Arrival of H. M. S. "Veryan Bay"

The British warship "VERYAN BAY" arrived in Montevideo on Wednesday last on a goodwill visit, in accordance with an announcement made previously.

Immediately following the docking of the ship a press conference was held on board, at which the captain (Cdr. J. Bitmead, D.S.O.) expressed his

pleasure at visiting Montevideo for the first time. (The vessel called at other Uruguayan ports two years ago.)

The "VERYAN BAY" has sailed some 18,000 miles since leaving Plymouth on 12th March. She belongs to the British South Atlantic Fleet and so far on this trip has also

made calls at Bermuda, Jamaica, the Panama Canal, Peru, Chile, the Falklands, Brazil and the Argentine.

We extend to the captain and crew a hearty welcome and hope they will enjoy a memorable sojourn in friendly Montevideo.

H. M. S. Veryan Bay



H. M. S. VERYAN BAY is an A/S Frigate and is the first ship of this name in the Royal Navy. She is a frigate of the Bay class. The name VERYAN BAY is derived from a bay of that name in Cornwall. The crest of the ship is a modification of the arms borne by the Trevanion family, who are a very old Cornish family, and until recently owned the Manor of Veryan.

H. M. S. VERYAN BAY was built by Messrs Charles Hill and Sons Ltd., of Bristol. She was laid down in June, 1944, and was completed in May, 1945. She then joined the British Pacific Fleet, until withdrawn to the Mediterranean Fleet in 1947, where she remained until 1950.

In November of that year she was loaned to the New Zealand Squadron for six months, rejoining the Home Fleet in May, 1951. She was then paid off at Devonport.

On re-commissioning in March, 1952, H. M. S. VERYAN BAY was designated to the America and West Indies Station. She has since remained on this Station, with periodical return to Devonport to refit and re-commission.

During the last commission on the station, between June, 1954 and October, 1955, the ship visited both coasts of South America, the Falkland Islands Dependencies, British West Indies and part of the Eastern coast of North America, Canada and Newfoundland.

The ship was re-commissioned with her present crew in October, 1955, and, after refit, at Devonport, sailed for the America and West Indies Station in March, 1956.

Since building the ship has steamed 237,000 miles.

Commander J. Bitmead, who is 37 years of age entered the Royal Navy from the Nautical College, Pangbourne in September, 1936.

Until the outbreak of World War II he served in H.M.S. RAMILLIES in the Home Fleet and in H.M.S. YORK, the Flagship of the America and West Indies Station.

On the outbreak of the war he was appointed to the destroyer H.M.S. BROKE, where he served until February, 1941. This ship was employed on escort duties in Home and Atlantic waters and was present at the evacuations of St. Valery and Brest.

In 1941 he was appointed Executive Officer of the ex-American destroyer H.M.S. GEORGETOWN and in 1942 as Executive Officer of the Home Fleet destroyer H.M.S. FOR-ESTER. This latter ship was employed escorting Convoys to North Russia. He was awarded the Distinguished Service Order for services during an action off North Norway with 3 German destroyers.

During 1943 he served in submarines operating from Malta against Axis sea communications.

In 1944 he served in Command

of the destroyer H.M.S. MEYNELL and subsequently Commanded the destroyers H.M.S. MENDIP and H.M.S. BROADSWORD.

In 1950 he was appointed to the Naval Intelligence Division of the Admiralty.

He was promoted Commander in June, 1952, whilst attending the Joint Services Staff College as a student. In 1953 he was appointed to the Planning Staff of the Commander-in-Chief, Allied Forces, Mediterranean.

He joined H.M.S. VERYAN BAY in October, 1955.

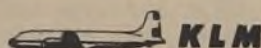
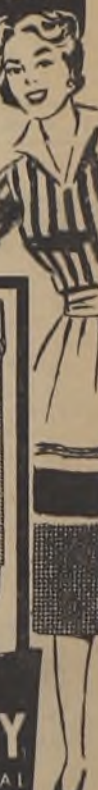

Prize Distributions at the Anglo-Uruguayan Cultural Institute

Last Thursday the Anglo-Uruguayan Cultural Institute held its annual prize-giving ceremony, at which forty-three Cambridge certificates and thirty-three class prizes were awarded to students of English on the examinations of the previous year.

