Second Sunday after Trinity.—Nativity of St. John the Baptist.—Lord Kitchener born, 1850.—176 days past, 190 to the end of the year.

POLITICAL NOTES.

SENATE. — The Senators sat on Friday. Approval was completed of the Law of Stamps and Stamped Paper for 1900-1901 without further amendment. The Bill authorizing the Executive to build a railway from Melo to Coronilla, was rejected, in accordance with the recommendation of the Committee. Approval was completed of the Bill of concession to Walker and Co. for free introduction of quarry machinery. Similar approval was given to the Bill de clarating that military officers in executive employment could not be elected to the Chambers. Several measures of minor interest, unnecessary to mention in detail, were also finally approved or rejected.

REPRESENTATIVES. CONSUMMATING THE SCANDAL. — Some forty Deputies attended the second convocation to a special sitting, on Friday, for the discussion in detail of the Bill restoring bull-fights. As before there was a crowded and noisy "bar," chiefly of the less respectable classes. Dr. S. Carranza opposed the Bill as frankly retrogressive and contrary to public morals. He pointed out that the French Chambers had just prohibited bull-fights in France. Dr. Espalter denied the assertion, and pointed out how they had recently been permitted in Chile. Their restoration was desired by the immense majority of the country (Sr. Irigoyen stigmatized bull-fights as inhuman and cruel, and expressed his surprise that they should be advocated by the liberal members of the Chambers. Sr. J. P. Castro opposed the Bill and as compromise proposed an alternative Bill permitting the spectacle in a modified and harmless form. For some unexplained reason this amendment was not put to the vote. Sr. M. Magariños stated that he would vote for the Bill as a liberal! A patriot!! and one who desired the happiness of his country!!! (Frantic applause from the "bar.") He denied that there was any immorality in the spectacle, and thought it should be restored because desired by the mass of the people, and as a question of individual right. After some further debate the Bill was put to the vote and was declared approved by a majority of 2 to 1. The voting was as follows:—

The announcement of the result was hailed with a noisy and scandalous demonstration from the "bar," which cheered the assenting and booed the dissenting Deputies as they quitted the Chamber.

The Representatives have thus consummated the scandal of holding special sittings to approve this retrograde, discreditable and mischievous measure, whilst shamefully neglecting public business of importance and real utility. If they show so little perception of parliamentary duty and legislative dignity and so little respect for themselves, how can they expect to be respected by others?

THE MONETARY SITUATION. — The Siglo of yesterday calls attention, not for the first time, to the large amount of reserve capital that is accumulated without employment in the Banks and elsewhere, and which is making itself felt just now in the fall in the rates of interest. It goes on to say:—"What astonishes many is that, with such elements accumulated by the incessant saving of the country, business has not recovered its great animation, but the commercial and the industrial movement remains as depressed as during the dolorous periods of the liquidation of the crisis. The Stock Exchange has barely initiated the rise in the values quoted there. And although public funds do show some tendency to improve, business is hardly any better, and the other investments for money remain as neglected as ever, especially landed property which is generally the first attraction to capitalists."

Without going into details, we think we can give some reasons for the phenomenon correctly described by our contemporary:—1. The situation of the market is such that the banks, and especially those of emission, are practically compelled to keep a large reserve on hand.—2. The oppressive, obstructive and ill-arranged system of taxation, which crushes all commercial or industrial expansion and initiative, hampers business at every turn, maintains high and often prohibitive prices, and deters immigration.—3. The fact that while public funds and mortgages yield a return of 7 per cent and more on the investment, these will always attract money more readily than uncertain and troublesome business investments.—4. The discouraging, dilatory and greedy attitude of the public authorities towards new enterprise, as manifested in the scandalous manner in which the question of electric traction has been treated.—5. The want of judicial reform, that is to say of a cheap, rapid and trustworthy administration of justice which will give adequate protection to life and property, and will not, as at present is the case, favor murderers, rogues and criminals while it persecutes honest and laborious men.—6. The attitude of a large section of the unpatriotic "colorado" party, which, unable to rest content under a fairly honest and respectable government, is continually promoting political agitation, and preaching revolution and a return to the robberies, dishonesties and abominations of the "collectivist" period.—7. Chambers which have failed to give proper support to the reform policy initiated by Sr. Caestras, which scandalously neglect and delay public business, and which are rapidly forfeiting public respect and confidence.—8. These reasons, whether taken jointly or separately, are quite sufficient to explain why the economic situation fails to recover.

