

British Vice Consul at Bluefields, who had been arrested.

A serious fire broke out yesterday at St. Moritz in the Eugenia, eleven shops being destroyed, and damage done to the amount of five thousand pounds. The conflagration for some time threatened the Hotel Victoria, where the Duchess of York and the Duchess of Teck have been staying, but was got under before it could spread so far.

Great excitement has been caused at Cairo by the arrest of Ali Pacha Cherif, President of the Legislative Council, and Hassan Wazir, a retired Egyptian General, on the charge of buying Sudanese girls. A third Pacha has absconded. The accused will probably be tried by court-martial in accordance with the Anti-Slavery Laws.

A telegram from Senegal published by a Paris newspaper states that the French have sustained a fresh reverse at Timbuctoo. Two companies are said to have been cut to pieces by the natives. The news is discredited at the Ministry of the Colonies in Paris.

Three cricket matches were decided yesterday. Somerset defeated Gloucestershire by five wickets' victory over Leicestershire, and Hampshire were successful against Essex by an innings and 61 runs. Sussex completed an innings for 247 at Brighton, where Kent, with one wicket down in their second attempt are 67 runs on. Yorkshire greatly outplayed the M.C.C. at Scarborough gaining an advantage of 160 on the first innings.

Susan Mesney, the young Tottenham school teacher who was reported on Monday to have mysteriously disappeared, has been recovered by her parents, to whom she has told a singular story. She first declared that on arriving at Holborn Viaduct station from Bromley, where she had been spending a holiday, she was met by a man with whom she consented to go away. She then denied this statement, and said that, fearing she was not wanted at home, she resolved to stay away for a few days to test her parents' love, as she had read in penny novelettes of other girls doing. Since Friday she had stayed at a Temperance Hotel in the Strand, and desired to return home when she had spent all her money.

Yesterday at the Stratford Police-court the extraordinary story from Romford reported in our last issue was investigated by the magistrates, before whom a young man named Hill appeared on a charge of attempting to murder his sweetheart, Emily Spooner, by administering laudanum to her and stabbing her. Miss Spooner declared that she and the accused had resolved to commit suicide the suggestion in the first instance being made by herself. They took a knife with them to use if the laudanum failed to take effect. After the poison and stabbing they wandered about the fields all night and returned to Romford and Ilford respectively the following morning. A remand was granted.

According to the Registrar-General's report there were 2,378 births and 1,284 deaths in London last week, the former being 242 and the latter 271 below the average for the same week in the last ten years. The death rate per thousand per annum, 15.4, was exceptionally low. The deaths included from small-pox 2, scarlet fever 17, and diphtheria 43. In all these cases there was a diminution in the number of patients under treatment.

At an extraordinary general meeting of the Trustees, Executors, and Securities Insurance Corporation, held yesterday to receive the report of the Investigation Committee which was appointed at the beginning of the year, it was resolved that legal proceedings should be taken against the directors, and that funds should be raised for instituting a test action for the purpose of deciding the questions raised on the Committee's report.

Between the 1st of April and the 25th inst., the receipts into the Exchequer amounted to 82,359,056*l.*, as compared with 81,240,036*l.* in the corresponding period of the last financial year, and the expenditure to 87,816,235*l.*, as against 86,011,120*l.* On Saturday last the Treasury balances stood at 2,052,380*l.*, and on the same day in the previous year at 1,616,806*l.*

THE LORDS AT MISCHIEF.

During the past Session the House of Lords have taken further steps antagonistic to the popular will. In the first Session of this Parliament they had to deal with the Irish Home Rule Bill, the Local Government or Parish Councils Bill, and the Employers Liability Bill. How they treated those measures will be fresh in the public mind. This year they have again had not only many minor measures, but three great Bills before them. The first was the Finance or Budget Bill, which, as they could not mangle, they passed, muttering outside, however, that in consequence they must henceforth discontinue doing so. The second great Bill, the Evicted Tenants Bill, they threw out; and the third, the Scotch Local Government Bill, they amended after their customary fashion. Half a dozen of their acts during the Session may be set forth thus:

CHURCH ASCENDENCY.—In April they adopted a motion by the Bishop of St. Asaph for an address to her Majesty, praying her to withhold her assent from the part of the Education Bill which would prevent the formation of any particular denomination from being taught or used at family worship in boarding houses. This was done in the interests of the Church of England; and the majority who carried the motion would not have formed a quorum in the

House of Commons, the numbers being 38 votes against 24.

THE PROPERTY OF INTASTATES.—In the same month the Lord Chancellor moved the second reading of a Bill entitled the Law of Inheritance Amendment Bill, by which it was proposed that in the case of a person dying intestate the disposition of his property by the law should be the same whether that property were real or personal estate. This would have effected a strongly-demanded reform in respect to realty, though only in the case of intestates. But the Duke of Norfolk, supported by Lord Salisbury and Lord Halsbury, opposed it. Lord Rosebery warmly advocated it. On a division it was thrown out by 63 votes against 52, a majority of 11.

