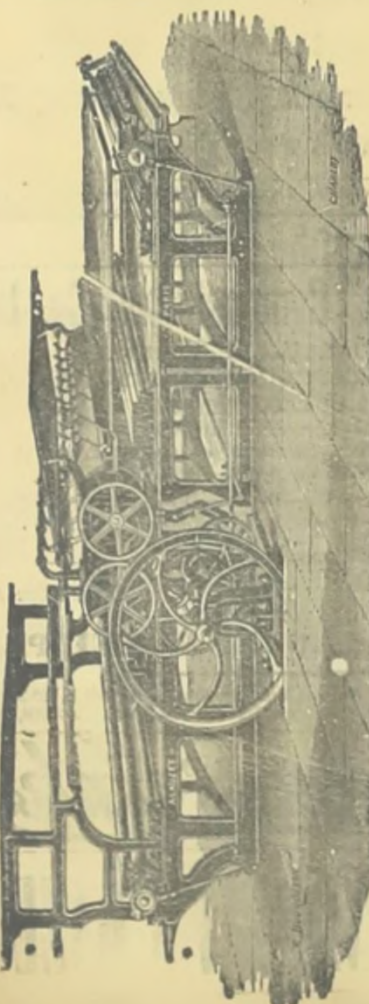

A Sacrifice.

(A SHORT STORY.)

I.

AT OBER-AMMERGAU.

To tell the truth, I had grown very tired of the Passion Play; the ranting actors, their gaudy clothes, and outlandish tongue had become hateful. At first the play charmed me, but after five hours I found it wearisome beyond words. My seat was well back, so that I had a wide view of the audience; but I was tired of watching that medley of races and creeds, and more than all I was heart sick of trying to avoid seeing the greasy bald head of the Polish Jew seated in front of me between a tanned monk and a pretty American. I dozed with my eyes open, not daring to close them, for the fat German beside me was snoring like an organ, and I was afraid that—unless I looked wide-awake—people might think me the offender.

The day was bright, and I took pleasure in watching the changing colours of the cluster of mountains beyond the open-air stage; and I remember that on one top a white tuft of cloud lingered in a clump of pines. It reminded me of some half-forgotten Greek verses about a goddess who wanted to see a fight, and so disguised herself carefully as a cloud. And then, thinking of Heine's *Gods in Exile*, I fancied that Athens haunted these mountains, and was now gazing on the queer form of the new worship with shining eyes. Then I thought how pleasant it would be to get away from the mob and go wandering along the mountain-paths through fields that had a blue and pink mist of flowers over them, or clambering up sunny hill-sides to the shadow of the trees. So I went on musing, till suddenly I found that it was about sunset, and that the players were acting the crucifixion.

A that moment they were raising the cross. One of them hung writhing on it. His acting had such realism that I caught my breath; he seemed swooning with pain, and blood seemed trickling down his cheeks from the crown of thorns. It was sickening to see him, and I turned instead to the multitude staring breathlessly at his agonised face. Some women were sobbing and crying; some people seemed wondering, as if that history had never been brought home to them; in all that throng I could see no one indifferent.

Then suddenly, on my right hand—about six rows in front—I caught sight of Margaret. Her small figure had been hidden by her mother's prosperous bulk. Now she was leaning forward, watching the scene through her eyeglasses. (She uses her glasses so seldom that they give her an intent look). Her face was as white as milk, her lips were parted; you would have thought that instead of that stage, she was seeing Calvary.

I lodged in Toby Zwinck's loft, but I went over that evening to the inn where Margaret and her mother were staying. They were in the dining-room; it was noisy, and crammed with tourists. I recognised the waiters as actors in the Passion Play: "St. John," a long-haired jack-a-daisical boy, was carving pork; "Judas" was serving out beer. To escape from the loud inn, we went for a stroll, the mother and a friend of hers—a grim, withered old maid—walking first. The night was clear, and the fantastic houses seemed like big toys; the moonlight whitened the gables and glittered on the small panes, and cast shadows under the jutting stories. Outside the village, as we went down the Oberau road, the dim meadows were lullied by a tinkling of sheep-bells.

We spoke of the play, but our talk flagged. I have at best a sluggish tongue, and Margaret was oddly silent. We must have dawdled, for the couple in front were well out of earshot. Suddenly she stopped: I remember we were opposite a ghostly white cross, that stands in the middle of a meadow, and was raised, I think, to the memory of King Louis.

"I've made up my mind about Jack," she said.
"About Jack?"
"Yes; I'm going to marry him."
"Of course," I said, "I know that he'd asked you."
Then I hesitated, for I have the slow and irresolute ways of a bookworm. I had foreseen this, and had failed to make up my mind how to act.

"I suppose," I went on, "I should congratulate you. And yet you know so little of Jack. Why, it isn't a year since you met him first. And there are such risks in marriage."

"Who do you mean?" she asked. "Are you condemning marriage, or Jack?"
"I doubt," I said, "whether you know him thoroughly."
