POLITICAL NOTES.

A Decree has been issued from the Ministry of Fomento establishing the "Fête of the Planting of Trees," to be held yearly on an opportune date, and in the present year on Sept. 18, the Ministry being charged with the organization of the same, and with the appointment of such Honorary Commissions as may be considered convenient. The Commission for the present year consists of the Minister of Fomento, Dr. G. L. Rodriguez, and the Sres. J. G. Requena and C. B. Cantera. We may add that the institution in this Republic, so far from being merely trivial or sentimental, is of practical utility and necessity, as likely to instill into the people a respect and love for trees, which not only beautify and enrich the land, but also have an important effect on climatic conditions. The ancient pagans made trees the objects of worship. Early Christianity, rejecting the superstition, went to the other extreme. The present century has recognized that the ancient idea was not devoid of wisdom, and the cult has been revived without the superstitious practices attached. "Arbor Day," or "Plantation Day," or the "Fête of the Trees," or by whatever name it may be called, is now celebrated in the United States and in several European countries, and is recognized as an institution as useful as it is pleasing and sympathetic. The Government is to be commended for introducing it here, where trees are a want alike in town and country, and where they have hitherto been neglected, if not deliberately ill-used or destroyed.

Until to-morrow we are not able to give the result of the presentation of tenders for the construction of the Port, which took place yesterday. It is already known, however, that the German firms of Luther and de Verin have desisted from the intention of presenting tenders, partly because the Government could not extend the period for reception of the same, and partly because they are preoccupied with other tasks. Dr. P. de Maria having resigned his post as member of the Port Financial Commission, for private and personal reasons, the Decree has been issued naming Dr. Francisco Socca in his place. It having been announced that the Directorate of the Bank of the Republic had approved certain changes in the working and machinery of the Monte de Piedad branch of the Bank, the Government has reminded the Directorate that no such changes can be carried out without its previous consent. This is obviously necessary, as one of the principal operations of the branch in question is to carry out the payment of the pension lists, for which

effect it is practically a Government office.

Payment will commence to-day here and in London of the 34th quarterly coupon of the Consolidated Debt and here of the 11th two-monthly coupon of the Treasury Certificates Debt.

Letters received by the "Nile" state that negotiations are proceeding very favorably with the Board of the Montevideo Waterworks Company for a rearrangement of the tariff and other conditions of supply, in which the Company will accede to all reasonable demands. We are unable to give the details, but we can state positively that there is not the least truth in the malicious statement circulated a few days ago by the "Herald" - a paper which seems unable to mention the Waterworks Company without slandering it - to the effect that the Board refused to make any concessions whatever or to come to any terms.

THE ASSASSINATION OF THE KING OF ITALY.

Yesterday's messages referring to this horrible crime, although voluminous, add little to our previous knowledge of the event. The King, it appears, received three bullets, one in the shoulder, one in the ribs and one touching the heart. The shots were fired from close quarters, the assassin being among the crowd on the footpath surrounding the royal carriage. As regards the antecedents of the assassin there are still complete uncertainty, and many contradictions appear. The police do not appear to have yet been able to trace his connection with any anarchist society. According to some accounts he has declared that he committed the crime out of hatred to the monarchy and denies being an anarchist, according to others he has professed himself a revolutionary anarchist, and according to others he refuses to make any declaration at all. He is 31 years of age, a weaver by calling, and has a brother who is lieutenant in the 2nd Regiment of artillery. His parents are humble weavers in the village of Prato. Some 50 persons have been arrested in Monza and Milan. According to an afternoon message from New York, the assassin Bressi was employed for some six months in a silk factory at Paterson, New Jersey, and left for Italy on May 7. Since then he seems to have paid a visit to Paris.

The terrible news has been conveyed to the Crown Prince, and he is expected in Rome to-day or tomorrow, to be invested as King. The funeral of the late King will not take place until next week. The Queen has been greatly prostrated by the event and refuses to leave the body of her husband. The authorities throughout Italy have taken extraordinary precautions to repress any disorder, but so far the almost universal feeling has been one of horror and pity. The anarchist paper *Avanti!* of yesterday was suppressed on account of the tone of its allusions to the event. The crowd broke the windows of the office. Messages of condolence continue to reach Italy from all parts of the world.

