NEWS OF THE DAY

MONTEVIDEO.
TUESDAY, DECEMBER 4, 1900.
Saints Peter Christmas and Barbara.—Suttee in India abolished, 1829.—838 days past, 27 to the end of the year.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives sat on Saturday. The Law of Licenses (patentes) for the interior for 1900-1901 was approved in detail with some minor amendments, and now passes to the Senate. The Live-Stock Sanitary Convention with Argentina was approved in general. There was no further business.

The note of the day has been a frankly seditious meeting held in the Odeon Theatre on Sunday afternoon under the auspices of the "Club Cruzada Libertadora," and which was attended by between 300 and 400 persons. The platform was occupied by a group of men, some of them military officers, who are notoriously connected with the various seditious movements that have occurred since 1898, or who are ardent followers of the ex-president Dr. Julio Herrera. The brother of the latter, Dr. Miguel Herrera, ex-minister of Government, was among them, and was also one of the orators. Other speakers were Dr. E. Chucarro, Sr. Julio Marquez, Sr. Acosta y Lara, Sr. Martinielli and Esquivel Dabry, and others. Nearly all the orators spoke in violent terms of President Cuestas, his Government and the present situation. The supporters of the Government were denounced as cowards and traitors to the "colorado" party. Some openly proposed their faith as "collectivists" and proclaimed a return to the "collectivism" of the times of Herrera and Borda as the only salvation for their party. A revolutionary movement for this object was freely spoken of as being necessary. One speaker said that he knew it would meet with almost unanimous support from the military element. Another speaker referred to the recent elections (the first honest and orderly contested elections the country has known) as a disgrace and a disaster! These speeches were hailed with frantic applause, interspersed with frequent cheers for Dr. Julio Herrera, the "collectivists," the mutineers of 1898, and groans and "muera" for Cuestas and his supporters and for the "blancos." An individual who rashly ventured on a cheer for Cuestas was promptly hustled to the door. Another who suggested that the "colorado" party required unifying and that this was hardly the way to go about it, was howled down. Eventually the meeting broke up in disorderly fashion, and groups of those present went through the streets giving cheers for Julio Herrera. Police officials were present and took notes, but made no effort to interrupt proceedings. A number of those who were present at the opening, quietly abandoned the Theatre when they saw the turn of things was taking.

MIDLAND URUGUAY RAILWAY.

The directors of the Midland Uruguay Railway Company, Limited, in their report for the year to June 30 last, state that the gross receipts for the year amounted to £38,103, compared with £39,717 for the twelve months to June 30, 1899, or a decrease of £1,614. The expenditure for the same period was £48,722, as against £42,097 in 1898-99. The general result of the working of the traffic for the year is a deficit of £8,619, as compared with £2,379 in the previous year. Adding the Government guarantee to the balance brought forward from the previous year, the amount to be dealt with is £63,515. After deducting the deficit of £8,619, the amount of the debenture interest, and the income tax, there remains a balance to the credit of revenue account of £6,490. In virtue of the arrangement with the debenture stock holders, by which funds were made available out of revenue for renewal of sleepers and other works, a large outlay has been made. The maintenance of way and works expenses for the year were £18,985, compared with £14,835 in 1898-99 and £9,925 in 1897-98. During the year 17,093 sleepers were renewed with 17,441 hardwood and 257 pine and steel. One bridge was rebuilt, several strengthened and repaired, and a large amount of extra ballasting done on the permanent way. The decrease in traffic receipts of £1,614 is more than accounted for by the diminution of animal traffic, brought about by a decree prohibiting the importation of cattle from the Argentine Republic, owing to an outbreak of foot and mouth disease. This decree seriously affected the Saladero industry, and thus deprived the company of much remunerative traffic. The passenger receipts during the latter part of the year were adversely affected by the interruption of through communication with Montevideo, owing to the washing away of a bridge to the south of our system. In spite of the foregoing, it is satisfactory to note the increase in goods receipts. The capital expenditure during the year amounted to £1,689; on the other hand, this account has been credited with the sum of £2,691, as representing the original cost of a locomotive sold to the Central Uruguay Railway Company, and two small buildings destroyed by fire. By a joint arrangement between this company, the North-Western of Uruguay Railway, and the Uruguay Northern Rail-

