POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives sat on Saturday. The Bill extending the term of civic inscription in certain of the Departments was approved in general and in detail. Discussion in detail was resumed of the Bill according general privileges to factories of textile goods, but the Chamber again adjourned without reaching any resolution.

A most absurd and perilous fuss is being raised over the justified refusal of the Executive to ratify the nomination of Sr. Juan A. Ramirez as Lecturer on History in the University, and the incident is being converted into an excuse for political attack on the Government. There is talk of the University Council resigning—one of its members, Dr. Acevedo, editor of the *Siglo*, has already resigned; and the students are being incited to make a demonstration. Sr. Ramirez himself has written a letter to the Council resigning his pretensions to the post (sour grapes) in order that he may have the right freely to judge this brutal aggression on the Lecturers of the University. All this is simply making a mountain out of a molehill. If the University Council cannot perceive that a young man, himself barely emerged from the student stage, who takes an active and at times even violent part in militant political and partisan journalism, is not a fit person to be appointed as a University Lecturer, and especially on such a topic as History, all we can say is that they are completely wanting in common sense. The truth is that the Council took a false step in proposing him for the nomination, and are now perplexed how to retire without loss of dignity, so they are making an attack on the Government. In our opinion the Government has acted perfectly correctly in the matter—though it might have expressed its reasons more happily—and we can hardly imagine any Government acting otherwise. Militant partisan politicians are certainly not fit persons to become University lecturers.

In a second article, the *Nacion* of Sunday again expresses opposition, which may be regarded as official, to the immediate sanction of Dr. Vasquez Acevedo's reformed Code of Penal Procedure. It must be confessed that some of the objections it raises are valid; as for instance where it points out that the system of trial by jury, which has been practically a failure even in the capital, would become an impossibility in the sparsely populated interior. The question of expense, it also points out, is a serious one. In conclusion, it argues that the creation of the High Court of Justice, proposed by the Government, is the best reform to begin with, as that will both open the road and provide the authority for general reform in the administration of justice. This is bound to remain a debatable question. For our part, we have little faith in the efficacy of the High Court of Justice for judicial reform, whilst constituted with the elements at present disposable—we analysed this point some time ago. On the other hand we do strongly recognise that the present system of procedure, and not only in penal cases, is unspeakably bad and one of the chief causes that the administration of justice is so very unsatisfactory, and therefore we maintain that reform in this must be the first step, and that no effort should be spared to introduce it with the least delay. We also find it difficult to believe that a reform which

will greatly simplify and accelerate legal processes, will be the occasion of greater expenditure than the present slow, tedious and cumbersome system. In fact, with a more modern system of procedure, the judicial expenses should be considerably less than they are at present, both to the State and to the litigant, to say nothing of the indirect saving caused by greater promptitude.

On Sunday Captain Cabrera and Lient. Belen—both of them more or less revolutionary characters—were arrested for wearing their swords in public, which, as officers on the reserve list, it is said they have no right to do—though there seems to be some doubt on the point. Quite possibly, there were other more serious motives for the arrest, as the infraction, if any, did not require more than a simple admonition.

THE CATTLE PLAGUE.

The cattle plague is reported as steadily spreading in the Department of Colonia. So far no fatal cases have been reported thence, though we understand that a few have occurred in other parts of the interior. The veterinary Sr. Borges is visiting the infected districts in order to make an official report. The general opinion seems to be that it is merely a somewhat aggravated form of the disease known as *lagas*, which frequently makes an endemic appearance at this season of the year after heavy rains. The symptoms of this are practically the same as those of foot and mouth disease. Cases of plague have been reported as appearing among swine in Santa Lucia, but have been quickly cured. The Prefects of Salto, Paysandu, Tacuarembó and Rivera, after due enquiry, report their respective Departments free from disease.

The Minister of Government has telegraphed orders to the Departmental Prefects to take strict measures in case of any appearance of the disease. These measures consist of strict isolation of infected establishments, with prohibition to remove the animals or to communicate with adjacent farms, cremation of animals dying from the disease, and obligation to report any outbreak.

The order for the closing of English ports to imports of live stock is given as follows:—

Order No. 6047.

