From the Editor's desk:

HUNGARIANS SENT TO SIBERIA

If you have read Russian pre-revolution writers you cannot have failed to be impressed by the horror with which they described experiences in Siberia. Even so, in those dark days of the Czarist régime the true situation was less horrible than it is today. In those days there was at least a faint chance of escape and often those who managed to do so retained their freedom. Or they might have to work there for three, four or more years, and then were released. The plight of Siberian prisoners today is incomparably worse under the inhuman rule of the Czar's successors. To be sent to Siberia nowadays is to be banished there for ever: no escape is possible, and no amnesty is likely. That has been the lot of Russian people for many years; and what is still more cruel is that this same barbarous

treatment has been meted out to millions of political subjects of non-Russian origin. That is the fate today of thousands of young Hungarian workers whose only crime was a yearning for freedom.

The most infernally wicked feature of this episode is that the Soviet régime, after educating a generation of mass murderers and mass betrayers of their own people, and after massacring tens of thousands of Hungarian workers simply because of their opposition to the continued presence of Soviet troops in their country, has added to its hideous record one of the foulest offences against a sacred basic principle of civilised nations. The deportation on flimsy pretexts unsupported by just trials, to a foreign country where only death brings deliverance, of thousands of innocent people.

USSR SEEKS COMPENSATION

Last week Russian Prime Minister Bulganin directed an official note to the governments of France, Britain and Israel proposing as a settlement of the Suez conflict the payment of compensation to Egypt for losses and damage sustained during the recent hostilities.

Normally payment of damages between two enemy countries is regarded as a last consideration and of relatively little importance. The fact that the Soviet government

has proposed this step as the most important towards an eventual settlement can only indicate that the Russians themselves desire to be compensated for the destruction of Soviet weapons by Anglo-French-Israeli forces in the Middle East. This shows clearly yet again what Russian intentions really were and proves that Egypt, led by Nasser, has been relegated to the invidious position of a mere custodian of Russian arms piles there.

NO COMMUNIST "VOLUNTEERS" WANTED

The suggestion made by Moscow and Peiping of sending so-called "volunteers" to Egypt and other Arab territories for the purpose of rescuing those countries from Western "colonialist and Zionist invaders", has been turned down by the Arab governments concerned. The proposal was rejected not only for the logical reason that the entry of Communist forces in large numbers would almost certainly have meant a new world war, but even more so because, despite their unpardonably hypocritical anti-Western animosity, the rulers of Arabia and their quisling administrators in the various gov-

ernments are fully aware that just as soon Communist forces in large numbers would as Russian and Chinese soldiers march into their territories it will mean the end of their régimes.

Any child knows that the Kremlin would never permit the continuance of a form of government odious to Communist ideology in countries where Red Army units were stationed and would insist on the installation of puppet governments under the aegis of the Kremlin itself. No other form of internal control would be tolerated, whether it were pro-Russian or not.

URUGUAY PAYS FOR EGYPT'S ARMS

On the 15th of this month a Polish ship docked in Montevideo bringing Egyptian cotton from the Soviet Union in accordance with a trade agreement between the USSR and Uruguay.

We have reason to believe that this cotton was first sold by Egypt to Czechoslovakia in exchange for supplies of arms. In Czechoslovakia the cotton was processed into yarn and afterwards transferred to Russia, whence it has now been sent to Uru-

guay. In other words, Uruguayan consumers will shortly be using cotton yarn supplied in payment for Communist weapons purchased for the purpose of making war against the West.

E. Celler: "USSR Condemned by World Opinion"

Representative Emanuel Celler arrived Sunday from Brazil. He had a press conference with Uruguayan newspaper men making the following statement:

Soviet Russia stands condemned before the court of world opinion as guilty of wanton murder. It has violated the genocide convention of the United Nations and sanctions might well be invoked against her by the UN. Even Red China has condemned her sadism.

Bulganin has become punch drunk with the blows that have rained upon him all over the world and is making wild and extravagant statements, like the one advocating the sending of "volunteers" to the Mid-

dle East. President Eisenhower called his bluff and said, in effect, that we were not deceived by so called volunteers, who would actually be Russian "regulars". The President of the United States gave timely warning and indicated that were the Russians to step upon the soil of the Middle East that means something like overt aggression and we shall act accordingly — thru the United Nations as in the Korean emergency.

The United States has assumed world leadership and as such must manifest the force and strength that Russia respects.

