Saints Rupert and Leopold.—86 days past, 279 to the end of the year.

POLITICAL NOTES.

Neither of the Chambers sat on Saturday. It should have been the turn of the Senators.

It is stated that Gen. Salvador Tajes will not accept the senatorship for Paysandu, to which he is entitled as substitute for Dr. Mendilaharsu, preferring to retain his seat as Military Judge. It is rather a pity that the Senators did not take this into account before voting the greater part of two sittings discussing as to whether he was eligible for the seat. Who the next substitute may be, is more than we can say.

The Legislative Committee of the Representatives has reported in favor of the Telegraphic Convention with Argentina. This has already been approved by the Senate.

A mysterious announcement has gone the rounds to the effect that the Government has sent a Message to the Chambers conveying a Bill for a new tax on articles of consumption. Nothing official has transpired, but it is conjectured that this is the tax on home industries referred to in the President's Message last month as necessary to compensate the decrease in the import duties on similar articles. According to the *Razon* the Chambers will be asked to discuss the proposal in secret, but we hesitate to believe that Sr. Cuestas' Government will be guilty of such an enormity. It was the secret discussion and sanction of legislation that created the first serious breach between Sr. Borda's Government and the people in 1895, and surely Sr. Cuestas is not going to follow so bad a precedent as that. It is also worth recalling that the internal tobacco tax, which was one of the results of those secret discussions, was a miserably incompetent piece of legislation that has given nothing but trouble ever since. This was not surprising, for the legislators, mostly pitifully ignorant of business methods and necessities, were working in the dark, without the guiding light of the press or of commercial opinion. Under such circumstances they were no more competent to legislate on such a matter than they were to build a suspension bridge over the River Plate, and the same may be said of the present Chambers.

New English Bank of the River Plate (in Liquidation.)

A Dividend on the Road.

We quote from the *South American Journal* of March 3.—

"The Official Receiver has just issued a further report upon the progress of the liquidation of the unfortunate 'New English Bank of the River Plate,' together with warrants for a second dividend to the deferred creditors at the rate of 1s. 3d. in the £. The report is rather voluminous, and in its details only of interest to those directly concerned. It speaks of the death of Mr. Robert Ramsay, and of the election of Mr. R. Inglis Runciman to take the position of representative in Buenos Aires of the Official Receiver. A proposal had been made to Mr. H. D. Robinson, who has been managing the liquidation at Buenos Aires, to agree to undertake the realization of the remaining assets upon a basis of commission. Mr. Robinson, however, could not see his way to accept this proposal except upon terms which neither the Official Receiver nor the Committee of Inspection could agree to. The River Plate Trust

Loan and Agency Company was then approached, and agreed to undertake the business upon commission, acting under the supervision of Mr. Runciman, as from 1st January, 1900. By this arrangement a large economy will be effected. Accounts are attached to the report, showing the progress of the liquidation. Creditors are now dependent for their dividends upon the realization of the South American assets. The River Plate Trust Loan and Agency Company has undertaken to furnish, as soon as possible, a valuation of these, and an estimate of the probable time required for their realization.

We may add that the dividend warrants have not yet reached Montevideo, but we shortly hope to be able to announce their arrival, and date and place of payment. On this occasion, we imagine, the payment will be made direct here, without the cumbersome absurdity of having to send the bonds to Buenos Aires, as was the case last year.

In addition to the above we are able to announce that steps have been on foot in London, and are probably complete by now, for the definite winding-up of the Montevideo Assets Company. Official information of this should arrive shortly.

THAT MYSTERIOUS MYLON.

A South American Speciality in Animals.

There has recently been placed in an exhibition case in the Central Hall of the Natural History Museum the remains of a large ground-sloth, known to science as Mylon or Grypotherium. These relics were discovered in a cavern near Conchelo Cove, Last Hope Inlet, in that part of Patagonia which adjoins the Cordillera de los Andes, between the 51st and 52nd degrees of south latitude. The particulars which were forthcoming regarding these objects aroused the greatest interest among naturalists in Europe, and their presence over here will be certain to revive the discussion concerning the animal of which they once formed part.

We may here state that it is owing to the courtesy and friendly action of Dr. F. Moreno, the accomplished director of the La Plata Museum, who is at present on a visit to England as the representative of his country in the Argentine-Chili Boundary arbitration, that men of science on this side of the water have now an opportunity of examining and studying these curious remains.