The newly-elected President, Dr. Alberto Gallinal Heber, opened the proceedings with a speech delivered partly in Spanish and partly in English, in which he said that the mastery of a foreign language gave one the key to the soul of another people and that this intimate understanding was more than ever desirable today. He added that it was unlikely that the students would ever master the entire English vocabulary — Shakespeare himself seemed to

have known only thirty-five thousand words — but their continued study of the English language and literature would play its part in bringing about international understanding and sympathy.

H. M. Ambassador, Sir Keith Jopson, then congratulated the prize-winners on their success, and drew attention to the fact that, of the fifty-four Diplomas of English Studies awarded by Cambridge in June 1955 only ten had been awarded to Latin-American candidates, and of those ten six had been obtained by students of the Montevideo Institute. He considered this a remarkable result in view of the fact that the Diploma of English Studies was the most advanced of the Cambridge Examinations in English for foreigners.

The presentation of certificates and prizes followed, after which Sr. Mario Trijtenburg, one of the successful Diploma candidates, made a graceful speech in English on behalf of the students.

The second part of the programme consisted of a recital of English choral songs given by the Institute choir under the direction of Sr. Silvio Aladjem Campus.

The World of Art

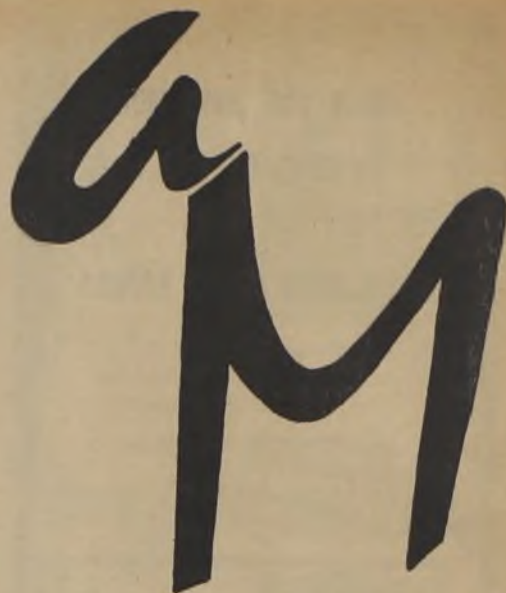
Aldemir Martins

He has received among others, the following distinctions: 1950, Bronze Medal in the Hall of Fine Arts in Bahia; 1951, the Olivia Guedes Penteado Prize, Sao Paulo; 1953, the Nadir Figueiredo Prize, Sao Paulo; 1955, First National Drawing Prize, Sao Paulo; 1955, Small Gold Medal for Modern Art, Sao Paulo; 1955, Gold Medal in the Hall of Fine Arts in Bahia; 1956, Gold Medal in the National Hall of Modern Art. He recently won the special distinction of the Grand International Prize at Venice for the year 1956.

A New York company of 120 well-known singers and musicians, many of them from the Metropolitan Opera in New York, will present eight operas during June at the University of Puerto Rico in Rio Piedras. Among the singers are Licia Alabanes, Dorothy Kirsten, Herva Nelli, Brian Sullivan, Jerome Hines and Richard Tucker. Emerson Buckley will be conductor and musical director. The troupe will be augmented in Puerto Rico by a chorus of about 40, plus 80 extras. Among the operas selected are: "Madame Butterfly", "La Forza del Destino", "Carmen" and "Tosca".

The Campion Award of 1956, presented by the Catholic Book Club, was awarded to Helen C. White "for eminent and long-standing service to the cause of Catholic letters". Among the eight books written by Mrs. White, are "Not Built With Hands" and "A Watch in the Night" (novels), and "Social Criticism in Popular Religions" and "The Metaphysical Poets".

The Mystery of Agatha Christie

Who done it? Who let the lady take £ 1,000,000?

Who cares who done it? Evidently a few million people do—profoundly. They have been willingly, eagerly, peacefully handing over to Agatha Christie and her partners in crime more blood money than Al Capone was ever able to extort with machineguns and stilettos.