way, which came into force on May 1 last, each company agreed to appoint Mr. Allan Darton as general manager, and Mr. C. J. Albrecht as engineer, of their respective lines, and a standing committee has been formed in London composed of members of the boards of the three companies, to deal with matters of common interest. The board regret to have to report the death during the year of Lord Farrer, one of the trustees for the debenture stock holders. The surviving trustee has, under the provisions of the trust deed, and subject to the approval of the company, nominated the Right Hon. James Bryce, M.P., to a seat with him as the second trustee. The board has pleasure in reporting the punctual payment of the guarantee.

Whether the Government will take any notice of this openly seditious meeting remains to be seen. On previous occasions it has carried its spirit of toleration to a dangerous excess, and it may do so again, but we are sure that if it would for once decide to adopt a sterner and more vigorous policy, it would find it warmly supported by the better opinion of the country.

Rumors have been basily circulated in Buenos Aires that Sr. Cuestas contemplates resigning the presidency of the Republic, either as a step to the reconciliation of the "colorado" party, or for other reasons. No credit is given to them here, and like many other mischievous or malicious rumors that have appeared in Buenos Aires from time to time, they are known to proceed from a "collectivist" source.

The scrutiny of the senatorial election in Rivera has confirmed the victory of the "blancos" by a narrow margin of 15 votes. There were 1004 "blanco" votes cast in the Department, 983 "colorado" and 6 constitutionalists. The act passed off in complete order and without protest. We may remark that it is no doubt the defeat of the "colorados" in the recent elections that accounts for the present exasperation of the "collectivists," for they know well enough that once the country is allowed honest elections, all vestiges of power will slip hopelessly from their grasp. Sr. Cuestas could not commit a more cardinal sin in their eyes than to allow honest elections. Herrera and Borda carried electoral fraud and corruption to the fullest degree, and hence the "collectivists" idolize them.

The case against Col. Pedro Ramos, recently arrested on a charge of conspiracy, has been abandoned, the Military Fiscal (Prosecutor) not finding sufficient evidence to proceed. The charges against him seem to have been got up by an over zealous member of the secret police—in other words a spy. On the other hand the Fiscal asks for six months imprisonment for Mayor Morel, whose offence was that he published a letter, which he also sent to the President of the Republic, denouncing serious abuses committed in the 4th Cavalry. This is not encouraging.

Settling Children in the Transvaal.

Sir Brampton Gordon has summarily crushed the suggestions that the new colonies should be utilised as a transplanting ground for children from our industrial schools. He points out that though there is land in the southern portion of Cape Colony and Natal suitable for settlement by British colonists, the newly-annexed territories are pastoral, and not in any sense agricultural. Those who speak of "cleansing them with Britishers" seem to imagine that such colonists would find homesteads surrounded by 300 or 400 acres of cultivated land, as in this country. The Transvaal farms contain, as a rule, 7,000 acres; a very small area has been hoed by natives, and grows a little maize; the rest is rough pasture. For five months in the year there is not a drop of rain; for three or four months out of the five the farmer must leave his house, and take his flocks and herds to the bush veldt, where grass can be found, and where his only home will be his wagon. Such a life would never suit the British farmer, and in Sir Brampton Gordon's opinion such a country is certainly not fitted for the settlement of children from our industrial schools, as proposed by the Duke of Argyll. A good many people will be inclined to agree with him. The incident is but another to show what a terra incognita South Africa is, even to well-educated Englishmen.—Commercial Intelligence.

THE WAR.