We need hardly say that the numerous Italian residents in Montevideo have not been slow in expressing their grief. Yesterday the Italian flag was visible every where at half-mast, meetings of the various Italian societies and associations have been held at which appropriate resolutions were passed, and a public demonstration of mourning is being organized, which will probably take place next Sunday afternoon. In this many others besides Italians will probably join, as was the case on the assassination of Mr. Sadi Carnot. The Italian Company at the Solis Theatre suspended their performance yesterday evening, although it was for the benefit of Tina di Lorenzo.

THE GREAT FIRE AT NEW YORK.

New York, July 1.
The extent of the loss of life and property by the burning of the North German-Lloyd Company's docks and steamers at Hoboken on Saturday is yet unknown. Probably between 150 and 200 men, chiefly sailors and longshore-men, have been drowned or burned in the ships, and 6,000,000 dollars' worth of damage has been done. The steamships *Saale* and *Main* have been practically destroyed, and the *Bremen* has been burned from the main deck up; the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse has been only slightly damaged. The *Saale* was to sail for Boston on Saturday to take the Christian Endeavourers to Cherbourg. The flames began in a number of cotton bales on the southern pier, and swept rapidly fanned by a strong wind over two other piers, where the four ships lay. The Kaiser Wilhelm was first towed out, and the flames on her upper works were soon extinguished by the crew. The *Saale* was now all ablaze, and the men cut her loose. The *Main* burned at the dock. The Hamburg-American Company's docks adjacent were saved by the destruction of the intervening pier shed. Messrs. Campbell's storehouse, a fine brick building full of jute and whiskey, was destroyed, and a dozen or more loaded lighters were burned.

Many stories are told of terrible sufferings. A large number of men were caught while working in the hold of the *Saale*. A hundred men thought to have been below the main deck, others jumped overboard, and were saved. Captain Mirrow is the only officer believed to have been lost. The faces of the imprisoned men could be seen at the portholes crying for help unavailingly. About fifty were rescued through the burning hatchways.

Paul Stoenberg, a sailor, said: "There were forty of us. We had just lunched and gone forward to work in the hold, when someone shouted, 'Get out, everybody! The ship is on fire!' A scramble followed. Every man was turned into a devil, and ran fighting, clawing, scratching, and swearing for the ladder to the deck. They found the hatches battened down. 'Great God! how the men did curse! Some climbed the ladder, and pounded with their fists against the iron hatch till the blood ran. Through the gratings we saw the flames - fire forward, fire in the stern, fire everywhere. Some of the men started forward. They had to pass over the coal bins, and half the way could walk, but half the way had to stoop, and at last crawl on their bellies. There were forty men struggling like rats in a black hole, with no air, and everybody fighting and cursing. We crawled through the machinery, and got upon the pumps forward. There were forty men, and room for only fifteen. One man tried to pull me down. I kicked his face in. Ten men tried to climb. Others kicked them down. The man that fell first was stamped on like a coal.

"Outside we could hear the crackling of the flames, and firemen shouting. I thought they could never reach us. It was like hell down there. Men tore their clothes off, and then after a while stopped cursing, and began praying. The men at the bottom fought no more. One by one they lay still. 'It was like months from four o'clock till after seven. Then we heard the firemen above. After a while they put down a ladder. I got out. I hope the others got out. Forty bodies were taken from the hold.

To-day sixteen men on the *Main* were taken out alive after seven hours' terrible heat. One had his eyes scoured out. Others in the upper bunkers were burned or suffocated.

The company insures its own ships. The *Canard* dock has been lent temporarily, but plans are still undecided.

New York, July 1.
The damage done by the fire is enormous, and the estimated loss is placed at between 10,000,000 dollars and 20,000,000 dollars. The figures vary widely owing to the confusion that exists. Already 25 bodies have been recovered, but only a few of these have been identified. The entire pier system of the North German Lloyd, with a frontage of a quarter of a mile, has been destroyed.

The flames swept over the three piers of the North German Lloyd and the liners lying there in little more than a few minutes, cutting off about 750 longshoremen and about 1,000 other people. Saturday was visiting day on the vessels, and the docks were crowded with men, women, and children anxious to see the officers and crews of the vessels. Hundreds jumped into the water, and there were many marvellous escapes.

The rescuing of the huge Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse was an especially brilliant piece of work. Most of the officers were on board at the time, and when the alarm was given they at once sought their posts. Captain Engelbart took his station on the bridge, and shouted his directions for cutting the cables and moving the tugs. The sailors, with hoses and hand-grenades, protected the sides of the liner at the risk of their lives. The canvas and woodwork of the vessel often caught fire, and had the men been less prompt the vessel would not have been saved. The officers and crew, after getting their vessel into the river, rescued many. Among many wonderful escapes was that of 29 firemen from the stokehole of the *Saale*. That vessel was towed out into the stream with dozens of people clinging to her ladder. The efforts fought the flames for four hours, while the stokers in the hold faced death from fire and water. Finally they mounted on each others' shoulders, and, forming a human rope, drew one another up in safety. It was reported, however, that 70 others perished in the hold.