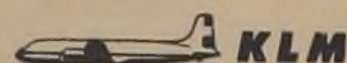

The Name is not the Same

A sigh must have been heard at some breakfast tables the other day when those who learnt their geography in the bad old days of memorizing anything and everything read that, in future, they must remember to forget yet another name. The Gold Coast will soon be forgotten; Ghana will reign in its stead. Cape Matapan confronts the wine-dark sea, not named, as it was when we were taught that it is the most southerly point in the Balkans, but on the new maps Akra Tainaron. The city of the violet crown does, indeed, remain loyal (thanks be to the gods of Olympus) to that glorious word, Athens. But, elsewhere, the map has changed as bewitchingly as a transformation scene in a pantomime. On his visits to Ireland the old stager no longer lands at Queenstown or Kingstown. He has to recognize the first as Cobh, which is pronounced more or less "cove," and he may reflect, if he is of a philosophical turn of mind, that he scarcely ever hears "cove" nowadays on his native Cockney soil. He is "luv" and "guy", but not, in contemporary idiom, an old cove or an old codger. Kingstown has turned into Dun Laoghaire, which, for all its formidably Celtic look, is sounded just like the bewhiskered lord in the old play.

Christiania is another royal casualty. Oslo the usurper was unknown (at least to English school-boys) when the traveller, with little or nothing in the way of passport, could go eastwards from Mesopo-

tamia through Persia on into Siam. Iraq, Iran, and Thailand were waiting in the wings, and Israel still suggested the Old Testament and no more. The map of Europe, across which the Hapsburgs comfortably sprawled, knew neither Yugoslavia nor Czechoslovakia. It recognized Pressburg but not Bratislava, Ragusa not Dubrovnik, Agram not Zagreb. Piume suggested a river to the bilingual as it still does, so we are told, to the learned in Slavonic studies, as Rijeka. Monte Video could then be pronounced unblushingly with two short "e's" and "the" Argentine did not have to end with an "a."

Russophobes could glower northward from Constantinople and Russophiles could enjoy themselves in Nijni Novgorod. Now we must remember to refer to the place as Gorki, which is an improvement, as it is much simpler to say. So is Stalingrad; who, even, with full marks for geography, knew of it as Tsaritsyn? The C.C.C.P.—which the Russians may, one of these days, persuade us to substitute for U.S.S.R.—has played this game of let's-change-the-name with a will. The conservative old stager, in mourning for the wasted efforts of his youth, may sympathize with the reactionary Russian who filled up a form as follows: Where born? St. Petersburg. Where educated? Petrograd. Where living? Leningrad. Where wishing to live? St. Petersburg.

Rhodesian African Sect Asks Israel To Let It In

PORT ELIZABETH, South Africa. — More than 1,300 Rhodesian Africans who were ordered last month by the Government to leave South Africa have petitioned the Israeli consulate in Johannesburg for permission to emigrate to Israel.

They are members of a sect called the Apostolic Sabbath Church of God. Their leader, Jack Sitole, told the Israeli offi-

cials: "All of us would like to settle in Israel. We consider ourselves a Jewish sect and we observe the Sabbath and practice the laws of the Torah".

Members of the sect began coming to South Africa from Southern Rhodesia eight years ago. They founded a basket-weaving and furniture industry on a communal basis in the non-white slum area where they live.

Peiping Lists 280,000 As Egypt "Volunteers"

HONG KONG. — The Egyptian Ambassador in Peiping said 280,000 Chinese had volunteered to go to Egypt, according to the Peiping radio.

"This matter was referred to the Egyptian Government in Cairo in case they would like to avail themselves of this friendly help from our Chinese brothers", said Ambassador Hassan Ragab, as quoted in broadcast.

He was reported to have said the volunteers for military service in Egypt's defense included able-bodied older men and women and students. Chinese Communist gifts of

food, medicines and medical supplies had been accepted, he said. Peiping asserted Egypt had asked for Communist China's help.

Modern Science:

Our Magic Carpet

The answer to a baffling medical problem was presented recently in Montevideo at a five-day medical symposium sponsored by the Instituto de Higiene "Prof. Arnoldo Bertoni". At this series of meetings, medical experts from both South and North America described to their colleagues their experiences with a new drug, nystatin, which has been used successfully in curing and preventing an increasingly prevalent fungus disease.

This fungus disease, called moniliasis, has appeared with such increasing frequency since the advent of antibiotics that some physicians have wondered if the era of the "wonder drugs" might not be drawing to a close. Physicians reason that if the use of antibiotics is followed by a new, and sometimes serious, ailment it may be necessary to curtail the use of these drugs. This might mean depriving their patients of medication which in the past few decades has so radically cut down serious disease and lengthened man's life span.

The problem, taken first to the research laboratory, consisted of finding a dependable medication which would destroy the monilia wi-

thout harming the patient (previously available drugs were slow-acting and frequently unreliable).

From time to time, researchers turned up new drugs which seemed promising but eventually they proved either too weak to be effective or too toxic for human use. It was, moreover, highly important that the new drug did not reduce the effectiveness of currently used antibiotics when given simultaneously.

