REMARKS UPON THE SOUTH AMERICAN PROBLEM.

(Concluded from our last.)

Before proceeding further we would like to revise one of the
opinions expressed yesterday. We
said, «Next to armed revolt, viola-
tion of the suffrage is the worst of-
fence that can be perpetrated
against the State.» On reflection
we cannot admit even this excep-
tion. There are circumstances in
which armed revolt, in the shape of
resistance to abuses of authority that
cannot be met by other means, is jus-
tifiable and even praiseworthy. But
no circumstances can be imagined to
justify a violation of the suffrage,
and since the suffrage is the basis of
republican government it must natu-
rally follow that offences against
the suffrage are offences against the
keystone of the State, and therefore
the highest political crime that can be
committed in a republic, standing
on a per with high treason in an Em-
pire, with this difference, that a
Monarch cannot commit treason
against himself, but a republican
President can and does commit
treason against the Republic when
he dares to interfere with the suffrage.
Unfortunately, as we said yesterday,
the political conscience is still so
imperfect, so undeveloped, that no
punishment is yet found for this
treason and it is a crime of almost
daily occurrence. When the political
conscience awakens, the Colmans,
Leiras and Herreras of South Am-
erican politics, the men who gain or
maintain their power solely by this
treason will meet their deserts, and
the political regeneration of the con-
tinent will commence in earnest.

We will now turn to the last phase
of the matter that it is our intention
to consider at present. No considera-
tion of the political, and still less of
the electoral, situation in South Am-
erica, could be complete without refer-
ence to the foreign element. So far as
we know, Dr. Zaballos has made little
or no reference to this in the Article
which has provoked our remarks.
We will venture partly to supply
the deficiency.

Speaking more especially of the
River Plate Republics, these present
a peculiarly anomalous position that
might almost be termed a double
life.

On the one hand there are the na-
tives, who claim the control of the
country by birthright, and from
whom the governing, administrative,
military, voting and controlling
classes are almost exclusively drawn.
On the other hand are the foreign
residents. Roughly speaking the
foreigners represent half the adult
male population, (therefore com-
petent to vote,) half the possessors of
the land, at least three-fifths of the in-
dustrial, commercial and progressive
interests, and probably still more of
the contributors to the revenue. But
this large and enormously important
class, representing the far greater
part of the active and progressive
life of these republics, have no share
in the government or administration
and no vote by which their voice
or influence can be made felt. The na-
tives who have the government, ad-
ministration and votes, have but little
share in the active life, and both
their interests and traditions are un-
progressive. It would hardly be an
exaggeration to say that the fore-
igner labours, produces and pays
taxes in order that the native may
govern him. We can hardly imagine
a situation more anomalous.

Such being the situation, it follows
that, even were the elections honest,
no vote taken under present elector-
al conditions could possibly repre-
sent the opinion of the country, if
by the word country we are to in-
clude the productive, industrial, com-
mercial and progressive interests in
which foreigners have far the
largest share. Such a vote must
be mainly representative of the

interests of the governing and
administrative classes, and unfor-
tunately these classes are for the
most part indifferent, when not po-
sitively antagonistic, to the first
mentioned classes. This fact is ex-
planatory of many defects of govern-
ment, of much legislative inimi-
city to the progressive interests of the
country concerned, and of the vices of
a situation in which politics have come
to be regarded as the privilege of a
special class who use their power to
strengthen their own monopoly and
to further their own class interests.
In such politics there is nothing na-
tional whatever, it is merely olig-
archical class government, and not
in the faintest degree republican.
That government cannot possibly be
called republican in which the class
contributing most to national activ-
ity and progress are excluded from
all voice and participation.

We do not suppose that the persons
responsible for framing the constitu-
tions of these republics, either fore-
saw so peculiar a situation as this or delib-
erately contemplated the exclusion of
such important factors from political
life. The situation has arisen grad-
ually, we might almost say mechan-
ically, whilst the governing parties have
been either too much occupied with
quarrels amongst themselves to apply
a remedy or have been too self-inter-
ested to wish to apply one. The fact
remains that no serious legisla-
tive attempt has been made to
cure the anomaly, and consequently
the door is still closed to what
would prove one of the strongest
regenerative forces imaginable.