New York, July 2, 5 p. m.
It is now stated that 49 bodies have been taken out of the river. A diver reports having seen eight bodies on board the *Saale*. Two others have been seen on the *Main*. Most of them were unrecognisable. One of the bodies taken to the Morgue is now definitely accepted as that of Captain Mirrow.

The *Bremen* has been flooded, and the fire is now practically quenched. The wreckers have not found any bodies on board the *Bremen*, but it is thought that the search has not been thorough. An official of the wrecking company, who has made an examination of the *Bremen*, has expressed the opinion that the *Bremen* can be saved, as she is practically all right below water. The engines also appear to be in good order.

Three of the crew of the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse are missing. The North German Lloyd Company will rebuild the piers which have been destroyed by the fire. Meanwhile, temporary quarters have been secured.

New York, July 2 (3.30 p. m.)

The statement cable yesterday that fifty bodies were recovered from the *Saale* and taken to the mortuary is now found to be erroneous, only eleven having been taken out of her. Two derricks are now alongside her, removing obstructions in her hold preparatory to a search. Up to three o'clock this afternoon forty bodies had been taken out of the river. There have been inquiries at the Hoboken police-station for thirty-two missing persons.

The origin of the fire has not yet been discovered.

The supervising inspector of steam vessels will take immediate action in the case of the officers of the tugboat who are reported to have declined to save drowning people.

A Voyage Through the Air.

Friedrichshafen, July 2.

Count Zeppelin's aerial ship ascended from here at about eight o'clock this evening. Those taking part in the first trip were Count Zeppelin, Baron Conrad Bussau, Herr Eugen Wolf, Engineer Burr, and Mechanical Engineer Gross. The ship travelled safely to Immenstadt, 35 miles from here, and landed all well. Towards 9 o'clock yesterday evening, after the crowd had dispersed and the wind had dropped, Count Zeppelin undertook a trial on a small scale in the presence of a few observers. The greater part of the airship was drawn out of the shed, and the propellers were set in motion. The huge machine moved forward, backwards, and sideways, and rose in the air to a height of about 12 feet. After experiments, lasting for 1 1/2 hours, the aerial ship was returned to its shed. Count Zeppelin was well satisfied with the result.

THE WAR.

News yesterday was reduced to a Middleburg, pursued the exploration northwards, by Gen. Porter's brigade. The enemy was retreating towards Lydenburg, seeking remote positions among the mountains which it would be very difficult to attack.

From Capetown it is stated that General Prinsloo with 5000 men has rendered unconditionally to Gen. Hunter at Fuarriesburg. From Lourenço Marquez it is reported that ex-president Steijn was taken prisoner at Middleburg, which has already been evacuated by French, and that Kruger with several thousand men is at Barberton, on a branch of the Pretoria to Delagoa railway. (All this is unofficial and unreliable. So far there has been no official reference to any fight at Fuarriesburg.)

CHINA.

Contradictions continue to accumulate about the fate of the Legations in Peking. According to an afternoon message from London, a communication has been received from Sir Claude Macdonald, dated as recently as July 21, stating as follows: "We were constantly attacked with guns and cannon from June 26 to July 16, after the armistice, but we are surrounded. Up to the present we have 62 killed." (This is obviously mangled, but if authentic the message shows the massacres have not taken place.) The Chinese Minister in Paris has produced a telegram from Li-Hung-Chang, dated from Shanghai, July 30, guaranteeing that the foreign Ministers in Peking are alive and under the protection of the Government. A message from Tien-Tsin, based on a letter from Peking, also states that the situation in the capital has materially improved, and the Empress has issued an Edict forbidding the bombardment of the foreign Legations under severe penalties. On the other hand, Mr. Fowler, the U. S. Consul at Che-Foo, and Reuter's correspondent at Shanghai have both sent messages more or less insisting on the tale of general destruction and slaughter. According to the former the German contingent lost 10 killed and 12 wounded in the attempt to defend the German Minister. His body was rescued from the crowd and given decent burial. Yet another tale is that a letter, dated July 21, has been received from the German Legation in Peking, stating that the Legations were safe, and that the attacks on them had ceased after the 16th. A reassuring note to similar effect has also been received in Tokio from the Japanese Legation.