FOREIGN ANIMALS (AMENDMENT) ORDER OF 1900. The Board of Agriculture, by virtue of and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—
Animals from the Argentine Republic or Uruguay Prohibited. 1. Unless and until the Board otherwise order, it shall not be lawful to land any animal brought from the country of the Argentine Republic or from Uruguay, and the First Schedule (*Prohibited Countries and Parts of Countries*) to the Foreign Animals Order of 1896 shall be read and have effect as if those countries were included in the list of prohibited countries and parts of countries mentioned in the Schedule.

Interpretation. 2. In this Order terms have the same meaning as in the Foreign Animals Order of 1896.

Commencement. 3. This Order shall come into operation on the thirtieth day of April, one thousand nine hundred.

Short Title. 4. This Order may be cited as the Foreign Animals (Amendment) Order of 1900. (Signed) T. H. ELLIOTT, Secretary.

Football.

Albion F. C. versus H.M.S. "Swallow."

This match was played at Paso Molino on Sunday, in brilliant weather, before a large gathering of spectators, including many English. Both sides put their best men in the field, providing an interesting game. In the first half, the home team pressed hard and had many corners at their disposal. Stewart, who was playing in unusually good form, scored a good goal at 25 yards. Lopez followed suit, scoring a straight one with a rush. Just before half time Sardeson shot a cliniker, but it was disallowed by the referee. In the second half the navy team had hill and wind in their favor, but though they did press the home backs a little, it was evident they had not much chance of winning. Lodge scored the third point for the Albions from a fine pass of Sardeson, and the game concluded without further scoring, the Albions winning by 3 goals to 0. For the Albions the entire team played well and deserved their victory, but special mention may be made by Stewart, Drever, Cardenal, C. B. Poole, W. L. Poole and Lodge. For the navy, Donaldson, Boswell, Leggett and Fallows were the most conspicuous.

Next Sunday there will be two matches of great interest, namely, C. U. R. C. C. and Albion 1st XI's at Penarol, and the 2nd XI's of the same Clubs at Paso Molino.

C. U. R. C. C. versus D. F. K. M.

This match was played at Penarol on Sunday before a fair number of spectators. It proved a well contested and lively match, the Germans showing considerable improvement on their last year's form. The home team

must also be congratulated on starting the season in good form. On their side special praise may be awarded to Stevens, the brothers Carve and Vanrell. Eventually the home team won by 3 goals, all scored in the first half, to 1 for the Germans, scored in the second half.

THE WAR.

Lord Roberts Advancing.—British Victory at Vet River.

There is no further doubt about the northward advance of the British army in Orange State, and Lord Roberts' operations have already been marked by a victory of some importance, following up the occupation of Brandfort, though the details given in the telegrams are confusing as usual.

Telegraphing on Saturday, Lord Roberts reports his arrival at Vet River with Gen. Pole Carey's division. The Staff and a brigade of the 7th division were some two miles behind, and Maxwell's division an equal distance to the right. The enemy appeared in large numbers on the opposite side of the river. Our artillery bombarded them for three hours without it being possible to force a passage, but towards nightfall General Hutton's mounted infantry flanked them on the right and bravely passed the river under a deadly rifle fire. We are now encamped three miles from the river. Yesterday Gen. Hamilton's forces, consisting of Royal Cavalry, the 12th Lancers and Kitchener's cavalry, engaged two Boer commands, inflicting serious losses. The enemy fled, leaving their dead and wounded on the field. MacDonald's Highland Brigade dislodged the right wing of the enemy, receiving notable assistance from the naval artillery. This (Saturday) morning Gen. Hamilton advanced towards a difficult ford of the Klein Vet river. Gen. Barton's brigade also had a smart combat, but is well fortified. Our men advance with great courage and are taking one hill after another. Capt. Miller, who was captured near Tlabancha, has been returned to Gen. Randle's camp with a serious wound in the abdomen. Gen. Brabant reports that on the 2nd the Boers took prisoners a sergeant and three men, one of whom was ill-treated and left for dead on the field. Lieut. Lilley of the Victoria Mounted Rifles, who was missing, has been found seriously wounded in Brandfort. He had been well looked after by the Dutch ambulance corps.

From other messages, not official, we gather the following items, though it is beyond our power to arrange them coherently.—Gen. Barton's Blackwatch regiment had a sharp combat with the Boers to the north of Rudim, and captured several hills, the enemy making a precipitate retreat. His losses were 5 killed and 25 wounded. The Boers left 13 dead on the field. The British forces now occupy excellent positions. On Sunday Gen. Hamilton captured 12 Boers and a Maxim gun. Trains are running from Bloemfontein to Karree Siding. The enemy are reported 1000 strong at Karree Siding under Coms. De Wet, De Laere and Kalbe (we think this was anterior to Saturday's victory). The Boers concentrated at Kronstadt are said to be very disheartened.

