POLITICAL NOTES.

Yesterday's *Siglo* occupies itself extensively with the by no means unimportant affair of the contract for the Flores Island Lazaret. Examining the tenders presented, as the result of the fourth call, it declares that it finds them all unacceptable and in fact less advantageous than the tenders presented on the second call and which were then rejected. We condense the following from its editorial comments on the affair.—The Council of Hygiene has shown itself persistently deaf to the general clamor of the press against the proponent which it has recommended (meaning the present contractor, Sr. Rovello) as also to public opinion which calls for the extirpation of many deplorable abuses, and to the numerous passengers, victims of detestable service and food, who have published collective and individual complaints of the manner in which quarantine is treated. It is almost certain that the Council will report to the Government for a fourth time in favor of the present purveyor, whose treatment of the quarantiners forms an eloquent page of the abuses which have discredited us at home and abroad during past administrations. In the face of this, it is the positive duty of the Executive, in pursuance of its policy of sound administration, to seek a remedy for the evil, causing to be drawn up without delay a plan of reforms which will take the purveying out of the hands of private persons, and entrust it to some corporation that cannot be suspected of trafficking with the credit and reputation of the Republic. In effect the Lazaret, in these times of frequent quarantines, constitutes an anti-chamber to the city. What a splendid idea of our degree of civilization is likely to be formed by the travellers compelled to support the sufferings imposed on quarantiners under the administration of a private person who does not hesitate to serve his commercial interests by miserably ill-treating them! What an attraction to immigrants to initiate them in the delights of the country by eight or ten days' purgatory at Flores Island! Such a first impression is quite sufficient to give any foreigner the worst opinion of a country that receives him with the seductions of a lazaret the reverse of clean and better calculated to spread infection than to avoid it, as has been testified by competent scientific persons, including an ex-member of the Council of Hygiene itself! This Lazaret has been one of the great scandals of the past, and it is time that the Government reformed it, commencing by derogating the absurd Law of 1894 that enacts the adjudication of the purveying to a private contractor.—Thus far our contemporary, and we congratulate it on the vigor with which it attacks this venerable abuse. We heartily agree with all that it says, so far as it goes, but at the same time we must repeat our remarks of a former occasion; namely, that the attack should be directed on the entire abusive and prejudicial quarantine system, of which the Lazaret is merely a branch. Let the reform begin with the Council of Hygiene, which is as at present constituted an incapable and untrustworthy body, quite unfitted to exercise the heavy responsibilities entrusted to it, and then reform of the rest will follow as a matter of course.

The arrival is announced of the distinguished French engineer Mr. Guerin, accompanied by his son, secretary, who comes in representation of the French syndicate "Société Entreprise du Port de Montevideo," which is one of the proponents of tenders for the construction of the port. This syndicate, composed of MM. Gouvenex, Allard, Coiseau, Dufour, Duparc and Viot, has already been concerned in port works of magnitude at Suez, Kerteb, Constantinople, Leixoes, Bilbao, Bruges and elsewhere. Sr. Pesce has been named local agent of the syndicate.

A hitch has occurred in the appointment of Sr. Lucas Herrera y Obes as Administrator of the Caridad Lottery, it being found that he is ineligible as not being inscribed in the civic register, a formality that is very properly exacted from all persons occupying public posts. This will give the Commission of Charity an opportunity of seeking a candidate more acceptable to public opinion, and whose name will inspire entire confidence. As a native contemporary correctly points out, the post is essentially one for which an apt man should be found, and one of the very last that should be allotted for any reasons of personal favoritism.

Payment will commence to-day, by the Office of Public Credit, of the local obligations for the month of July.