One of the most interesting problems to be solved in connection with their discovery relates to the antiquity of the animal of which they once were part. According to all preconceived ideas on the subject, the giant ground-sloth of Patagonia (Grypotherium) was extinct ages ago, and has always been regarded as belonging to the period popularly known as "antediluvian." On the other hand, the state of preservation of the skin makes it difficult for one to believe it to be of great antiquity, and several experts who have seen it and the other remains do not hesitate to affirm that we have here no "antediluvian" animal, but the remains of a creature which may have been alive within quite recent times. The outer side of the skin has a dense covering of hair completely obscuring the deep-seated layer of small bones imbedded in the skin-substance. It was evidently removed from the carcass by man, and the holes in the air-chambers of the roof of the skull seem to have been made by battering by man, while the right occipital condyle has been cut by some sharp instrument. In the same stratum on the floor of the cavern, close to the skin, other evidence of the presence of man was found in the shape of cut hay, which may be supposed to have been used to feed the grypotherium. Associated with these remains were two or three boring awls, made from the hind legs of a large dog, probably one of the wild species of Patagonia. An abundant covering of dried serum on one cut border of the smaller piece of skin further suggests doubts as to the great antiquity of the specimen. The fact that dried serum, similar in appearance, has frequently been observed on the remains of Egyptian mummies can scarcely be said to meet the point. In the case of the Patagonian specimen the climatic conditions are widely different from those which have assisted in the preservation of the mummies of Egypt.

The question now exercising the minds of naturalists is: Did this animal exist in pre-historic times, subsequent to the appearance of man, but long since extinct; or was it living, say, within the last fifty years, and is it possible that specimens of it may be alive at the present day in the forests of Patagonia? Dr. Moreno holds, we believe, that the former view is the correct one, and meets the objections raised on the ground of the state of preservation of the skin and skull by the statement that in the same district, but in another cove, he found a well-preserved mummified human body, painted red, with the head still covered in part with its short hair wonderfully preserved, and wrapped up in a covering made of the skin of a Rhea, and holding in its arms a large feather of the condor, also painted red. Dr. Moreno is satisfied that this mummy, which is preserved in the Museum of La Plata, does not belong to any of

the actual tribes of Patagonia, but is one of an extinct race of great antiquity. Dr. Moreno, therefore, maintains that the skin of a huge mammal, which he believes to have long ago disappeared, may very well have also been preserved till the present day.

Teaching English.

"The School World" has gathered together several expressions of opinion on the teaching of English in Public Schools. These differ in many important ways. Dr. James Gow differs from the Master of Marlborough College in preferring poetry to prose for young people at school. We cannot quite follow Dr. Gow in his recommendation of difficult rather than easy poetry. The tendency to hate what we learn at school is so strong with many of us that we think it rather a mistake so early to associate the reading of good books with effort and difficulty rather than with enjoyment. The custom of prescribing a play of Shakespeare to be studied with elaborate annotations still prevails in many schools, and is generally a mistake, while to turn Shakespeare into exercises for parsing and analysis, amounts, as Mr. Howson says, to a desecration. "We want our boys, he says, to learn to appreciate the best that has been written in their own tongue. We do not want to make them use the glowing words of Milton or Burke as pegs for philology and antiquarian lore, still less as a machinery of elaborate verbal analysis." We can almost imagine we hear the chorus of shrill "hear, hear" with which these sentiments would be greeted by all right-minded boys. There seems a general agreement that the reading of English literature in class, with only the most necessary explanation, is a very valuable exercise. Reading aloud, far too uncommon with grown-up people, can scarcely be practised too frequently at school. Mr. Batterby's suggestion that "occasionally the boys might be allowed to spend a school hour in the quiet perusal of books" seems based upon a very sanguine view of early human nature.

Our Enemies.