THE QUARANTINE PLAGUE.
(Review of River Plate, June 23.)
It occurs to us that among the anomalies to which the quarantine system gives rise may be counted that, in the very midst of the winter season, there should be any quarantine at all necessary to be imposed upon vessels touching at Brazilian ports. In former years it was not so, and we can only assume it to be one of the caprices which has arisen, subsequent to the formation of the triple alliance of the Health Boards of the three nationalities concerned, in the conception of annoy'g restrictions upon the comfort and liberties of travellers. After the monstrous treatment to which the passengers of the "Clyde" had been exposed, it might have been thought some modification of rules would have been brought about; but so far from this being the case, when the R. M. Steamer "Danube" arrived, she was also condemned, or rather her passengers were, to undergo the ten days quarantine at Martin Garcia, and they are now working out their sentence in that delightful retreat. But the universal outcry that there has been in the newspapers, and the general indignation of the whole of the population, which has been evinced in the most unmistakable way, condemnation of the almost brutal treatment which is meted out to these unfortunate victims of red tape and ignorant officialism, was bound to have a certain amount of effect, and we learn that, at length, there is to be a change in the method and procedure....

But, it may be urged that, spite of all precautions and of the fact that Argentine Inspectors with their awe-inspiring attributes, in full bloom, are on board the several steamers, diseases and contagious disorders have an awkward way of asserting themselves. In this case quarantine, for a prudential term, or quarantine observation, may be clearly employed, and this very necessity points to the need of establishing proper accommodation for the passengers in the localities set apart for the purpose of isolating the sick from those who are whole. It is not our intention to emulate others in description of the loathsome and noxious dens in which the quarantine passengers are confined, but we will state that the very reverse of this is what is wanted, if only to minimise as far as possible the

risk of contagion being spread among the involuntary prisoners. The disappointment alone, experienced by those of sensitive or delicate temperament, from being shut up for a term of days over and above the legitimate length of the voyage, when they had been confidently counting upon landing and meeting their friends and relatives, is sufficient to induce an illness. But when to this is superadded the nauseous influence of unaccustomed, uncleanly, and insanitary surroundings, we can only look with surprise upon realising that so few, comparatively speaking, come out of the ordeal unscathed. We will not, here, dwell upon the often serious loss and damage sustained by the bungling and arbitrary practices observed in the so-called disinfecting of luggage, a system which, by this time and with some small expenditure of common sense and intelligence, ought to be reduced to more order, rendering the heavy losses and infliction of damage impossible to occur. For, so far as we know, there is no redress obtainable, of any sort or kind, and to agitate for it, is to occupy time and patience in the most useless manner. Our quarantine stations, both at Flores Island and Martin Garcia, as at present constituted, are a disgrace, and should be a shame, were the sensation existing, to nations having any aspirations to be classified in the ranks of civilization, as to day understood in the world.

Transmission of Electric Energy.

Much interest, says the San Francisco Chronicle, is felt throughout the United States over the practical results of the transmission of the electric current of the Standard Electric Company, of which Prince Poniatowski is president, from the generating plant at the foot of the Sierra to San Francisco and the neighbouring cities and towns. The reason is that the voltage will be the highest in the country, and the commercial transmission the longest of any in the world. There are those who have serious doubts of the success of the enterprise; but they include neither the electricians nor the officers of the company, as tests have been made which convince them that there is no such word as failure in their plans. The matter will soon be determined, as the material is being received, and the poles are being placed along the first circuit, with every prospect of being completed by July.

