BANK OF THE REPUBLIC.

We condense below the balance sheet of the Bank of the Republic dated Jan. 31, adding for the sake of comparison some of the figures from the balance sheet of the previous month.

Credit. - Unissued shares of 2nd Series \$5,000,000; - Unissued bonds shares, \$1,941,766.92; - Various Debtors of head office and branches, \$8,722,744.34 (in December, \$9,320,405); - Values deposited, \$3,879,322.10 (in December, \$4,205,405); - Guarantees of Judicial Deposits, \$800,000 nom. in Bonds of the Extraordinary Loan 3rd Series, at 62.50 %, \$500,000; Cash in hand, \$4,928,170.01 (in December, \$4,048,513); - Total, \$24,972,493.37.

Debit. - Capital, nominal, \$12,000,000; - Various creditors, \$3,858,354.25 (in December, \$3,406,508); - Depositors of values, \$3,893,210; - Port Commission, \$70,500; - Judicial Deposits, \$399,928.76; - Service of the Extraordinary Loan, payments by the Direction General of Direct Taxes, \$85,205.68; - Notes in circulation, \$4,620,939.50; - Reserve Fund, \$58,243.08; - Provision Fund, \$50,000; - Silver cheques conforming in circulation, \$20,000; - Total, \$24,972,493.37.

The only novelty in the above balance sheet is the appearance of the item "Port Commission," this being the fund devoted to the Port works, the account for which was opened during the month.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives sat on Thursday. A note was read from the Minister of Government excusing his personal attendance on the plea of indisposition, and stating that his recent circular to the Police, which had provoked an interpellation in the Chamber, was solely a measure of internal order, to ensure the better observation of police and other regulations for public order and safety, and was not intended to infringe any rights or privileges, being entirely within Constitutional and legal limits. Sr. Pereda, the interpellator, did not consider this explanation sufficient. The Circular, he said, had been publicly interpreted as an attack on the privileges of legislators, and he thought that the Minister should be again summoned to the Chamber and be asked to declare explicitly if the Circular was intended to apply to members of the Chambers. Sr. Castro opposed this as unnecessary. He pointed out that disobedience of the police justified arrest, and that the Constitution authorized the arrest of legislators when found infringing the law. After some further debate, the Chamber resolved to return to the order of the day, this shelving the question. It then adjourned, no public business having been transacted.

With regard to the above, it is impossible to avoid remarking that if the Deputies were to show more attention to their legislative duties and less fondness about academic questions of privilege, they would be entitled to a larger measure of public respect. They can waste a whole sitting over a trivial question like the above, and at the same time cannot despatch the numerous important measures awaiting their sanction. The public has not formed a very high opinion of the present Chambers, and therefore, until they have shown themselves more worthy of their high position, it would be well for the legislators to be more modest in their assertion of rights and privileges.

Yesterday's *Razon* attacks the Minister of Government Mr. McEachen, because he excused himself from attending the Chamber. It asks if he was upset by the contradiction of the relief of Ladysmith, and concludes by saying, "we want a Minister who is more sane, and less English." This is simply a gratuitous insult to an excellent Minister and one of the most respected men in the Republic. This is personal journalism of the lowest description, and shows how far the *Razon* has fallen from the high tone imparted to it when edited by the late Dr. Carlos Maria Ramirez.

It is foreseen that the Customs Receipts for February will be below the mark, owing to the unusual slackness in exportation. Importation however, has been very satisfactory.

It is stated that the Council of Hygiene has reported in favor of the tender for purveying the Flores Island Lazaretto presented by Sr. Felix Revello. Sr. Revello is the holder of contract just about to expire, and is consequently responsible for the scandals and abuses that have been matter of such very serious complaint for the past five or six years. After this experience, it is inconceivable that he should be given the contract again, whatever the public or private advantages that he offers. The mere idea is sufficient to raise a general protest, and it is characteristic of the health authorities and of their utter contempt for all public conveniences and opinion that they should propose such a thing. The Government, which we believe has the final word in the matter, should unhesitatingly reject the proposal, sending it back to the Council with a stiff admonition to exercise a little more sense and discretion. We are getting very tired of the tricks played with public interests by these pseudo health authorities, who are constantly showing themselves unfit to be trusted with any authority at all, and it is time that something was done to bring them to reason. There is much more reason for a public manifestation against them and their abuses than there was for a manifestation against the Waterworks Company.