Looking at the same question in
yet another aspect, we almost feel
tempted to say that the declaration
of national independence has been in
a certain sense premature, but we
would not wish this to be taken
in any offensive sense. What we
desire to convey is that there has
been an attempt to give the national
feeling an exclusiveness which cir-
cumstances hardly permit it to retain
without detriment to the advance-
ment of the country. It may be fa-
vorable to class interests but not to
general interests which we take to be
those of the whole country and not
of any special class. And after all this
national feeling, when analyzed,
proves very shadowy. Of the adult
male residents, one half more or less
are foreigners. Of the remainder
fully one half are directly descended
from foreigners on one or both sides
and therefore can have but little real
participation in the national tradi-
tions that originated early in the
century, though properly enough
taught to respect them. The num-
ber of residents that can go back
two generations without coming to
foreign blood is very small, perhaps
not 20 per cent of the present popu-
lation. And of these most were born
before the tide of immigration set in.
Of the rising generation fully one-
half are direct descendants of for-
eigners on one or both sides. It is
evident that the «nationality» of these
countries is at present entirely imma-
ture and in an exceedingly transitory
state. With this constant influx of
foreign blood, which will increase as
immigration continues and grows,
it is certain enough that the «na-
tive» type of two generations hence
will be something entirely different
from what it is to-day, and that the
present «criollo» and gaucho tradi-
tions, which still exercise a certain
influence on a limited class of the
people, will have disappeared
entirely. The sons of the «foreigners»
of to-day will take their places
amongst the native governing classes
of to-morrow, bringing with them
the more advanced and Europeanised
notions that they have imbibed
from their parents. From this point
of view, then, the present exclusiveness
is equally unreasonable. A liberal
electoral law that would give the
foreign residents a fair share in the
political life of the country, and in
some measure remedy the present
disequilibrium between taxation and
representation, whilst of great ben-
efit to the progressive interests of
the country, would only anticipate
by some twenty or thirty years that
which nature cannot but otherwise
infinitely bring about. And if this
were done, the pretence of the «in-
competence» of the voter would be
even more fallacious than at present.

There are many other points of
Dr. Zaballos' article that might be
commented upon, but we have no
wish to weary our readers. Summing
up what we said on the points touch-
ed, the problem resolves itself into
three special heads—misconception of
authority—violation of the suffrage
—unnatural exclusion of the foreign
vote. These come in the first rank, and
are, in fact, responsible for most of the
other defects. The first being tradi-
tional is not easily cured, but the
other two are a matter for legislation
and the remedy of these two would
greatly hasten the removal of the
first. If a few South American
statesmen could be induced to
abandon their minor party and
selfish interests and agitate seri-
ously for reform on these three
important lines they would be the
initiators of a regenerative movement
not less important to the welfare and
progress of the continent than its
emancipation from the Spanish do-
mination, an emancipation from
which so much was expected and so
little has hitherto resulted.

POLITICAL NOTES.

Matters in political circles remain
very quiet. The portfolio of Foreign
Affairs is still in abeyance and for
the moment Government is attend-
ing principally to routine duties that
afford no room for comment. The
Chambers also seem to be taking a
vacation unto themselves, which is by
no means excusable. So far as
the Senators are concerned, we
believe there is nothing before them
until certain matters come up from
the other Chamber. But the Repre-
sentatives have plenty of topics,
which are at present slumbering in
the bosoms of Committees that seem
in no hurry to despatch them.
Perhaps this is partly accounted for
by the exclusively «berrista» com-
position of these Committees, which
command little public confi-
dence. The Chambers have been
unsatisfactory throughout the year,
and it is not surprising that this
dissatisfaction should find public
expression in foreign as well as local
papers. This is the natural result of
the manner in which they were nomi-
nated. Dr. Herrera and his party
may employ what sophisms they
please about the imperfections or in-
competence of the electors, but it is
very certain that no popular vote
could have given the country such
an unsatisfactory Chamber as has
resulted from his nominations. If there
were no other arguments against the
violation of the suffrage, this expe-
rience would sufficiently condemn it.
It is not in the hands of such as Dr.
Herrera that the dangerous power of
nominating legislators is to be en-
trusted. The electors may be incom-
petent—though we doubt it—but he
is untrustworthy, which is far worse.