Antarctic is a veritable case of the winds which Eolus himself might be proud to administer; its dazzling peaks rise up to ten or twelve thousand feet; great glacier streams pursue their sluggish courses down endless ranges; in awesome contrast to the eternal snows is the fiery flood which belches out from Erebus; Mount Terror is dead or slumbers, even more ominous; the crash of new-born bergs, the cruel screwing of the ice, the crack of the crevasse, the thunder of the surf, the wild wolf-like howls of the wind are the only sounds which tell that the world is a living, sentient thing, in eternal change. To trap the tornado, to weigh the air by cunning instruments, to probe the secret of the dipping needle, to register the goings and comings of the winds, the snow, the rain, the sun, the moon, the stars; to explore the ocean depths for living things, to gauge the ocean currents, to explore icy fastness—such was the work of the little band which has just returned to England. Many months must elapse before their observations, made under such arduous conditions, can be known. Let us hope that they will benefit mankind, as well as do something to quench its insatiable curiosity. The man who will botanize on his mother's grave will be able to glean over revelations of lichen life in Antarctica; the geologist will have fresh stones to sermonize upon; the geographer will find leagues of frozen coast mapped out before him; the student of nature's hidden forces will dream over the dips of the needle, responsive to that quality, as mysterious as life itself, which men call magnetism; the ichthyologist will find fish, the zoologist birds, the entomologist insects. The Southern Cross is expected to arrive here in a few weeks. It is scarcely hyperbole to say that she is bulging with a cargo of those specimens which men of science love better than gold. They all come out of the Unknown.

"FARTHEST SOUTH."
AN INTERVIEW WITH MR. BORCHGREVINK.
It seems strange to be talking of Antarctic solitudes on this sunny June morning, loling in an easy chair amongst the shrubs and flowers on the terrace of a luxurious West End hotel. But this quiet, well-dressed, comfortable-looking gentleman, with the modest and retiring manner, is Mr. Borchgrevink, the leader of Sir George Newnes's expedition to the Antarctic, who has just emerged safely from the fastnesses at the other end of the world. It is astonishing how quickly a few good meals, a few hot baths, and a visit to a tailor will convert a dirty, unshaven, unwashed explorer, oily with a long succession of blubber dinners, into a decent human being again. The joys of the explorer never lived who did not sicken for a sight of his fellow man and woman, in bulk, once more; and was not delighted to avail himself of the good things of this life. How many exploring lions this ancient capital has seen go greatly daring, and come back, yearning for applause, society, and a little good living! Even the hardy Elizabethans thirsted for London after one of their splendid piratical raids on the Spanish main. Drake's heart was in his mouth for joy when he came up the Thames, after sailing round the world, and hurried off to the Palace at Richmond or Greenwich, to bask in the smiles and baquets of his admiring mistress. Cabot, Frobenius, Hawkins, Gilbert, Raleigh, Stanley, Nau, Borchgrevink—are they not men and brothers? And unlike the famous earl—"they do like London." Apropos of curates, the great Livingstone was one of the few missionaries who has been really indifferent to the delights of the capitals. It is the passion for violent contrast which is innate in us. When they have a surfeit of civilization back again they go if they can.

An explorer need not be a Timon. He explores to benefit his fellow men. One of the first questions I asked Mr. Borchgrevink was the practical use of the expedition to the Antarctic. He said that he and his staff were the first men to winter in those Southern icefields. "Is it merely for the pleasure of being first that you endured ten months' hardships and banishment?" I asked. "No," he answered, "the first to get somewhere, is the ambition of the healthy man. Ross sighted the Antarctic continent sixty years ago, and sailed on. We landed and lived there, though it was thought by such men as Greeley that the conditions would make life insupportable." All of us, except the poet, perhaps, whatever we pretend, have the mental habit of reducing the results of exploration, or any other "tion," to the common denomination of pounds, shillings, and pence. I asked if substantial interest would accrue as the result of the investment. The explorer's answer was that the record of the long months of uninterrupted meteorological observations made at his main camp on Cape Adair would have, he believed, a most appreciable value for all Australia and New Zealand, and therefore upon the world at large. In plain, unscientific language, Mr. Borchgrevink means that the Clerk of the Weather at Melbourne, Sydney, Adelaide, Brisbane, Wellington, Canterbury, and so forth, can now base his prophecies upon something solidier than shakya data. The vast Antarctic continent, whether it is a group of islands or one huge country, is the mother in whose womb are generated the mysterious conditions we call weather, which so profoundly affects the material prosperity of our great Colonies in the Southern Pacific. So that, in time to come, the dweller in Brixton may get his frozen Australian chop the juicier, and, perhaps, a penny a pound cheaper, for Mr. Borchgrevink's observations of the weather in the Antarctic.