The Emperor of Austria is credited with an ejaculation which is not without its element of truth. "Why," he is said to have exclaimed to a diplomatist, "call the tag rag and bobtail of Europe seem to be banded against England." A Viennese daily paper entitled "Die Information" annotates in an interesting way this Imperial observation. "As in the war with Prussia Napoleon had all the German criminals on his side, so at the present moment the great army of the 'declassees,' the whole of the international demi-monde, is mobilized against England. Wherever there is a cashiered officer, an expelled official, he is physically or morally to be found in the anti-English camp. That the murder Bräsewitz should have placed his sword at the disposal of the Boers is more than a mere chance; it is, so to speak, a psychological necessity. . . . All the reactionaries and absolutists on the one hand, and all the revolutionaries and red republicans on the other are anti-English." The writer, of course, does not ignore the per contra facts—that a number of the worthiest and most honest are against us. To take two examples: Dr. Mommsen, in Germany, and Father Hyacinth, in France, have publicly condemned the war. Nevertheless it cannot be questioned that in France at least Orleanists, anti-Semites, and the "stroches" in general (to use the Imperial phrase) are arrayed on the side of the Boers. Anti-Semitism, indeed, seems to have invaded even our own pro-Boer enthusiasts.

An Infant Munchausen.

A High Wycombe correspondent writes: Although the son of a resident of Wycombe Marsh is only two years and five months old, he appears well on the road to make himself a name from the fact that, up to date, he possesses a record of adventures that would beat many an adult. At the age of 17 months he toddled upstairs, took the top off a small lamp, and drank the contents! His greed for "low-flash" did no harm, and shortly after he was as lively as ever. His next exploit ended in his falling into the river at Wycombe Marsh. Again he escaped from the laws of death. A short time afterwards he walked once more into the same stream—another rescue, and more anxious moments for the parents. This week the little fellow has experienced another remarkable escape. His mother sent him into the garret with the other children while she performed her household duties. All went well for some time, till George's keen eye caught sight of the window-catch, and in his usual inquisitive frame of mind, he proceeded to open the window. With all his might, he pushed back the window, and, being unable to balance himself, he fell to the ground, a distance of 25 feet. There was a stampede from the house, followed by cries of "Send for the doctor." The youngster however, is apparently as hard as nails, takes 25 feet tumbles as other children do their bottles, and thrives on them.

To every one's astonishment, he was soon seen running about as lively as ever, the result of his latest exploit only producing a small scar on his leg.

THE WAR.

The news from the seat of operations continues to be of secondary interest; in fact, of official news there is next to nothing and the messages are largely made up of gossip and trivialities.

Lord Roberts reports an incident which occurred at Glen Siding, some 14 miles from Bloemfontein (date uncertain, Friday-Sunday). Lieut. Col. Crabbe and Coddington, Captain Trotter and Lieut. Ligon (? Lyon) of the Grenadier Guards, which were encamped there, had ridden out some nine miles from the camp, when they saw a small party of mounted Boers. Although only armed with revolvers, the officers rode towards the Boers to take them prisoners, and were received with a masked rifle fire which killed Lieut. Ligon and wounded all the others. (Anglic! they walked into an ambush.) The Boers gathered up the wounded and gave them every possible attention (small consolation).

Rumors have come from Kroons-tadt that Steijn has been deposed from the presidency of the Orange Free State, and a Board of Government of leading personages formed. No confirmation has yet appeared.

Lord Roberts reports having appointed Mr. Fraser as Administrator of the Orange State, under control of Gt. Britain. Mr. Fraser is an ex-minister of the State, and was known for his friendliness to England and opposition to the alliance with the Transvaal. The administrative accounts of the Orange State are said to have been found in admirable order and everything carefully up to date. (From which we presume the books were all left behind when the seat of government was moved to Kroons-tadt.)

The sad news is given of the death, on Saturday, of General Woodgate, from the effect of the wounds received in the gallant attack on Spion Kop some weeks ago. It occurred in the hospital at Massi (?)

A despatch from Mafeking, dated 14th, states great activity on the part of the besiegers. On the 13th there was a vigorous bombardment, causing 8 casualties. One of the enemy's trenches had been captured by a patrol. One of the British shells killed 5 Boers. (Another patrol captured 26 animals (what kind of animals?) after a combat in which the losses were 2 killed and 3 wounded, the Boers losing 7 killed. News of the relief of Ladysmith was received on the 13th and occasioned great satisfaction, but the civil element (in Mafeking) are very disheartened at the remote prospect of relief. The men have been on garrison service in the trenches day and night for 6 months, the damp weather making the situation worse, and they are quite exhausted. Special attention is being paid to feeding the natives, who are sold (or given when indigent) a broth of horse flesh and flour, but many of them die of starvation on account of their aversion to horse flesh! (The above message is put down as coming through Lord Roberts. We suspect it to be a concoction.)