It is worth remarking that both
the «berrista» organs carefully re-
frained from reproducing the London
telegram we quoted yesterday, stat-
ing that the Times has a letter from
its Montevideo Correspondent
strongly condemning the present po-
litical and parliamentary situation.
As they are mainly responsible for
the said situation, this is not un-
intelligible. Probably they attribute
this also to the intrigues of the op-
position.

We understand that the question
of the Port Studies Committee was
considered in Cabinet Council yester-
day, but we cannot yet state with
what result. The Minister of Foment
has been busy drafting the regu-
latory measures of the Port Law.
Sr. P. Pinayra, President of the
Jockey Club, visited the President
on Monday in order to ask for
the assistance of government for the
International race meeting to be held
next January.

Nothing is heard of the Budget,
nor does it seem that it is occupy-
ing the attention of the Ministers.
Yesterday's Herald devoted three
columns or more, to explanations of
Dr. Herrera's fiasco of last week,
when the «tajistas» circle refused to
attend the banquet of reconciliation
he had prepared for them. Twelve
covers were laid, and only two guests
arrived! Of course the Herald in-
geniously contrives to prove every-
body to have been in the wrong ex-
cept Dr. Herrera. The affair con-
tinues to cause no little amusement
in political circles, and every one
has a different version of it. It is
generally acknowledged that for
once Don Julio has been «sold», and
we do not think many are sorry.

Yesterday's Siglo has a strong ar-
ticle protesting against fresh military
promotions, and claiming that some
stringent measures should be taken to
restrain this hoary abuse. This is
the public opinion also, but it does
not seem to weigh in official circles.
The Siglo also shows that by using
the present discount of the military
pensions to purchase them out by
present value on the annuity sys-
tem, the whole present onerous list
could be wiped out in twelve years,
relieving the budget of nearly 2½
million dollars at present expended
in an entirely unproductive manner.
Sunday the 30th instant is fixed
for the elections of Justices of the
Peace and Tenientes Alcaldes in a
number of districts of the interior.

The Minister of Foment, Sr. J. J.
Castro, has received through the
Rural Association, the diploma of
honour awarded him in the Chicago
Exhibition for his excellent Map of
the South American Railway System,
of which we have frequently spoken.

THE AMERICAN TARIFF.

THE BILL PASSED.
A Brighter Outlook for Trade.
The following telegrams, copied
from a London paper, supply details
of this important matter not yet
known here.—

NEW YORK, AUG. 13.

The new tariff law which will be
the result of the surrender of the
House to the Senate to-day is a
slightly less Protective measure than
the McKinley law. The average re-
duction in duties is about 15 per
cent. The only feature of the Bill
which can be called an anti-Protec-
tionist victory, however, is the free
wool clause. Tariff reformers have
always regarded free wool as the

entering of a wedge for the overthrow
of the Protective system, and they
think now that this will prove to be
the ultimate result of the present
victory. The free list includes also
lumber, binding twine, and cotton
bagging. All pound duties on woolen
goods are abolished, leaving ad val-
orem duties only, which are slightly
reduced.

Whether the Senate will concur
with the House in the passage of se-
parate Bills granting free coal, iron,
barbed wire, and sugar, is doubtful,
but it seems safe to predict that the
passage of the present law will mark
the beginning of the gradual destruc-
tion of the tariff system. Nobody
believes that the tariff will ever be
increased again. Whatever changes
may be made in future will be
towards lower duties.