THE MUCH-ABUSED EX-PREMIER OF THE CAPE.

"There was Mr. Schreiner, the Premier, almost boyish; with plump, smooth cheeks and a dark moustache. He looks capable, and looks as if he knows it; he, too, is conversational, almost jerky in speech, but with a flavour of bitterness added to his reason." In these terms did the late Mr. G. W. Stevens sketch the Prime Minister of Cape Colony, after a brief visit to the Capetown Parliament last October. . . . William Philip Schreiner was the son of a German missionary in South Africa. His mother is an English lady, Miss Lyndall—a name his sister, Olive Schreiner, introduced into "The Story of an African Farm." At the South African College in Capetown, one of the finest educational institutions in the British colonies, Mr. Schreiner went to school, and at once gave proof of his great talents. When he left the college he carried with him the chief scholarship—one of £200 a year—awarded to a student proceeding to an English university. This to England, while still a boy, came Mr. Schreiner. Cambridge he chose, and his name was enrolled at Downing College in 1879. Further honours lay before him—the greater ones in the examination rooms, lesser ones under the open sky. For he rowed in his college boat what time Downing stood high in the first division on the Cam. . . . While still an undergraduate, Schreiner had eaten his dinners at the Middle Temple, and won the two hundred guineas studentship. Directly after he had obtained his degree with honours, he was called to the Bar and returned home to the Cape, and at once began to practise. . . . His success at the Bar was instant and great. In addition to legal attainments of extraordinary merit, Schreiner enjoyed an intimate knowledge of the Dutch language, Dutch character, and Dutch customs and thought. Until he became Attorney-General in the Rhodes Ministry, no case of any importance in the colony came before the Law Courts in which he did not appear. His wife is a sister of Mr. Reitz.

The Hon. W. P. Schreiner, Q. C., became Prime Minister in October, 1895, at the head of the Bond party, and in opposition to Mr. Rhodes, whose Attorney-General he had been in the previous Administration. At the time of the Jameson raid Mr. Schreiner quarrelled with Mr. Rhodes, up to then his personal friend and political colleague in the representation of Barkly West. He then attached himself to his other particular friend, Mr. Hofmeyr, the clever Bond leader. When Sir Alfred Milner conducted negotiations with President Kruger last summer the Bond Premier, overruling his influence, believed himself capable of being a treaty-maker, but Mr. Kruger's ultimatum shattered the ambition. Mr. Schreiner then found himself in a position in which he was bound to be misunderstood. He concurred in the policy of the High Commissioner, but led a party ready to break into open rebellion at the least encouragement. So he had to work with supreme tact; he had to bear odium and to acquiesce silently in the misunderstanding of his inward motives. When the true history of the politics of Cape

Colony throughout these troublous times comes to be written it will be found that Sir Alfred Milner, Her Majesty's representative in South Africa, had no firmer supporter than the Bond Prime Minister of Cape Colony, Mr. William Philip Schreiner.

Treatment of Sea-sickness.

In a recent communication to the French Academy of Medicine, M. L. Dutrenblay advocates the treatment of sea-sickness by inhalation of pure oxygen under pressure. "The first attempts in this direction," says *La Nature*, "were made successfully by Dr. Daboiss. Professor in the Faculty of Sciences at Lyons, who recognised as the principal cause of sea-sickness the incomplete ventilation of the lung, with consequent increase of the residual air and imperfect respiratory action. Dutrenblay, aided by Dr. Perdirolat, physician to the Compagnie Générale Transatlantique, took up and completed these experiments on numerous persons at sea. According to him, the sudden and violent displacements of the visceral mass and the contraction of the diaphragm act as principal causes, and bring about such secondary manifestations as headache, nausea, chills, &c. In these conditions the use of oxygen is perfectly justifiable. From numerous observations it appears that this gas generally acts favourably and gives rapid relief. Nausea and vomiting cease, a feeling of comfort supervenes, and this is followed by calmer sleep, the pulse-rate rises, and the complete breathing becomes regular, the pulse-rate rises, and headache disappears. Patients should make long and deep rhythmic inhalations. Eight or ten gallons of the gas suffice. The inhalation should take place through the mouth, the nostrils being tightly closed so that nothing but the oxygen is taken into the lungs." *La Nature* goes on to say that it would have been a good plan to try whether deep and regular breathing would not have produced a good effect, even without the oxygen.