The Decree has been issued appointing Col. Martin Suberbia as Consul of the Republic in Naples.

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

(Continued from our last.)

The important factors of stock-farming and agriculture also demand attention. The Nat. Department of Agriculture and Live-Stock, as regards its operations, requires reform similar to that being effected in the Nat. Department of Engineers. It is not office work that is wanted by the country or that should be fostered by the Public Powers. Our extensive agricultural and pastoral areas require a special study for their improvement and extension; the public common lands (*ejidos*) cannot be longer allowed to remain as pastures fields; official action must exert itself in a practical form, opening new horizons to the poverty-stricken peasant. During the year the Government proposes to reform the (Agricultural) School at Toledo, and to establish a Veterinary School either there or annexed to the Medical College, thus doing something to supply the daily felt want of veterinary surgeons created by the increasing importance of stock-breeding interests. It has also under study the question of colonization of both public and private lands. During the year there has been presented a Bill, drafted by the Rural Association, regulating the importation and exportation of live-stock, and a convention with the Argentine Republic on the same subject also awaits legislative confirmation. The provisions of the first-named were in part anticipated by Decree in October last; this step being considered necessary for sanitary protection. Negotiations have been successfully made with the Argentine Government to procure the removal of the prohibition against the importation of plants and vegetables from Uruguay. The prohibition was removed on December 6.

The prices reached by last season's wool have been unprecedented. The production of wheat, unfavorably affected by excessive rain at sowing time and drought at reaping time, has been uneven; that is to say good in some Departments and only medium in others. Still, owing to the greater area under cultivation, the average of the harvest has been greater than that of last year. Exportation of both grain and flour has been slack owing to the poor demand in our foreign markets. The maize harvest has been in great measure spoilt through the prolonged drought. The prices for cereals, though not high, have been sufficiently remunerative to encourage agriculturists. A scheme for the regular formation of agricultural statistics, hitherto lacking, is among those awaiting legislative sanction. The holding of live-stock fairs in the Departments of Soriano, Paysandú and Tacuarembó has been carried out with satisfactory results, and will influence the improvement of strain in live-stock.

The Government has in view the formation of a geological map of the Republic, with the special object of studying its mineral wealth, and also

a measure for the regulation of sea and river fishing.

With the assistance of the Chamber of Commerce, the Government has decided several important controversies relative to trade-marks. Some important abuses have been corrected by the Resolution exacting the exhibition of powers of attorney before registering a foreign trade-mark. The Law of Trade-marks is under study by a competent Commission, which will after turn its attention to that of Patents. It is the desire of the Government to reform both these Laws so as to give more efficacious protection to industry and commerce, at the same time reducing the fees.

Abdication of The Chinese Emperor.

Peking, Jan. 25.

An Imperial Edict, issued yesterday, announces that owing to the poor state of the Emperor's health, he is unable to conduct the business of the State. He therefore appoints Pu Chun, son of Prince Tuan, as his heir. It is apparent from the Edict that the Emperor will be compelled to abdicate by the Dowager Empress about the beginning of the Chinese New Year, although it is understood that this will meet with considerable opposition in certain Court circles. It appears, however, that the Dowager Empress has been able to deal successfully with the present Emperor for the past fifteen years. While this step does not amount to absolute abdication from the Throne, it is believed in high Chinese circles that the latter is only a matter of a very short time. It has been persistently stated for some months past that this is the programme contemplated by the Empress, and that she intends to carry it out to the end.

Shanghai, Jan. 25.

An Imperial Edict, issued to-day, declares that the Emperor Kwang-Su has been dethroned, and the Prince Tuan, son of the Fifth Prince, has been declared Emperor.

The Empress Dowager held a Council yesterday, attended by the chiefs of all the Boards and the members of the Imperial Clan, when her intention of dethroning the Emperor Kwang-Su and appointing his successor was announced.

The usurping Emperor, or rather, his father, is the head of the great secret societies known as the Great Sword and the Boxers, extending over the provinces of Chihli, Shan-tung, and Honan, members of which recently murdered the Rev. Mr. Brooks, an English missionary. Hence Yuan-shi Kai, who was sent ostensibly to scatter the societies, has been afraid to interfere. The Manchian Clan favours the change of rulers, but the Chinese are opposed to it, and many predict a tremendous upheaval will result.