There is a general expectation that
the settlement of the matter will be
followed by a great business revival,
which will open an era of prosperity
in all branches of trade. If this should
prove to be the case it will convince
people that tariff reduction and free
raw material are not harmful, but be-
neficial, and they will henceforward
lose their terror of Free Trade.

WASHINGTON, AUGUST 13.
Mr. Crisp, the Speaker of the
House, had a conference this morn-
ing with the Democratic Conference
of the House. An agreement was
arrived at that a resolution should
be proposed to the Democratic
Caucus, proposing that the House
should agree to the Senate's Bill, and
should instruct the Ways and Means
Committee to report separate Bills,
placing sugar, coal, and iron ore on
the free list.

When the Caucus met, Mr. Wil-
son, the author of the Tariff, declar-
ed that there remained no choice.
Either the party must accept the
Senate's Bill, or there would be no
tariff legislation. Finally the Caucus
passed a resolution receding from the
House's objections to the Senate's
Bill. This secures the passing of that
Bill.

6 45 P.M.
The House of Representatives has
passed the Senate's Tariff Bill by 182
votes to 105. The Bill will now be
submitted to the President.

Evening.
At the meeting of the Democratic
Caucus this afternoon, Mr. Wilson
recounted the futile efforts which
had been made by the House Con-
ference to obtain concessions from the
Senate Conference, who were convin-
ced that the Bill would not pass the
Senate if they yielded to the de-
mands of the House. The battle,
Mr. Wilson declared, was between
the people and the Sugar Trust,
which had taken the people by the
throat, and the fight would never end
until they had shaken off the grip.
Mr. Crisp, who spoke in a similar
strain, submitted a resolution that
the House should agree to the Sen-
ate's amendments, and immediately
consider separate Bills for freelist-
ing sugar in all its forms, as well as
iron ore, coal, and barbed wire. The
resolution was divided into two parts,
and the first clause was adopted by
130 against 21 votes. The second
part was agreed to without a divi-
sion.

In the House of Representatives
this afternoon the Committee on
Rules submitted a resolution em-
bodying the resolution of the Caucus,
and providing for a two hours' de-
bate on the Tariff Bill.

Mr. Reed maintained that the
Tariff Bill was not before the House,
but Mr. Crisp over-ruled the objec-
tion, and the resolution was adopted
by 176 against 97 votes.

It is stated on unquestionable
authority that President Cleveland
will neither sign nor veto the Bill
after its passage, but will permit it
to become law without his signature,
in virtue of the provision in the
Constitution allowing this to be done
after the lapse of ten days.

The Senate's Bill, of which the
action taken by the Caucus ensures
the adoption, provides that raw
sugars shall pay 40 per cent ad val-
orem, but above 16 Dutch standard
one-eighth per cent in addition, and
from bounty-paying countries one-
tenth per cent, additional. Iron ore
will pay 40 cents per ton, pig-iron 4
dollars per ton, iron or steel rails
7-20th of a cent per pound, precious
stones cut and unset, 25 per cent. ad
valorem, precious stones set 30 per
cent, and precious stones unset 10
per cent. ad valorem. Glaziers' and
miners' diamonds are admitted free.
Wool is also free. Tinplate will pay
1-15 cent. per pound after Octo-
ber 1st.

Immediately after the vote on the
Tariff Bill, the first of the Special
Bills recommended by the Democra-
tic caucus was introduced, provid-
ing for the free-listing of coal, and
was passed by 160 votes against 104.

8 30 P.M.

The Free Iron Ore Bill has been
passed by the House of Representa-
tives by 163 votes against 102.