Mr. Rudyard Kipling, according to one message, has become attached to the Staff of a General, a friend of his. Another puts him down as editing an English paper in Bloemfontein with the aid of the war correspondents there.

Mr. Chamberlain has telegraphed the Canadian Government, offering Canadians forty-two officer-ships in the imperial army.

The Duke of Norfolk is said to have embarked for the Cape at Southampton on Saturday last, as Yeomanry officer. (We do not understand this. Has he resigned his post as Postmaster-General?)

Sir A. Milner seems to be making a tour of the principal loyal colonial cities. His latest call has been at Dur-drecht.

We quote the following from a late London paper.

London, Feb. 26.

Cronje still holds out. We conclude so, at least, from a dispatch sent off by Lord Roberts from Paardeberg shortly after noon on Saturday, though it contains no reference to the invested Boer army, or to anything which the public would most like to know. The Field-Marshal's silence may probably be taken to mean that the position is not materially changed.

Lord Roberts reports that on Friday our outposts were again attacked by parties of Boers who had arrived from Natal. The enemy seem to have been repulsed, losing a good many killed and wounded, and leaving in our hands about a hundred prisoners, including a commandant and three field cornets. We lost four officers wounded and nine men killed, twenty-three wounded, and two missing.

In the meantime our own Special Correspondent, telegraphing on Friday, tells us that the enemy's positions are daily becoming worse.

Our latest news shows the position to be as follows. We had seized and occupied an important strategic position to the east, which, besides commanding the Boer trenches to the west, enables us to meet effectively any advance of the enemy from Bloemfontein. We had captured 560 prisoners, and we were gradually closing in around the enemy. Two thousand Boers, on the other hand, are reported to be operating to the north of us, and others are probably advancing. The cavalry under General French is protecting our flanks from attack.

General Buller, in forwarding a return of three officers killed and fourteen wounded in the advance on Thursday states that owing to continuous fighting he is unable at present to give the number of men killed and wounded. Among the officers wounded is Major-General Wynne, C. B., who was appointed to command the 11th Brigade in succession to General Woodgate.

Sir Redvers Buller, it appears from other telegrams, is slowly but steadily advancing, the enemy contesting every step of the way. On Friday an artillery duel was in progress between our howitzers and the enemy's Creutz gun on Grobler's Kloof. When darkness set in our infantry, despite the Boers heavy rifle fire, had advanced to within a few hundred yards of their trenches.

A telegram from Sterkstroom reports that Lieutenant-Colonel Hoskier, of the 3rd Middlesex Volunteers, and Captain Montmorency, of Montmorency's Scouts, were killed in fighting on Friday. General Gurnee conducted a reconnaissance in person on Saturday. The Boers are reported to be in force at Labuschagne's Nek.

SUNDRIES.

The wisecracks which misconduct the sanitary affairs of the Republic have issued a terrible decree to the effect that any case whatever of sickness occurring on board a vessel in port, must immediately be reported by the Captain to the Sanitary Inspection of the Port, under penalty of a fine of \$10. In accordance with this, on Sunday the captain of a vessel just arrived asked them to send a doctor on board to diagnose a case that had just occurred—and it then transpired that there was no doctor to be had for the task, nor one to attend to an accident that occurred on board another vessel! Comment is superfluous.

Rain began to fall yesterday about 1 p. m. and towards 5 p. m. became torrential without sign of cessation. The darkness all the day was remarkable and the weather generally simply suicidal in its depressive effects.

A painful sensation has been caused by the suicide of the youth Enrique Seré, only 16 years of age, son of the well-known man of business Sr. Bernardo Seré. On Sunday morning he was visiting his uncle, who keeps a baker's establishment in Calle Uruguay. Being missed, search was made, and he was found in an upper room with a bullet wound through his head and a revolver in his hand. (One paper states that he fired two bullets into his head, which is hardly credible.) No reasons whatever are known for the act. (What was he doing with the revolver, and where did he get it?) Besides this, there were two unsuccessful attempts at suicide on Sunday, for which the weather may have its share of responsibility.

The weather seems to have been conducive to bloodthirstiness as well as to suicide. A number of cases of stabbing, shooting and fighting among the lower classes are reported. The details of all of them are so stereotyped that our readers may easily fill them in for themselves. These affairs scarcely ever seem to vary from one year's end to another.

