MONTEVIDEO.

SATURDAY, MARCH 3, 1900.
Santa Euterpe and Celeron.—Rev. J. G. Wood died, 1889—82 days past, 303 to the end of the year.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives sat on Thursday. Another batch of applications for pensions was referred to Committee, and various other routine business attended to. The resignation of Sr. Heber Jackson as Deputy for Paysandu was accepted, and Sr. J. M. Copello convoked in his place. Discussion was then once more resumed of the question of the pension to the widow of Senator Bauzá, and after this having occupied nearly all the sitting, the Chamber again adjourned without having reached any conclusion. (The time that is being wasted over the trivial question of procedure involved in this question is scandalous, and still more so when it is compared with the manner in which real public business is neglected and delayed. The pension was agreed to by both Chambers months ago, yet they are still discussing and squabbling as to which of the Chambers shall be allowed precedence in the granting, and over this whole sitting is wasted, and public business stands aside. We can only apply one word to such procedure, and that is, scandalous.)

Thursday being the anniversary of Sr. Cuestas' election to the presidency, the day was devoted in official circles to the usual congratulations. To the credit of Sr. Cuestas be it said, that those were of a modest description and there was no attempt to transform the occasion into a pompous public event, as was done by his predecessors. Amongst his visitors in the evening were the foreign diplomatic corps, including the British Minister. Sr. Cuestas also received a large number of congratulatory telegrams, cards and letters from the interior and from abroad. Telegrams from the departmental capitals report that the Census of the interior was duly carried out on Thursday in good order and without difficulty. The general result, however, will not be known for a few days yet.

The Oriental Tramway Company has applied to the Chamber to dictate a general measure under which the substitution of electric for horse traction may be carried out. The matter has been referred to the Foment Commission of the Representatives.

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

(Continued from our last.)

GENERAL REMARKS.—(Although we have reserved these until the last, in reality they form the introduction and conclusion of the Message.) The first act of my Government was to carry out loyally and patriotically the Law of amnesty, reinstalling in their rights all those citizens who, alienated from the country by regrettable errors, waited for a more tranquil era and the free exercise of institutions in order to return, taught by experience. My Government has dedicated itself to perfecting its administration, conceding the fullest liberty to all political centres without exception, and to making the laws respected. Liberty in order and order in liberty has been its rule in political matters; and in administration, the most scrupulous management of the public moneys and in administrative matters generally.

The Government has been attentive to the steadily increasing progress of the country. The interior, which extends its sources of wealth and of labor, has demanded various measures for the consolidation of its situation. Industry is fast growing in the capital

and other centres of population, in relation to their elements. The Rural Exhibitions which have been held in some of the Departments have been a veritable sign of progress, and have given evidence of the improvement of the live-stock, the farming of which is the principal industry of the country. To these Exhibitions the Government has given all the assistance in its power. Agriculture is also assuming proportions worthy of attention as a factor in the national wealth. The Republic owes a debt of gratitude to its interior for its dedication to industry and labor, to the benefit of general interests.

Whilst the interior is the first factor of the national prosperity, commerce and industry in general, under the shelter of peace and order, also play their part in the national progress. This is proved by the Custom House statistics. In 1898 and 1899, importation was in round figures \$24,000,000 the year. Exportation, however, rose from \$30,000,000 in 1898 to \$37,000,000 in 1899. These figures give eloquent proof of the steady progress of the country. Never before have national labor and production manifested themselves so admirably.

As may be seen, the general spirit of all the inhabitants of the Republic is in favor of peace and order. In this idea, town and country harmonize; and, if there exist certain individuals led astray by habits acquired in long years of idleness during which they lived on the public Treasury, they are in a minority, and it is the duty of the Government to keep a close watch on them, in accordance with their notorious shady antecedents; for acts which injure society in the lives and interests of its members can never be forgotten, and the factors of such lamentable errors remain perpetually stamped with public censure. The Executive, which in its political and administrative march governs for all the inhabitants of the country without distinction of nationalities or of parties, fulfils its duty of respecting and making respected the laws, enforcing the corresponding responsibilities on those who violate them.

In conclusion, the Port and other public works for benefit of town and country which are on foot, will place the country in conditions of progressive prosperity which will attract still further the attention of foreign capital in search of profitable investment, and these initiatives will be accompanied by spontaneous immigration and general progress. The Republic, judging from its annual production, is in a flourishing state, and it only awaits that its sons, inspired in the purest patriotism, combine their efforts to the end that so many benefits of Providence be not wasted, and that all honest men, whether natives or foreigners, proclaim peace and union of all citizens in the single thought "All for the Country."—JUAN L. CUESTAS.