The following is a statement show-
ing the reductions made by the Sen-
ate Bill in the average ad valorem
duties as compared with the duties
at present imposed under the Mc-
Kinley law:
The duties on painted china are re-
duced from 60 per cent. to 35 per
cent; on plain china, 55 per cent. to
30 per cent; on manufacturers of glass,
60 per cent. to 35 per cent; pig iron,
which paid from 25 per cent. to 41

per cents, will pay from 15 per cent.
to 21 cent. The duties on iron ore are
reduced from 33 per cent. to 25 per
cent. On scrap steel 43 per cent. to
26 cent. Bar iron, which paid from
25 per cent. to 33 per cent. will pay
from 16 per cent. to 32 per cent.
Duties on steel rails are reduced from
58 per cent. to 34 per cent. On bars
of rolled iron from 62 per cent. to 45
per cent, on boiler or other plate
iron or steel 54 per cent. to 25 per
cent. Sheets of iron or steel, common
or black, which paid from 25 per
cent. to 70 per cent. will pay from 20
per cent. to fifty-five per cent. The
duties on tin plates are reduced
from 75 per cent. to 42 per cent.,
on tin manufactures from 55 per
cent. to 35 per cent. The duties
on cylinder glass, polished and
unpolished, now 20 per cent. to 64
per cent, will be from 13 per cent.
to 58 per cent; on plate glass, fluted,
&c., now 49 per cent. to 64 per cent.,
37 per cent. to 43 per cent., on plate
glass, unsilvered, cast, &c., now 98 to
174 per cent, 88 per cent. to 122
cent. The duties on plate glass, cast
and unsilvered and above 24 inches by
60 inches, are reduced from 49 per
cent. to 31 per cent. On cylinder
and crown glass, silvered, from 44
per cent. to 28 per cent; steel ingots,
&c., now paying from 29 per cent. to
50 per cent. will pay from 20 per
cent. to 40 per cent. Nails, now 23 per
cent. to 45 per cent, 26 per cent. to 30
per cent. The duty on railway
fishplates is reduced from 72 per cent.
to 25 per cent. Screws, now paying 47
per cent. to 111 per cent, will pay
from 33 per cent. to 67 per cent. The
duty on lead sheets is reduced from 37
per cent. to 18 per cent, on nickel
from 23 per cent. to 14 per cent, on
manufactures of metal from 45 per
cent. to 35 per cent, on cotton cloth
bleached from 35.17 per cent. to 35.5
per cent; ditto bleached from 33
per cent. to 26 per cent; ditto dyed,
coloured, etc., from 41 per cent. to 30
per cent. On cotton cloth exceeding
a hundred threads, unbleached, from
42 per cent. to 32 per cent; ditto
bleached, from 43 per cent. to 38 per
cent; ditto dyed, coloured, &c., from
44 per cent. to 38 per cent. On
woolen yarn from 278 per cent.
to 30 per cent; on woollen
shawls, not above 40 cents,
a pound, from 136 per cent. to
35 per cent. The duty on
blankets—now 80 per cent. to
104 per cent.—is fixed at 35 per
cent. On woollen hats—now 86 per
cent. to 106 per cent.—35 per cent;
on flannels not over 50c. a pound—
now paying 85 per cent. to 104 per
cent.—25 per cent. to 35 per cent.
The duty on silk partially manufac-
tured is reduced from 60 per cent. to

convenient to have arrested more of the gamblers, on account of their social position. Anyhow the police are to be congratulated on having at last taken this step, and we hope they will follow it up energetically. It has not been allowed to transpire who was the proprietor of the den.

—The Khedive has abruptly broken off his continental tour and is returning to Egypt. This is supposed to be due to instructions from the Sultan, who was anxious that he should not visit London.

—The death has occurred at Berlin of Dr. Henry Karl Brugsch, one of the leading Egyptologists of the century. He was 57 years old.

—The death took place on Monday, in childhood, of the young wife of the well-known photographer Sr. Santini.

—The influenza epidemic continues its tiresome course, and is extending to the interior. Both the cavalry regiments at Salto and Durazno are suffering severely, a large number of the men being down at once. At Minas it has appeared in a violent form in the prison and police quarters. In town it is also extending, and has recently attacked the Penitentiary.