The decree making known the dethronement consists only of twenty words, reading:

"It is promulgated that Hukwei, the Son of Saichoo, Prince of Tao, is hereby declared successor to the Emperor Tung-Chi."

All reference to the Emperor Kwang-Su's name is omitted. The Emperor Tung Chi was Kwang-Su's cousin and predecessor.

A report has reached here that the Emperor Kwang-Su, after signing the decree and expressing his thanks to the Empress Dowager, committed suicide last night.

The new Emperor's official name is Pu Tsing. He is nine years old. His father is the head of the secret societies already named.

The belief prevails among some of the foreign residents that the Emperor Kwang-Su, if dead, has been murdered.

It is believed that the Russian forces at Port Andushan will support the new regime.

England's engagements in South Africa are thought here to have given her rivals an opportunity, which they promptly seized. There is even an impression that the British Legation was taken by surprise upon the dethronement of the Emperor was an accomplished fact.

THE WAR.

Yesterday's messages were most conflicting, presenting alternately good and bad news about both Roberts and Buller. Their statements were not only contradictory among themselves, but in several cases irreconcilable with the telegrams of previous days, added to which the chronological confusion is worse than ever. Their only effect is to leave one in a state of complete bewilderment as to the situation. We give below a summary of the principal messages, but resign all attempt at making a coherent statement out of them.

The War Office publishes a despatch from Lord Roberts at Paardeberg, dated Wednesday, reporting that after close reconnaissance of the forces and position of the enemy, he was convinced that they could not be taken by assault, without suffering heavy losses which he wished to avoid. He therefore decided to bombard their positions, reserving the infantry and cavalry forces for the task of cutting off the approach of Boer reinforcements. The plan worked most satisfactorily. The Boers were reject-

ed in all directions with loss of many killed and wounded and 50 taken prisoners. The latter said they had come by rail from Ladysmith camp, and that our artillery fire had compelled them to abandon the hill they occupied. Our losses were 6 men (killed?) Capt. Campbell, Lieut. Houston and 4 men are slightly wounded.

An unofficial message from Paardeberg, Tuesday, says that General Cronje's brilliant night march will probably result in the destruction of the bulk of his army. The Boers behaved bravely on Sunday, confronting the British although tired and worn out. It is difficult to explain Sunday's combat. All the British forces took part, but Cronje, in spite of his inferiority, maintained his positions. On Saturday night, the British mounted infantry was in contact with Cronje's rear-guard, driving it back on the main body. On Sunday morning there was heavy firing on both sides of the river.

Another unofficial message gives the following particulars published in London on Thursday evening. On Sunday Gen. Kelly Kenn's division overtook Cronje's rear-guard at Klipfontein on the Modder river, and drove them to Koodoosrand, where they entrenched themselves in a strong position; there they passed the night, Cronje fortifying himself and Kelly Kenn watching him from below. The action commenced at daybreak on Monday, General Knox's brigade attacking the Boer centre and right, General Macdonald their left, and Gen. Smith-Dorrien going up the river to cut off their retreat. The combat lasted all day, and at nightfall the parties still occupied the same positions. The Boers were completely defeated (2) The British losses in this action were heavy, Generals Macdonald and Knox were wounded and 39 other officers, 9 chiefs and 39 officers killed (this is evidently some bungling in transmission). The Boer chief confessed their losses over 800.

On Tuesday Cronje asked for a truce to bury the dead and succour the wounded. Cronje's positions, it is said, were prepared beforehand in view of a forced retreat from Modder River, and are very similar to those occupied at Magersfontein. General Macdonald's wound, which is in the eye, is said to be severe but not mortal. His Highland Brigade suffered severely in the action.

A Daily Mail message adds that, in reply to Cronje's request for a truce, Kitchener said he would not give him a minute, but would fight him till he surrendered or was conquered. It was General Botha's column from Colesburg that arrived to reinforce Cronje (there seems to have been another from Ladysmith as well). The messages state that it was repulsed and dispersed, and also that it held its positions!

An afternoon telegram from Paardeberg says Cronje is helplessly lost. He is sheltered in the depression formed by the dry bed of the Modder, but this is dominated by the British artillery, and the infantry hem in to the east and west.

