THE ECONOMICAL SITUATION OF URUGUAY.

We quote the following from the Financial Chapter of the *South American Journal* of August 18:—

Although the political situation in the Republic of Uruguay is at present, and has been for some time, growingly satisfactory, that country, on the whole, has not, during the past couple of years, made such headway under the administration of President Cuestas as was confidently looked for some time ago. The *Times* correspondent in Montevideo has just sent a communication to your contemporary (published August 10) in which he points out that it is becoming painfully evident that the Government of President Cuestas, despite its many merits, has not yet succeeded in bringing about a return of economic prosperity to the Republic. The customs receipts, for the year ended in June last, are cited in proof of this, and, indeed, there is no disputing the fact that an increase over the previous year of only \$67,734 in revenue, or barely 3 per cent., is far from being impressive. Nevertheless, as respects some South American Republics, it would be gratifying to be in a position to record even so small an improvement, for the movement is in the right direction. To properly appreciate the situation it is necessary to look back a few years, and remember that, when Señor Cuestas took over the Vice-Presidency, and a few months later declared himself Dictator, the country was in a very desperate condition. Trade was at a standstill, no budget had been presented for many years, official salaries were long overdue; in a word, the only redeeming feature was the knowledge that the Government did not, as has so often happened under identical circumstances, default on its foreign debt. Nevertheless, considerable difficulty was experienced in making both ends meet, and, with a disturbed political atmosphere, it is not wonderful that the trade and commerce of the country was at a very low ebb. When Señor Cuestas assumed power as constitutionally elected President, after he had practically held the reins of power for eighteen months, and it was seen that he really had, not only the will, but the capacity to give the country political and administrative freedom from corruption, it was thought that a decided trade revival would forthwith set in. While there was no doubt an improvement, 1898-99 did not, however, show so great a gain as was expected, but it was thought that 1899-1900 would present much more emphatic results. But the Customs receipts amounted to \$10,054,360, as compared with \$9,736,009; an increase of only \$319,351. The *Times* correspondent is of opinion that the weak spot lies in the tributary system, the duties and taxes on commerce and industry being exorbitant, obstructive, and ill-adjusted. In the custom duties alone there are numerous instances of common articles of use being raised to the rank of luxuries, and their sale in consequence limited to a fifth or even a tenth of what it might be under a more rational régime. Shopkeepers of all kinds are obliged to charge extravagant prices for the most ordinary articles, and all of them complain that their business is thus very seriously restricted. Traders and capitalists, when they endeavour to engage in new branches of commerce and industry, have been so taxed, harassed, and discouraged, that, af-

ter a few months' experience, they have been compelled to abandon their attempts and to withdraw their capital and energies for employment elsewhere. Added to all this there is the drawback of an antiquated quarantine system, and the bonds of the country are quoted at so low a price as to give an exceptionally high yield. But for this I attribute no blame to President Cuestas. He has done his best to improve the situation, and it is not his fault if he has not been entirely successful.

Although we have not the letter of the *Times* correspondent before us, we venture to add a few remarks to the above. When Sr. Cuestas acceded to the presidency in August, 1897, the Republic had been engaged for some six months in civil war, and its fortunes were consequently at the lowest ebb. Things would indeed have been black if there had not been some recovery from that period, but what we understand the *Times* correspondent to claim, and what we ourselves have maintained, is that the recovery is much less than what was expected. A comparison with such an abnormal period as that of 1897, is not a just one from which to draw conclusions of any value. To do this it is necessary to go back a little further, say to 1895-96, and we do not hesitate to say that there would be no difficulty in showing that the economical activity of that period, despite a corrupt, distrustful and very unpopular Government, was greater than it has been in the period 1898-1900, under the reformed Government of Sr. Cuestas. This may be shown both by comparison of the Customs revenue and of the commercial statistics, without taking into account the general feeling of the market. It must also be remembered that there is five years increase of population to allow for. A paltry increase of 3 per cent. in the Customs revenue, from a level which was itself below the average, is decidedly unsatisfactory and disappointing.