—No little sensation was caused yesterday by the telegram from Buenos Aires announcing that the great Irish estanciero and whilom millionaire Mr. Thomas Duggan had been declared bankrupt by the Commercial Judge Dr. Garay. He is said to owe \$20,000,000 (paper presumably) to various banks, besides other heavy liabilities. He owes the English Bank \$300,000 and \$250,000 gold, the Provincial Bank \$200,000 paper, and the National Bank \$400,000 and \$300,000 paper. His assets are calculated at 15 millions, comprised in lands, stocks and houses, and his liabilities at 20 millions. Julio Garcia has been named syndic. It is feared his failure will be of fatal consequences for several houses.

—We do not think it would be rash to ascribe part if not all of Mr. Duggan's failure to his large participation in the wild speculations of Mr. Edward Casey.

—On Monday evening, Benito Lopez, an elderly and blind man who lived on public charity, was found in a side street near the Avenida Rondeau, with three dangerous knife-stabs in his body. He was too weak to make any declaration, but it is thought he must have been assaulted for the sake of robbing him of the few coppers he had begged during the day. Suspicion has fallen on the person who guided him about and for whom the police are looking. A more dastardly crime can hardly be imagined.

—The R. N. S. "Tagua" left Rio Janeiro yesterday morning and should arrive here to-morrow morning.

—The Custom House paid \$15,454 into the London Bank yesterday on account of the foreign debt service.

—From London telegrams we learn that Cardinal Vaughan is better and will officiate at the funeral of the Count of Paris.—Mr. Gladstone is unwell and confined to his bed. It is feared another operation on his eyes is necessary.—News from the seat of war is very indefinite.

LONDON NOTES.

SATURDAY, AUG. 11.

In the House of Commons yesterday the Chancellor of the Exchequer said he hoped on Monday to make a full statement of what the Government expected would be the business for the rest of the Session. As soon as the Mines (Eight Hours) Bill was disposed of the Indian discussion would be taken up. The Report stage of the Scotch Local Government Bill was resumed and concluded. Some progress was made with the Railway and Canal Traffic Bill, and the Congested Districts Board (Ireland) Bill was read a second time.

As the result of a joint conference of representative cabowners and drivers, held last night in the Conference Room at the House of Commons, the Home Secretary made a supplementary award regarding the prices to be paid for privileged cabs. Subsequently, the men who have been on strike during the past week resolved to return to work to-day.

Lord Roberts yesterday inspected the Volunteer Artillery Camp at Shoeburyness, and afterwards presented the prizes to the winning detachments.

Many of the sections of the British Association met again at Oxford, yesterday, Professor Schäfer delivering his presidential address in that devoted to Physiology, which met at Kable College for the first time. Lady Lord Salisbury was present at a combined meeting of the Mathematical and Mechanical Sections, when Mr. Maxim's flying machine was described and discussed. Problems of a social and industrial character were debated in the Section on Economic Science.

No further news has been received from Corea, the telegraph stations being in the hands of the Japanese or the Chinese, and messages referring to the war being refused. A telegram from Shanghai states that the Tung-li-Yamen has issued a proclamation promising protection to foreigners. The Japanese are, however, leaving China. Despatches telegraphed from San Francisco contain fuller details, taken from newspapers published at Tokio and Yokohama, of the earlier episodes of the conflict between the two Powers. A report is mentioned to the effect that Russia has occupied the island of Gotsulbo.

M. Drumont has telegraphed from Brussels to Paris declaring that the account published by the "Figaro" of an attempt made by M. Dupuy, the Premier, to bribe him is absolutely correct. No denial has yet been published from M. Dupuy or M. Lé-

pine, the Prefect of Police, who was accused of having conducted the negotiations.

Yesterday the trial began at Saintes of the Englishman Wittingham for the murder of his wife. During his examination by the judge the prisoner broke down, and sobbed painfully.

An unfortunate accident happened to the Grand Duke and Duchess Alexander Michaelovitch while they were driving to the castle of Kopscha after their marriage on Monday. The horses shied at the Bengal fires placed along the road and overturned the carriage. The Grand Duchess sustained slight injuries, her husband being unhurt. The Czar has founded a training college for girls in honour of his daughter's wedding.