THE WAR.

Pence Overtures?

According to the London telegram briefly mentioned in our last, it is "almost officially" announced that President Kruger has made overtures of peace to Lord Roberts, in the hope of saving his country from the continuance of a campaign daily more destructive and ruinous. Lord Roberts replied that his instructions forbid him to enter into any negotiations so long as there was a single man in arms in either of the Boer Republics, and he could not give an answer which would compromise a principle of arrangement without superior orders. He advised Mr. Kruger to address the British Government through the representatives of the Transvaal in Europe, and could not undertake to suspend operations. A few days later the emissary returned, bringing, on the part of Mr. Kruger, a promise of surrender and disarming of all the Transvaal and Orange forces, provided the conditions fixed by Great Britain and the promises made for the future of both countries were acceptable. It was asked that Lord Roberts should report this to his Government so that negotiations might be opened. This, says the message, Lord Roberts did, and a Cabinet Council has been convened at Osborne to consider the matter. President Kruger is at present in Lydenburg. The message containing the above arrived late on Wednesday afternoon. So far there has been no further reference to the matter.

Lord Kitchener reports from Bethlehem that Gen. Brabant has rejoined his troops, and that Harris Smith surrendered to the 8th Brigade, Gen. Macdonald commanding. The town was found nearly deserted, as the defending troops abandoned it on the approach of the British forces. The latter took 300 prisoners, 2 guns and many rifles and munitions.

An afternoon message expresses the fear that General (or Colonel) Howard's garrison at Elands River has been captured by Com. Delarey after a siege of ten days. The account is most confused so we await further explanation.

CHINA.

The Diplomatic Safe.—Message from Sir Claude Macdonald.

At last direct telegrams have been received assuring the safety of the foreign Ministers in Peking—always excepting the German Minister, whose murder seems beyond doubt—though anxiety still continues as to their fate in the near future if the relieving column is not able to achieve its object in time.

In addition to the message from the U. S. Minister Mr. Conger mentioned in our last, and to which his Government has sent a reply, Mr. Brodriek was able to inform the Commons on Wednesday evening, amid loud cheers that expressed general relief, that a telegram in cipher, dated Aug. 3, had that day been received from Sir Claude Macdonald, the British Minister in Peking, acknowledging receipt of a ciphered message sent through the Chinese Minister Sir Claude stated that the bombardment had ceased since July 16, but intermittent rifle fire con-

tinued. Up to the moment the losses of the foreigners sheltered in the Legation had been 60 killed and 102 wounded. There were some 200 women and children sheltered in the British Legation. Until the 3rd the Chinese Government had refused to allow any ciphered telegram from the diplomats to pass.

The Italian Government has also received a direct message from the Marquis Salvo Raggi, its Minister in Peking. To the details already known he adds that 30 French and 10 Italians continue to defend the Catholic missions in the north of the city, but it is difficult to communicate with them.

From Washington it is stated that the U. S. Government has sent a very stern telegram to the Tsung-Li Yamen making the Chinese Government responsible for whatever might happen to Mr. Conger and his staff.

Further details appear of the battle at Peitsang. As usual, they create confusion by disagreeing with previous accounts. The engagement seems to have continued from the 4th to 6th instant. The allied forces are now said to have numbered 18,000. The fighting was very stiff, the Chinese positions being almost impregnable and inaccessible to the field and naval guns. The message concludes by saying that the opinion gains ground in London that the combat was a reverse for the allies, as, although the Chinese were eventually dislodged, a great effort and many more troops will be required to repair the losses. The U. S. States is sending more artillery from the Philippines in response to an urgent appeal from Gen. Chaffee. A regiment of artillery will leave San Francisco next Monday, with 3 heavy guns. Meanwhile the Chinese are reported to be steadily bringing up more troops to meet the allies.