It is quite true that President Cuestas is not to blame for the situation, in the sense that he did not create it, but we consider that he is to blame in the sense that he has not attempted to reform it. He has greatly reformed the country politically and administratively, and for that he deserves high credit, but his reforms have stopped short there, and, as experience has proved beyond doubt, this has not been sufficient to revive the economical situation. His fiscal policy—by which we mean the excessive pressure of taxation—has been as disastrous to public welfare as that of his predecessors, and until this is reformed, the economical situation, in our opinion, will not recover from its present stagnation. Whether the Government be honest or corrupt, popular or unpopular, commerce and industry will neither flourish nor expand, so long as they are crushed and hampered in every direction by excessive duties and taxes, and by exaggerated officialism.

NEWS OF THE DAY

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives sat on Saturday. The Law of Licenses (*Patentes*) for 1900-1901 was referred to the Committee of Finance. Discussion in detail was resumed of the Bill amending the internal tobacco tax. After a prolonged debate, Art. 1 was approved, reducing the specific duty on black pigtail tobacco to 12 cents per kilo. The Chamber then adjourned.

Rumors of preparations in Buenos Aires for a "collectivist" invasion were again very rife yesterday, the basis being some startling notices published by the Buenos Aires papers, but which probably have more of invention than of fact in them. It is possible that the "collectivists" may make some mad attempt, or the simulacrum of one, but no one believes in their power seriously to disturb the public peace, and consequently the news of their preparations is only received with derision and contempt. Both the Government and the Argentine authorities are sufficiently on the *qui vive*, and there is perfect confidence in the ability of the former to preserve order and maintain the situation. In fact, if the "collectivists" were capable of learning a lesson, it would be almost an advantage that they should make an attempt, just to convince them of their own impotence and the public antipathy in which they are held. If they could once learn that, they might consent to remain quiet for a while. Moreover, perhaps on this occasion the offenders would not be treated with the same mistaken leniency as before, and might receive a sharper lesson than they expect.

From the Custom House is reported considerably improved activity, especially in the despatch of soft-goods. This was to be expected in the present month, when the shops are laying in their stocks for the approaching spring and summer.

THE WAR.

Lord Roberts reports as follows:—Sir R. Buller's forces have occupied Lydenburg. The Boers are retreating hastily on Pilgrimage. They offered (? no) great resistance. I do not think they will present themselves again with forces of any importance. Gen. Hamilton flanked their position and fell on the point where their guns were placed. They were unable to withdraw many of these, and Hamilton captured most of them. They employed the guns they took with them to cover their retreat, but their firing did not cause us any losses. On the 5th the commandos of De Wet and Theron united near Johannesburg, and now occupy strong positions with a column 1,000 strong.

A second despatch from Lord Roberts adds the following details. The forces of Gens. Doodson and Brocklehurst, commanding the 3rd cavalry brigade and the Natal cavalry, have occupied Lydenburg. Buller states that his forces and those of Hamilton are 5 miles from Lydenburg, having had an encounter with the Boers, in which our losses were only 4 wounded. Buller further states that both retreated with some of his guns towards Krugersdorp, which is northwards on the line of Pilgrimage, whilst other Boers are falling back on Spiltoep, south of Lydenburg, and in precisely the opposite direction. In the advance on Krugersdorp Gen. Hart had some skirmishes with the enemy. On the road he found four dead Boers, one of them believed to be Col. Theron. (A rumor of the death of Theron also appears in a message from Capetown.) Gen. Hildyard occupied Walkerstroom on the 5th. The Boers opposing his march, commanded by Joseph Joubert, retreated after a skirmish which cost us 1 killed and 4 wounded.

One of the patrols of Gen. Clement's column, marching on Kekepoort, was surprised by a Boer party and lost 1 killed and 3 wounded.

On account of the almost daily railway accidents caused by the Boers, Lord Roberts proposes to order the immediate shooting of any person found near a railway in suspicious attitude.

The *Daily Mail* publishes a telegram from Pietermaritzburg stating that after the British occupied Lydenburg, the Boers situated on the surrounding hills opened a terrible bombardment for over two hours, regardless of the presence of many Englishwomen and of the Red Cross flag. Kruger has proclaimed Pilgrimage as the new capital of the Transvaal (for how long?) Gen. Louis Botha is said to be north-east of Lydenburg, with 12 guns of small calibre. The Boers are reported to have recaptured Bethlehem, Flouriesburg and Seukel.

R. M. S. "Clyde."

The Trip Out.