A telegram from New York gives the particulars of the wrecking of a train on the Rock Island line at Lincoln, in Nebraska. The train fell through a trestle bridge forty feet high, the engine boiler exploded, and the burning coals set fire to the debris. Twelve persons were either killed outright or slowly burnt to death.

The Grindelwald Conference resumed its meetings on Thursday night, when the Rev. Hugh Hughes, Prebendary Webb-Peploe, and the Rev. Douglas Mackenzie, President of the Scottish Congregational Union, spoke.

The Britannia was left to sail over the course yesterday for the Meteor Challenge Shield, which her owner will now retain, having won the trophy two years in succession. The Prince of Wales and the German Emperor were aboard. In the evening, the Emperor and a party of about forty were entertained by the Prince of Wales on board the Osborne.

Surrey yesterday defeated Somerset by four wickets at Taunton. As they disposed of the Western county in their second innings for 116, the visitors required 89 only to win, but the wicket was altogether against run-getting. At Canterbury, Yorkshire got considerably the better of the match, thanks mainly to the batting of Brown, and the fact that the Kent bowlers were handicapped by having to use a wet ball, and left off with a lead of 90 on the first innings. Middlesex, at Clifton, found themselves in the unenviable position of having to follow on, and at the close of the day's play Gloucester were still 65 ahead, their opponents having their ten wickets in hand.

Yesterday in the Divorce Division Sir F. Jenne had before him a petition for restitution of conjugal rights by Mrs. Jane Frances Dore. The respondent, when 21 years of age, persuaded the petitioner who was then 14, to run away with him. The parents afterwards intervened, and prevented the parties living together. Now, the petitioner sought to enforce her rights. A decree was granted with costs.

At Bow-street Police-Court yesterday, Mr. John Clack, a solicitor, appeared to an adjourned summons charged with having obtained 120l. by means of a lady's signature to a cheque. The defendant was committed for trial, but admitted to bail.

The Home Secretary yesterday ordered a reprieve for Sommerfeldt, who was sentenced to death for participation in the Shaftesbury-avenue murder.

MONDAY, AUG. 13.

The Japanese navy has made an unsuccessful attempt to capture Wei-Lai-Wei, a strong Chinese naval station on the straits of Pechili, in the absence of the Chinese fleet. One account speaks of an engagement on Wednesday, while another version mentions two attacks as having taken place on Friday. Four vessels are said to have been engaged. On Friday, a larger fleet of ships, numbering twenty-six, attacked Port Arthur, an important port on the other side of the Pechili Straits, also without success. On Saturday a naval battle was reported to be in progress between the Japanese and Chinese fleets, in which twenty-one ships were thought to be engaged. The Japanese land forces are also concentrating near Seoul, to which place a Chinese force is advancing from the north.

No meeting was held at Washington on Saturday of the Conference Committee on the Tariff Bill, the Senatorial members failing to appear at the time appointed. The Senate stands adjourned until to-day.

On Saturday the Anarchist trial was concluded in Paris. Of the thirty prisoners only three were convicted, and these on charges of house-breaking. The notorious Ortiz was sentenced to fifteen years' imprisonment and Cheriot to eight years. A Correspondent states that the jury may be regarded as representing the average bourgeois opinion in Paris on the recent exceptional legislation against the Anarchists.

A telegram from Saintes states that the young Englishman Wittingham was sentenced there on Saturday to twenty years' penal servitude for the murder of his wife.

At the closing closing session of the Grindelwald Conference on Saturday an important discussion took place in favour of Methodist Reunion which it is hoped may lead to practical results.

An alarming mishap occurred at St. Pancras Station yesterday morning. As the Scotch express approached the Midland terminus the driver found that the engine brakes were ineffective and notwithstanding his efforts to reduce speed, the train came into violent collision with the buffer stops at the end of the platform. The goods train was telescoped and other carriages were injured, six of them somewhat seriously. The guard saved his life by jumping from his van to the platform just before the collision occurred. Both the engine driver and the fireman escaped unhurt.