Telegrams from Boer sources, which it is useless to repeat in detail, claim great victories for the Boer forces at Koodoosrand and Paardeberg on Saturday and Sunday. In the former they took 40 British prisoners, only losing 2 killed and 4 wounded, and in the latter they took 2 officers and 83 men prisoners whom they sent to Waterburg, their own losses being 8 killed and 12 wounded. The British completely failed in the attempt to surround Cronje, and now the Boers are trying to prevent the British from entering Kimberley!! A message of German origin says the British losses at Paardeberg were 100 officers and 1200 men!!

A Chieveley telegram dated Wednesday states that the advance of Buller's column continues without interruption. The Boers have been dislodged from their last positions on the banks of the Tagela. Col. Thorpe's cavalry and the Dablu fusiliers have occupied Colenso and captured a Transvaal flag. The Boers were using their artillery on Hlangwana Hill and Colenso, and the British infantry had to advance under a hot rifle fire, but they were well covered and suffered few losses. The enemy had a railway line from Colenso to Baiwana. The British found a large quantity of munitions and provisions abandoned by the Boers. No great resistance was anticipated, and it was hoped to be in Ladysmith in a few days.

Another message expresses doubt whether all Buller's forces have yet been able to cross the Tagela. The river is swollen and the passage difficult. The Boers still occupy some very strong positions and Buller will have a tough fight to dislodge them. Ladysmith is still being vigorously bombarded from Baiwana and Baarwe Bank, but with little damage. It is doubtful if the besieging forces have greatly diminished in number. Buller's forces are visible from Ladysmith.

The War Office publishes the following losses at the Tagela: Capt. W. Thabana killed, Sub-Lieut. Colchester, Wemyss and Park wounded. One of Kruger's numerous grandsons has been killed. Mrs. Kruger is ill with anxiety.

We quote the following from late London papers: -
London, Jan. 26.
Yesterday brought good news. Spion Kop was surprised and captured on Tuesday night, and at midnight on Wednesday was still being held against the enemy.

Sir Redvers Buller leads us to expect a somewhat heavy list of casualties. It is not likely that the actual seizure of the hill cost as dearly the small garrison, as in the case of Sir Archibald Hunter's attack on Gona hill, outside Ladysmith, having turned and fled. The enemy, however, seem somewhat late in the day to have awakened to the importance of the position lost to them, and delivered a heavy attack, which probably opened as soon as it was light, and was continued throughout the day. Especially galling was the enemy's gun fire, with which we were not yet in a position to cope effectually. It no doubt accounted for a large proportion of our losses.

We quote the following from late London papers: -

The attack was decided upon at a conference between Sir Redvers Buller and Sir Charles Warren on Tuesday morning. It was after this that General Buller sent his dispatch explaining the importance of the hill, and stating that its capture would give him considerable command of the enemy's entrenchments. The opinion is shown to have been well founded. Sir Charles Warren, the man in possession, now considers that he has rendered the Boer positions untenable.

This notwithstanding, and particularly in view of the enthusiasm created in London by the news yesterday, it may not be superfluous to point out that the enemy is still strongly placed west of Spion Kop. If our guns, as the terrible aid of Lyddite, are, as General Warren evidently believes, able to develop so powerful a fire upon his trenches as to make their continued occupation impossible, well and good.

Part of Lord Dunsford's mounted force was again engaged on Saturday. It was in this action, which does not seem to have much exceeded the proportion of a skirmish, that Major Gildie, of the 2nd South African Horse, was killed. He is stated to have had a fixed presentation of his death, and had given instructions for his burying.

Spion's Kop has been abandoned. The position won and held by our troops - we know now at what cost - is thus lost to us. Sir Redvers Buller in his dispatch says nothing of how or why, but his bare statement, accompanied as it is by an expression of regret, does not favour the happy construction suggested as possible in some quarters yesterday.

General Buller's message announcing the capture of the crest was written shortly after midnight on Wednesday, when, as it appears, the withdrawal must already have been determined upon by Sir Charles Warren. Some delay seems to have occurred in communication with headquarters, and it is just possible that when he sent off his present dispatch at noon on Thursday General Buller was not yet in possession of the facts which made the retirement necessary. Should this be the case, the hope might not appear altogether unwarranted that General Warren can yet supply the word which will throw a more favourable light on the situation. This, however, seems improbable. We hinted yesterday that the elation over the success of Tuesday's night attack was possibly somewhat premature, and pointed out the strength of the enemy's positions to the west. Of three things one appears now to be likely. Either Sir Charles Warren was mistaken, and those positions cannot, as he had anticipated, be commanded from the Kop; or, his opinion as to the strategic value of the hill being confirmed, he is unable to bring up his guns into such position as to allow him to take full advantage of his success; or, as our Military Expert suggests, the garrison abandoned the position in a night surprise or panic.