There are many interesting details in connection with this work, the most striking, however, being in connection with the insulators, which are of a new and complicated system. The problem which it is undertaken to solve in the carrying of the high voltage of electricity without contact with the wood, which it would speedily consume. One of the chief dangers to be guarded against is the conveyance of the electric current to the poles by means of water, especially by rains. To overcome this two materials are employed; one is porcelain and the other is glass. The upper portion of the insulator is made of porcelain of umbrella form, with a corrugated button at the top in order to receive the aluminium wire, with a saucer-like receptacle to catch the water that is led off by means of a spout beyond the line of the pole. In this connection it is interesting to state that the tests of the working of the insulator demonstrated that the electric current will be of great service in accomplishing this object. When the poles were drenched the water collected in the saucer umbrellas and ran off in nearly a vertical line; but when the electric current was applied the water was propelled horizontally to a greater distance from the poles, first taking the size of large drops, and as the power was increased assuming the condition of spray thrown off so far that no further danger of conduct existed. Just below the porcelain umbrella is placed an annealed glass skirt, and again below it a sleeve of porcelain. All of these are not only set into one another, but are cemented by a species of flux so as to leave not the slightest opportunity for the water to penetrate and serve as a conductor to the electricity. The umbrella of the insulator is 11 in. in diameter, and the exposed portions of the glass skirt and the porcelain sleeve are 11 1/2 in.; so that with the discharge of the rain by the spot the danger of transmission of electricity to the poles is reduced to a minimum.

The electric current will be transmitted from the power-house of the Standard Company, two miles east of the county road between Jackson in Amador County and Mokelumne Hill in Calaveras County, by means of aluminium cables 3/4 in. in thickness, composed of 37 wires laid one over the other in a series of twists in opposite directions, and then bound together. The service of carrying 60,000 volts to be imposed upon them is something unexampled, and therefore the tests to which they have been subjected are extraordinary. They proved entirely satisfactory, sustaining 16 times the force to which they will be put in actual transmissions. The transmission system will consist of two cross sections. The first installation will be from the power-house along the mother lode for the use of the mines and mining towns; thence to the power-house in Stock-

ton, thence to the Mission San José to Oakland, from the Mission San José to Alviso, and to South San Francisco.

The line from Alviso along the west side of the bay to South San Francisco will be exploited by another company, to which the current will be supplied by the Standard Electric Company. It is expected that this section of the work will be in working order by next July. The second installation will be to this city, and will be placed in operation early next year if all goes well. The main trunk for transmission will be about 150 miles in length, with numerous branches.

Thus far the Standard Electric Company has expended, or contracted to expend, nearly \$2,000,000; but its authorised bond issue is sufficient to enable it to place \$6,000,000 in this mammoth enterprise should such outlay be deemed necessary or advisable.

THE WAR.

Com. Steijn Captured.
Lord Roberts forwards a report from Gen. Baden Powell stating that the result of his operations since his visit to Pretoria has been most satisfactory, resulting in the capture of Com. Steijn (brother of the ex-president) and the complete dissolution of the latter's forces. Part of the forces disbanded on his (B.P.'s) approach, and the remainder submitted, accepting the promises published on the occupation of Bloemfontein. As a consequence of this submission, 3000 carbines (? rifles) have been delivered up, and have been taken to Rustenburg, whence they will be sent to Pretoria. The British losses were insignificant. The Boer forces are greatly disheartened.

Another dispatch from Lord Roberts reports that Gen. Hamilton's division of mounted infantry arrived at Spring Station, near Johannesburg, on Thursday morning, and followed on for Heidelberg, whence it will go to unite with Sir R. Buller at Standerton. The occupation of Standerton will close the line cutting off common action between the Transvaal and the Orange forces, compelling each to operate solely in their own district. The line extends along the railway from Johannesburg, passing Heidelberg, Handerton, Volksrust and Newcastle. Besides thus severing the enemy, it guarantees facility of communications. Sir R. Buller has met with no resistance in his march towards the north. In addition to this, Gen. Hunter occupied Potchefstroom (which some authorities call the capital of the Transvaal) on Thursday afternoon.

The War Office announces three skirmishes having taken place near Ficksburg, between the patrols of Gen. Randle's division and Boer groups from De Wet's forces. British losses were 3 killed and 10 wounded.

An unofficial message states that Standerton has already been occupied by Gen. Dunderdale's brigade, which forms the advance guard of Buller's army.

The first direct train for the Cape, since the war began, has left Pretoria. Lord Roberts' next move will be to attack the Boer forces concentrating in the north-west of Orange (should not this north-west Transvaal? For this he counts on an army of 40,000 men and 200 guns.

SUNDRIES.