According to a late afternoon message, Gen. Roberts had reported crossing the Vet river and establishing his camp at Sualdeck early yesterday morning. The Boers were retreating towards the Zandra river and Kronstadt. The British had taken a Maxim gun and 35 prisoners. The total British losses were only 19. Gen. Hamilton had occupied Wynburg and captured a gun.

There has been some artillery fighting at Warrenton (the message says at a range of seven miles and a half) in which the Boers were eventually driven from their trenches. All their guns were destroyed by the British shells.

Mr. Schreiner, the Cape premier, has been fired at in a solitary street of Capetown, his assailant escaping unknown. The Premier escaped unhurt.

The U.S. Consul at Pretoria denies the tales of ill-treatment of the British prisoners there. He says the Transvaal Government is giving them every reasonable attention.

Official correspondence in reference to the Spion Kop affair shows that Lord Lansdowne proposed to General Buller that he should rewrite his despatches before publication. General Buller, however, refused to rewrite them and left the matter to the decision of Lord Roberts, who sanctioned their publication.

We quote the following from a late London paper.—
London, April 7.

Troubles come not single spies. The ambush at Sanna Post has been followed by a second misfortune of the kind, in which, while no guns have been lost, an even greater number of our men have been captured by the enemy.

Lord Roberts, telegraphing on Thursday night, reports that in the forenoon of Tuesday three companies of the Royal Irish Rifles and two companies of mounted infantry were surrounded by the enemy, who had four

or five guns, near Reddersburg, to the east of Bethany, and only a very few miles from Bloemfontein, they held out until the following morning, when, as far as can be ascertained, they surrendered. There can be no doubt, says the Field-Marshal, that the whole party were taken prisoners.

General Gatacre, whose headquarters were at Springfontein, on the railway, had in the meantime been ordered to move to Reddersburg with all speed, and arrived there only an hour and a half after the time at which it is believed the infantry capitulated. The Cameron Highlanders, sent south from Bloemfontein, also reached the scene promptly, but no news of the missing men could be had.

Against this fresh heavy item in our debit account it is to be placed the news of a success gained by Lord Methuen near Boshof. On Thursday a party of about seventy Boers in the neighbourhood were surrounded, and, after fighting which lasted four hours, their position was rushed at the bayonet's point, and the whole number were killed, wounded, or taken prisoners. Among the seven of the enemy killed was Colonel Count de Villebois-Mareuil, the French officer who joined the enemy at the opening of the campaign. Our losses were one officer and three men of the Yeomanry killed, and seven wounded.

Bethany, near which, to the east, Reddersburg lies, is the second station on the railway south of Bloemfontein. The Boers have not stopped here, but have pushed their advance to the west of the railway, and have fired upon a train between Springfontein and Jagersfontein Road. A telegram from Bloemfontein states that small parties of the enemy have been seen in the environs. It seems altogether unlikely that they have in contemplation an attack upon the town, but the Boers have done some surprising things during the war, and this may possibly be added to them. Lord Roberts, at any rate, could hardly wish for anything better.

Crimes.

About daybreak yesterday, the dead body of a man of color was found lying in a pool of blood, on the side walk in Calle Esperanza, Bella Vista. On examination he was found to have six or eight terrific stabs in the front part of the body, one of the wounds affecting the heart. He was identified as Ramon Cano, Uruguayan, aged 27, and resident in the neighbourhood. He had been last seen drinking the night before in the company of an Argentine named José Fernandez, aged 35. The latter was promptly found by the police and arrested, and after some trouble a confession was extracted from him that he had quarrelled with Cano and stabbed him to death. There seems to have been some question of jealousy between the two. Beyond stating that the murderer has been placed at the disposal of the judges, there is nothing worth adding.

A strange affair took place at the Cerro on Sunday night. Antonio Picardo, a Neapolitan labourer and his wife, occupied a modest dwelling there for over 30 years. Both had reached the ripe age of 77, and enjoyed the respect of their neighbours, leading an orderly life, though not without occasional matrimonial differences. On Sunday as they were retiring to bed, a quarrel arose on the classical question of which should put out the light, and the old man became so infuriated that he took a large knife and stabbed his wife, inflicting a terrible wound which is expected to prove mortal. The poor old woman was taken to the Hospital plaintively mormoring, "After so many years!"—as well she might.