THE QUEEN'S SPEECH.

The following is the text of the Queen's Speech, read by the Lord Chancellor at the reopening of the Imperial Parliament, on January 30:—

My Lords and Gentlemen,
The peace which had recently been broken in South Africa when last I addressed you has unhappily not been restored; but otherwise my relations with other States are friendly.

In resisting the invasion of my South African Colonies by the South African Republic and by the Orange Free State, my people have responded with devotion and enthusiasm to the appeal which I have made to them; and the heroism of my soldiers in the field, and of my sailors and marines who were landed to cooperate with them, has not fallen short of the noblest traditions of our military history. I am deeply grieved that so many valuable lives should have fallen a sacrifice. But I have witnessed with pride and with the heartiest gratification the patriotic eagerness and spontaneous loyalty with which my subjects in all parts of my dominions have come forward to share in the common defence of their Imperial interests. I am confident that I shall not look to them in vain when I exhort them to sustain and renew their exertions until they have brought the struggle for the maintenance of the Empire and the assertion of its supremacy in South Africa to a victorious conclusion.

A Treaty has been concluded with the German Emperor for the adjustment of rights claimed by the two countries in Samoa, Tonga, and other islands in the Pacific. To a portion of these stipulations the Government of the United States has also been a party.

A Bill will be introduced at an early date to give effect to the scheme of Federation which has been adopted after the most careful consideration by five of my Australian Colonies. I have watched with cordial satisfaction the gradual development of my greater Colonies into self-governing communities. I feel confident that the establishment of the great Federation of Australia will prove advantageous, not only to the Colonies immediately concerned, but also to the Empire at large.

The brilliant courage and the soldier-like qualities of the Colonial Forces engaged in South Africa have al-

ready earned high admiration. Patriotic offers of assistance, which it was not possible to accept, have come from many other Colonies with populations of various races.

I have received from the ruling chiefs of native States in India numerous offers to place their troops and the resources of their States at my disposal for service in South Africa. These proofs of their loyalty to myself and of their devotion to the cause of my Empire have afforded me much gratification.

I regret that owing to insufficient rainfall in the autumn over a great part of Western and Central India the harvests and pasturage have failed to such an extent as to create a famine. Timely measures have been taken by my Government, and by the Rulers of the Native States affected, to relieve suffering and to prevent starvation.

I regret to add that the epidemic of plague continues, and that, although its severity has not increased since last year, there is at present no prospect of its diminution.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons.
The Estimates for the Public Service of the year will be laid before you. The provision for military expenditure must be largely increased on account of the charge for military operations in South Africa.

The experience of a great war must necessarily afford lessons of the greatest importance to the military administration of the country. You will not, I am convinced, shrink from any outlay that may be required to place our defensive preparations on a level with the responsibilities which the possession of so great an Empire has laid upon us.

At a time when several other nations are perfecting their naval preparations at the cost of increasing efforts and sacrifices, the solicitude with which you have provided for the efficiency of our Navy and of our coast defences will assuredly not be relaxed.

My Lords and Gentlemen.
The time is not propitious for any domestic reforms which involve a large expenditure.

Proposals, however, will be made to you for several important changes which are not open to this objection. Amendments are required in the laws which govern Limited Liability Companies, and in those which relate to Agricultural Tenancies. Measures for amending the Law of Ecclesiastical Assessments and in regard to Education in Scotland, and for the relief of Tithe Rent payers in Ireland, will also be laid before you. Your attention will also be invited to proposals for better enabling local authorities to aid Secondary and Technical Education in England and Wales; for controlling the contracts of money lenders; for the amendment of the Factory Law, of the Law of Lunacy, and of the Housing of the Working Classes Act.

The labours of the Commission appointed by me to inquire into the nature and causes of accidents to railway servants are now completed. A Bill, framed with the object of lessening the number of such accidents, will be laid before you.

It appears that service in South Africa may have the effect of disfranchising those who are taking part in it. You will be asked to sanction a Measure by which this injustice will be prevented.

I commend your deliberations in this anxious time to the blessing and guidance of Almighty God.

THE WAR.

The entry of Lord Dunsford into Ladysmith, briefly mentioned in our last, is fully confirmed, though there is still an absence of details and of reliable information as to the new situation in the Ladysmith district. The event was officially announced in the House of Lords on Thursday evening by Lord Lansdowne himself, who congratulated Generals Buller and White and their officers and men. He Majesty has also telegraphed her congratulations, as she did to Lord Roberts, not forgetting to add a word of kindest sympathy for the loss of life.

