Bill, and the Finance Bill were read a first time.

In the House of Commons Mr. Chamberlain described as a falsehood the statement that he had been conferring with Mr. Rhodes. He had had no communication with Mr. Rhodes on Transvaal affairs since 1896. He warned the House against believing without confirmation any of the numerous statements which at a time like the present were invented and circulated for obvious purposes. Sir H. Fowler moved an address to the Queen praying her to disallow the Indian Tariff Act of the present year, which was a violation of the principles of Free Trade. The motion was seconded by Mr. Maclean, who protested against the manner in which Ministers had refused to grant time for the discussion of the subject. Lord G. Hamilton, on behalf of the Government, contended that the Act imposing countervailing duties in India was in the true interests of Free Trade. On a division the motion was rejected—152 voting for it and 293 against—a majority of 141.

An old age pension scheme formulated by the State Pension League was yesterday submitted to the House of Commons Committee on the subject by Mr. Graham, of Manchester, President of the League.

The Transvaal Raads adjourned yesterday till July 3rd. President Kruger urged the consideration of the expediency of giving a larger Parliamentary representation to the gold fields.

Eight of the leaders in the riot at Auteuil on the 4th inst. were brought before the Correctional Chamber in Paris yesterday. A good deal of contradictory evidence was given as to the part taken in the disturbance by the prisoners, and the case was finally adjourned until to-day.

With the adoption yesterday of M. Renaul's report on the extension of the Geneva Convention to naval warfare, the labours of the sub-committee of the Peace Conference appointed to deal with that subject came to an end. The members are pledged to recommend the scheme to their Government and it is hoped that a formal Convention may be signed before the break up of the Conference. A Correspondent, in discussing the present position at the Hague with regard to permanent arbitration, says that, favorable as are the other Powers, Germany must be counted with, as on a vote she would probably take Austria and Italy with her.

The Venezuela Arbitration Court held its first sitting at the Foreign Office in Paris yesterday. M. Delcassé welcomed the members to France, and M. de Martens replied. Sir R. Webster opened the case for Great Britain.

Viscount Halifax was prevented by illness from presiding over the meetings of the English Church Union, held yesterday at the Church House, Westminster, and his place was filled by Mr. J. A. Shaw Stewart in the afternoon and by Sir Theodore Hope in the evening.

At the first meeting a long address written by Lord Halifax was read by the Rev. Prebendary Villiers. Among other speakers were Lord Tennyson and Canon Knox Little. A resolution was passed denying that the secular power had authority in matters purely spiritual. Mr. G. W. E. Russell and Canon Bristow were among the speakers at the evening meeting.

The plasterers' dispute is now at an end, and the men will resume work on Monday. Yesterday a final conference between the representatives of the National Association of Master Builders' Associations and the National Association of Operative Plasterers took place at the Salisbury Hotel.

Mr. A. Pullen Barry, a fruit grower near Worthing, obtained a decree nisi against his wife yesterday on account of her alleged misconduct with Captain A. Bruce Fraser, formerly an officer of Hussars, and an ex-Mayor of Worthing. The case was remarkable for the confessions the respondent had made to a governess employed by her and to some of her relations. In the result the co-respondent was dismissed from the suit on the ground that there was no evidence against him; but the decree was granted to the husband on the finding of the jury that the wife, on her own confession, had committed her self with the co-respondent.

Liptons Limited appeared at the Worship-street Police court yesterday to three summonses charging them with having sold tea to which a false trade description or state-

ment as to the weight of the goods was applied. The point raised was whether dealers were justified in weighing in the paper in which teas were sold in packets. Mr. Cluer, the magistrate, imposed a fine of £10 and fifteen guineascosts, and agreed to state a case to the High Court. Two other summonses against the firm related to weights said to be below the Board of Trade standard. Mr. Cluer suggested that the London County Council should be satisfied if their use was stopped, and the summonses were withdrawn on payment of one guinea costs.

Brilliant weather was associated with the Gold Cup Day at Ascot. For the principal race only a small field turned out, Cyllene, the favourite, winning easily by eight lengths, Lord Edward II, was second, and Gardefeu third. The Thirty-sixth New Biennial Stakes went to Caiman, the St. James's Palace Stakes to Millenium, the New Stakes to The Gorgon, the Rons Memorial Stakes to Champ de Mars, the All-Aged Stakes to Ona, and the Thirty-Seventh New Biennial Stakes to Bettyfield.

There was an enormous gathering of spectators at Lord's yesterday to witness the opening stages of the second test match between England and Australia. The home eleven won the toss, but could do comparatively little against Jones's fast bowling. Jackson and Jessop alone made anything like a stand, and the innings closed for 206. Jones took seven wickets at a cost of 88 runs. Afterwards the Australians made 156 for the loss of three batsmen. At Leicester yesterday the home county, playing against Yorkshire, remained in all day, and hit up 295 Hampshire had much the better of their match with Lancashire, at Southampton, getting within one of the total made by the Northern team at a cost of three wickets.

COMMERCIAL

STOCK EXCHANGE.

Business to day was moderate. There were some heavy sales in Mortgage Bank shares in 2nd ring. Prices were firm and favorable, recovering a fraction. Sales as follows.

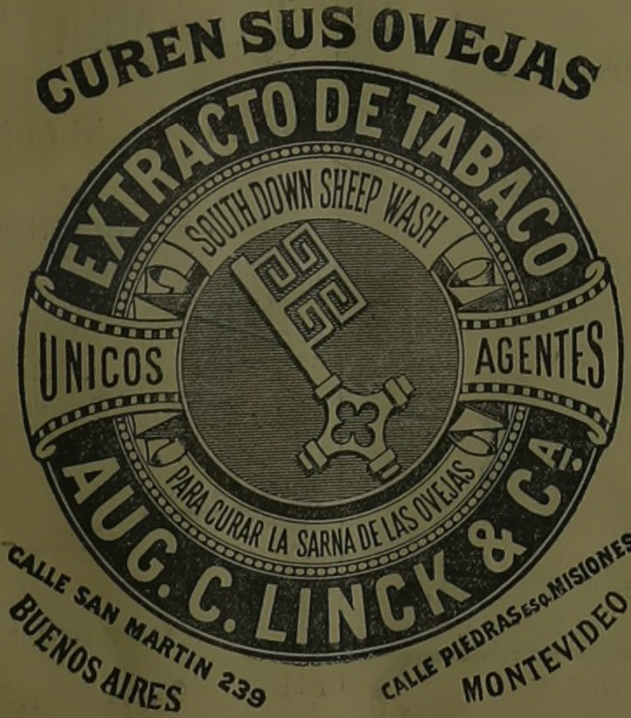