Now Miss Christie has been rewarded with a CBE — for littering the pages of London and New York with enough bodies to make a murder syndicate look like a potty-cash business.

Witness for the Prosecution is up for sale in Hollywood. The price? £ 100,000. This play is now in its 13th month on Broadway and taking £ 7000 every week.

LONDON'S TWO

In London she has Spider's Web at the Savoy, now in its second year, and The Mousetrap at the Ambassadors, in its fourth year.

The Mousetrap has just been bought for filming in England.

Miss Christie, I estimated, has induced the public during the past few years, to part with a cool £ 1,000,000.

How has she worked this literary — and perfectly legal — confidence trick?

This is a mystery that is deeper and more insoluble than any Miss Christie has ever written. I set out this week to solve it.

Who done it? And how is it done?

Let me introduce you first to the suspect, Agatha Christie, the archaeologist's wife who looks like an inverted Margaret Rutherford bound and gagged by chains of pearls.

She is not an easy person to interrogate. She is not an easy person to find. At present she is in Bagdad. But she could hardly be less accessible there than she is usually when straying at her house in Devon.

When I met her, she was as non-committal as a deaf mute. You

couldn't really pin anything on her, even if you were Hercule Poirot.

How did she come to make so much money? Miss Christie couldn't say.

We discussed homicide. Naturally, she had her favourite method, but she was openminded on the subject and prepared to try any blunt instrument once. She didn't like anything gruesome, though. Murder must not be in bad taste.

IS HE GUILTY?

At the end of our encounter, I had not a single clue to the Christie Mystery. I scrupulously examined her footprints, but all they told me was the size of her shoes. Not how she managed to walk away with a million pounds.

Still puzzled, I went to Peter Saunders, the man who presents Miss Christie's plays. Could he be the guilty party?

It is certainly true that since he started putting on Miss Christie's plays they have had a greater suc-

ago. I remember she kept whispering to me, every few minutes: "What is it all about?" and I kept whispering back: "I'm sorry, but I haven't the slightest idea."

IN THE BOOK

I still hadn't the slightest idea what it was all about the second time I saw it. But the public was still going to it. Presumably some of them understood it.

Still seeking that vital clue, I took a look at the written evidence. Miss Christie's classic who-dunnit, The Murder of Roger Ackroyd.

I was immediately plunged into a seamy world in which murderers may forget their veronal phials, but never their manners.

It is a world in which the hors d'oeuvre is always a red herring and people are more busily exterminating dandelion roots than victims. Murderers, on being unmasked, say: "Thank you for a most interesting evening."

Commentary

No Change

The London Conference on Suez, and the many conversations which have taken place on the subject, the outcome of which sometimes appears to interest Nasser and sometimes not, are hardly likely to yield any concrete results.

The British Government is quite firm in its stand and, in certain circumstances, would be ready to use force to secure a settlement of the affair. On the other hand, some other Western Powers, and even the British Opposition, are against any warlike action in reply to Nasser's treachery. It is highly probable that if the British Opposition were in government they would have reacted in the same way as the Conservatives have done).

Such was the situation immediately following Nasser's nationalization act. Such is the position now. The only difference lies in the viewpoints expressed in the endless speechifying which has gone on ever since but has led to no positive result. This is not surprising: conferences and talks have never yet adequately counterbalanced an accomplished act of aggression.

Very probably at this stage, because of the failure to react immediately and effectively, a forceful solution of the Suez affair could only lead to dangerous complications with unthinkable consequences. By this time, even in Britain there is a manifest lack of enthusiasm for warlike action in defence of Britain's Suez interests.

In such conditions it is not surprising that on Cyprus the EOKA movement has sprung into renewed activity, apparently under the impression that resourceful action there, as in Suez, could secure the change they desire.

EOKA is in close contact with Nasser and they have, of course, one vital interest in common — their determination to eliminate British influence in the area. EOKA is ready to destroy British bases on Cyprus to eliminate it useless as a potential jumping-off ground against Egypt. At the same time, the Cypriots are confidently counting upon the wholehearted support of the Aso-African bloc when Greece raises the question of her annexation of Cyprus in the Security Council.