Since from time to time the soil has yielded valuable therapeutic drugs, it was only natural that scientists should again turn in this direction for a solution to their problem. After the careful screening of soil samples from many areas of the world, two research scientists, Drs. Elizabeth Hazen and Rachel Brown, developed a drug, from a small organism in the soil, that would destroy the monilia. Many problems of extraction, purification, testing for safety, and quantity production were encountered but eventually a solution was found and each roadblock, in turn, removed.

The verdict of the experts as presented at the symposium: Nystatin has not only proved safe for the patient and effective against the fun-

gus that causes moniliasis, but can be used together with other antibiotics without lessening their ability to cure diseases.

Today, speakers reported, nystatin can be used to treat patients who have already developed moniliasis. Even more important, however, is the fact that this new drug can be given together with the usual antibiotics.

Physicians will now be able to continue using the life-saving antibiotics for their patients to combat such serious maladies as typhus, pneumonia, gonorrhea, and dysentery, without fearing that the remedy might prove worse than the disease.

SCIENCE NOTES

BENEFITS OF ATOMIC MEDICINE

"It is impossible to anticipate the future benefits mankind will derive from the new field of nuclear medicine," which uses atomic radiation and radioactive isotopes, according to Dr. Paul C. Aebersold of the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission.

Radioactive isotopes are sometimes called "atomic medicines," he said. They are produced in atomic reactors in almost unlimited amounts. Thousands of shipments are made each month to clinicians in many countries. As more and more reactors are built for power or for scientific research, more and more radioactive isotopes will be produced.

Ten years after the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission first began public distribution of radioisotopes, more than 1,200 medical institutions in the United States are using these materials, according to Dr.

Aebersold. More than 50 countries have received them from the United States since September 1946, nearly 100,000 shipments have been made to radioisotope users from the Oak Ridge National Laboratory.

NEW TYPE OF SAFETY TIRE

The Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company in the United States has perfected a new type of nylon cord tire, which it says can be driven about 250 miles (400 kilometers) after a puncture or blowout had enough to slash the outer casing.

The tire has two casings — inner and outer — each with an independent air supply. If the outer casing is punctured, the inner casing will keep the tire inflated. Goodyear hopes that its "Captive-Air" tire will replace the tubeless tires now used, which turn punctures into slow leaks and allow a safe but quick stop.

New Phase in Kashmir Mr. Meany's Address To Uruguayan Labor

Under the complete Indian domination, the so-called "Constituent Assembly" in Kashmir has now ratified a draft Constitution that makes formal and final Kashmir's accession to India. Immediately thereafter the Indian Government in New Delhi promulgated its new map of the Indian states — some of them linguistically based — and included in them was the Indian State of Kashmir and Jammu.

Some idea of the extent to which the popular will was either suppressed or denied may be had from the fact that just before these actions were taken several important members of this Kashmir Assembly were put under arrest, or rearrested after previous release, because they had formed a group that urged a plebiscite in Kashmir rather than this unilateral action. Under such conditions it is impossible to accept the Indian thesis that the will of the Kashmiris has been expressed. It has not had the chance to make itself vocal.

This Kashmir question is a thorny one. There have been mistakes on both sides and each has publicized the mistakes of the other. But right in the beginning Indian Prime Minister Nehru declared that the equitable solution must be based upon a popular plebiscite in which the Kashmiris could express, freely, their desire as to their political future. He was right then, and the principle that he proclaimed is still valid. It is deplorable that his Government has departed from it.

This unilateral action on the part of India does not, in our judgment, relieve the United Nations of its responsibility in this case. The Kashmir issue is still before the United Nations and the international body has committed itself not merely to a cease-fire in the hostilities that have taken place but the larger framework of a free, popular ballot under external supervision. Pakistan has accepted this mode of solution. India has blocked it and has now attempted to circumvent it.

Lies from Moscow

The thirty-ninth anniversary of the Bolshevik Revolution was celebrated recently in Moscow in the atmosphere of moral degradation created by the Soviet crimes in Hungary. The Soviet troops in Hungary marked the anniversary by killing still more Hungarians battling for their freedom and independence. Thus was the "humanitarian" nature of Sovietism "proved" again.

It was fitting that Mikhail A. Suslov was chosen to deliver the keynote anniversary speech. He had, after all, gone to Hungary last June to reaffirm Matyas Rakosi's hold on power in Budapest. He was in Budapest, too, lately, gathering the information on the basis of which he and his colleagues decided to unleash the Hungarian blood-bath. It was appropriate that the man who thus signed the death sentences for innocent Hungarians should be permitted personally to incarnate the Bolshevik Revolution's nature on its thirty-ninth anniversary.