SUNDRIES.

—BISHOP STIRLING.—We remind members of the Anglican Church that the subscription list for a presentation to Bishop Stirling remains open at the London and Brazilian Bank, but will probably be closed at the end of this month. The smallest subscriptions will be received, the idea being that the list shall include as many names as possible.

—THE CERRO.—The Municipality of the Cerro is credited with a plan for making the hill, which forms such a prominent feature in the view of the bay, a place of popular resort by constructing a handsome avenue of access and building a convenient road to and around the top, from which a very beautiful view of the surrounding sea and country may be obtained in fine weather, to say nothing of a most exhilarating breeze. The idea is an excellent one, and should be carried out. This is only one of many places in the suburbs of the city that might be converted into popular resorts and excursion places with a little enterprise, and with a little less red-tape and obstructive officialism. For instance, there are delightful spots on the southern coast of the city where there might be established pleasant esplanades and promenades with all the attractions and amusements familiar in European sea-side places. Yet so far from the shore and sands being thus utilised, they are entirely neglected, and if any one attempts to take a walk along the shore, he is opposed by some barrier, or stopped by a policeman with the asinine order that it is forbidden to walk past the ladies' bathing places. Where, also, is the enterprise that will establish small steamers or launches to make short excursions around the bay and coast, and that will let out sailing and rowing vessels for hire, matters that ought to be an established attraction in summer days and evenings? So far from this being done, when we enquire once on the feasibility of hiring a steam launch for a short excursion, not only were we asked a prohibitive price but were also told that a special permit from the port authorities was necessary! For such a stupid and obstructive piece of officialism as this, some one to be kicked. We doubt if any city in the world has so many natural advantages and opportunities as Montevideo, and which makes such little use of them. Has officialism completely killed all enterprise?

—MILLS.—The R. M. S. "Pharos" bringing London dates to about July 21 is expected on Sunday.

—REPRESSING ANARCHISM.—According to a Berlin telegram, Germany is addressing the other Powers, proposing the common enforcement of a severe law, devised by the Kaiser, for the suppression of anarchism. This plan consists in authorising the arrest of all militant anarchists whenever a police functionary may consider it necessary, or of any person suspected of anarchism; and the creation of special tribunals to judge such persons summarily, the vehement suspicions of the police of the existence of a plot, supported by the declarations of two respectable persons, being considered sufficient proof for their condemnation, and the minimum penalty being six months' imprisonment. The message adds that the idea has already been approved in principle by Russia, Italy and Austria, but is resisted by England and France. (It only requires the addition of torture to make this a rank revival of the Inquisition of the

Middle Ages. To put such a power in the hands of the police, who would be certain to exaggerate it, would be intolerable and speedily fatal to all personal liberty and freedom of expression of opinion, besides opening the way to unlimited blackmail, abuse, and persecution of innocent and harmless persons. In fact, it would be almost a greater evil than anarchy itself. Such a proposal should not be entertained for an instant by any nation that retains a vestige of respect for liberty. It is significant that it should emanate from the man who, of all living monarchs, has shown himself the most determined enemy of liberty in every form.

—THE BRITISH SQUADRON.—H. M. S. "Swallow" left for Rio Grande on Wednesday, for the usual cruise. Her time on this station has expired and she expects to be relieved before the end of the cruise, so that it is improbable that she will return to this port. The other vessels of the squadron will leave for Brazil next Monday.

—NARROW ESCAPE.—The King of Belgium has been touring in his royal yacht on the Norwegian coast. The other day the vessel was caught in a violent storm, and had a narrow escape from being wrecked. His Belgian Majesty is said to have shown great serenity on the trying occasion, and to have taken the lead in inspiring the crew with courage.

—MARRIAGE.—We learn from a Buenos Aires contemporary that the marriage of Miss Bridget Wilson, the daughter of Mr. John Wilson, of General Pinto, to Mr. Albert Carroll, is announced to take place on the estancia on the 8th of September next. Rev. Father Luis, C. P., will go out to perform the ceremony.