Lord Kitchener, who is now established in his post as Commander in Chief in South Africa, in place of Lord Roberts, reports from Bloemfontein as follows.—Gen. Knox continues the pursuit of the Boer force under Steyn and De Wet which captured the Dawaetsdorp garrison. By latest account he is now some 12 miles north of Bethulia, on the frontier. In various skirmishes with advance guards he has had 7 wounded.—A strong Boer commando made an attack on Boshop, northwest of Bloemfontein, near the Griqualand frontier. It twice attacked the British garrison there, but was repulsed with heavy losses.—Gen. Paget, who is operating with a strong column in the region of the river Rhenoster, against the Boer forces under Viljoen and Erasmus, reports a determined combat in which he lost 5 killed and 50 wounded, the latter including Col. Lloyd (very dangerously) and five officers.

From Capetown it is reported (unofficially) that the campaign in Orange is reassuming very serious proportions. Numerous Boer commandos appear on all sides, and are constantly attacking the British forces, keeping them in a chronic state of alarm. The Boers have now adopted a new tactic of bayonet charges, which cause the British more losses than formerly.—A corps of 500 picked riders is being formed in Durban under the name of "Kitchener's Scouts."—Lord Kitchener is said to have doubled the guards round Bloemfontein, in prevision of an attack from the Boers going

northwards.—It is stated that an important combat is on foot near Roosville between Knox and De Wet, which it is hoped will result in the capture of the latter.

Last Friday there were three combats in north Orange, near Helvetia, between detachments from Knox's column, which were protecting the railway, and the commandos of Wesels and Fourrier. The Boers had heavy losses, and Fourrier lost one of two provision convoys which tried to pass the British lines. Gen. Picher's brigade has taken positions in south Orange to defend the frontier in case of any attempt at rebellion.

At Capetown, Maceking and various other cities, the press has initiated a vigorous campaign against the Afrikaner elements. The loyalists are holding meetings in which they ask for severe application of martial law. (This will only make relations more strained.) Speaking at Stellenbosch, Mr. Merriman, ex-Minister of the Treasury of Cape Colony, said that the present war was a black stain on British history, and the tactics employed by the British had embittered the worst elements on both sides, and would have fatal consequences for the future of S. Africa. He exhorted the Boers to be energetic in defence of their rights. Neither he nor Mr. Sauer (ex-minister of Public Works) would attend the congress about to be held at Worcester, so that it might be said that the Congress was the work of discontented politicians. Mr. Sauer made an even more violent speech, and especially attacked Sir Alfred Milner as an enemy of the Dutch element in the Cape. He exhorted the Delegates to the Congress to be firm, and declared that if Gt. Britain persisted in depriving the two Republics of their independence, she would alienate the sympathy of all the inhabitants of S. Africa.

Poster-Mania.

During a recent railway journey in France, I was very much puzzled by the tactics of a Frenchman who occasionally sat opposite me. He glared out of the windows the whole time, first at one side of the compartment, then, with a wild rush, to the other. In the usual way I began to size him up. He was, I opined, either an ardent admirer of Nature or an authority on crops. But he wasn't. He confided in me that he was a poster-collector.—"on the look out for hoardings." The time is near when it will be the correct thing for tourists to "do" the hoardings and not the so-called art galleries of our towns. It will soon be your lot to see Mr. Cook's flocks ignoring the Louvre and the Madeleine in their feverish haste to see the latest pictorial advertisement of Moonshine Soap. You will no longer talk of Titians and Raphaels, and will cease to be interested in the Madonna as a subject for artistic representation. Macha's decorative ladies, and Chéret's circus girls will command your attention and admiration. In France and Belgium they have had their annual exhibitions of posters for long enough, and even we have recently followed suit. It is now seriously proposed to establish a poster academy. And every one in England knows the immense stimulus to art given by an "Academy!"—Sunday Sun.

SUNDRIES.

—RED CROSS.—The Ladies Red Cross of Committee of Uruguay has taken the initiative in raising funds to assist the Red Cross work with the allied troops in China, by means of a public fête or Kermesse. Of this we will give particulars later on. A representative International Committee is being formed to carry out the idea under the presidency of M. le Comte de Malherbe, and it is earnestly desired that two or three representative English residents should join the Committee. In fact, remembering the part British troops and mariners have taken and are taking in the campaign, this is nothing short of a duty, and it would be shameful if we were not represented. M. de Malherbe has approached us personally on the subject, in the hope that we may induce some of our compatriots to come forward for the occasion, and we have promised to do what we can. Tomorrow we hope to say more about the matter.