As can be seen, then, no change can be reported in the Middle East. The decisive moment for a quick and effective operation aimed at the removal of Nasser has been irretrievably missed. Now even the optimistically-inclined, who were of opinion that the constructive result of such action would be fully justified in the event, believe it is too late. Too late for a change in the familiar verdict: 'Too late to change'!

The Fall of Mr. Rakosi in Hungary

Contrary to the general impression, Mr. Rakosi, First Secretary of the Hungarian Communist Party, did not fall because he was Stalin's friend; he fell because he was Marshal Tito's enemy.

Mr. Khrushchev — for reasons of his own — rather liked and even trusted Mr. Rakosi, who seemed to be the only outstanding, orthodox Stalinist who was to be forgiven. Indeed, it was the Khrushchev-Bulgarian regime which restored him to power. The Hungarians were fully aware of Mr. Rakosi's almost incredible good luck. Whenever he seemed to be lost, a dramatic last-minute event came along to save his career. In the end, however, it turned out to be his most desperate — and seemingly most successful — manoeuvre which doomed him.

In 1948 Mr. Rakosi's star was declining in the Kremlin, and the youthful and energetic Mr. Rajk's was in the ascendant. Rajk, it seemed, was to oust Mr. Rakosi from power or, at least, was to take first place in the Hungarian hierarchy. Then dramatic coincidence — Mr. Rakosi's usual life-saver — intervened. The Tito quarrel broke out between Russia and Yugoslavia. Mr. Rakosi managed to label Rajk as a Titoist, and Rajk was hanged after a mock trial. Thus Mr. Rakosi saved himself, proving his faith and loyalty to Stalin, and his fierce denunciation of the Titoist heresy and of Marshal Tito himself were second to none. It was his violent hatred of Marshal Tito which secured his position as long as Stalin was alive; it was his hatred of Marshal Tito which has proved his undoing now.

Marshal Tito refused to forgive him, and before his departure for Moscow he repeatedly declared to western visitors that Russo-Yugoslav relations could not become normal until Mr. Rakosi went. During the Moscow talks Mr. Khrushchev — it is reliably reported from various sources — tried to stand up for Mr. Rakosi and pleaded that there was a unique situation in Hungary, and that there the whole communist structure would collapse if Mr. Rakosi were to be removed. For him, too, Mr. Rakosi was a personal matter, and — as an able politician — has expressed it — Marshal Tito was dancing to obtain Mr. Rakosi's head. Mr. Khrushchev, however, still hesitated to give it away. He sent Mr. Suslov, a member of the Soviet Politburo, to Budapest to

investigate matters, and later summoned Mr. Rakosi and his eventual successor, Mr. Gerö, to Moscow. For a moment, it seemed that another miracle — yet another dramatic coincidence — would once again save Mr. Rakosi. While he and Mr. Gerö were travelling to Moscow, the Poznan riots broke out. For a few days it did not seem impossible that it would be Mr. Khrushchev who would lose his head as a consequence, and Mr. Rakosi might keep his. But Poznan, as far as Mr. Rakosi is concerned, was not enough.

What is the meaning of the change in Hungary? It must be borne in mind that Mr. Rakosi's dismissal is no concession to liberalism. It is a concession to Marshal Tito. Mr. Rakosi's successor, Mr. Gerö, is another old Stalinist, a friend and former lieutenant of Mr. Rakosi, who came back from Moscow

after the war, where, as it happens, he had spent a much longer time than Mr. Rakosi himself. On the other hand, it is also true that Mr. Rakosi's extreme unpopularity in Hungary — as duly reported by Mr. Suslov — was a contributory factor to his dismissal. At least part of the Russian's reason for dismissing him was to save a vestige of the regime's prestige. By substituting Mr. Gerö for him they made it clear that the concessions were small and not fundamental. The greatest effect of Mr. Rakosi's dismissal is, however, psychological. Of course, he is a man of outstanding ability and — I met him once or twice — he gave the impression of being an outstanding personality. His name was connected with oppression, secret-police persecution, the Mindszenty and the Rajk trials — not to mention half a dozen

other equally outstanding political murders — a solution of all political problems and also with the tortures of thousands of innocent and decent citizens under necessarily cruel circumstances. The Hungarian refused to change or renege on any promises for the long as Mr. Rakosi was in power. The local Russian's dismissal means a change in itself; it foreshadows the change to come.