—As usual.—Sunday has come round once again, and with it every promise of dismal, disagreeable weather. The past week has been relatively fine, but yesterday the weather changed for the worse, with every prospect of continuing so to-day. Still, it would be the height of recklessness to make any prophecy for the Clerk of the Weather does out a different sample every twenty-four hours, if not oftener, and he is quite capricious enough to astonish us to-day by a glorious fine day, when least expected.

—THOSE HORRID BELLS.—Complaint is again rife about the nuisance caused by the bells of San Francisco Church. During the past week, without any apparent special reason, for there has been no religious festival of any importance, they have been clashed and jangled barbarously morning, noon and night with hardly any cessation, to the serious annoyance of the entire neighbourhood, and especially of the business quarter to which the church is adjacent. We wonder how many more years will elapse before any steps will be taken to restrict the abusive ringing of church bells and the many other offensive and unnecessary noises with which the streets of the city abound. Instead of being called Monte video (Mount-see) it seems to us that this city should be called Monte-oigo (Mount-hear) for one's ears are perpetually assailed by noises of one description or another and the large majority of them superfluous; impertinent and objectionable.

—LOGICAL.—Bad as bull-fighting may be as a diversion, there is no doubt that murder is many degrees worse, but since the latter is so frequently permitted here with complete impunity, it is not entirely unreasonable that the Chambers should hasten to remove any restrictions on the former. There is nothing like being logical and consistent in these little matters.

—THEATRICAL.—Although the French Company at the Solis Theatre is much the best that has visited this city for many years, we learn that it is not attracting large audiences. This is not due to want of appreciation on part of the theatre-goers, so much as to the unpopularity of the present management, the result of its ill-liberal policy towards public and press. The moral needs no pointing.—Complaints continue to appear of the abuses committed with the public at the San Felipe Theatre. Whilst these continue, the public cannot do better than punish them by stopping away.—Nothing further seems to be heard of the English Company, dramatic or musical, which our Buenos Aires contemporaries alleged would visit the Plate this season.—There will be the usual afternoon performance at the Casino to-day.

—HILLARDS.—In case any of our readers should desire to become possessed of a genuine English billiard table, two are now being offered for sale in our advertisement columns. They are not often to be met with in this part of the world, though French tables abound.

—FETES.—We remind our readers of the special excursion train to the fetes of St. John at Santa Lucia to-day.

—LECTURE.—Prof. H. G. Welby, of Buenos Aires, will lecture at the Methodist Episcopal Church next Friday evening, on the subject of "Church Music from the 1st to the 19th Century." A specially trained quartette will aid the lecturer in his illustrations. The admission will be by tickets, which may be obtained at the American School Calle San José 257, and at the house of the Rev. G. P. Howard Calle Rio Negro 290. Prof. Welby's lecture, we may remark, has already achieved great success in Buenos Aires, and it should be received with no less interest here. The topic is one of which Prof. Welby has made a special study.

—CHINA.—There is still no reliable news from Peking. Wild rumors continue to circulate of an imperial tragedy, but no two versions agree as to details.—Telegrams received in New York assert that 24 N. American missionaries have been assassinated in Tien-Tsin.—Captain Hans, of the German gunboat "Iliss" has died from wounds received in the

combat of Taku.—The Anglo-Indian Government has chartered 30 steamers at Calcutta to transport troops to China.—A rumor is current in Shanghai, of Japanese origin, that 1500 foreigners have been massacred in Tien-Tsin.—Speaking in the Commons, Mr. Brodick confirmed an attack on Tien-Tsin, by the Boxers and revolted Chinese soldiers, on the 17th. They were rejected, and since have been bombarding the city. The allied European forces seized and destroyed the Chinese military college, losing in the action 9 killed and 12 wounded. Attacks and combats continued on the 20th. In view of the steadily increasing numbers of the enemy, urgent reinforcements are asked for. The foreign Admirals hoped to be able to succor Tien-Tsin on Friday afternoon. There had been considerable losses on both sides.—The Admiralty announces that 841 sailors and 400 marines will be embarked for China, with supplies, in a rapid transport, on the 30th.—According to a late afternoon telegram, the Legations at Peking are still safe. The railway from Taku to Tien-Tsin has been partly repaired, and is in working order for 150 kilometers. Further troops, namely 249 German marines, 380 British and 1500 Russian soldiers have been landed at Taku and are preparing to leave for Tien-Tsin. The allied troops there are said to be short of munitions.