SUNDRIES.

—In a letter from Paris, dealing with the present situation in Europe, the eminent critic Max Nordau says:—
"What a glorious spectacle Europe presents only twelve months after the chimerical Peace Congress at La Hague. On all sides the same tale; hatred, homicidal anger, national boresfulness; an undisguised desire among all the peoples to throw themselves on some neighbour in order to ravage, burn and kill. Governments threaten, and the nations approve. Those who denounce these madnesses are a small minority, and they are treated as madmen, when they are not insulted as cowards and traitors. Men of the highest intellect share the virtual cannibalism of the mob, and talents of all classes join the unlettered majority in uttering cries of death and rapine. (He here makes some trenchant remarks about the rabid jingoism into which Ruyard Kipling has fallen). . . . What encouragement does our civilisation offer to the apostles of peace? The Governments regard them with an evil eye. In the military monarchies they are persecuted, in the republics they are despised. The few journals which serve a peaceful propaganda, vegetate in obscurity, and probably have not 5000 subscribers all the world over, whilst it has been sufficient for one single London paper, the *Daily Mail*, to raise the standard of war, to attain, in some four weeks, a circulation of over a million!"

Little beyond formal business was brought before the House of Lords yesterday. It was stated that the House would adjourn on Monday for three weeks.

—All of which above is merely equivalent to saying that the whole civilised world is at present unfortunately afflicted with an epidemic of jingoism and of militarism—the two things are very much akin, and it is difficult to say which is the more abominable or the more contrary to progress. We fear that the disease—like a bad boil—will have to come to a head and burst, before it is likely to be cured. Meanwhile the clock of progress goes steadily backward. Military Europe is less civilised and less Christian to-day than it was thirty years ago, and even England has caught the fatal infection and will be drawn into the maelstrom.

—It is expected that in a few days the insane quarantines against Buenos Aires will be reduced, if not lifted entirely. It is more than time, though, for the matter of that, they should never have been imposed.

—First class passengers arrived by the "Liguria" were Mr. R. F. Rao and Mr. T. Doyle. None came by the R. M. S. "Magdalena".

—Festivities continue on a grand scale in Berlin on account of the coming of age of the Crown Prince. Royal speeches, toasts and decorations are flying about liberally. There is a tremendous effusion of cordiality between the Kaiser and the Emperor of Austria.

—More tricks in Paris. On Sunday night the Exhibition had to remain closed because, when the time for lighting up came, it was found that some expert but mischievous hand had severed a number of the electric light connections. What next!

—The queer news is telegraphed from St. Petersburg that the Czar, with the object of making himself popular, has sent home all his special police, and walks or drives about the city without escort and unprotected. This shows great courage, but the temptation may prove too great for some of his hereditary enemies.

—The French Minister of War has issued a temperance order extending to the entire French army the prohibition, hitherto confined to certain regiments, to sell absinthe, vermout, and similar preparations in the barracks and regimental canteens. It is found this contributes to better health of the men. Wine, beer and cider, not containing noxious ingredients, are still permitted.

—The Argentine Minister of Agriculture has ordered the director of the national library to compile a book containing a description of the Republic, an essay on its intellectual, social and economic progress and other information. The book must be ready by July 31st and will be in Spanish, English and French. The object of the book is to spread a more correct knowledge of Argentina throughout Europe, for which purpose all unpleasant facts that might deter immigration or represent the country as semi-civilised, will be carefully eliminated.

—We learn from London that toy merchants of the itinerant class who, in skirmishing order, line Victoria street, Westminster, and other frequented thoroughfares, have alighted upon a new thing, and by the aid of a deplorable pun, possibly enhance their sales. The article in question is an inflatable, sausage-shaped bladder. To it are affixed ears, legs, and a curly tail, which help to give it a distant resemblance to a pig. Vigorously blown into and placed on the ground it emits a plaintive shriek, which gets weaker and weaker till, with a last faint squeal, it falls breathless on its side. "Hero—yarr—sir," cries the man; "dilest—novelty—the—dying—Boer." The toy pleases the Jingo crowd.