Five-week Tour by Princess Margaret

MANY ENGAGEMENTS IN EAST AFRICA

As already announced, Princess Margaret will leave Britain on September 21 in an aircraft chartered from B.O.A.C. and will be away for five weeks. She will join the royal yacht at Mombasa and sail to Mauritius, Zanzibar, and Tanganyika, completing the rest of her tour by air and road, and returning to Britain by air from Kisumu, in the Nyanza Province of Kenya.

While in Mauritius Princess Margaret will tour Port Louis and lay the foundation-stone of new buildings for the Royal College School. At Zanzibar, on October 5, she will have dinner with the Sultan at the palace. On reaching Tanganyika on October 8 she will open the new deep-water berths at Dar-es-Salaam, and from there will fly on October 10 to Tanga to visit the hospital and perhaps the new town hall. Back in Dar-es-Salaam that evening, she will attend a dinner in the ss. Kenya. She will open the new general hospital at Dar-es-Salaam the next morning, and the following day will fly to Mbeya and Sao Hill (for tea with the farmers of the district), where she will spend the night.



The Dionne quintuplets, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Oliva Dionne, were born prematurely in their father's farmhouse at Callendar, Ontario, Canada, on May 28, 1934. This was the first known case of five survivals of multiple birth. Their aggregate weight at birth was 13 pounds 6 ounces. The welfare of the children — Annette, Cecile, Emilie, Marie, and Yvonne — was considered a state concern, and the Ontario Legislature made them wards of the province. Emilie died two years ago.

PEOPLE'S GATHERING

Later she will fly to Kinangop in the Rift Valley Province, then by road to Machakos, in the Southern Province, to see dances by the Kamba tribe. She will spend the night of October 23 in the Amboseli game reserve, returning to Nairobi next day to open the Royal Technical College. She will visit Kisumu on October 25, and leave for home in the evening.

"Palefaces" of Borneo

To live in a country where the sun often shines and yet be frightened of the sun may seem a little illogical. But that is the way it is with an unusual tribe of people living in the jungles of Borneo. They are called the Punans. They have long hair and they go almost naked; but they have pale skins because they never leave the jungle and face the sunshine. They are a nomadic people, too, as TOM HARRISON explained.

"They never have any settled houses at all", he said. "They move about in gangs of between twenty and forty, a sort of loose family federation, and they live on wild fruit, and wild sago, for which they cut the sago palm and make a horrible sort of gooey pulp, six times as dull as sago pudding. It is the staple thing—apart from meat—you have to live on when you are with them and it becomes extremely boring."

"They use the blow-pipe with poisoned darts for all their hunting, and they are wonderful hunters. They largely migrate behind the big flocks of pig, moving through the jungle, and they will hang on to a flock of pig for months at a time until they finally decimate it. They have no salt and so they have to eat every bit of an animal in order to get all the things they need to keep themselves fit, and that includes eating the bones, and the intestines. They are keen on snake too, and they will eat every little bit of a snake. Though there are

many fish in the rivers, they are afraid of rivers, so they do not get much fish.

"Their buildings consist of little huts, which they move sometimes every night, sometimes every few days; and if it comes on to rain when they are ending the day, they will just put up a lean-to of leaves and some sticks, and twenty or thirty people will get into one of these little places. I have often seen Punans, because there was no room for them, sleeping standing up. They lean against the posts all round, and you see twenty or thirty people standing, asleep."

"That is the sort of extreme simplicity of their lives. There is practically no furniture, but, on the other hand, they are extremely good at making mats, and they make the most beautiful elaborate mats, which they sell to the settled tribes on the rivers, and which travel all through Borneo. Many of these mats are to be seen in museums all over the world."

- 4 eggs, separated
- 2 cups sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon vanilla
- 4 squares chocolate
- 1 cup milk
- 2 cups flour (200 grs.)
- 3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Beat egg yolks, and add gradually 1 1/2 cups of the sugar, beating well. Add vanilla, and chocolate, melted over hot water with 1/2 cup of the milk.