From St. Petersburg it is stated that the Russian forces mobilised for campaign in China consist of 30 battalions of infantry, 50 squadrons of cavalry and 17 batteries of artillery, representing a total of 50,000 men, under command of Gen. Grodoff, Governor General of the military district of Amour.

SUNDRIES.

—STAMPS. - We now learn that not merely new Postal Cards, but an entire emission of postage stamps, of all the values in use, has been ordered from Messrs. Waterlow and Sons, of London. On this occasion new designs will be introduced, and the stamps will not be, as has been the case with recent issues, reproductions of old designs in new colors. We suppose they are intended for issue with the new currency.

—THEVES. - The police have recently laid their hands upon a gang of some eight or ten youths, ages varying from 12 to 16 years, who have confessed to being concerned in between thirty and forty petty thefts from shops and private houses. Some of their booty was found in hiding places indicated by them. This fact does not surprise us in the least, when we remember the utter want of care for street boys and youths which exists in this nominally civilised city. From five years old and upwards, a certain class of boy seems to be allowed to run entirely wild, neither parents nor any one else claiming any authority over him. The consequence of this is that the streets of the city are infested with gangs of unruly boys who from an early age become initiated in every description of vice and crime, and who logically develop into bad citizens. One may meet these gangs, any day and in any part of the city; a group of ill-dressed, uncouth boys, foul in language, noisy and offensive in manners, ostentatiously puffing their cigarettes, and openly indulging in idle and vicious habits which inevitably lead in time to moral and physical depravity, to the hospital and the prison. The sight is always a painful one. It seems to concern no one, yet it should concern every one, for it means that every one of these boys, if his vicious habits permit him to reach manhood, will become a bad citizen, an element of disorder, vice and crime, an offence to society and a burden on the State. Even in their youth they are a public nuisance, as witness their daily conduct in the streets and at every public gathering. To say that this cannot be a great measure prevented, and completed is absurd, for might be found here. By neglecting such a matter as this, society injures itself.

—ACCIDENT. - At Fiume, on Monday, the boiler of a torpedo boat exploded, killing 5 of the crew and severely injuring three more. The name of the vessel is not mentioned, and we are left to infer that it was one of the British squadron now visiting the Adriatic.

—CRIME. - The small town or village of Zapican, Dept. of Minas, has once more been the scene of a horrible crime. The body of the wife of the resident Sr. Felix Fernandez was found in one of the rooms of the house, riddled with stabs, and the peon of the house was found some distance off, also stabbed to death. It is supposed that the latter was purged and murdered whilst trying to escape in order to call for assistance or give information. The murdered lady was much esteemed in the neighborhood. So far, no further particulars have transpired.

—A WAGON. - Two Viennese, a merchant and a restaurant-keeper, have made a wager for five thousand crowns - £208 - to visit the Paris Exhibition on foot, travelling before them a huge wine-barrel, made to contain over a hundred and fifty gallons, and, although empty, weighing not less than four hundredweight. With this rotund travelling companion, which is decorated with the arms of Vienna and Paris, and stamped with the figure 1900, the two men left the former city in June. They count on covering twenty-five or thirty kilometres - say, sixteen or eighteen miles - a day, and, as the distance via Linz, Braunau, Munich, and Strasburg is 1,350 kilometres, they are likely to be seven or eight weeks on the journey. Says the *"Figaro"*, commenting upon the novel enterprise: "We have already had the wheelbarrow man from Vienna, the man who had himself transported as luggage, and the automobile journalist. We are awaiting the announcement that a Viennese has left for Paris with his mother-in-law on his back."

—FROM AUSTRALIA. - Here is a peculiar advertisement which recently appeared in a Brisbane paper: "Permanent. - Wanted, a man to look after one horse and a few cows and pigs. One who can impart the rudiments of French, singing and the piano to children preferred."

LONDON NOTES.

SATURDAY, JUNE 30.

To celebrate the completion of the Dictionary of National Biography, the Lord Mayor yesterday entertained a distinguished company at luncheon at the Mansion House, to meet the proprietor and editors of that great work. The speakers were Mr. John Morley, M.P., Mr. Geo. M. Smith, the American Ambassador, the Bishop of London, Mr. Sidney Lee, and Mr. Leslie Stephen.