But what cannot be accepted are the gross lies and slanders he heaped upon the heroic freedom fighters of Hungary. The Hungarian revolution, he said, represented a "revival of fascism." He gave great place in it to "Hitlerite forces" and to "Horthy's Fascist Army." Mr. Suslov lied. The Hungarian revolution was the spontaneous national liberation revolution of the Hungarian people seeking to end Soviet enslavement. The present butchery being performed by the Soviet Army is the real reactionary counter-revolution.

One more point made by Mr. Suslov deserves attention. He says baldly that Hungarian Communists established their own "government" and called in the Red Army. Now we have out in the open what is meant by

On Friday last, Mr. Meany, the visiting President of the AFL and CIO of the United States, gave an address at the CSU Hall, during which he said:

It is a pleasure to bring you the greetings, salutations and good wishes of the 15 million working men and women who make up the American Federation of Labor and Congress of Industrial Organizations. The workers of my country have a special feeling of affection in their hearts for the workers of Uruguay. They revere and respect you because of your undeviating adherence to freedom and democracy, even under the most intense pressures, and because you have succeeded so notably in making democracy work for the benefit of all the Uruguayan people.

It is no wonder, then, that labor hates dictatorship. To us, totalitarianism, whether of the right or the left, is completely obnoxious. Because we are dedicated to the cause of justice, we are bound to resist injustice to our last breath. We see in dictatorship and all its works nothing but injustice officially entrenched, nothing but human oppression, nothing but the denial of every human right.

Thus the trade union movement was the first to raise its voice against the Fascism of Mussolini, against the Nazism of Hitler, against the Communism of Lenin, Stalin and Khrushchev, against the Falangism of Franco and against the mixture of all of these exercised by the dictatorship of Peron. We find them all hideous, intolerable and unforgivable.

Let us consider the recent revolt in Hungary. It was led, in the first instance, by students and workers. Oppressed beyond human endurance, starved and cheated by a Soviet-controlled puppet regime which imposed the most stringent economic conditions and a reign of political terror upon them, the students and workers rose up in protest. At first they engaged merely in peaceful, public demonstrations. They were unarmed, unorganized. They just couldn't take it any longer and said so. But the Soviet puppets grew panicky and ordered Russian troops and tanks to fire on the unarmed people in the streets.

Those shots and the general slaughter that ensued, kindled a spark of resistance that quickly spread into a full-fledged, nation-wide revolution. The workers and students using rocks and clubs and home-

the "peaceful transition to socialism." Mr. Suslov has now warned us that if French or American or Indian Communists set up a "government" and call on the Red Army, it will respond to the call. Dare we ever relax our guard in the face of this warning?

made weapons captured some of the Russian tanks. The Hungarian army and air force went over to the rebels. They smashed the secret police, drove the Russian troops and armor into full retreat and in a few days gained control of their own country.

How did Soviet Russia react? Did the Communists share the joy of the rest of the world? Did they hail the rebirth of freedom in Hungary? Did they offer to supply food, medicines, and economic aid to the Hungarian people?

You know what did happen. The entire free world heard the tragic story over Radio Budapest... how fresh Soviet divisions and fleets of jet planes were rushed into the embattled land by the Russian dictators... how they smashed the revolt with overpowering force... how they engulfed the cities and towns of Hungary in the most savage blood-bath in modern history.

The free world was forced to stand by helpless while Radio Budapest broadcast its last desperate appeals for "Help, Help, Help!" Fearful of provoking a third World War, the United Nations confined itself to the adoption of a resolution condemning Soviet Russia.

But are we of labor going to accept this monstrous outrage against humanity submissively?

Can the workers of any free country — yours or mine — condone

the savage butchery of the workers of Hungary? Can we associate with or collaborate with the Communist fellow-travelers and apologists for the Kremlin's mass murders? Can we send delegations to Moscow to shake hands with and congratulate the dictators responsible for these horrible crimes against humanity? Can the students of any land permit themselves to be led astray by the paid Communist agents and propagandists for a regime which suppresses the free search for knowledge, the self-determination of people and all the strivings for human justice which inspire students everywhere?

I think the time has come for free labor to speak out clearly and to act intelligently in self-defense. It is our responsibility to expose, to indict, to ostracize and to boycott the enemies of civilization.

Let us have the courage and good sense to tell our people the true story of how working men and women suffer under the exploitation of Communism or any other kind of dictatorship... how wage-earners are reduced to slavery... how individual liberty and human life itself are ruthlessly stamped out by those who consider that the end justifies the means.

It would be a grave mistake to regard our own organizations and our own countries as immune to the infection of Communism. You know and I know that the Commu-

nists are busy trying to sell people. You know and I know they are constantly seeking more united fronts, in order the day when they can complete control.

Under such circumstances, any free trade union must to scorn and reject offer of collaboration from the Communists and Fascists alike.

The only united front that will knowingly enter is a front against the twin evils of capitalism and Communism.