THE DECEASED WIFE'S SISTER QUESTION.—It has been said that the present House of Commons would pass a Deceased Wife's Sister Bill by a majority of two to one. In June, Lord Dunsen moved the second reading of such a Bill in the House of Lords. The Earl of Selborne, the Archbishop of Canterbury, and others, however, came down to oppose it, and it was rejected by 129 votes to 120.

BETTERMENT.—On the important subject of Betterment the Lords appointed a Committee of their own House only to consider it when they found that the Commons would not join with them. This Committee drew up a Report which did indeed recommend the principle of Betterment, but with such restrictions and safeguards as to hamper all who desired to apply it. The Report was brought before their lordships' House last month, and they forthwith adopted it.

IRISH EVICTED TENANTS.—As already stated the Lords rejected the Irish Evicted Tenants Bill, notwithstanding the importance attached to it by the Irish Executive, responsible for the maintenance of law and order. It should be added that this was done by an enormous vote, 249 to 30, a special muster being made for the occasion.

WORKMEN'S DWELLINGS.—In dealing with the Scotch Local Government Bill a few days ago the Lords struck out a provision that would have enabled local authorities to acquire land for workmen's dwellings. To this the Commons had to agree under pain of sacrificing the Bill.

It will be noticed that in all these things the Lords have been moved by two reasons only—the claims of the Church and the privileges of property.

FATAL MINING DISASTERS IN AMERICA.

SEATTLE (WASHINGTON), AUGUST 25. A serious disaster occurred in the Franklin mine near here yesterday afternoon, causing the loss of thirty-seven lives.

Smoke was noticed issuing from the mine at about one o'clock in the afternoon, and the men in the workings were at once warned. Of the seventy men in the sixth level forty lingered at Breast 62, where the fire was found to have originated, and attempted to extinguish the flames. The fire, however, was beyond their control, and spread to Breasts 60 and 61.

Some of the men fled, but others did not seem to realise their danger and remained so long that when they attempted to leave all means of escape were cut off.

It is evident that there was time for all to escape, since men working at a more distant Breast reached the shaft in safety.

The bodies were all found south of Breast 62 within a space of 500 feet. Some were badly bruised and bore wounds showing that the men had thrown themselves against timbers of the gangway in a wild endeavour to escape. The majority, however, were unmarked, while the features presented an appearance of quiet repose indicating that death had been speedy and painless. An immense number of people assembled at the pit mouth, and painful scenes were witnessed as the bodies were brought to the surface.

The mine belongs to the Oregon Improvement Company.

NEW YORK, AUGUST 25.

A fatal accident occurred at the Amethyst Mine at Creede, Colorado, yesterday. A fire broke out in the shaft house, which destroyed the building and melted the cable attached to the skip. The latter consequently fell and crushed to death four miners who were ascending the shaft.

Two men were killed and eleven others injured by the explosion at the mine at Gilberton, Pennsylvania, yesterday.

THE BRITISH GOVERNOR AND THE MOSQUE.—His Excellency the Governor delivered an address at the dedication of the Mosque. The announcement, which we call from a Colonial paper published at Lagos, West Africa, is likely to cause surprise to some good people. But the Governor in question (Sir Gilbert T. Carter) made out a good case for himself. Here are some extracts from his Excellency's address:—

to religions is not "Are they true?" but "Are they aids to a higher and better life?" And if we can answer this question in the affirmative and strive to our duty to God and to our neighbor, I cannot think it matters much whether we call ourselves Mohammedan, or Buddhist, or Christian.

His Excellency's broad-minded and almost breezy views remind one of the Turkish interpreter, cited in a speech the other day by the present Lord Chancellor, who, on being asked to explain the difference between two Eastern sects, replied "Only the people fanatics; the religions come all ones."

Sir Gilbert Carter did not shrink from the difficult question of polygamy, and his remarks are a useful contribution to recent discussions on the proper attitude for Christian missions towards this subject. He said:—

The great stumbling-block to Christians in Islam is the practice of polygamy. Whatever may be its merits or demerits, it has existed in Africa from time immemorial and seems well adapted to the needs of the people. Of one thing I am sure, and that is that Christianity will stand no chance side by side with Islam in Africa so long as the question of polygamy is made a vital one. Religion must have its compromises in its working details like other questions, and there is no doubt that as civilisation advances the need for polygamy will cease, but let us be content with main principles first and the rest will surely follow.