On Sunday, the members of the Water-supply Commission paid a visit to the installations of the Montevideo Waterworks Company at Santa Lucia, being met by the Manager Mr. Galway and the other officers of the Company. (We expect they must have received an ego-opener as to the magnitude of this much maligned Company.) Next Sunday they propose to visit the intake at Las Piedras.

When a person of note dies in this Republic, it seems to bring public life to a full stop for three days, if not more. On the first day, the Chambers (if they have a quorum) suspend business as a mark of respect. On the second day the Chambers transact no business beyond the voting of funeral honors; and on the third day attention is monopolized by the funeral. This is the effect in parliamentary circles, and a similar effect seems to extend to administrative circles as well. We may even go further and say that it extends to journalistic circles for during the three days, and sometimes for much longer, the subject of the death, the obituary notices, and the funeral orations practically monopolize the columns of our native contemporaries.

Without wishing to convey any disrespect to the illustrations dead, we cannot help thinking that this is rather overdoing the matter, and especially as regards parliamentary business, which is chronically in arrears. We

do not know any other part of the world where the death of a public man, however eminent, would be allowed to interrupt legislative business for more than one day. And surely both the official world and the press can duly honor the dead without, on that account, neglecting the living. Neither need the press imagine because someone has died that the world has ceased to take an interest in other topics. This may sound ungracious, as must every criticism of sentimental actions, but the world's affairs to day have to be conducted by common-sense, not by sentiment. This is not the only matter here in which the interests of the living are unduly sacrificed by excessive attention to the dead. Let the dead be respected, by all means, but the world has to move onwards, no matter who dies.

—We quote from the *Rio News* of March 20:—We are informed that Mr. W. G. Wagstaff, British consul-general at this port, is leaving for home by the Pacific Mail str. "Orissa," and also that he is retiring from the consular service. Mr. Wagstaff informs us that he will be unable to say "good by" personally to many members of the British community and other friends, and that he takes this means of doing so and thanking them for the kindness and attention shown to him during his tenure of office in Rio de Janeiro. We are able to say in return that our entire English-speaking colony, both British and American, sincerely regret Mr. Wagstaff's departure, and they will long cherish the recollection of his untiring cordiality and consideration, both in his official and social relations with this community. Their best wishes will go with him to the "old country" and remain with Mrs. Wagstaff and himself all through life.

LONDON NOTES.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 26.

Speaking at the joint dinner of the Eighty and Russell Clubs at Oxford, on Saturday, Mr. Asquith made an earnest appeal for party unity. The suggestion to set up a separate organization as to the policy of the war in South Africa, was short-sighted and insensate, and would provoke reprisals. He believed that an examination of the differences of Liberals on the subject of Imperialism would show these differences to be much more differences of words than of things. At any rate, whatever they were, let them talk them over and thresh them out in friendly conferences.

Addressing a number of Yeomanry, who are about to proceed to South Africa, at Folkestone, on Saturday, Lord Harris said the Imperial Yeomanry could not have been raised and trained in the way it had been but for the existence of the Yeomanry Cavalry, a force which the country had greatly underrated, but now recognised the value of. He hoped this bit of gratitude would not pass away too lightly.

Pictures contributed by British artists, with the special object of creating a War Fund, were sold at Messrs. Christie's on Saturday. There was a large attendance, and the bidding was spirited. By the day's sales £27,300 was realised.

Consultations have taken place between the Gladstone Memorial Committee and the Improvements Committee of the London County Council as to the most appropriate site for the monument which is to be erected in London to the memory of Mr. Gladstone. The position recommended to the Council will be one immediately to the west of St. Clement Danes Church, at the southern end of the projected thoroughfare from Holborn to the Strand.

Polling in the County Council by-election for Woolwich took place on Saturday, Mr. Squires and the Hon. W. L. Peel, the Moderate candidates, were returned by large majorities. Footballers were particularly busy on Saturday, when, in addition to the third round for the Cup, there were two international matches, and the great Rugby Union game between North and South. In the Cup competition only one of the four ties was brought to a definite issue, and that was at Southampton, where the local club beat West Bromwich, and thus entered the semi-final round.

There was little attention given to the League championship; but good progress was made with the Amateur and London Cups. Wales won their Association game with Ireland v. Scotland (Bagby) was drawn. The