Today the forces of oppression reign over Hungary and the other nations behind the Iron Curtain. But their victory is a temporary one. History that bullets and tanks cannot extinguish the spark of freedom in the human breast. The independence still lives in the hearts of the people under the dictatorship.

They look to us — the workers of Hungary, of Poland, of Czechoslovakia, of the people of Soviet Russia and the people of Spain — and the people of some of the nations in Latin America — they look to us who are free to keep alive the hopes of eventual freedom.

Silently they beseech us to free trade union movement to carry the torch of human freedom.

Venezuela Sends Blood to Hungarian Patriots

Venezuela is answering the plea for help by hard-pressed Hungarian patriots by sending 3,500 pounds of blood plasma for the victims of Russian guns.

The blood, from the Venezuelan Red Cross, is being flown cost-free by Pan American World Airways from Caracas to New York and thence to Vienna for delivery to the Austrian Red Cross.

Pan American has been notified that Venezuela may send an additional shipment—possibly as much as 8,000 pounds—in the next few days.

Wilbur L. Morrison of Miami, PAA's executive vice president in charge of the Latin American Division, said the proposed new route would join both Tocumen Airport, serving Panama and the Canal Zone, and Miami, gateway for the Southeastern United States, with Lisbon, Madrid and Rome by way of Puerto Rico and the Azores.

Solid support for this sunshine airway, far to the south of the existing North Atlantic routes, has been voiced by the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico and the Spanish government.

"Our concept of initial service," said Morrison, "calls for four flights weekly—two in each direction—between Miami, Rome and the intermediate capitals, and an identical pattern of service from Panama, with flights stopping at Barranquilla, Colombia, and Caracas, Venezuela, before reaching the transatlantic takeoff point at San Juan."

An "extremely conservative estimate" of 13,590 passengers would fly the new sunshine air route the first year with rapid growth thereafter, said Morrison. Mail and air cargo also would be flown.

Morrison listed these advantages of the new route:

Many cities in the Western Hemisphere would be brought 1,200 to 1,400 miles closer to Lisbon, Ma-

drid and Rome, with which they have a close community of interest, and with correspondingly cheaper fares.

Carefully arranged merging schedules would tie in the new route with a wide range of countries in Central and South America, Panama, Mexico and the Caribbean area.

Puerto Rico's importance as an aerial crossroads would be vastly enhanced, with resultant aid to the commonwealth's economy.

Cultural and commercial ties between Southern Europe and Latin America, including ready movement of the most desirable type of immigrants for these areas, would be greatly strengthened.

Morrison said PAA would use four-engine, radar-equipped, long-range DC-7B and DC-7C Super Clippers, cruising at 350 miles an hour over the 5,027-mile Miami-Madrid and the 5,402-mile Panama-Madrid legs.

Known as the San Juan-Madrid application (PAA already serves other sections of the new route), the sunshine airway would also tie in closely with schedules to South Africa at Madrid, and PAA's around-the-world service at Rome. Connections to Northern Europe would be made at the Italian capital.

Spain dispatched a special emissary and Puerto Rico an official delegation to Washington to plead with CAB to grant Pan American's application.

Sheikh Abdullah's Plea

Letter to Mr. Nehru from Prison

SRINAGAR. — Kashmir's dismissed Chief Minister, Sheikh Abdullah, has asked Mr. Nehru to intervene in Kashmir. In a letter from prison, where he has been detained for many months, he said: "Your timely action may arrest a further deterioration of the situation." Sheikh Abdullah also asked for strict application of the basic principles of democracy, one of which was toleration of various viewpoints. It is understood that Mr. Nehru has not so far replied.

The Kashmir Assembly has ended the rights of future legislatures to make any change in those parts of

the draft constitution which relate to accession to India. The Assembly unanimously approved that no legislature should be able to amend or change the clause passed earlier that "Kashmir State is, and shall be, an integral part of the Indian Union." Other clauses made incapable of amendment were those relating to the extent of sovereignty and autonomy enjoyed by Kashmir within the Indian Union. By another clause any change in reduction of scope of the Indian constitution as applied to Kashmir at present was precluded from the Legislature's authority.

Ginger Bread

1/2 cup shortening, 1/4 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1/2 cup dark molasses, 1 3/4 cups flour, 1 teaspoon baking soda, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup milk.

Cream together shortening and sugar. Add egg; beat well. Add molasses. Sift together flour, baking soda, cinnamon, cloves, ginger and salt. Add alternately with milk to creamed mixture. Pour into greased pan 8" x 8" x 2". Bake in moderate oven (350°F) 45 minutes. Cut in squares. If desired, serve with Hard Sauce or Cream Cheese Topping.

HARD SAUCE: — 1/3 cup butter, 1 cup confectioners' sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla extract. Cream butter; add confectioners' sugar, cream-

ing until fluffy. Add vanilla extract; mix well. Makes 1 cup.