From the latest messages we learn that Lord Dunsford entered Ladysmith at 6 p.m. on Wednesday. Separating from the rest of the cavalry, he advanced on Beeston's Farm with a division of Natal carabineers and Royal Guards. The Boer forces here were small and only offered a feeble resistance. Having occupied the farm, which was considered a strong position, he advanced on Cesar's camp, occupied by the Gordon Highlanders and Royal Rifles, who received the liberating forces with the most enthusiastic joy.

(This is the text of the message, but there is evidently something wanting.) Exactly how Lord Dunsford got to Ladysmith still requires explanation; it is conjectured that he made a large circuit by Acton Homes whilst the Boers were occupied by the British troops on the other side.

The references to Sir R. Buller's movements are most confusing. One movement states that he has "returned from Ladysmith" to his camp at Nethorpe, and he reports that only Surprise Hill is still occupied by Joubert's vanguard, the rest of the Boer forces having retired towards the frontier. Another states that the district south of Ladysmith to the Tugela is free from Boers. Yet

another that the retreat of the Boers from Colenso was prepared beforehand, as they took away all their artillery. This is all very confusing, as belated messages continue to appear stating that Buller was suffering more than one check in his advance, and no definite statement has appeared of the capture of Colenso. The history of the days Feb. 24 to 28 is still most obscure. Fortunately, the relief of Ladysmith seems quite complete. The garrison was found in a very exhausted state from heavy fighting and insufficient food. For the last two days their rations had been reduced to half a pound of meat and half a pound of flour each man. Still, they were determined to resist to the utmost.

A telegram published by the *Morning Post* states that in the action in which the British took Pieters Hill (or Farm) on Wednesday, the troops advanced for a league with set bayonets, dislodging the Boers from successive hills, with the constant cry of "Remember Majuba Hill." The Boers made a determined resistance, but eventually retreated, en masse, showing Sir R. Buller that his victory was decisive.

Lord Roberts telegraphs from Paardeberg (Tuesday) that although his troops had advanced to within 30 yards of the Boer trenches, it was the deadly shells that determined Cronje's capitulation. The Boer trenches were regular subterranean dwellings and perfectly secure. When the Boer forces surrounded they were blind (?) and completely worn out. Their farewell to their women and children was most touching. None of the women had been hurt. The stench from the unburied bodies of dead horses was insufferable. During his interview with Lord Roberts, Gen. Cronje, although understanding English, made use of an interpreter, and would only make monosyllabic replies to the questions put to him. After that he sat apart and smoked his pipe in gloomy silence. His men seemed glad at the relief of the surrender, and only their officers were downcast, censuring the hardness of Cronje.

Lord Roberts confirms that a strong Boer force (one message states 7000) has appeared to the south west of his camp at Paardeberg. His cavalry is in contact with them, and he is preparing for an attack, but first wishes to be disembarrassed of his prisoners.

It is pointed out that whilst only some 4000 men surrendered with Cronje, his forces when he left Modder River were 10,000. It is conjectured that the rest, or the greater part of them, have retired to protect Bloemfontein. It has to be remembered that this surrender still leaves a very large Boer force to be dealt with, and is more important from its moral effects than its numbers.

The War Office announces that on Saturday and Sunday last the Boers made another vigorous attack on Mafeking, but were eventually repulsed with heavy losses. Another message states the Boer losses at 40 killed and wounded, and the British at 2 killed and 3 wounded.

Lord Kitchener arrived at Arundel on Tuesday, without having met any of the enemy.

From Stertspruit General Brabant reports that he has "reoccupied" Jamestown after a sharp combat in which the Boers lost 50 killed, 123 wounded and 300 prisoners.

In the Commons Mr. G. Wyndham has presented the new War estimates. They are for 61 1/2 millions sterling, an increase of 40 millions on last year. Lord Lansdowne has announced that 39,000 more troops will leave for the Cape this month and 17,000 during April. Lord Roberts has confirmed that the Boers use Dam-dam bullets.

From Brussels, it is stated that Dr. Leyds' efforts to raise a loan of four millions sterling for the two Republics have finally collapsed, the surrender of Cronje having given the coup de grace to the negotiations. Leyds boats that the war is "only now beginning," and that Bloemfontein is defended by 40,000 men and 100 guns of the most modern type.

SUNDRIES.

—There has been so much enthusiasm for Carnival this year (despite the blithely declaration of one or two minor papers that it was a failure) that permission has been asked and obtained to hold an extra "corso." This will accordingly take place this evening, the central streets being illuminated for the purpose (both the Gas and the Electric Light Company are giving this illumination free of charge). The special feature of the "corso" will be that it will be preceded by a procession of all the "comparsas." Carnival play will be permitted from 5 p.m. to-day. Tomorrow will take place the traditional "burying" of Carnival, and play will be permitted all day.