Somersetshire collapsed yesterday before the Yorkshire bowling at Downton, and scoring only 48 in their second innings, were beaten by 140 runs. Surrey at Worcester defeated the local eleven by ten wickets. Middlesex continued to play a strong game against Lancashire at Manchester, and were 209 on, with three wickets still in hand, when rain stopped play. At Leyton Derbyshire carried their overnight score to 503; Essex in response hit up 273 runs for the loss of four wickets. Oxford, after batting well at Brighton, got rid of Sussex for 80, and won by an innings and 75 runs.

MONDAY, JULY 2.

Accompanied by the Prince, the Princess of Wales visited Norwich on Saturday and opened the new Jenny Lind Infirmary, which has been erected in celebration of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee.

On Wednesday, his Highness leaves these shores to visit a Swiss Spa, to drink the waters.

On Clapham Common, on Saturday, the annual Review of the Metropolitan Fire Brigade and distribution of medals took place. In the course of a speech on the work of the Brigade, Mr. W. H. Dickinson, Chairman of the County Council, said there was no one in London who could not, in the event of a fire occurring at his house, be reached by the Brigade within five minutes after he gave the alarm.

The transport Orontea, which left Tilbury on Thursday for South Africa, with nearly 1,200 officers and men, has been in collision in the English Channel, 50 miles west of the Casquets, with a German trading steamer which she sank. The crew of the latter vessel were rescued. There was no panic on the troopship, which returned to Southampton, and has been berthed for repairs.

Essex saved their match with Derbyshire at Leyton on Saturday, the game being left drawn. The fixtures between Lancashire and Middlesex and Kent and Nottingham were also drawn. Cambridge beat the M.C.C. at Lord's by 84 runs, and Warwickshire defeated Hampshire at Portsmouth by 143 runs.

Details of the official revenue returns for the quarter ended Saturday appear to-day. The total amount paid into the Exchequer was £24,690,634, a decrease compared with the corresponding period of last year of £1,203,144. With sums paid to the local taxation accounts, aggregating £1,939,592, the total yield of revenue was £26,630,226, a net decrease of £1,144,372.

THURSDAY, JULY 3.

In the House of Lords, yesterday, Earl Wemyss moved the second reading of the Militia Ballot Bill. Lord Lansdowne moved the previous question, believing, as he said, that the Government were taking much more effective steps for strengthening our forces. On a division, the previous question was carried by 90 votes to 31. Several other Bills were advanced a stage.

Dispatches relating to recent events in China were read in the House of Commons by Mr. Brodick. Mr. Chamberlain announced that the proposal of the Government to appoint four additional Colonial Law Lords had been abandoned, their intention being to consider the larger question of a representative Supreme Tribunal for the whole of her Majesty's dominions. The Housing of the Working Classes Bill was again considered on report, and, after new clauses had been added, was put down for third reading on Thursday. The Agricultural Holdings Bill was afterwards taken up.

Under the presidency of the Prince of Wales, a meeting of the Governors of St. Bartholomew's Hospital was held yesterday to consider the negotiations which had taken place with the authorities of Christ's Hospital for

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the purchase of a strip of land required for the extension of St. Bartholomew's. It was reported that Christ's Hospital had refused an offer of £117,000 for 1 1/2 acres of their site, and it was decided to invoke arbitration or the cooperation of the Charity Commissioners, and, as a last resort, to ask Parliament for compulsory powers of acquisition.

After spending the entire day indoors, the Khedive last night dined with the Prince of Wales at Marlborough House, the party being a large and distinguished one. Subsequently a State Concert was given at Buckingham Palace. It was attended by over a thousand invited guests.

Lord Kimberley presided over a gathering in Clare Market yesterday, when the Bishop of London laid the foundation stone of the Passmore Edwards Hall, for the London School of Economics and Political Science.

"Dominion Day" was celebrated in London last night by a banquet at the Hotel Metropole, at which Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal presided. There was a large and representative Colonial gathering, among the company being the Earl of Aberdeen, late Governor-General of the Dominion, Lord Brassey, late Governor of Victoria, and several of the Agents-General.

Dr. Danford Thomas yesterday resumed and completed his inquiry into the circumstances attending the death of one of the victims of the Slough railway disaster. The jury found that he died from injuries, and that the collision was due to the driver of the express having neglected to observe that the signals were against him; but having heard the statement of the driver, they considered that he ought not to be charged with manslaughter. The jury further recommended that the driver be fined £100.

Little progress was made with yesterday's cricket fixtures on account of heavy rain. There were two exceptions. At Leeds, Kent made 230 against Yorkshire, and the home county afterwards lost two wickets in scoring 59; at Leicester, the West Indians hit up 307 for four wickets.