The Governor was careful to explain that he was not to be understood as advocating polygamy. But, he added, and herein he will find plenty of people to agree with him—"What I do say is, that it is better to be a Mohammedan and a polygamist than a professed Christian with one nominal wife and several irregular ones in the background."—Westminster Budget.

Swift Retribution.

Passed His Examination.

A MAN'S fitness for a position is determined in various ways, often by tests which could scarcely be embraced in any series of set questions. A unique but successful Civil Service examination occurred during the American Civil War, and is thus described by Mr. C. De Land. On a certain occasion the Confederates were much in need of a railway locomotive in order to work their supply system. It was in 1864; they had not the means to buy one, and their only hope was to capture one. A band of one hundred men was selected from Lee's army, and placed under the command of a tall Georgian who had been foreman of a stone-quarry, and was more or less skilled in the use of derricks and the like. He took his men up into Maryland, and they tore up a section of the Baltimore and Ohio Railway tracks, flagged the first train, and, with nothing save plenty of rope, these one hundred men drew the locomotive fifty-two miles, over hills, across streams, through bogs and woods, until they struck a line built by the Confederacy. Then they ran the engine down to Virginia. When the President of the Baltimore and Ohio Railway heard of the exploit, he would not believe it. He went out and, seeing what had been done, finally declared it the most wonderful feat in engineering ever accomplished. After the war, Mr. Garrett delegated a man to hunt up the leader who had superintended the removal of the locomotive, and, on the strength of that single exploit, made him road-master of his entire system of roadbeds. "Any man that can pick up an engine with fishing-lines and carry it over a mountain has passed his examination with me," said Mr. Garrett.

The Very Latest

We are all prepared to admit that medical science is making wonderful progress; but when we hear of it being possible to make a "century nap" in the near future most of us will become slightly incredulous.

This is how the advanced theory is presented to us: "It has been frequently said that truth is stranger than fiction," writes an eminent doctor. "I often think that I would like to go to sleep and wake up in the full enjoyment of my faculties a century later—say, about the year 2000. I believe that this will be successfully done. Cases of suspended animation for considerable periods of time frequently occur."

"I have myself pronounced people dead who are now in the full enjoyment of vigorous life. I have no doubt that thousands of people have been entombed alive after having been examined by reputable and careful physicians. If the life-force may be so completely suspended for a day or two and then resumed, why may it not be taken up again after the lapse of a century or more? Irving makes Rip Van Winkle age during his twenty-years' nap."

"That is, I think, wrong. Should the life-force be so completely suspended that man would not require food there would be little or no waste, and he would wake up as youthful and vigorous as when he dozed off. I believe that it will yet be possible for a man, by taking century naps, to enjoy a few years of life during every century for 1,000 years or more. I can see no good reason for believing that the nineteenth century has witnessed the high tide of scientific achievement."

Turned to Account.

"There's nothing like giving a boy a little encouragement once in a while," said a wealthy merchant the other day. "I know I owe a great deal to a remark I craved old farmer made to me when I was quite small."

"I was trying to split a cross-grained log, and as our wood-pile was close by the roadside, my efforts attracted the notice of the farmer, who stopped his team to watch me."

"I was greatly flattered by his attention, because he was the cross-est and surliest man in the village, and never took any notice of us boys, except to sit in his orchard with a gun in his hand when the apples were ripe. So I put in my best strokes and covered my hands with blisters, but the log refused to split. The thing seemed to have no grain to it. I hated to be beaten, but apparently there was no help for it. The old man noticed my chagrin."

"Humph! I thought you'd hev to give it up!" he said, with a chuckle of malicious delight.

"Those words were all I needed. I made no reply; but the way that ax-head went into that log was a revelation to me. As I drove it into the knots, they yielded. There was a cheerful crackle; the gap widened, and soon the two halves lay before me, and the farmer drove off."

"But I never forgot that scene. When I first went into business I made mistakes, as every young man will; but whenever I got caught in a doubtful enterprise I recollected that my friends were standing round waiting for the chance to say: 'I thought you'd have to give it up.'"

"I may remark that a well placed sneer is sometimes worth more than sympathetic condolences."

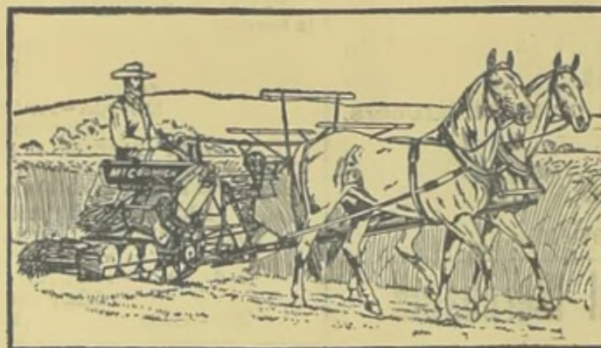