Another alternative has been suggested as possible. It may be that Sir Charles Warren's message which announced the heavy attack on our men at Spion Kop, was misread. In the light of subsequent events it is not impossible that he used the words "position untenable," and that they were meant to apply to the British and not the Boer position. This interpretation, it is argued by some, would be more in keeping with the whole tenor of the dispatch.

Of only one thing we may yet be certain. The venture has cost as well over two hundred killed, wounded, and missing. These include six officers killed, among them being Lieut. Col. Buchanan-Riddell, of the 3rd King's Rifle Corps. The return of casualties may be conveniently given as follows:

The sound of General Buller's guns could then be plainly heard, and the bursting of the shells from the howitzers could be seen. The guns of the Boers were doing little damage, but the enemy were showing no signs of abandoning their positions, but were, on the contrary, doing their best to fortify the ground between the town and the Tegel.

—Baseball.—A return match of this interesting game will be played between teams representing the U. S. S. "Chicago" and "Montgomery," on the Abdon ground at Paso Molino, to-morrow (Sunday) afternoon, commencing at 2.30 p.m.
—Our *belles lettres* the health authorities are discussing the advisability of reducing to two days the quarantine against Buenos Aires, but it seems doubtful if this will be done, as it is pretended that the Argentine regulations stand in the way. It is not very clear how this can be, for no country is likely to insist on quarantine against itself. However, there is no limit to the absurdities of quarantine in this part of the world, and therefore we would not be surprised to hear of Argentina proclaiming quarantine against Montevideo because Montevideo does not maintain sufficient quarantine against Argentina. It would be no worse than things which have already occurred.

LONDON NOTES.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 27.
Yesterday the Prince of Wales reviewed five companies of the Imperial Yeomanry at Albany Barracks, Regent's Park. Addressing them, he assured them that he felt it a high compliment to be honorary colonel of the corps, and that he would watch their proceedings with deep interest. They would, he left confident, they assist the regular troops and do credit to their country and corps.
The Yorkshire Contingent of Imperial Yeomanry, who embark to-morrow, telegraphed yesterday to the Queen conveying their devotion, and expressing their great satisfaction at being allowed to share in upholding the Empire. Her Majesty replied thanking them for their loyal devotion, and trusting that good fortune may second their cheerful and ready service.

The last contingent of the City Imperial Volunteers, 140 strong, attended Divine Service in the Church of St. Laurence Jewry, last night, and were afterwards entertained at supper in the Mansion House. Brief speeches of a patriotic character were made.
Speaking at the dinner of the Scottish Liberal Club, at Edinburgh, last night, Lord Rosebery, who has been elected first President, made some amusing remarks on the subject of the club and about the people who remain outside politics. He commended the club for having commemorated the memory of Mr. Gladstone by the establishment of a Gladstone library.
A deputation from the Agricultural Education Committee waited upon the Duke of Devonshire yesterday at Whitehall, to urge upon the Government certain changes in rural schools, with the view of the teaching being more adapted to country life. The Duke expressed the desire of the Department to work hand in hand with the Committee, and gradually to introduce reforms in the way suggested.

Charging the Grand Jury at Lancaster Assizes yesterday, Mr. Justice Grantham protested against the Dean of Durham's statement that, from the state in which soldiers were sent out from this country, it seemed as if the bottle were the best prelude to battle. These slanders were unjust, ungenerous, and false. Intemperance in drink was vile, but it only affected the individual. Intemperance of speech and of tongue was a national crime, when the words uttered would be as useful to our enemies as they were insulting to our country.
Mr. Justice Darling, in the Queen's Bench Division yesterday, made some severe remarks on the practice of solicitors bringing speculative actions, and specially called before him a solicitor whose conduct in this regard had been brought into question in a case heard the previous day. The learned judge directed the solicitor himself to pay the costs of the defendant, against whom the action had been brought by his client.

COMMERCIAL

STOCK EXCHANGE.