—CELEBRITIES DEAD.—Telegrams announce the death of Theodor Mommsen, the great German historian, and of Oscar Wilde.

—A WASTED OPPORTUNITY.—It is a pity that the Paris Exposition has closed so soon, or else our little weekly contemporary might surely have claimed a Grand Prix for its last number. As a rule its columns are apt to be insipid, but on this occasion they were spicy and vigorous to an unusual degree that must

have fairly astonished its habitual readers. We hope that we may say this without being charged with egotism, for two-thirds of its matter was levelled, directly or indirectly, at us. Not only our own opinions on current matters, but even those of our casual correspondents came in for a share of its censure, and it seems to have been determined to find fault all round. Fortunately nobody takes anything it may say seriously, or otherwise we might indeed considered ourselves pulverised and wiped out. We are quite content that it should abuse us, even violently if it finds amusement in so doing. So long as it does this, we know we cannot be entirely in the wrong. If we had met with its approbation, then we might have our doubts. It is welcome to all it says; and we have not the least intention of being drawn into a polemic; our space is too valuable, and we have no desire to bore our readers.

—CHILDS THEATRE.—The popular zarzuela "La Brja" will be repeated this evening.

—WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY.—Marconi the discoverer of wireless telegraphy has stated to a press representative that before Christmas he will establish wireless telegraphy between London and New York.

—JAGERSFONTEIN.—Jagersfontein (Hauter's Fountain), which is frequently mentioned in connexion with desultory fighting just now, is, next to Kimberley, the most important diamond mining centre in South Africa. It is a town of some 1,100 white inhabitants, and lies southwest of Bloemfontein. The largest white diamond in the world was found here in 1893, weighing 971 carats, but a flaw depreciated its value. The average yearly yield of diamonds at Jagersfontein is about £400,000.

—A PRINCEBLOW OF THE QUEEN.—Miss Caroline Hillman died the other day in Driffield Workhouse. The old lady had seen better days and in her youth played with Queen Victoria, her father and grandfather having both been in the service of the late Duke of Kent, the Queen's father. Miss Hillman's father, after the death of the Duke, became a waiter at the Bell Hotel, Driffield. Deceased was nearly blind. The Queen sent her a gift in the Diamond Jubilee year.

—A RAILWAY-TICKET PROBLEM.—The New York Tribune relates an amusing story. A man twenty-one years old, who was travelling recently on a Santa Fé train, presented the return coupon of a child's half-rate ticket for transportation from San Francisco to Kansas City. He had bought the ticket eleven years ago, and as it was unlimited as to time he claimed the right to use the ticket on his return trip. The railroad officials, on the other hand, argued that, as it was a half-rate ticket good for a child under twelve years of age, he, a man of twenty-one, could not ride on it. The contract on the back of the ticket did not specify that the child was to stop growing, however, and now the question is, Can the young man compel the railroad to carry him on that ticket?

—S. AMERICAN DOG.—An amiable little brown-headed puppy in the small mammals house at the Zoo is the first representative that has been exhibited for the last twenty years ago, of a rather fierce race of South American dogs. The species is known by a technical name which means hunting wascel dog, a very appropriate name for this long-bodied and short-legged creature, the puppy of which at any rate has the light brown head and general aspect of the equally South American weasel, the Tayra. It is believed to be an ancient type of dog, and it is not at all unlike the curious Japanese "Raccoon-like dog." To the person knowing in domestic dogs it may suggest the dachshund, but of course there is no connection between them. The Ichtyon has not been the progenitor of any European domesticated race.

—WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY is about to be put at the service of passengers as well as of officials. The steamers between Dover and Ostend. The needful apparatus is being erected on the other side. An addition, with corresponding apparatus, to the masts of the vessels carrying the mails, will keep the ship in that mysterious touch with the land which is yet to touch. The ether will carry the whisper safely across the water and ring it out loud on the instrument on land. When the same kind of receiver is erected at this side, the passengers may send their words to either shore. If anything goes wrong, the silent voice will cross the water and cry help to the nearest land.

—DEATH.—We deeply regret, says the Rio News of Nov. 27, to note the death yesterday morning in Liverpool of Mr. H. Bell Morton, representative

LONDON NOTES.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 2.

Several Cabinet changes are announced this morning. The Marquis of Salisbury is appointed Prime Minister and Lord Privy Seal. Mr. C. T. Ritchie, Home Secretary; the Marquis of Lansdowne, Foreign Secretary; Mr. St. John Brodick, Secretary of State for War; and the Earl of Selborne, First Lord of the Admiralty.

Memorial services to the late Prince Christian Victor were held yesterday at the Chapel Royal, St. James's, and at Windsor Castle. Amongst those present at the former were the Duke of Cambridge, representatives of members of the Royal family, Lord Salisbury, and other members of the Cabinet, and members of the diplomatic corps. At Windsor the Prince and Princess of Wales were amongst the Royal mourners, occupying the Queen's closet in St. George's Chapel.

The funeral of Professor Max Müller took place yesterday at Oxford, and was largely attended. Amongst those represented were the Queen and German Emperor; wreaths were also sent by their Majesties, and by the King of Sweden.

A statement was made at yesterday's meeting of the School Board for London that there were at least 20 foreigners on the roll of the Kennet gardens Evening School being educated out of the rates and taxes, to which they contributed their share. The annual report of the Evening Continuation Schools was received after a discussion. A substantial increase in the number of pupils was recorded.

Presiding at a lecture given last night to the Solicitors' Managing Clerks' Association, Lord Alverstone spoke of the importance of scientific study of the law, and recommended also the acquisition of knowledge on the history of the law.

Two actions for libel brought against newspapers were heard in the Queen's Bench Division yesterday. In one a turf commission agent and bookmaker recovered damages from «The Times» for the publication of a notice in which he was described as being well known to the police. The jury awarded him £100. In the other, a fancier and judge of buildups obtained a verdict for £300 for a statement published in «The Licensed Victuallers' Gazette» attributing an unfairness to him in his official capacity at several dog shows.

At the Central Criminal Court, yesterday, William P. Leech, a public house broker, was convicted under the Debtors Act for having concealed from his trustee in bankruptcy a sum of £964. The Recorder sentenced him to four months' imprisonment in the second division.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 3.

Last evening the Prince of Wales presided at a dinner given by the officers and members of the Honourable Artillery Company to their comrades who had served in the war in South Africa. His Royal Highness spoke highly of the progress which had been made by the Corps, and of their services as loyal Englishmen abroad. Congratulatory speeches were also made by Major McKicking, Colonel Mackinnon, and other officers, and by the Lord Mayor. In a later speech the Prince made feeling reference to the death of Prince Christian Victor. It was, he added, by the wish of his sister and brother-in-law that he attended that evening.

Colonel Lord Chesham has been appointed Master of the Buckhounds, in the room of the Earl of Coventry, resigned. Her Majesty has also been pleased to approve of the provisional

Complete returns of the poll in six of the twenty-eight metropolitan boroughs were made known on Thursday night; the residue were declared yesterday. Of the 1,362 Councillors elected, 785 are Moderates, 460 Progressives, 11 are Labour representatives, and 106 are Independents.

Members of the old Free Church of Scotland who object to the recent act of Union met yesterday in Edinburgh, and passed resolutions declaratory of their intention to adhere to the old system. They also issued a manifesto calling for the assistance and adherence of those throughout Scotland who shared their views.

Grievances of waiters and musicians were ventilated yesterday at the sitting of the Theatre and Music Halls Committee of the London County Council to hear applications for music and dancing licences in respect of premises north of the Thames. An unsuccessful attempt was made to induce the Committee to withdraw the prohibition of the sale of drink at the Hippodrome.