A friendly passenger has obliged us with the following notes:—

The R.M.S. "Clyde" arrived in port on Saturday afternoon, bringing dates to Aug. 18th, after having had an unusually fine weather passage, the sea from the Channel to St. Vincent and from Rio to Montevideo being as smooth as the proverbial millpond. Since her last visit to the River Plate, this vessel has been thoroughly overhauled in dry-dock, and her passenger accommodation has been greatly improved by the construction of a hurricane deck, similar to that arrangement of the "Nile" and "Daube," leaving the main deck entirely unobstructed for passengers use and providing them with sun and weather protection.

Although only bringing some 50 saloon passengers for the Plate, the steamer was well filled to Rio, and an energetic Entertainment Committee kept things pleasant throughout the trip for the amusement of their fellow travellers—two dances, a concert (at which 27 was subscribed for the Poor-box), athletic sports, cricket, and all manner of tournaments being held. Captain C. S. Tindall and his officers contributing greatly to their successful issue.

The steamer was boarded by the Argentine sanitary Inspector in Pernambuco and no communication having been allowed from the shore in Rio free pratique was given on arrival in Montevideo.

Amongst the passengers for this city returning from holidays in Europe, were Mr. and Mrs. Herbert P. Contos of Penarth, Mrs. Miss and Messrs. Cranwell, and Mr. J. Weir Reid, of the London Bank, all looking in the best of health after their trip.

Fashionable Wedding in Buenos Aires.

One of the largest attended and most fashionable weddings of the season, at St. John's Church, was that of Mr. D. Ross Henderson and Miss Margarita Huxtable, which was celebrated at 3 p. m., on Thursday. Owing to their prominence in society both have a large circle of acquaintances, Miss Huxtable is the charming daughter of the well-known and popular manager of the Buenos Aires and Pacific Railway.

Mr. D. Ross Henderson is a nephew of Mr. Frank Henderson, Manager of the Southern railway, and brother to the assistant to the Manager of the Western railway.

The body of the church was well filled before the hour for the wedding arrived. Mr. J. H. Wall presided at the organ in his usual masterly manner and among the selections played here the following: "Andante," J. H. Wall; "Ocasional Overture," Handel; "Be Thou Faithful Unto Death," Mendelssohn.

The wedding party entered the church to the beautiful strains of the wedding march and one of the most charming brides of the season was escorted to the altar on the arm of the father, Mr. Sidney H. Paleston officiated as best man and was assisted by Mr. George Henderson. The bridesmaids were Miss Marie Brooks, Miss Dorothy Henderson, and Miss Kathleen Rowland.

The bride was attired in a costume of ivory duchess satin, the panel of bodice and skirt embroidered in pearls and gold festooned with chiffon. The sleeves were transparent chiffon and the square court train of the skirt was lined with chiffon. A rich embroidered tulle veil, surmounted with a crown of orange blossoms.

Following the wedding ceremony the wedding party adjourned to the Cafe Paris where a reception was held. The bride cut the wedding cake, a rich affair surmounted with horse shoes and miniature wedding bells.

Among the toasts mentioned were those proposed by the Rev. Mr. George who officiated at the wedding, and also a toast by the bride's father. Football.

SUNDRIES.

—COTTON PLANTING.—The *Siglo* states that satisfactory results are being obtained by the propaganda of the Nat. Department of Agriculture in favor of cotton as an object of cultivation in this Republic. Several important agriculturists have made applications for quantities of seed for experimental purpose and, should the result prove promising, are disposed to devote large areas to further cultivation. Amongst these mention is made of Sr. J. Batello of Tacuarembó, Sr. G. Fernandez of San José, and Sr. A. L. Rodriguez of Tranqueras, Dept. of

Rivera. The present month is the proper time for sowing, and the Department of Agriculture will supply seed to any applicants.

—NEW STEAMSHIP LINE.—Next month there will be inaugurated a new line of steamers, running between Genoa, Barcelona, Brasil and the River Plate. The line is founded by the Spanish ship-builder Sr. J. Jover Serra, and the first steamer will bear his name. The head quarters of the line will be in Barcelona, and Carran and Co. have been named agents in this port.

—DISSOLUTION OF PARLIAMENT.—A London telegram announces, on the authority of the *Daily News*, that the present parliament will be dissolved at the end of this month. We suppose this will mean a general election in October or November. The strong protests that were made against holding a general election at the present moment have evidently had no effect. It would not have suited Mr. Chamberlain to listen to them.