Sift together flour, Royal Baking Powder, and salt, and add these ingredients to previous mixture, alternately with remaining milk, stirring until well blended.

Beat egg whites until stiff, adding slowly remaining sugar, and fold into the batter. Bake cake in three 20-oz. greased and lightly floured layer pans, in moderate oven (375° F or 190° C) 25 minutes. Permit cakes to cool in the pans. Spread your favourite filling between layers, and cover top and sides with white icing.

Ivy's Recipes

Here are a few typical dishes of almost all nations, which I hope my readers will find interesting.

France: KIDNEYS SAUTIED IN WHITE WINE

"Rognons Sautés au Vin Blanc" is a favourite luncheon dish in France, one of those excellent "petits plats", dainty and yet satisfying.

Ingredients: — The number of lamb kidneys required — allow 2 for each person — ½ cup of white wine, butter, a little flour, 1 bayleaf, salt and pepper.

Method: — Remove the fat skin from the kidneys and cut in very thin slices. Melt the butter in a frying pan and, when very hot, put in the sliced kidneys, the bayleaf and season with salt and pepper. Cook for a few minutes on a brisk fire, shaking the pan, and turning the kidneys with a spoon. When nearly done — they should not take longer than 8 or 10 minutes in all — sprinkle with a little flour, stir it in well, then remove the pan from the fire, and add the white wine. Replace on the fire and stir a few minutes longer. Serve very hot.

Portugal: POTATO AND WATERCRESS SOUP

"Sopa de Batata e Agrião" is an interesting and typical Portuguese version of the French "Potage Croissant" but it is richer and contains more ingredients.

Ingredients: — Meat stock, 3 or 4 potatoes, a bunch of watercress, the yolks of 4 eggs, 1 cup of milk, 2 or 3 tablespoons of grated cheese (optional), salt and pepper.

Method: — Grate the uncooked potatoes, add them to the boiling stock and simmer for ½ an hour. Rub through a sieve and put the soup back in a saucepan. A few minutes before serving, add the watercress, finely chopped. Put the yolks of 4 eggs in the soup tureen, mix them thoroughly with a cup of warm milk and 1 tablespoon of butter, adding gradually a few tablespoons of the hot soup. Finally pour the soup into the tureen over the egg mixture. Season with salt and pepper and sprinkle with grated cheese, according to taste.

Italy: RAVIOLI

Ravioli are popular throughout Italy and have, in fact, become

decorate with capers and a sprinkling of paprika. The method of making them differs in various parts of Italy, and they are sometimes served plain and sometimes with a filling. They are often added to soups or served as an entrée with tomato sauce and grated cheese. The recipe given below is a popular one.

Ingredients: — 4 cups of flour, 2 whole eggs and the yolk of one, 2 tablespoons of oil, a pinch of salt, and sufficient water to make into a stiff dough.

For the Filling: — A little breast of chicken, veal, calves' brains, sweetbread, spinach, garlic, bayleaf, a little brown stock, 1 tablespoon of grated Parmesan cheese, 1 egg.

Method: — Make a stiff dough with the flour, eggs, etc., and knead for 20 minutes or longer. Let the dough stand for 30 minutes. Then roll out very thin on a floured board and cut into rounds of about 3 inches in diameter. On each round place a little of the following stuffing:

Put the chicken breast, the brain and the spinach in a saucepan and braise with the chopped garlic, a little bread, soaked in milk, bayleaf, and a very little stock. Simmer gently for about 45 minutes until the stock has been completely absorbed. The mixture should be dry. Remove from the saucepan, pound in a mortar, mix with the grated cheese and bind with an egg.

Fold the paste over, pressing the edges together and dampening slightly so that the ravioli will not open while cooking. Boil in boiling stock for 20 minutes. Remove from the stock, put on a hot dish and pour over them a sauce made with a little stock thickened with meat glaze, or tomato sauce, and sprinkle with grated Parmesan cheese.

Hungary: LIPTAUER CHEESE

This famous cheese, which is extensively made in Germany and Austria, is of Hungarian origin. It is made from sour milk. When the milk has soured and has become solidified it is put in a muslin bag for 12 hours to drain. (A serviette will do).