Two actions were heard together yesterday before Mr. Justice Channell and a common jury in the Queen's Bench Division, by which a Fulham dressmaker named Knight recovered £100 against Mr. Stanley D. Cadley, a clerk, for breach of promise; and the lady's father £50 from the same defendant as damages for the seduction of his daughter and the consequent loss of her services. The parties became engaged in 1898, and a number of affectionately worded letters passed between them.

Benjamin Greene Lake, a solicitor, was brought before Sir F. Lushington, at the Bow street Police Court, yesterday, charged with having, as a trustee, appropriated certain sums of money to his own use with intent to defraud. He was remanded.

V.—THE INDIAN SECRETARY'S STORY.

(Continued)

As time went on the vague prophecy received ample verification; so certainly and surely that in Ahmed's case an early death was accepted as a foregone conclusion. Every one of his predecessors had come to a violent end within a short space of reaching the fatal age. One of them had been found murdered in the garden of his palace; another was drowned in a lake whither he had gone alone, it was supposed, for the purpose of shooting ducks; while yet a third—Ahmed's own father—had been discovered lying on the plain outside the city walls, strangled with a bowstring. The authors of all these crimes remained unknown, and the whereabouts of the vanished diamond continued a mystery. Thus it was that Ahmed was so imbued with the tradition of his family that, while giving him self up to the affairs of state with a devotion which endeared him to his people, he abjured all that could make him value the life he was so soon to lose. This principle he carried to such an extent that he resolutely refused to take to himself a wife, saying that he would not perpetuate a race thus foredoomed to disaster.

The message from the seer Pragmalji was the first ray of hope that had reached him. Putting the best construction upon it, it meant that the old man could put him in the way of finding the Kali Stone, so that he could restore it to the goddess, and thus escape the ban of her displeasure. Ahmed knew the aged seer well by repute as a holy man of great learning and wisdom, who had dwelt by the city gate for longer time than the oldest inhabitant of Doonghar could remember. His age was reputed to be nigh on a hundred years, and the wise-words of the bazaar told wild tales of his communing with the spirit world.

At nightfall Ahmed left the palace for the purpose of seeking Pragmalji's abode. To stifle the curiosity of the many who would have recognised him, he had disguised his well-known figure in the flowing white garments of a Moslem merchant, and he had bound his turban low to conceal his face. As he turned into the great bazaar he had to pass the temple of Kali; and through the open doorway he saw the grim figure of the goddess, with the gaping cavity over the brow whence the jewel had been wrangled. Across the idol's knees lay the sacrificial knife all stained with the blood of the victims, and her hideous features seemed to grin threateningly at the Maharajah as he hurried on, more eager than ever to restore the missing gem.

At this hour the streets of Doonghar were full enough, but, thanks to his disguise, Ahmed reached the seer's door unrecognised. Pragmalji's house was of mean exterior and had a deserted, lonely appearance, which was perhaps in accordance with the reputation of the owner as a strict recluse, but which was scarcely reassuring to an unattended prince. The door was barred, and no glimmer of light was visible through the unglazed windows. Ahmed's summons to open was answered at length by the boy who had brought the note to the audience chamber. Without a word he beckoned the Maharajah to enter, and leading the way through a long passage which was nearly in darkness, passed up a rickety staircase followed by the visitor. So far the surroundings were of the most squalid order. The place was narrow and dirty, with the dust of ages accumulated on the floor, and there was an odour of age and dampness over everything. But at the top of the ladder-like stairs the boy drew a key from his girdle and opened a massive door, inviting Ahmed to proceed. Here the scene changed suddenly from gloom and squalor to luxury and splendour that, even without the contrast of the mean approach, would have caused a thrill of wonder to those beholding it for the first time. The place in which Ahmed found himself was a sort of entrance hall, richly carpeted and lit with the mellow light of a silver lamp suspended from a beautifully painted ceiling. A small fountain of rose water played in the centre, and the walls were covered with embroidered hangings from the looms of Persia and Cashmere.