—STRANGE ACCIDENT.—A London telegram gives account of an extraordinary accident that occurred in the Victoria Docks on the arrival of the steamer "Cullingwood," with a cargo of maize from Buenos Aires. It appears that during the voyage, the maize, which was in bulk, had become damp and fermented. When the hold was opened, the emanation of gas was so powerful that the inspector fell dead, and three of the assistants who accompanied him were nearly suffocated and are still seriously ill. It was only by keeping the hold hermetically sealed that a fire was averted.

—STRIKES.—It is telegraphed from New York that a general strike of some 100,000 miners throughout the Union is anticipated, owing to a disagreement with the mine owners. It is not said whether this refers to coal or to iron mines. In France there is an epidemic of strikes, the coachmen in Paris, the oil refiners in Marseilles, the metal workers in Havre, the mariners at Rouen and neighboring ports, and the dockers at Oran, all being in various stages of strike.

—BULL-FIGHTS.—Although the Chambers failed to complete the sanction of bull-fights here, this *Tribuna* calmly announces that preparations are being made to hold them in the approaching season. Will the Government permit this open breach of the law? Although nominally prohibited by the Argentine law, bull-fights are being held in Rosario by a gang of bull-fighters from Spain.—We cannot help thinking that, if the authorities were properly energetic, they would cut the evil short at the root.—we had nearly written "take the bull by the horns"—by prohibiting the landing of bull-fighters, classifying them with vagabonds, criminals, notorious anarchists, professional pimps, and other objectionable persons whose immigration is interdicted as pernicious to society.

—STORMS.—A New York telegram reports severe tempests on the south-east coast of the northern continent from Louisiana to Mexico and extending one hundred miles inland. The material damages are heavy, especially at Galveston where they reach several million dollars.

—SALT.—Alarm is felt in England at the manoeuvres of a N. American syndicate which is trying to establish a monopoly for salt that shall cover Gt. Britain and the United States, by dominating the production of this article of prime necessity. Their object is an unholy one, like the majority of "trusts," and it is to be hoped they will fail.

—SALSON.—The anarchist Salson who recently attempted the life of the Shah, in Paris, has been sent to a mad house without further trial, it being shown that he is quite insane.

—CHOLERA.—Great alarm has been caused in Madrid by the appearance of what is said to be a fully proved case of cholera (probably sporadic).

—ANOTHER MURDER.—At 5 p. m. on Saturday afternoon the soldier Juan Torres, of the 1st Chasseurs, who had been out on leave, returned to the barracks the worse for liquor. His condition being noticed, Corporal Juan Monchal ordered him to go and lie down. Torres thereupon became abusive and violent, and eventually seized his rifle, which was loaded, and shot Monchal through the heart, causing immediate death. The murderer was arrested and has been placed at the disposal of the Military Judges. It would be interesting to know to what the extent the soldiers are allowed to carry their rifles loaded with ball cartridge when not required on service.

—DEATHS.—The death took place on Saturday evening, from a fit, of Sr. Maguas Hinrichs, the well-known beer-salon proprietor. He leaves a widow and several children to lament his loss.—The death occurred on Sunday, rather suddenly, of Lieut.-Col. Gumerando Collaza, Prefect of Cero Largo during the previous administration.

—POLAR EXPLORATION.—The expedition led by the Duke of Abruzzo to the polar regions has returned to Hammerfest, the most northerly town in Europe. In spring 1899 the "Stella Polaris," which carried the expedition entered Tiffy Bay and was ice bound.

eleven months. The Duke then decided to proceed in sleighs. In one of the first sleigh expeditions the Duke lost two fingers by frost-bite and had to remain four months in camp. He organized four expeditions which he sent to the North. In the second expedition a Norwegian and two Italians died. The third was 24 days in the ice desert and had to return as its members were tired out. The fourth was more successful and under the command of Captain Humberto Cagni it kept advancing 105 days and reached a point 86 degrees 33' north, or 19' further north than Nansen. The members of this expedition had to eat some of their dogs. The ship was greatly damaged by the ice.