—FIRE.—About 2 a. m. yesterday a fire broke out in a deposit of old carts, empty boxes and other cast-off articles at the corner of Calles Misiones and Santa Teresa. The damages amount to a few hundred dollars.

—OUT OF WORK.—The Buenos Aires Herald says that there are a great number of unemployed persons in that city, especially those who are clerks or accountants, and work of this kind is diminishing, for there is a manifest decline in new undertakings.

—MAILS.—The sailing of the Royal Mail Company's steamers from Southampton during August have been fixed as follows:—Danube left Southampton August 3rd, leaves B. Aires Aug. 31st; Clyde leaves Southampton Aug. 17th, leaves B. Aires Sept. 14th; Magdalen leaves Southampton Aug. 31st, leaves B. Aires Sept. 28th. Arrangements are being made for Sanitary Inspectors to join these steamers at Brazilian ports before proceeding to the River Plate so that on arrival here they should receive free pratique, all being well on board.

—SEARS.—We quote from a recent London paper:—The Inter-University contests of the year have just been concluded, leaving Oxford with a slight superiority. The big event of the year—the boat race—was won by Cambridge in the easiest possible fashion, and the Light Blues also won the Rugby football match with ridiculous ease. Oxford, however, won the Association football match and the athletic sports. The cricket match was left drawn, after some heavy scoring, without much advantage to either team. In what may be called the minor events, Oxford won the boxing and fencing contests, the single and double-handled billiard games, the point to point steeplechase, the golf contest, the racquets (singles and doubles), the swimming races, and the lawn tennis singles. Cambridge won the cross-country race, the hockey match, the chess contests, the water-polo match, the lawn tennis doubles, the tennis matches (singles and doubles), and the cycling contests. This gives a total of 11 successes to Oxford and 10 to Cambridge. Cambridge have also won the Humphry Challenge Cup at Bisle.

—LONDON NOTES.

THURSDAY, JULY 12.

The Queen gave a garden party in the grounds of Buckingham Palace yesterday, and came to town from Windsor to attend it. Invitations were issued to between five and six thousand guests. The function will undoubtedly be remembered as the most brilliant of the season. In addition to the Prince and Princess and other members of the Royal Family, most of the Ambassadors and members of the Corps Diplomatique were present, as well as members of both Houses of Parliament.

As Grand Prior of the Order of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in England, the Prince of Wales yesterday presented, at Marlborough House, the medals and certificates of honour awarded by the Chapter during the

After the Public Works Loans Bill had been read a second time, some progress was made in the House of Commons, yesterday, with the Committee stage of the Agricultural Holdings Bill. Just after four o'clock Mr. Fletcher Moulton moved the adjournment, to enable members to attend the Queen's garden party. Strong protests were made by Mr. Dillon and others, and the motion was only carried with the assistance of the closure. When the Post Office Sites Bill was taken up the House was counted out.

Mr. R. W. Perks, M. P., and Lord Tweedmouth were the principal speakers at meetings held at King's Lynn yesterday in connection with the annual conference of the Eastern Counties Liberal Federation. The former defended the attitude he had taken on Home Rule and South African questions, and declared that if Liberals hoped to reassert themselves at the General Election they must unite under the leadership of Lord Rosebery.

At a supper given last night at the Mansion House to the C.I.V. draft which sails for South Africa this morning, the Lord Mayor announced that, at the Buckingham Palace garden party the Queen had commissioned him to wish them, in her name, God speed and a safe return.

Shooting was continued at Bisle yesterday under pleasant conditions, the heat being tempered by a smartly moving breeze. The principal competitions were again confined to match rifles. Lieutenant-Colonel Hopton, of the Hythe staff, won the Albert Prize, Major Gibbs, of Bristol, being second. The Wimbledon Cup was taken by Major W. J. Perkins, 2nd V. B. West Surrey.

After an interesting and well-fought game, the match between Gentlemen and Players ended at the Oval yesterday in a victory for the professionals by 37 runs. A Sheffield Yorkshire beat Sussex by an innings and 93 runs, while at Worcester the local representatives were defeated by Lancashire by an innings and 167 runs.