LONDON NOTES.

FRIDAY, APRIL 6.

The Queen, who suffered little or no fatigue from Wednesday's ceremonies in Dublin, spent a quiet day yesterday. In the morning her Majesty drove round the grounds of the Viceregal Lodge in her donkey carriage; and in the afternoon had more than an hour's drive in Phoenix Park. The weather, though cold, was fine.

Almost every public body that met throughout the United Kingdom yesterday adopted a resolution recording indignation at the attempted assassination of the Prince of Wales, and expressing pleasure at his Royal Highness's escape. In many cases telegrams of congratulation were forwarded to the Prince.

Little beyond formal business was brought before the House of Lords yesterday. It was stated that the House would adjourn on Monday for three weeks.

with the question of municipal trading was carried by 141 votes to 67. Sir Philip Fysh, speaking on behalf of the Australian federal delegates at a luncheon in the City yesterday, said the Bill which they brought over for the acceptance of the Imperial Parliament was one which the people had adopted. He described it as an agreement for a commercial partnership, based upon the fundamental principle that trade should be free throughout Australia.

The South African Conciliation Committee held a crowded meeting yesterday at the Westminster Palace Hotel. Discussing the question of what settlement should be made to the war, Mr. Bryce, M. P., suggested the separation of the mining district from the rest of the Transvaal. Mr. Courtney, M. P., advocated the granting of qualified independence to both Republics, and Sir Robert Reid, M. P., expressed the opinion that the establishment of a Protectorate would perhaps yield the best result. Mr. Cronwright-Schreiner also spoke.

Judgment was given in the House of Lords yesterday in an appeal brought by Mr. Montague Gluckstein against an order sought by the Official Receiver and liquidator of Olympia asking for a declaration that plaintiff had been guilty of misfeasance, it being alleged that he and other directors and promoters of the company had secretly retained for their own use a large sum out of the purchase money. The Lord Chancellor, Lord Macnaghten, and Lord Robertson dismissed the appeal, the two former expressing strong opinions on the conduct of Mr. Gluckstein in the matter.

SATURDAY, APRIL 7.

Yesterday her Majesty gave a pleasant surprise to the people of Dublin. As rain threatened it was expected that she would not drive out; but in the afternoon, accompanied by the Princess Beatrice, the Queen paid a visit to the poorer quarters of the City, where she received a hearty welcome. The first State dinner arranged during the visit was held last night. There were about a hundred guests.

A Cabinet Council was held yesterday at the Foreign Office. No fewer than five Ministers were away, most of them being in Ireland in connection with the Queen's visit.

A late, as well as an early, sitting of the House of Lords was held yesterday. The late sitting was held to enable the peers to receive from the House of Commons and give a first reading to the Finance Bill. At the early sitting the Army (Annual) Bill was read a second time.

In the House of Commons a curious debate arose on the motion that the House on Monday should adjourn until the 26th inst. Mr. Courtney complained that a blocking motion on South African affairs had been placed on the paper by Mr. Dunscombe, who had since himself gone to the Cape. The Speaker held that the motion was according to the forms of the House. The Chancellor of the Exchequer made his final statement as to the national receipts and expenditure. The total income for the coming year was estimated at £127,520,000, and the expenditure at £150,061,000, leaving a deficit of over 22 1/2 millions. This would be provided by increased taxation and the War Loan. The Finance Bill was finally disposed of. Other measures were advanced a stage before the House was counted out.

Lord James of Hereford, addressing the annual meeting of the Liberal Union Club yesterday, entirely devoted his speech to a consideration of the demand made by some party organizations for a reduction of the Parliamentary representation of Ireland. Lord James admitted that there were inequalities in the representation as between Great Britain and Ireland, but urged that those inequalities were intentionally inserted in the Act of 1885 by a specific agreement between the two chief parties in the State. Any attempt to reduce the number of Irish members must be accompanied by a comprehensive redistribution Bill affecting England.

Judgment was given yesterday by Mr. Justice Ouzens-Hardy, in the Chancery Division, declaring the system by which the London County Council worked certain services of omnibuses between the various tramways leased by them, to be outside their statutory powers as mere tramway lessees, and therefore unlawful. The action was brought on an information by the Attorney-General at the relation of a large number of omnibus proprietors.

Before the Recorder, at the Old Bailey, last night, the trial was concluded of Alfred Paget, Bernard