—SHORT SERMONS.—Some recent investigations as to the length of sermons in Scotland show, we learn from the Home Magazine, that for a good many years they have been steadily decreasing in length, and are still inclined to be shorter. The limits within which they vary are very wide. Nine minutes is the absolute record for brevity, sixty-eight minutes the greatest length. Of the three leading Presbyterian Churches, the Free Church has the highest average length of sermon with thirty-two minutes; the U. P. Church, with thirty minutes, occupies the centre; and the Established Church has the shortest, with twenty-six minutes. There is a suspicion in some quarters that the shorter sermons of the present day are not altogether unconnected with the declining congregations.

—ACCIDENT.—A dreadful affair happened in the Basilica at Rome on Wednesday while the Pope was giving his blessing to 2000 pilgrims. A workman who was on a scaffold high up cleaning the damp from a cornice suddenly lost his balance and fell to the ground, being killed on the spot.

CHANGES IN MANNERS.

LE TEMPS.

Nothing is so curious as to note the changes of manners in the large countries of Europe. England, once phlegmatic, impassive, and making it a point of honour to affect a gravity superior to the accidents—happy or the reverse—of fortune, and to take even its pleasure sadly, suddenly develops a temperament of a vivacity, an ardour, and a facility for effusions quite Southern and Neapolitan.

There was a time, if we may believe history, when the news of the great victories—of Waterloo for instance—coming after the anguish of the preceding days, and the sinister omens of Ligny and Quatre-Bras, failed to shake off this mask of insensibility. Let us avow that there was a certain grandeur in this placing oneself above destiny, in undergoing without wincing the worst disasters, and in registering without any joyous emotion the most intoxicating favours of fortune. It is thus to be sure that imagination loves to represent a nation truly imperial.

—Ta regere imperio populos.... momento.—It is thus that Rome bore herself after Cannae, and thus in the hour of her revenge. And when the English writers, with Thackeray at their head, amused themselves by riddling with gallantry the too lively gesticulation, the too evident sensibility of the French, their manner of making the universe the confidant of the joys and sorrows of the life of the nation, and of making the street theatre of those dramatic explosions, we were tempted to lower our heads humbly, and to recognise in private the superiority of these cold and impenetrable strong men over a race of children, and to envy majestic Albion her disdainful calmness.

Ah well! If Thackeray were to come to life again it would no longer be on this side of the Channel that he would find materials for exercising his satiric strain. The events in London that have followed the deliverance of Mafeking surpass imagination. Certainly the siege of Mafeking—the third longest of the century, after

those of Sebastopol and Kars, and longer than that of Paris—is a fine feat of arms to be put to the credit of Colonel Baden-Powell and his little garrison.

It is natural that their fellow-citizens, delighted to see this place escape the fate which seemed likely to overtake it, should celebrate with enthusiasm and even with intoxication this happy ending. Yet some sense of proportion would not be out of place.

Mafeking has defended itself well: that is understood. Mafeking has at last been relieved: that is very good. But it is ridiculous to compare Mafeking to Saragossa, or to talk, like the Lord Mayor of London, of the heroic handful of defenders at death-grip with the hordes of South Africa.

No words can describe the spectacle that London has presented the last forty-eight hours. At the theatre the audience brutally interrupted the performance at the most thrilling moment to chant "God save the Queen." The Duke, who was playing in the *Princesse Georges*, was stupefied at seeing her manager appear on the scene, his heart in his mouth, and at the moment when she defied her husband to find her lover, and hurried at him the famous "Cercles" (search), to hear this gentleman cry out the magic word "Mafeking!" and the hall break into applause.

In the streets the crowd indulged in other diversions. It danced with frenzy, and drank to excess.

One asks oneself what the Englishmen of fifty years ago, like Sir Robert Peel, Lord Aberdeen, Cornwall Lewis, Stuart Mill, and Cobden would think if they returned to earth to assist at such a spectacle. For the first moment they would think themselves in Bedlam. Then they would understand that such great changes do not occur in manners without corresponding revolutions being accomplished in the hearts of a nation.