With the exception of that devoted

ed to Mathematics, the work of the sections of the British Association at Oxford was not very heavy on Saturday. Yesterday the German Emperor went to Osborne and paid a farewell visit to the Queen. In the evening his Imperial Majesty gave a large dinner party on board the Hohenzollern. This morning, accompanied by the Prince of Wales and the Duke of York, he will go by train to Aldershot to witness a great review, which will take place on Laffan's Plain.

Lady Tweeddale formally opened the West Highland Railway on Saturday afternoon. This line, which is to be worked practically as a part of the North British Railway system, is one hundred miles in length, and runs through a picturesque portion of the Western Highlands hitherto inaccessible by rail.

The Shoeburyness meeting was brought to a conclusion on Saturday, the 2nd Durham and the 1st Cornwall taking the prizes in the carbine competition, and the South Eastern and the Amalgamated taking the first and second prize respectively in the competition for the Royal Artillery. In the guard-mounting competition there was a tie between the 2nd Middlesex and the 3rd Kent detachments.

Kent could do little against the Yorkshire bowling on a treacherous wicket at Canterbury on Saturday, and the northern county were victorious by ten wickets. Middlesex gave a capital account of themselves at Clifton, and Gloucestershire found it anything but easy to avert defeat by playing out time. Hampshire beat Warwickshire by two wickets, and Leicestershire were defeated by Derbyshire by an innings and 36 runs.

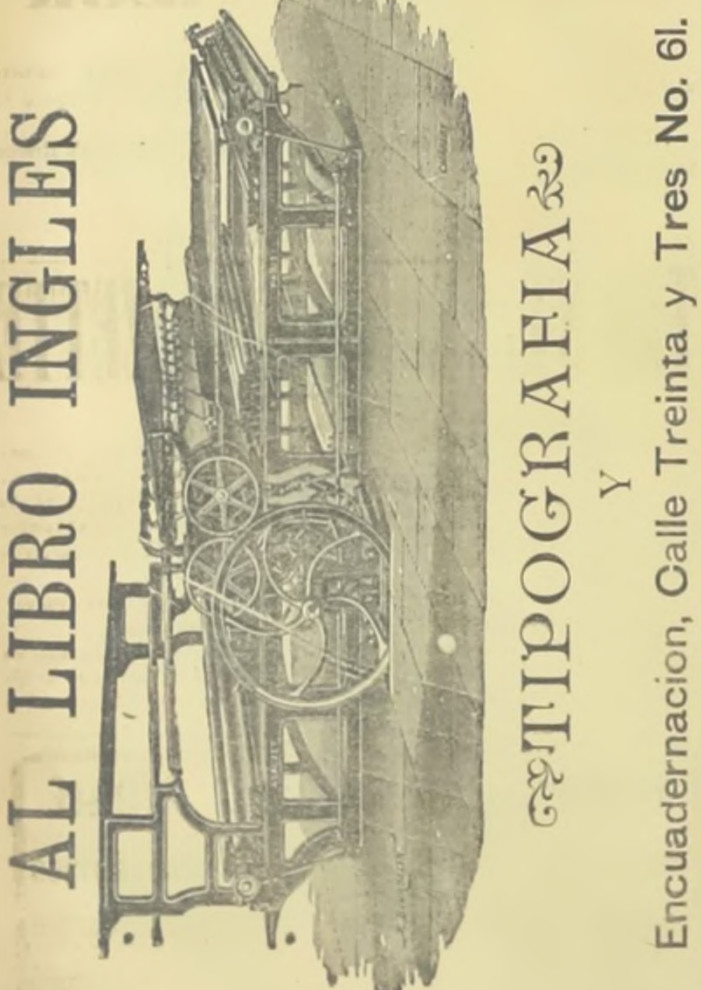