CREAM CHEESE TOPPING: — 1 cup cream cheese; 1 teaspoon grated orange rind, 2 teaspoon confectioners' sugar; few grains salt, 3 tablespoons orange juice.

Mash cream cheese; add orange rind, sugar and salt. Slowly add orange juice, creaming constantly. Whip until light and fluffy. Makes enough to top gingerbread 8" x 8" x 2".

Hire - Purchased Plenty

WASHINGTON. — My wife and I burst out laughing the other day when we heard a fiery political orator describe how Americans were getting poverty stricken under the Republican Administration.

Houses are expected to have refrigerators built in, central heating of course, automatic washing machines and driers, a sink that takes care of the garbage, so that you need not cart it out, and simply miraculous dishwashers that polish the glasses in a way unknown to the cloth-and-perspiration school.

No Cash, Please

I cannot quote prices because they are often unobtainable. Things do not cost a certain amount in America, they cost so much a week. And on more than one occasion I drew a blank look when I said I wanted to pay cash. Paying cash, by the way, is treated as slightly anti-social. At least, that is what one's first impressions are. If you considered less solid a citizen than if you have borrowed vast sums and are paying your instalments regularly.

I found this out when I tried to get a credit card for petrol. This is a miraculous piece of pasteboard which enables you to drive into any service station anywhere in the United States and get petrol without paying cash. The bill comes, tidily itemized, monthly. But it is difficult to get a credit card unless you already owe money somewhere else and are known to be regular with your instalment payments.

I explained that I did not like buying on instalments, and was told by the college student working part-time as a petrol station attendant that if everyone behaved as I did, then the volume of sales would slump sharply, there would be another 1929 stock market crash, a world depression, and the Communists would win! I hastened to buy a vacuum cleaner on the instalment plan, feeling that I was striking a blow for freedom.

Deep-Freeze Education

Having thus established my credit, I was besieged by salespersons — that is what they call them here — eager to help me strike some more blows at Mr. Khrushchev. One female salesperson spent three hours explaining to me how a deep-freeze machine would educate my children. And I don't have to put them in the deep-freeze to achieve that, either. The firm represented by this salesperson installs your freezer, packs it with food, and keeps replenishing it. For this service, you pay less than you would at a supermarket. The firm makes its profit by saving on overheads — no shops, no parking lots. In two years, you've bought your freezer. In 15, if you have a

family of seven, you save \$200,000 thereby educating your children. I'm still thinking about it.

I have been offered three free lubrications for my car; four free car washes, enough hardware to start me on the slippery path of "Do-It-Yourself", 10 per cent discount on my first cash purchase of clothes; four firms have offered to clean my clothes free, another wants me to have coal or fuel oil — just to get acquainted. And so the lists goes on. Without paying any money, just so that I get to know their establishment, people are pressing me to have a facial treatment, bottles of vitamins, even a funeral at a discount.

Best of all, a bank with many branches, offers to put a dollar into any account which I can open with only one dollar. I have been considering taking a day off and going from branch to branch, putting a dollar in each — 37 in all — and seeing the sum doubled in one day. I could then withdraw the 74 dollars, move to another town and start again. A lawyer with an office near to mine says it is legal.

24-Hour Salesmen

The intensity of the sales techniques is unbelievable, and so is the amount of trouble a salesman will take. He is willing to come at any time, late at night, to try to make a deal that might not come off.

The fantastic part of all this to me is that it has no catch — apart from the exorbitant rates of interest on instalment buying. But if you are buying for cash, you are protected by a whole series of organizations. A merchant who swindles a customer is blacklisted. This seems so frightening a fate that you can actually buy a chicken, eat it, and get your money back simply by saying that the fowl was tough.

The system apparently works with everyone buying more and more without ever paying fully — reselling or trading in to buy something bigger and better. This, it seems to me, may be one reason for the inflexible missionary spirit the Americans show in praising their free enterprise system and for failing to understand that it might not be applicable elsewhere.

Margaret's Recipes

APPLE SALAD is German and excellent with most cold meats. You'll want diced cooked potatoes as for potato salad and about one third to half as much diced raw eating apple. Mix well together with several spoonfuls of finely chopped gherkin, a little minced raw onion and little strips of salted herring fillet for extra piquancy. Dress with an oil and vinegar dressing.

LEMON SPONGE PUDDING

1½ sup sugar, 2 tablespoons flour, 1½ teaspoon salt, 2 egg yolks, 1 cup milk, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 2 teaspoons grated lemon rind, 2 egg whites.

Mix sugar, flour and salt. Beat egg yolks slightly; add with milk. Add lemon juice and rind. Beat egg whites stiff; fold in. Pour into greased baking dish. Place in pan of hot water; bake in moderate oven (350°F) 45 minutes. Chill. Serves 4.