Work equal quantities of this cream cheese and butter to a smooth paste. Add just under 2 tablespoons of finely chopped capers, 1 teaspoon salt, 4 chopped anchovies, ¼ teaspoon of chopped onion, 1 small teaspoon of mustard, 1½ teaspoons of paprika, a dash of pepper.

Mix all the ingredients thoroughly, put in a mould to shape it and

decorate with capers and a sprinkling of paprika.

About 2½ pints of milk will make sufficient cream cheese for 4 people.

Spain: A MIXED SALAD

"Esqueixada" is a very tasty salad made with 3 or 4 tablespoons of dry salt cod, previously boiled and flaked, a few boned anchovies, stoned olives, sliced uncooked onion, 2 or 3 uncooked peppers, all put in a salad bowl, on crisp lettuce leaves, dressed with salad oil and vinegar, salt and pepper and garnished with slices of hard-boiled eggs.

Scotland: SCOTCH HAGGIS

Haggis is undoubtedly one of Scotland's gastronomic glories, and is of ancient origin. In the days of the Auld Alliance it was sent to Scots exiled in France, where it was known as "le pain béni d'Ecosse"; and although it was at one time believed to be of French origin, and the word "haggis" supposed to be derived from the French word "hachis", it is now generally admitted that it comes from the old Scotch dialect "to hag", to hack, chop, or cut up. Practically all countries have some form of haggis — even the ancient Greeks had theirs, a mention of which is made in "The Clouds of Aristophanes" — but the Scotch is quite distinctive, and the addition of oatmeal gives it that particular and unsurpassable flavour. The recipe given below is a traditional Scottish one.

Ingredients: — A sheep's paunch and pluck (including heart, liver and lights), 1 cup of oatmeal, well browned in front of the fire, ½ lb. of minced suet 1 or 2 finely chopped onions, black pepper, salt.

Method: — The paunch should be thoroughly cleaned and soaked in cold salted water for about 12 hours. Then turn inside out and set aside

until required. Put the pluck in cold water, bring to the boil and simmer for 1½ hours. Remove from the water and cut off the pipes and gristle. Grate half of the liver — the other half is not used — and mince the lights and heart. Mix in a bowl with the finely chopped suet, the browned oatmeal, the onions, season highly with salt and black pepper and moisten with the water in which the pluck was boiled. Put the mixture in the paunch, sew up the opening, being careful to leave sufficient space for the oatmeal to swell. Put in a large saucepan of hot water (in Scotland milk is often added to the water) and boil for 3 hours, being careful to prick with a needle as soon as the haggis begins to swell.

Haggis is served plain, without

any gravy or garnish, and the national custom is to drink straight whiskey with it.

India: TOMATO CHUTNEY

Ingredients: — 4 lbs. of tomatoes, 4 lbs. of sugar, 1 oz. of chillies, ¼ lb. of salt, 1 lb. of raisins, 2 ozs. of garlic, 1 quart (1 litre) of vinegar.

Method: — Bake the tomatoes until soft and remove the skins. Boil them to a pulp in 1 pint (½ litre) of vinegar. Pound the raisins, the chillies, and garlic to a paste in a mortar, mix all the other ingredients, adding the salt. Put in a saucepan over a slow fire and simmer, stirring continuously, until the mixture thickens. Remove from the fire and bottle when cold.

★ THE PHANTOM OF THE RUE MORGUE (El Fantasma de la Rue Morgue)

This may have made an exciting story by the master of creeps and thrills but blown up to a full length film and presented in detail on the screen all its flaws are revealed and it becomes a ludicrous matter drawing giggles where there were meant to be gasps. The stupidest detective ever to enter the Sureté is played by too genteel an actor, Claude Dauphin, whose genuine French accent is rather out of place among the American voices of the rest of the 'Parisians'. Both he and Karl Malden are too intelligent actors for this sort of rubbish. The best per-

formance comes from a gorilla which, with a 3-year-old human mentality, showed incredible ingenuity in working intricate window catches, moving wardrobes in front of doors, and so forth. The most blatant weakness is that the detective, who traced a scarf sold in Malta in a few hours, never thought of tracing a recurring clue in the unusual form of locking gold bracelets bearing three bells, which were presumably purchased in Paris. But then the whole thing doesn't bear a serious thought and cannot be recommended from any aspect. Even the description '3-dimensional' concerning the photography is wishful-thinking because the effect of depth is negligible.