—We call the attention of all players of Lawn Tennis to the announcement elsewhere concurring a meeting to consider an offer from the Union Tramway Company to form a Tennis Club on the Company's ground at Camino Cibils. For further information we may state that the Tramway Company offers to make three tennis courts, to build suitable

dressing-rooms, etc., and to supply well-water free of charge, to the proposed Club. The courts would be made on the lower part of the ground and would not be interfered with by any use of the main portion of the ground may be put to. All that the Company ask in return for this liberal offer is that the Club does what it can in the Company's interests. In case the offer be not accepted, we understand that a similar offer will be made to a German Football Club.

—The many friends of the well-known resident and produce broker Mr. E. Ramsay will regret to learn that the illness from which he has been suffering for some time past, has reached an acute stage, and his condition at the present moment is most critical, though all hopes are not yet abandoned.

—On Thursday the U.S. flagship "Chicago" made a target practice cruise 60 miles out. All her 26 guns were used in turn, with a record of hits that made an average of 76 per cent. It was the first time her crew had had such practice in these waters.

—Correcting a previous paragraph, we understand that the "corso" this evening will be confined to Calle 18 Julio, difficulties having arisen about the gas illumination of the other streets.

—Two million francs damages have been caused by a fire in the stores of the Cressot factories.

—The steamer Ethelada, with live stock from Buenos Aires, has been wrecked (or burnt) off Gravesend (or Yarmouth). It is feared all the crew have perished.

—Here are three social items from Buenos Aires:—The numerous friends of Mr. Grenfell, our esteemed Consul-General, will be glad to hear that he has so far recovered from his late illness that he will be able to resume his post this week.—The engagement is announced of Mr. Ernest Pasman and the charming Miss Clara Davidson.—The death is announced by cable of Mr. David McClelland, so well-known in the River Plate, on the 23rd ult. at his residence in Scotland.

—Recruiting sergeant (filling in recruit's attestation paper): "What persuasion are you, my man?" Recruit: "A farrier." Sergeant: "No, no! What religion are you?" Recruit: "No answer, asks: "What do you do on Sunday mornings, my man?" Recruit: "Go rat catching with father." (Sergeant puts R. C. (Roman Catholic)—Rat Catching.)

—Our cricketing readers will be interested in the following note from the *B. A. Herald*:—The result of the "North" and "South" match will not be such a surprise to most people. Both in fielding and batting the "North" men were far superior in everyway, and they fully deserve their victory, which now gives them the lead of the "South" by five "wins" to four. The "South" team gave a shocking display of cricket, and was perhaps the worst exhibition on record since these series of contests commenced. A. T. Spens, who from all appearances is an excellent batsman and bowler, saved the South from a more crushing defeat. Some time ago, the cricketers of Buenos Aires were anxious to get an English team out here. If the "North" men, who really get no chance of practising the game from one year's end to another, can walk over the Buenos Aires men, who are always practising in matches etc., how do they expect to face against an English team? Why any third-rate team from England, could walk through the cricketers of Buenos Aires with perfect ease; so until Buenos Aires can master a few men such as Messrs. W. E. and F. Leach, P. C. Barry, H. Horner, J. R. Garrad, and H. Mills we strongly advise them to think seriously before attempting to bring an English team out here.

—While we are reading about the heavy losses in South Africa it may be well to recall the fact that in the battle of Gettysburg, during the American civil war, one side lost 20,000 and the other 23,000 men in killed, wounded and missing, 43,000 men in one battle!

—In the Argentine army, says a Buenos Aires contemporary, "we have General Fotheringham who is an Englishman born; General Reynolds at the head of the head of the Military College, the son of an Englishman and an expert in the use of English, and in the navy we have several officers who are able to use this language with fluency, and every one of these officers is of greater value to the service on account of this accomplishment."

—It may not be generally known that Lord Edmund Fitzmaurice, who presented the liberal amendment to the Queen's Speech condemning the African policy of the Government, is the brother of Lord Lansdowne, the Secretary of War, and whose conduct he therefore had to attack. Referring to this a London paper has the interesting note which we give below:—

—Lord Edmund Fitzmaurice, in moving his amendment to the Address, must have been rather perplexed between the two conflicting sentiments of loyalty to his brother, and opposition to the Government of which Lord Lansdowne is a distinguished member. It is not surprising, under the circumstances, that his criticism of the War Office was not the most trenchant part of his speech. How-