FUDGE

¾ cup butter, 6 bars chocolate (1¼ kilo), 1 cup milk, 2 cups sugar, 1 cup chopped nuts. Boil over quick fire 15 minutes. Add the nuts; remove from fire and beat until the mixture thickens.

Turn out onto buttered plates. Cut into squares.

...Your film correspondent JR writes entertainingly and I like reading his stuff and usually agree with his remarks, though I've often already seen the film and felt quite pleased with it until he's made me think again. But isn't he a bit hard to please?

WE PASSED THE ABOVE LETTER TO Mr. RANDALL AND HERE IS HIS ANSWER:

Yes. So should all filmgoers be. It has always amazed me that the public, on buying a dozen eggs, should be very fussy about getting them all uncracked and fresh, but the same people will gladly pay their admission to a cinema and automatically accept any trash that is shown to them. Millions are made in the film industry and the best talents in the artistic and technical worlds are at its disposal but the standard of presentation varies considerably, and it is up to the people who pay to deplore the bad and praise the good productions, that the level may have reason to improve. As it happens, I find I have recommended over a third of the pictures of all types I have written about — a very much higher percentage than would be the case if I reviewed every film.

The point is, every movie should be a first-class job, though naturally one or two will always be better than others, but too many stars, earning some of the biggest money in the world, have been kept in their lofty positions for years by a public which will accept anything, without ever justifying their eminence in their profession or, in some cases, even their right to be in the profession at all. All criticism is a personal opinion, but, as an actor myself, I can at least spot some fakes when I see them and I have some idea of what constitutes imaginative effort and what doesn't. I shall continue to be hard to please, but not over-fascinated, and those who don't like such an attitude should not read film reviews any way.

SEEN AT THE CINEMA

(Cine Trocadero)

One rather wonders why the producers of this film elected to swing us high with the gaiety of the entrancing Rodgers and Hammerstein's lyrics, then plunge us down to the depths of the heart-rending Molnar tragedy (adapted from the play "Liliom"). The plot seems a misfit, if the intention of a good musical comedy is to cheer one up in these troublous times.

However, I have no quarrel with the actors, who are all good in their respective parts, both vocal-

ly and visually, and supported by some first-rate choruses. Gordon MacRae is a handsome Billy Bigelow, the Fair "barker", cause of most of the trouble, and Shirley Jones is winsome and winning, as his lovely Carrie The Clambake ballet sequence is sheer delight with a tune which will undoubtedly haunt the future: "June is bustin' out all over". Cameron Mitchell is a deep-dyed villain and Barbara Ruick fairly sparkles tunelessly, with all the suppressed allure of the 1900 courtship style.

THE LITTLEST OUTLAW
(Cine Grand Splendid)

Preceded by an outstandingly beautiful and instructive short film entitled "The Sheepdog of Arizona", the main film transports us to the spacious scenery of Mexico, with all its varied landscapes and colours worthy of an artist's brush, at the authentic location of San Miguel Allende.

Ten-year old Andrés Velásquez is cast as the young Mexican stable assistant, whose adored companion is the General's chestnut horse, who leaps over fences with all the grace of a Pegasus. When the General's young daughter (portrayed by Laila Maley, who is better on the horse than off it) gets thrown, and the General — with surprising lack of

"THE FIGHTING KENTUCKIAN"
("Águilas en Destierro")

At a loss for a variation in the setting of the old, old theme of bad men versus good men with the situation saved by a lone, outstanding member of the latter, the film-makers have chosen Alabama in 1818 for this one, set in a French settlement founded by some of Napoleon's ex-officers seeking asylum. But, apart from a foreign accent here and there and some strange costumes, it could just as easily have been played out 50 years later further west. The French have had land granted to them by the government, but, unbeknown to them, a local villain has moved the markers causing the Frogs, in some delightfully vague way, to clear and cultivate ground which doesn't belong to them. This is going to be reclaimed from them by force,

sportsmanship — orders it to be shot, the boy escapes with the horse, and his ensuing adventures form the main plot of the story. Pursued by the villain of the piece (Rodolfo Acosta), and befriended by an extremely tuneful priest (Pedro Vargas, cheerfully vocal), the horse and its best friend finally take sanctuary in the village church and the final showdown occurs in a bullring. Good healthy thrills for everyone, if you can swallow the redundancy of Latin sentimentalism which detracts from a realistic approach to the theme. Entirely suitable for the teen-agers.