I'll Cry Tomorrow

It is with no surprise that one learns that Susan Hayward obtained the Grand Prix of the Cannes Festival for her magnificent interpretation of the life-story of former Broadway star Lillian Roth as depicted in this film. Miss Hayward has the supreme gift of making you believe every line she says, and in this film she tugs hard at her audience's heart-strings all the way through. From her far from normal early years as a child star, to her later meteoric success, we follow her career, until the first hard blows of Fate strike down her fiancé and her attempts to drown her sorrows in alcoholic stimulus drive her right up to the abyss of self-destruction.

The film is a vivid human story with a strong message of hope for all those who may have suffered the heart-break of life and sought refuge in release from mental torture

through alcohol. Her ultimate regeneration may well be summed up in the Alcoholics Anonymous prayer: "God give us the courage to face the things we cannot change with serenity; the strength to change those we can, and the wisdom for us to know the difference."

Richard Conte makes a likable figure out of the ill-fated David, Lillian's fiancé. Eddie Albert is the happy-go-lucky Tony whose lack of character proves of no support for the self-indulgent heroine. Joe Van Fleet creditably portrays the worst kind of second husband Lillian could have chosen.

For pleasurable enjoyment I can recommend all the nostalgic lyrics which Miss Hayward sings, including that old favourite "When the red, red robin, comes bob, bob, bobbin' along."

"THE WHITE SHEEP OF THE FAMILY"

It is the well-known comedy "THE WHITE SHEEP OF THE FAMILY", written jointly by L. du Garde Peach and Ian Hay. Cyprus Terrorists are Minority Brutality Directed against Fellow-Cypriots

FOREIGN SECRETARY ON "DASTARDLY CRIMES"

Britain has been taking risks — rightly, in his view — in heaping responsibility on those who, in theory, might not yet be fully ready for it, said Mr. Selwyn Lloyd, Foreign Secretary, in a speech in Nottinghamshire. It would, however, be a breach of faith with the rising generation for Britain to cast away those overseas possessions which were vital to her strategic interests.

Cyprus was vital to Britain to enable her to carry out her responsibilities to N.A.T.O., and also enable her to maintain her position in the Middle East and to honour her great obligations there.

"Quite a lot of people, even in Britain, seem to think that these Cypriot terrorists are fighting a battle for freedom in a respectable and commendable manner. In fact, the terrorists have not the backing of more than a tiny fraction of the

population of Cyprus, and most of their acts of brutality have been directed against their fellow-Cypriots.

"These people are supposed to be fighting for freedom and the right of self-determination. The sincerity of that claim can be shown by the amount of freedom they are prepared to permit to their fellow-citizens."

Seventy-one Indian Communists from Tarn Taran have joined the Congress (Government) Party because they believe there is "no other

political party which could rule the country and deliver the goods".

After detailing recent outrages, Mr. Selwyn Lloyd said that such dastardly crimes would sully any cause. There was one answer to them: they had to be met firmly, with force, to preserve public order and political decency in Cyprus.

Police were brought in to keep order when 12,400 women converged on a newly-opened Prague clothing store. The attraction was a consignment of 136 poplin raincoats.

Items in Brief

The Hungarian Communist newspaper SZABAD NEP declared on July 20: "...the Party is in favour of debates, in favour of free expression of opinions, but cannot permit a field for the professing of hostile views, the profession of such views as are opposed to the essence of our people's democracy and to its constitution."

A Bulgarian, Petko Ivanov Yankulov, has been sentenced to death for misappropriation of co-operative funds.

Political prisoners recently released from East German prisons and now in the West have stated that last Christmas they were urged

to send parcels home to their families to suggest how well they were being treated in prison. In fact, they say, food and conditions at the time were well below the already very meagre average.

In works committee elections held in the first six months of 1956 in 131 factories of Turin and district, the Communist-dominated Italian trade union federation CGIL lost 36 seats and about 3,000 votes. The figures do not include those of the great FIAT works in Turin, where the Communist suffered severe losses in the March works' elections.