—KUGLER AS HAMLET!—We read in a London paper: The alleged appearance of Mr. Kruger on the London stage is now very substantially confirmed by a correspondent, who is nothing if not exact in the matter of dates and localities. It was, according to this authority, on the 9th of March, 1864 (the year, it will be noted, of the centenary of Shakespeare's birth, when Mr. Kruger is said to have visited England) that the present President of the Transvaal appeared in the part of Hamlet at the Pavilion Theatre in the Whitechapel-road. The entire cast, indeed, is forthcoming, including Miss Constance Young, "the leading stock lady," and a handsome young actress, as Ophelia, Mr. Charles Robinson as Queen Gertrude, and Mr. William Harmer, "the East-end favorite," as the First Grave-digger. We are further told that Mr. Alfred Saville, brother of the late Lady Martin, was stage-door keeper at the time; that the foreign accent which pervaded the utterances of the young Prince of Denmark did not please the East-end folk, and finally that Mr. Kruger was no more seen. Here is surely circumstantiality enough to guide the researcher of any curious explorer of the theatrical papers of the period; but Kruger being a common name in Dutch communities it is obvious that some more evidence will be required than the actor's foreign accent or the appearance in the playbill of the words "Hamlet, Mr. P. Kruger."

LONDON NOTES.

MONDAY, AUG. 13.

The funeral of the late Lord Russell of Killowen will take place at Epse Cemetery to-morrow.

A mass meeting of men employed by the Great Eastern Railway Company was held at the Theatre Royal, Stratford, last evening, to receive reports from delegates appointed to lay their demands before the directors. It was stated that the deputation had been received courteously, but that the directors had given no reply, saying they must take time for consideration. Considerable dissatisfaction was expressed at this, and it was resolved to request a definite answer by Saturday next. The meeting was then adjourned for a week.

A remarkably large and enthusiastic meeting of Jews living in the East of London took place on Saturday night, in the Great Assembly Hall, at Mile-end, to welcome delegates to the Zionist Congress, which opens in Queen's Hall, Langham-place, to-day.

Members of the National Amalgamated Union of Shop Assistants, Warehousemen, and Clerks, held a demonstration yesterday afternoon in Hyde Park, when vigorous speeches were delivered in favour of the objects of the association, which aims at obtaining better conditions of work and payment for the class it represents.

As a result of loss of time through bad weather, the cricket matches between Essex and Lancashire at Leyton, Warwickshire and Yorkshire at Birmingham, Somerset and Sussex at Taunton, Leicestershire and Hampshire at Leicester, Kent and Surrey at Canterbury, and Worcestershire and Derbyshire at Worcester were all left drawn. Middlesex, however, won their match against Gloucestershire at Clifton by 125 runs; and at Norwich the West Indians finished up their tour in this country with a victory over Norfolk by an innings and 16 runs.

TUESDAY, AUGUST 14.

Alderman Sir A. J. Newton, Lord Mayor of London, accompanied by the Lady Mayoress and Sheriff and Lady Trevelyan, were present at Scarborough yesterday, and took part in various public functions, the chief item in the day's programme being to constitute the Chief Magistrate of the Metropolis the first freeman on the roll of the famous Yorkshire seaside resort.

At the opening of the Zionist Congress, in Queen's Hall, yesterday, Dr. Herzl, the president, gave an address on the progress of the movement for the settlement of Jews in Palestine.

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161, CALLE ITUZAINGO—MONTEVIDEO.

Dr. Max Nordau delivered an address on the present position of the Jewish race. Mr. Greenberg gave statistics and comments on Jews in Great Britain.

Two important vessels were successfully launched yesterday. At Barrow, Lady Muncaster christened the new first class armoured cruiser Hogue a new type of fighting ship constructed for the British Government; while at Greenock, the Persia, the biggest P. and O. liner ever built, left the dock, and will make her maiden voyage to Bombay early in November next.

Grouse shooting opened yesterday under generally favourable conditions. The weather was exceedingly fine in most places, and although strong winds were occasionally experienced, these did not interfere with the success of the sport. Birds are for the most part well forward; but in many cases very wild, as a consequence of the recent continued wet weather.

At the Crystal Palace yesterday, the London County Club, playing against Worcestershire, stayed in all day, and scored 281 for the loss of eight wickets. Yorkshire, at Leeds, had all the best of their match against Middlesex, for, after scoring 235, they got five Middlesex wickets down for 66. In the first match of the Bournemouth week, Surrey were disposed of for 237, and Hampshire scored 60 for two wickets; at Hastings, Sussex, after being put in by Lancashire, scored 147, and dismissed young Lancashire batsmen for 123.