But along comes John Wayne with a troop of scruffy-looking Kentucky soldiers — and who is that bulging bugler waddling beside him? Could it be — yes, it is: Oliver Hardy, Laureless. Vera Ralston is a beautiful mademoiselle engaged to a wealthy attractive businessman, which is good for her community since it needs such contacts, but she trots round the block a couple of times driven by the laconic Wayne (in a carriage, of course) who draws uninterestingly about nothing at all, and the smell of his home-made, skin jacket is too much for her so she falls in love with him. He drifts off with his troop and ten days later, having spent the time going round in circles, marches them into the middle of the pre-wedding festivities and decides to demobilise himself and stay right there; his fat friend joins him. They both play about in the fields with a theodolite until Wayne gets wind of dirty work afoot over the land racket and races off to inform Vera's father, who is a general who sits in a little hut surrounded by French souvenirs, telling us how cold it was during the retreat from Moscow, with La Marseillaise strains in the background.

The customary battle winds things up, with the French in immaculate uniforms and incredible power and accuracy being attributed to the old

Uruguayan Problems

by H. P. Gebhardt

The Uruguayan Council of Government has been approached by representatives of the "Lebanese Colony" who urged that the Anglo-French activities in Egypt be condemned; at the same time, the Jewish Central Committee has appealed to the National Council to support Israel morally and politically in her war against Nasser.

The Soviet Ambassador has protested to the Government against the firing of the Soviet Consulate in Montevideo recently, as a result of which important documents, art treasures and furniture were destroyed. According to *La Mañana* the Russian note contained an allusion that in the incendiary action were involved persons closely connected with the local Jewish organization. Government members defended the attack against the Consulate, and *El Pais* thought the demonstration an encouraging sign because it indicated the end of the indifference of youth towards the problems of world politics, and dwindling support of the so-called "Middle Way" of neutralism. For all this, the Minister for Home Affairs, Dr. Abdala, laid the responsibility on the chiefs of the Political and Criminal Divisions of the Police Department, Vieyte and Coolinghan, accusing them of inadequate vigilance, and calling for their resignations.

Every day approximately \$ 25,000 worth of contraband is smuggled through the port of Montevideo by travellers from Buenos Aires. The government investigator has changed the staff whose job it is to examine luggage in the Aduana but the amount of goods smuggled through is still immense. And no wonder. For two years legal importation of luxury goods has been forbidden and only now has 14,000,000 dollars been allocated for this purpose. Consequently, contraband has been the substitute for the missing imports.

and the high prices it fetches has made the risk well worth while. Ingenious modern methods have been employed: luggage with double bottoms and waterproof nylon pouches lowered over the side of ships in the Rio de la Plata and left submerged in the water for fishing out during the hours of darkness. No author of crime fiction could have been more inventive than the River Plate smugglers. There is only one certain means to stifle these activities: the Aduana employees must be constantly changed in order that the smugglers have no time to make accomplices of them.

Building workers went on strike recently for two days. The daily rate of pay for unskilled labourers is \$ 10.90, and for skilled workers \$ 13.60. A common rate for both has been claimed, plus an increase of \$ 5 daily, but the contractors offered only \$ 13.48 and \$ 16.82, respectively. The building industry as a whole is, in any case, paralysed by the delay of the Banco Hipotecario loan and the increase in the import rate of exchange to say nothing of the lack of steel on the Montevideo market. The strike and the newly-raised taxes are seriously imperilling this key industry of 70,000 workers.

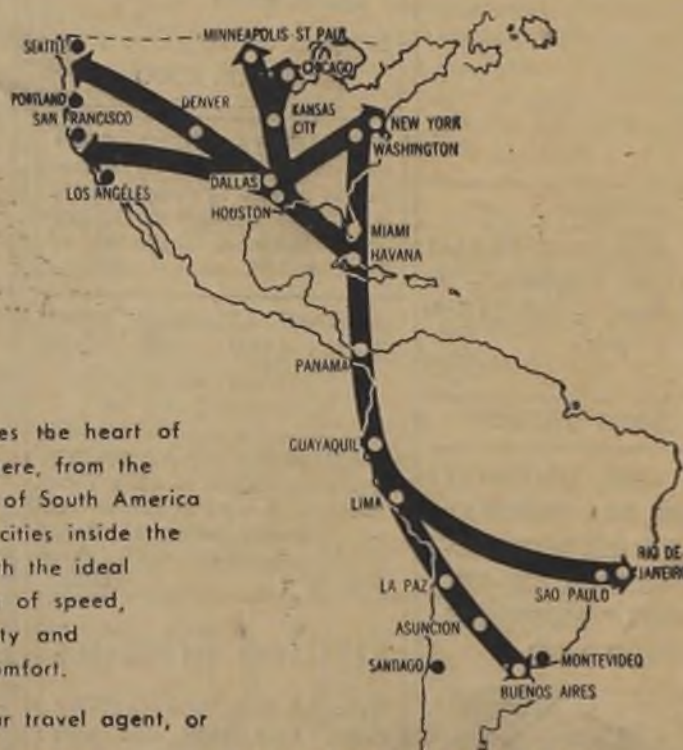
